Tanks Clatter Through Beirut Streets As Grim Reminders

By LARRY COLLINS

BEIRUT (UPI) - U.S. tanks clattered through the streets of Beirut Wednesday night, offering tacit warning to pro - government bandits that there must be no further interference with American troops.

"This will let (pro - government leader) Saeb Salem's people know that we have the capacity for effective action if we are forced to it," a U.S. Army spokesman said. Stick-up men identified as followers of Salem halted an American military police jeep on an important supply road outside Beirut late Wednesday and stole the revolvers carried by the three-man

One of the MP's was injured, and the guns were recovered by the Lebanese army.

A few hours later, five tanks in column rolled through the center of the city. Armed infantrymen riding atop the tanks covered windows and rooftops with their car-

As the column passed along the waterfront, the tanks' big guns crowd gathered outside the St. George Hotel to watch the tanks turn around and start back to

The demonstration of armored might started a buzz of rumors in the city, including a hastily-denied report that Premier Rashid Karami's cabinet had been replaced by a military regime. Karami himself denied the re-

Johnson Asks Low Interest **Loans Be Made**

DALLAS (UPI) - Senate Demo eratic Leader Lyndon Johnson said today if it is proper for the federal government to make long term, low interest rate loans to foreign nations, similar aid should be made available to local gov-

ernments in this country. "And I'm tired of the hypocrisy that says it is not," Johnson said in a speech prepared for delivery at a convention of the county judges and commissioners associ-

He cautioned that the mounting cost of local government could "place a lien against the future of a region," and added:

"I don't want this to happen in Texas - and I certainly don't want it to happen outside Texas either. If local governments need help to help themselves, I believe they ought to be able to find that help from their federal government. I think that you ought to be able to look to Washington for something more than a formal letter of introduction referring you the bond-houses of Wall

Johnson saw in Texas "the place where the American economy of tomorrow will find its home," and said the state is headed for the day when it will "rank No. 1 in the nation in population,' and "stand as an industrial and commercial and cultural center of the western hemisphere.'

U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, speaking Monday, pointed out that Texas receives more federal highway benefits than any other state, but ranks only 39th in the nation for treatment of elderly persons. "I personally am not in favor of cutting off this aid to old peo-

ple," he said. Yarborough said 26 per cent of the funds spent in 1956 and 1957 by the Texas Highway Department was federal money and out of \$143,000,000 spant by Texas on benefits to elderly persons, \$100,-000,000 was federal money.

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

As the sun begins to set low in the northern hemisphere and the days get shorter, the thoughts of more and more people-particularly parents-turn toward vitamins.

They wonder how to get the vitamins they need in their food, whether they should take vitamin preparations bought in a drug store, and if so, which vitamins they should buy. The subject is

complex. Vitamins are complicated chemical substances which are needed in small quantities to maintain life and health in the human body and which are not made at all by the body itself, or frequently are not manufactured in sufficient

There are a great many vitamine which are still named after the letters of the alphabet because the early students of the subject Marted that way.

Virtually all of the vitamins needed by the body are present in one kind of food or another. In countries like Canada and the United States, where a wide variety of foodstuffs is available, most all the needed vitamins can be obtained from the diet alone, providing there is proper selec-

analyzed have differing actions. Some of them are really bestknown by what happens to the body when insufficient quantities are consumed. In some the exact part they played is still poorly un-

Besides knowing something of what vitamins can do, everyone should realize that there are a great many things which they cannot do.

Only Drastic Tax Reform Can Preserve Freedom

William Henry Chamberlin has an interesting article in "Human Events" under the heading of 'The Power To Destroy; Only Drastic Tax Reform Can Preserve

I think he should have said, Only Drastic Tax Reform Can Help Restore Freedom." We certainly do not have freedom now with the graduated income tax and the labor laws that limit the employer's choice in selecting his

The 16th Amendment passed in 1913 gave the government the authority to take any iraction of a man's income Congress saw fit to

Chamberlin writes: "So at first the income tax did not seriously affect the 'pursuit of happiness' of many people, although some farsighted members of Congress recognized the danger mplicit in giving politicians a lien of indefinite proportions on the earnings of the people. Even these pessimists, one suspects, would have been surprised and shocked by the growth of this burden. In the first year of its imposition the income tax brought in about \$80 million. Now American taxpayers are paying over \$30 billion annually through this form of exaction. Of course population and real wealth have grown during the last 45 years But not in the proportion of more than 300 to

Then Chamberlin relates how difficult it is for a man to save to take care of his old age because of the income tax. Before 1913 men could save what they earned for their old age. Then he

. Now the all - powerful. and all-meddling state muscles in like a racketeer, demanding a large first cut of everyone's earnings, a cut that becomes progressively larger as the individual becomes more competent and able to earn more money.

' The spark plug of individual incentive is brought to sputtering extinction by a tax system that treats competence and prosperity as a crime and makes it almost impossible, without inherited wealth, to build up the medium and small fortunes which formerly testified to the vitality of, the American way of life.

Morally and fiscally an excessive tax on personal earnings is the worst imaginable form of exaction. It does not commend it self to the individuai's sense of what is right and just, the moral sanction that must underlie law, it is to be effectively enforced. It produces a vast amount of legal, semi-legal and illegal evasion. It can only be enforced at all with the aid of a horde of snoopers

Probably the reason we have a graduated income tax is that the man with relatively small income does not realize that he is the big sufferer because of the graduated income tax. He does not seem to realize that practically everything he buys is loaded with the graduated income tax.

The small - income man with a large family usually consumes all of his income and helps pay these corporation income taxes, and also helps pay the graduated income tax and inheritance tax by being obliged to work with poor tools and thus is unable to produce as much as he would have been able to produce had there been no corporation income tax or graduated personal income tax. Then there would have been more tools, the owners of which would be competing with each other to secure employes and competing with each other to sell their product, which would keep prices down.

30 Per Cent Chamberlin points out that the United States gets over 80 per cent of its federal revenue from direct levees from individuals and cor-

It is doubtful whether we would have been in all these foreign wars if the great mass of voters realized that the consumer would have to pay the cost of the war and not the rich man. This is true because the rich man, relatively speaking, consumes a small proportion of his income. Our government would not have enough money to pay the costs if they took everything he had. immediate beneficiary of these contemplated arrangements will be the government of India, whose socialized economy is now in a state of proximate bankruptcy. indian finances are so precarious that, on Monday a meeting of the country's chief creditors was held at headquarters of the World bank in Washington.

Mr. Eisenhower, in his letter to Secretary Anderson, referred to "countries which, from time to time, have encountered temporary difficulties in their balance of payments." This is no temporary condition with India, but is chronic. There is never enough in the cash drawer to pay foreign bills coming due.

So far this year India has had 225 million dollars from the American government, and now is so far into us and her other creditors, among which are West Germany, Britain, Canada, and Japan, that she is able to make bankruptcy an asset. The argument is the old one that the existing investment of creditor nations must be "protected" by sending good money after bad. The theory is that India cannot expect to pay out anything until the large scale projects in her five-year plan are completed.

Although creditor countries blame inefficient planning for India's plight, they are, nevertheless, persuaded that they must continue to back Indian socialism if for no better reason than that India might otherwise avail herself of Soviet loans.

As a prod to keep America support coming, the Soviet Union granted a 231 million dollar loan to India in 1956 to build a steel mill. The loan is repayable in 12 years at 21/2 per cent interest. Moscow has also promised additional loans of 112 million dollars toward eight other industrial projects. The soviet contribution compares with American aid of more than one and one-quarter billion dollars for India's first and second five-year

Yet the process of bailing, out Nehru gives promise of being unending. Predictions are that the second five-year plan, to end in March, 1961, will immediately be fellowed by a third, fourth, and fifth plan. The reason is that India's population keeps growing at such a rate that the economy can't keep up with it.

As a millstone around the neck of American taxpayers, India probbably serves the Kremlin's pursoviet vassal, and the arrangement costs the Russians only a fraction of the burden on Americans. This one-sided competition for affection might be more palatable if it produced no more than their tribute,


