Racial Unrest Curbed Slightly In Rhodesia

SALISBURY, Southern Rhodesia (UPI)—Security forces striking before dawn rounded up nationalist agitators throughout this troubled colony today, launching the first major crackdown on the anti-white violence that has swept Africa this week.

The colony-wide roundup aimed at leaders of the political organizations which have been a focus of unrest, was ordered under the terms of a state of emergency proclaimed by Prime Minister Sir Edgar Whitehead.

"Instructions have been given under the emergency powers to detain all officeholders and executive members of the four African congresses and all branch officials simultaneously," Whitehead said. "Operations were synchronized to start at 2 a. m., and so far have been completely successful. Most of the men affected have been rounded up."

The total number of persons arrested could not be determined immediately.

Rioters Block Airstrip

Anti-white agitation is raging in territories spanning Africa from sea to sea and from the Congo jungles to the Cape of Good Hope.

Sullen strikes and savage rioting are the hallmarks of a menacing although apparently uncoordinated upsurge of native resentment of the authority of the Dark Continent's vastly outnumbered white men.

The most serious outbreak reported in the past 24 hours occurred at Ft. Hill in northern Nyasaland, where Negro rioters blocked the airfield with tree trunks and huge boulders and seized a customs post dominating the protectorate's main north-south highway.

Troops and police were reported on the way from neighboring Tanganyika to deal with the Ft. Hill mobs.

Elsewhere in Nyasaland, the situation was reported "at the boiling point" in Lilongwe where two Africans were killed and one injured in a clash between troops and rioters earlier this week.

In nearby Southern Rhodesia, army riot troops and security forces were reported in control of the situation at the huge Kaiba Dam, where stone-throwing strike mobs battled authorities Wednesday.

In Somaliland, at Africa's eastern tip, a district police commissioner was stabbed Wednesday and rioters ran wild after a bomb outbreak in Mogadishu. Police arrested a number of leaders of a pro-Egyptian political party which is blamed for the outbreak.

Near the west coast, police in the Belgian Congo used tear gas to break up a mob that was stoning automobiles owned by white residents of Inzisi.

In South Africa, armed police patrolled the Durban waterfront, where at least 20 persons were injured in strike riots Wednesday.

No violence was reported from Brazzaville, the Congo capital where at least 120 Negroes were killed in savage inter-tribal riots last week, but heavy security precautions were still in effect.

THREE NOMINATED FOR STATE 'SOIL' CONTEST

The Fort Worth Press-Gazette cooperation with the soil conservation districts will present thousands of dollars in prizes and trophies to Texans who are doing an outstanding job of conserving soil and water.

State champions will be honored at a dinner in Fort Worth May 2. Regional champions will be honored at five regional dinners later in May.

The outstanding farmer or rancher from each soil conservation district in Texas is eligible to receive a Lions Club plaque. Plaques are usually awarded by the Lions club nearest the winner.

PROXMIRE vs. JOHNSON! SOLON 'SCRAP' SET

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Wisconsin's freshman Sen. William Proxmire says that in his opposition to the Democratic leadership of Texas Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, he has just begun to fight.

Capitol Hill old timers are remarking that Proxmire—who started the Senate this week with a full dress speech challenging Johnson's rule—should quit while he's ahead, if he is ahead. He complained that Johnson was making all of the legislative decisions while rank and file Democratic senators had no function other than blindly to supply the votes.

Whatever the outcome, the net result of Proxmire's effort so far has been to spotlight Johnson's firm Senate position. On the occasion of Proxmire's speech, no other senator joined him in condemning Johnson. There was almost a Democratic boycott of Proxmire. At one time only one other Democratic senator was on the floor to listen.

Johnson's dominance of his party in the Senate has been more evident than that of any other Senate leader in recent years. Backtracking into the 1920s, the Republican leadership of Pennsylvania's Sen. Boies Penrose would be comparable to that of Johnson today.

Problems More Difficult

The Texas' problems in this new 86th Congress will be more difficult, however, than in the 85th. The added complication is the large majority by which Democrats control the new Senate with a count of 64 to 31. The larger the herd the more chance of mavericks and strays, as any Texan well knows.

Johnson has been under fire before this, but not in the Senate. Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt complained in September 1957, that the Democrats had failed in the Congress just ended to provide any leadership. This contrasts with Proxmire's complaint that Johnson provides too much.

Praise Until Now

Johnson and House Speaker Sam Rayburn, another Texan, survived this criticism without any scars. Until Proxmire got the floor Monday, almost everything Johnson said was praised. "I don't know of any other senator who has been grumbling privately about Johnson's firm hand on the leadership controls. But Sen. Douglas jumps up Monday to support Proxmire's attack on Johnson." He did not.

Johnson arranged a sweet political pie for Douglas in this session, the chairmanship of the Joint Economic Committee investigation which soon will be making headlines for itself and for its chairman. The chairmanship is fixed but the Senate has not yet voted funds for the inquiry.

The Capitol Hill old timer remarked that under such circumstances, Douglas had reason to be a good boy.

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Self-Styled 'Christ' At UT Says He's No 'Beatnik'

AUSTIN (UPI)—A bearded art student dressed like Jesus says "beatniks" are the only Atheists at the University of Texas.

Campus police halted Eluid Martinez, 24, when he tried to march through the gates at the school Wednesday, wearing a white sheet and a crown of thorns, and carrying a six-foot wooden cross.

Martinez said he was a "one-man protest" to a bill before the Texas legislature to require all teachers to sign an oath they believe in a Supreme Being. Several lawmakers have charged some of the state's leading institutions, including denominational Southern Methodist University, are teaching atheism.

SMU officials and other leading educators immediately denied the accusations.

"I wanted to demonstrate to stimulate others to think about this legislation," Martinez, a senior student in fine arts, said. Police said they stopped him because they didn't think he had administration approval.

Another bearded university student said Martinez hatched the plot in a "beer joint."

Martinez said the original plan was to have other students dressed like soldiers to follow him jeering and beating him.

"But the others changed their minds," he said.

The lanky art student said he plans to teach public school history after graduation and he wouldn't sign such an oath.

"I'm not an atheist or an agnostic, but I'm stubborn," Martinez said. "I feel my word is good when I say that I believe."

He said he couldn't detect any atheistic teachings at the university, but said some students have atheistic ideas because of "existentialist philosophy and the modern writing of the beat generation."

"But I'm not a beatnik," he stressed.

123 Rural Mishaps Investigated In '58

The Highway Patrol investigated 123 rural traffic accidents that occurred in Gray County during 1958, Sergeant E. G. Albers, Patrol Supervisor of this area, announced today. Property damage accidents accounted for 89 of the total. Personal injury for 30 and 4 were fatal accidents. These accidents caused a total property damage of \$66,262.00 with 51 persons injured and 5 lives lost.

"In 1958, Texas recorded 1,869 fatal motor vehicle traffic accidents which resulted in 2,311 deaths," said Sergeant Albers. "639 of these deaths were in cities over 2,500 population while the remaining 1,272 were rural traffic deaths."

The sergeant further pointed out that these figures were not complete and an accurate account will not be known until about March 15. He estimated that when the final reports are received, the 1958 death figure should be approximately eight percent less than 1957.

Sergeant Albers advised the Highway Patrol had investigated 4 rural accidents in Gray County during January 1959 with the following breakdown: Property damage age 4. Personal injury 0 and fatal accidents 0. This is an increase of 1 accident for the same period of 1958.

The sergeant pointed out that speed continues to be the number one killer in traffic accidents throughout the State and called on all motorists to voluntarily observe the speed limits in an effort to prevent further carnage on our streets and highways.

Cold War Thaw Try Takes Another 'Dive'

Khrushchev Cool Toward Macmillan

British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's personal attempt to thaw out the cold war took another nose-dive today.

Macmillan had another negotiation with Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev in Moscow this morning and then flew off alone to Kiev for a tourist trip of the U.S.S.R.

British sources said Macmillan had "talked turkey" to Khrushchev about dangers of Soviet stubbornness on Berlin and other crucial questions, but that Khrushchev did not budge from his position.

Not only that, but Khrushchev did not accompany Macmillan to Kiev, as was planned as recently as Wednesday. He pleaded a toothache, but after Macmillan was gone he met with an Iraq delegation in Moscow.

Aside from one more formal session Monday, at which a joint communiqué will be drawn up, the serious talks between the two were at an end with the hoped-for thaw still not in sight.

"The amiability of the first few days has disappeared," a British official stated in Moscow.

No Negotiations Intended

Macmillan stated emphatically before leaving London for Moscow that he was going on a "reconnaissance" trip to find out what was in the Soviet mind, and not for negotiations on specific items.

A top British spokesman said in Moscow this afternoon that he had succeeded in this "to some extent."

But the obvious implication of his trip was an attempt to bring a thaw in the cold war, and British spokesmen made it clear that Khrushchev had not backed down from his bristling, challenging speech of Tuesday.

Since president Eisenhower in Washington, and Macmillan in Moscow, said they would not change the western position in the face of such Russian intransigence, this appeared to leave the cold war exactly where it was before the Macmillan trip.

Macmillan Warns Reds Of Danger

MOSCOW (UPI)—British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan has informed Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev in brief terms that unilateral Russian action in Berlin can "only lead to a dangerous situation," it was disclosed today.

A British spokesman made the disclosure as Macmillan took off by plane on a "tourist circuit" of Kiev and Leningrad without Khrushchev, who was to have accompanied him. The spokesman said Khrushchev did not go because of a "bad tooth."

British sources said Macmillan's statements to Khrushchev Wednesday night, at dinner and during an intermission of the "Romeo and Juliet" ballet at the Bolshoi Theater apparently had caused the temperature of the talks to rise.

Wednesday the British sources described the atmosphere as cool as the result of Khrushchev's Tuesday speech in which he rejected the West's offer of a foreign minister conference and demanded a meeting at the summit instead.

Diplomats had called the situation worse than in many months and feared a rough situation when the Soviet deadline expires May 27 on handing West Berlin's life-line over to the East Germans.

Wednesday Macmillan warned that Khrushchev's cold war speech of Tuesday would force the West to take vital decisions on the Berlin crisis and that the blame would lie with Russia.

Rejects Demands

In his speech Khrushchev rejected the idea of a foreign ministers conference on Germany and West Berlin as proposed by the West and demanded a summit meeting. President Eisenhower Wednesday brushed aside Khrushchev's demands for such a meeting.

There seemed to be little Macmillan could do during his visit to Moscow to bring the East and West together on those points.

Prospects Good For Hawaii Statehood

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress labored today to extend America's boundaries far into the blue Pacific by making Hawaii the 50th state.

The statehood bill faced a crucial hurdle in the powerful and traditionally hostile House Rules Committee. But prospects were good that the group would grant its approval.

At the same time, the Senate territories subcommittee worked behind closed doors to polish up its statehood measure after virtually no opposition was voiced at a one-day public hearing.

Supporters are pushing for Senate and House passage before Congress goes home for its East-er vacation March 26.

Despite past opposition, there were strong indications that the House Rules Committee, which funds legislation to the floor, would approve Hawaiian statehood rather than risk a scrap with the bill's backers.

These supporters have threatened to invoke a special parliamentary action to get the bill to the House if the committee holds back. This maneuver was used to get a House vote when the rules committee tried to bottle-up the Alaskan statehood measure last year.

Other congressional news:

Auto Financing: Chrysler Corp. opposed proposals to ban auto manufacturers from operating car-financing firms. A spokesman told the Senate anti-monopoly subcommittee in a prepared statement that the proposals were based on "erroneous" notions that financing by auto makers threatened competition and kept financing and insurance costs up.

Depressed Areas: Democratic Sens. John F. Kennedy (Mass.), Hubert H. Humphrey (Minn.), Eugene J. McCarthy (Minn.) and Harrison A. Williams Jr. (N.D.) proposed special federal aid to industries, workers and communities hit by hardship because of competition from foreign imports. They offered the measure as an amendment to a \$38,500,000 bill to grant federal help to areas of persistent unemployment.

Nepotism: Chairman Omar Burleson (D-Tex.) of the House Administration Committee stamped a "reform" label on a bill to give members more and higher paid office help. He said this would help save the measure from being killed by public reaction to disclosures that many congressmen have put relatives on the federal payroll. Burleson said the bill was a reform because it would prevent an employee from working for more than one lawmaker. Meantime, Rep. Steven A. Carter (D-Iowa) said he would cut his 19-year-old son's \$11,872 salary in half.

Housing: The House Banking Committee ignored President Eisenhower's economy plea and approved a multi-billion dollar Democratic housing bill. Republicans denounced it as a "budget-busting" measure. It would cost \$2,100,000,000 for slum clearance, college housing and other features plus an undetermined amount for expanded public housing.

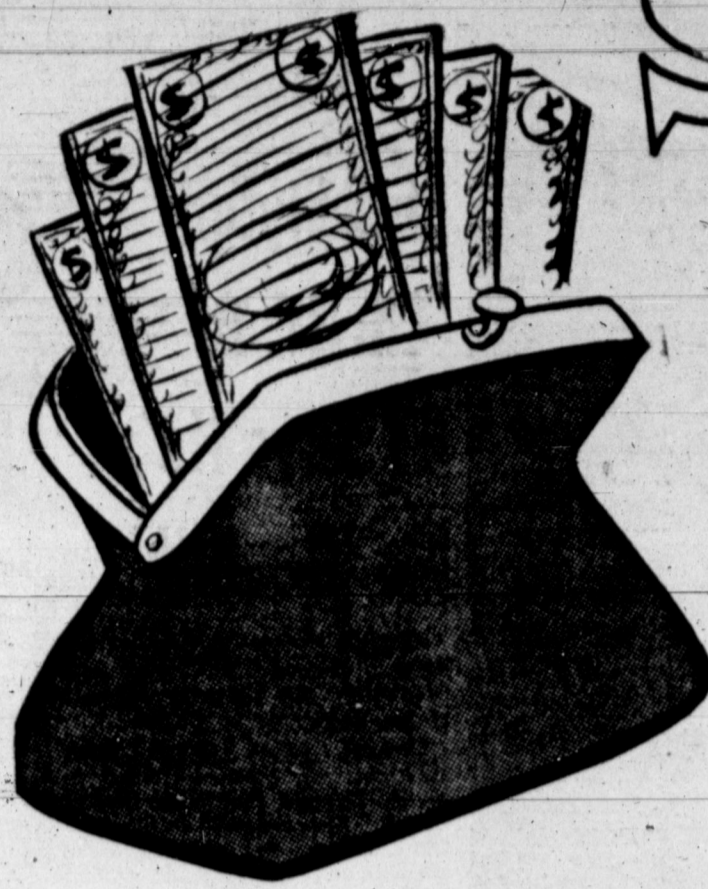

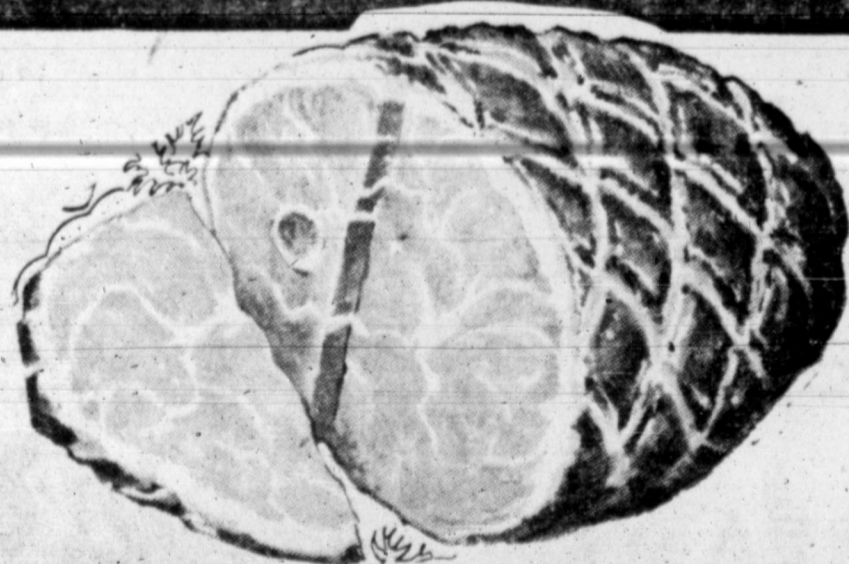

Washington Monument Now Even Harder To Climb

WASHINGTON (UPI) — They have just finished a big overhaul job on the Washington Monument. One result is that it's even harder to climb.

Most sensible people don't try. They ride the elevator, and that's been made easier, quicker, and

pleasanter than ever before.

The National Park Service has put a fresh coat of paint on a superfluous sign at the base of the stairs. This says it's illegal to run. For anyone over 30, they ought to make it illegal to walk.

Every now and again they have to stop the cab somewhere up the shaft, open emergency doors onto the stairs, and pick up somebody who shouldn't have tried the trek.

Hold Ceremonies — The monument has been closed for three months while the park service spent \$125,000 installing a faster, bigger elevator and making other improvements. Interior Secretary Fred A. Seaton, Chief Justice Earl Warren and other dignitaries turned out in a cold rain Monday to reopen it. They cut a red, white and blue ribbon and let me ride with them on the first 60-second trip to the top.

It was so foggy outside you couldn't see what normally is one

success of the Macmillan mission to ease East-West tension but they did not give up hope.

American officials took a similar view in Washington, clinging to the hope that Russia would agree eventually to realistic negotiations. They said it was possible the Russians may leave the door ajar to a foreign ministers' conference when Moscow formally replies to the Allied request for such a meeting.

Khrushchev called such a meeting unacceptable in a speech Tuesday and asked instead for a "summit meeting." Eisenhower, obviously angered by Khrushchev's action, said it would be a "very grave mistake" to hold such a top level meeting without adequate advance preparation.

France watched the developing cold war crisis with increasing concern but refused to be stampeded. Informed sources in Paris predicted de Gaulle might press some ideas of his own for handling the Soviet diplomatic offensive, but officials were close-mouthed on the latest developments.

Coolness Develops — Macmillan warned Khrushchev Wednesday that his speech would force the West to take vital decisions on the Berlin crisis.

Western dispatches from Moscow spoke of the coolness developing between Macmillan and Khrushchev — a coolness shown publicly Wednesday night when the two attended a performance of the Bolshoi Ballet and scarcely spoke during the entire ballet.

That, the official Soviet news agency, said today's meeting was "warm and friendly," and that all the other meetings had been the same. The London press, which has covered Macmillan almost inch by inch on his tour, used such expressions as "freezing point" and "cool, markedly cool."

Other related developments: Athens, Ohio: James B. Conant, former U.S. ambassador to Bonn, warned that the United States must not give in to Russian demands on Berlin. He said Russia had failed to gain the confidence of the East Germans and that the Western sector stands as a constant reminder of freedom.

Geneva: The atom test ban Geneva entered a new and ominous stage with the first talk of quitting. The U.S. and British delegates insisted they would go on talking as long as there is any chance of success.

Washington: White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said he knew of no basis for a union shop. The company and union scheduled talks for over the current \$1.15 hourly rate Friday.

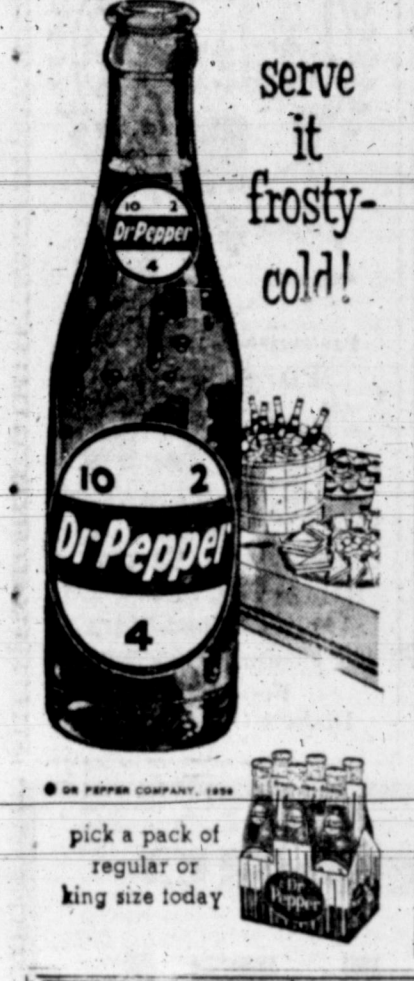
Brother's Rites In Littlefield

Titan Has Big Success

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI) — The Titan, fledgling member of this country's arsenal of intercontinental ballistic missiles, apparently had another success to its credit today.

The Air Force sent one of the sleek rockets aloft Wednesday under limited power and over a short range. "Everything looks real good," a project official commented after early data was in.

The Titan, lighter and more powerful than the Atlas ICBM, is designed to carry a hydrogen warhead more than 8,000 miles. In Wednesday's test the 110-ton test vehicle traveled about 200 statute miles under the propulsion of a single booster engine believed to be the most powerful single thrust unit in the free world.

A dummy second stage, filled with about 5,000 gallons of water for ballast, was not separated. This was the second successful Titan firing in as many attempts, although malfunctions have caused "scrubbing" of other test shots before the missile left its pad.

The Martin Co., builder of the Titan, believes the weapon can be made combat-ready within a year.

Harold Frenzel, Tex-Son president, stepped outside to see what the commotion was about, and was splattered with an egg. He retreated to call police and change clothes.

Members of the International Women's Garment Workers Union walked out Wednesday and threw up picket lines. Their contract expired Saturday. They demand a 10-cent wage increase and a union shop. Talks for over the current \$1.15 hourly rate Friday.

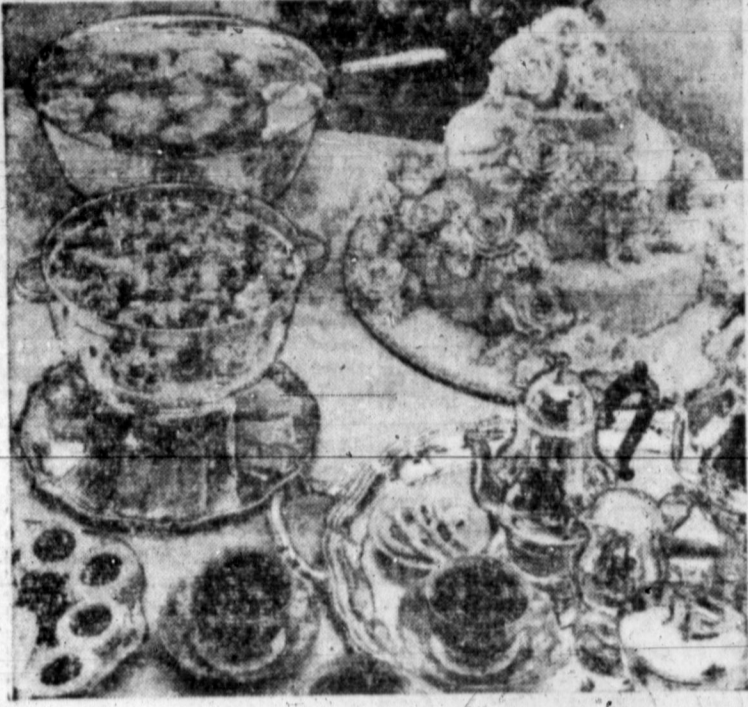

Cut beef into cubes and dredge in flour seasoned with salt and pepper. Heat some of the fat from the beef in a skillet; add beef and brown. Put seared beef into a stew pot, add boiling water to cover and simmer until done - about 3 hours. Add carrots, turnips and potatoes during the last hour of cooking. Add dumplings about 15 minutes before serving time. Re-member that dumplings are cooked by steam; cover stew pot tightly during dumpling cooking period.

1 1/2-pound can sauerkraut, drained
1 tablespoon chili sauce
2 tablespoons catchup
1/2 teaspoon onion salt
8 frankfurter rolls
8 frankfurters
Combine kraut, chili sauce, catchup and onion salt; mix well. Split frankfurter rolls in half lengthwise without cutting all the way through. Arrange kraut mixture on rolls. Top with frankfurters. Arrange on greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 15-20 minutes.

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Engineering Career in the 'Space Era' Requires Broad Preparation in Science

Q. What kind of educational background does a young person need today for an engineering career in the 'space era'?



A career in engineering actually begins in high school math and science classes. Modern industrial research and technology require a high-level understanding of the theoretical aspects of such subjects as physics, chemistry, and electronics on the part of the engineering profession.

A. Solid preparation in a wide range of basic science, subjects and plenty of mathematics. Science and mathematics—these are the key words heard over and over at career conferences for high school seniors interested in engineering.

This month, students attending high school career conferences are hearing more about the science requirements for engineering as the members of one of the largest professional societies observe National Engineers' Week, February 22-28.

Without a well-rounded preparation in mathematics and the basic physical sciences, the young engineer could not master graduate courses in such fields as solid state physics, nuclear, and electronics.

Today the picture has changed completely. The engineer is more likely to be working right up with the physicist, chemist, or other research scientist as industrial firms join in pushing back the frontiers of the unknown.

As a part of this expansion of intellectual horizons, engineers are finding themselves developing plans and specifications in areas which are largely uncharted—areas which have been researched only around the fringes. Take, for example, the

current military and civil activity concerning the exploration of our solar system. The conquest of space is so far, and will continue to be, the end product of millions of engineering man hours.

Atomic Industry — A new industry — atomic energy — is being built on the theoretical foundations of the "new physics." Engineers in this industry must have an educational background in atomic theory.

Outer Space — The further we move into outer space, the less physicists and astronomers are able to furnish in the way of factual information regarding temperature, density, radiation intensity, and the like.

Opportunity — Engineering in the second half of the 20th Century is a career of opportunity. Interested young people or their parents may obtain a free booklet which gives the basic facts about this challenging profession.

'Let's Be Bolder,' Patterson Admonishes Fellow Commies

'Let's be bolder,' is Patterson's proposal to the Communist and fellow traveler readers of the party's weekly newspaper The Worker.

'McCarthyism has sustained a heartening defeat in our country,' Patterson continued. 'American reaction has in fact sustained a number of defeats on the political as well as the moral front.'

'We say this because it must be made clear that the prevailing political atmosphere permits increasing activities with lessening danger of victimization.'

Patterson is general manager of the Communist newspaper. The foregoing quotations are from a statement which appeared over Patterson's signature in the Worker of Feb. 15.

More Favorable Atmosphere — It could not be often that Patterson and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover would agree on anything relating to the Communist Party.

some time previously. On Dec. 22, 1958, Hoover put it this way:

'Sensing a more favorable atmosphere, the Communist Party, U.S.A., and its dupes and sympathizers gained further courage and became more vocal in their attacks upon law enforcement and other professions which are dedicated to preserving our freedoms.'

This more favorable atmosphere to the Communist conspiracy has come about coincidentally with a series of decisions by the U.S. Supreme Court in the field of subversion and national security. The overall impact of these decisions is a matter of controversy, usually angry.

There is not much dissent from the proposition that these decisions greatly weakened or in considerable degree nullified federal and state laws enacted to protect the United States against subversive activities. None, other than Communists and their stooges, would be likely to argue that such weakening or nullification, of itself, was good for the United States.

The argument in support of the court's decisions is that they were mostly made in defense of the individual rights conferred by the First Amendment to the Constitution, the opening paragraph of the Bill of Rights. The First is as follows:

'Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.'

The null of the controversy between those who approve and those who disapprove of the court's decisions is this: Is the Communist Party a lawful organization entitled to the protection of the First Amendment or is the party a conspiracy, in fact, operating outside the law to bring about the destruction of the American way of life?

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

'Conflicting Interests' Bill Jones had been in an automobile accident and...

As soon as Smith learned this fact, he stopped Bill from telling him any more about the case and explained that he could not represent him. Smith pointed out that the 'conflicting interest' resulting from his representation of the insurance company prevented him from representing Marvin. He said that he owed it to Bill not to hear anything from him which he might use against him if the matter were taken to court.

The situation outlined above illustrates one of the basic principles in the ethics of a lawyer, namely, that he cannot represent conflicting interests. Basically, this is but the lawyer's way of phrasing the old axiom that a man cannot serve two masters. A lawyer's duty is to give his full and complete efforts to his client and he cannot do that if there is a conflict between the interests of two of them. The reasoning behind this rule is that a lawyer should not appear in court representing both sides of a controversy.

If both Bill and the insurance company are regular clients of Smith, then it is Smith's duty to refuse to represent either one of them in case of altercation between the two.

If attorney Smith is one of a group of lawyers practicing together as a partnership, then he must be careful not only of avoiding a conflict of interest between the clients he is personally serving, but between his clients and other clients of the partnership as well.

As far as Smith is concerned in determining whether there is a conflict of interests, any client of his partners is his client and vice versa.

There are, of course, cases where a lawyer may represent more than one of the parties to the same transaction without violating the rule of professional conduct.
