Hoiles: When there are too many people trying to do something in which the price is lower than a free market price because of the surplus of men in that line. then they certainly will have to take a lower wage, just as the farmers, when they wouldn't let them learn a trade, had to try to sell their product, and their real hourly wage or yearly wage went down because there were too many at it.

Buck: Well, what's the ques-

Hoiles: Does not excluding peo ple from ages that are higher, and thus requiring them to work in places where there is not a surplus of labor, tend to make their total wages less? Buck: Well, let's see. You say

"their total wages." When I think of total wages I think of the wages of the whole economy. Hoiles: No, this group that's excluded

Buck: It may, and it may not. Hoiles: Well, give a case, an illustration where it would not. Buck: Well, if they were left out of this situation and started a project of their own and hired into another situation, their total wages might go up.

Hoiles: They wouldn't want any of these wages if they thought the other place would reward them Buck: Well, I might illustrate

it this way: I was laid off from a job before now for different reasons and feared that my total wages, my yearly wages would be much less because of having been laid off, but as it turned out I found another job that was much better. I was very glad the employer did me the favor of laying me off. Hoiles: Well that was one in

dividual case, but if you limit the number that dare join, and there are more people seeking jobs in the unorganized proposition because you won't let them in the other proposition, certainly their total wages will be less.

Buck: Well, let me admit that that may very well be true 14. Hoiles: If the employes are not to be selected on the basis of what the employer believes the worker will produce, the value of which is to be judged by competition - the worker who in the opinion of the employer in the long run will enable the employer

to best serve his customer - are they to be selected on a noncompetitive basis? Buck: The productive ability of the employe is, of course, the prime factor when hiring is considered, and certainly the judgment of the employer as to the value of the employe is a basic principle in our free enterprise system and should never be ignored. Therefore, the idea of competition between workers for jobs is basic. Some sort of standard, productively speaking, must be established, else the employer

could never estimate his costs: Those not able to meet the standard cannot be considered. Those able to meet it are naturally eligible for consideration. However, union labor demands, and in my opinion justifiably so, that the standard include rules which take into consideration the sacredness of human life. The whole theory behind union labor philosopy, simply stated, as I understand it, is that the employe is not just a tool and machine to be used and abused at the sole discretion of the employer. Human health and welfare cannot be morally disregarded. Profits

are not paramount to human health and welfare. Simply because 10 men are available for every job does not entitle, the employer to set a productive standard and working conditions which endanger the health and well-being of the employes. That's my answer to your question.

"We have the search factors down fairly pat," he said the other afternoon. "It takes a corporation 40 to 45 weeks to find a man they need not flinch over hiring. Our techniques have reduced the project to about 10 or 12 weeks, maybe less. Let's say we can knock 35 full weeks off the task. Working with us, however, the corporation in question must be prepared to give us five full weeks passing judgment on the one, two, or even three prospects we send to them."

Well, now, just a minute there, Hertan, Isn't it a fact that the unemployment situation current at the moment has made locating top flight executives much easier? 'No, it hasn't," he said. "There is an acute shortage of top-drawer

executives. Our defense economy has been a 'production' economy, and consequently business needs skilled executives to sell products and cut costs at the factory level. are sales executives and cost-control experts. Real, delivering, brain - equipped men who are worth \$50,000 a year."

Do you have problems with prospects for such jobs, personal problems?

"We certainly do," he said. "Most executives momentarily making a change out of choice or because of corporate reshuffling (neither being shameful) never have had time or cause to think about interviews for new positions. Frequently, facing such for the first time, they tend to oversell themselves, try to show they are jacks of all executive trades when the corporation in question, actually, wants only a crackerjack jack of the one needed trade. We cool the eagerness out of them and coach them into sticking to the facts as needed. The best attitude at an interview. we tell them, is to depend on Representative Fogarty's Subcom- Relations Committee, Intelligence to the subject at hand, whether it be sales, marketing, advertising, production or cost - control. Don't wander away, Single track it. If the prospects will listen to us and do exactly that they don't have much trouble nailing down the job. It is not disgraceful for an executive prospect for a cost-control job to say, if advertising is mentioned during the interview.


