

# HELLO CHAMPS

"It's wonderful to be a part of the fine Pampa coaching organization, and I really enjoy working with such fine boys as you have here." So spoke Clifton McNeely in a loud and clear voice before a huge throng of Pampa High students and citizens who gathered downtown Monday afternoon to welcome home the state champion Harvester basketball delegation.

"It's always a pleasure to return home to Pampa, especially when we come back with a state championship trophy," said the man who had only 48 hours earlier led Pampa to a fourth Class AAAA Texas schoolboy cage crown.

It was a warm sunny day and a shirt-sleeve crowd in a festive mood was on hand for the "welcome home" ceremonies.

Knox Kinard, superintendent of Pampa schools, spoke briefly, saying, "It is a pure delight to have our boys bring home the bacon from Austin again."

Mayor Lynn Boyd commented,

"We would have been disappointed if Pampa hadn't won the state title this year with the great club they had. We are all proud of the record (31-0) the Harvesters compiled and knew they could take state."

Team captains Mack Layne and Coyne Winborn, who both tallied 18 points in pacing Pampa past Dallas Jefferson, 65-52, in the finals, showed some shyness before being coaxed before a public address system that stood on top of a large trailer truck bed.

Layne said, "We're all real happy to have been able to bring back the state title to Pampa." Winborn, gulped twice before the crowd, nothing compared to the some 8,000 spectators and a state-wide teevue audience he had played before in Austin and muttered, "I just don't have anything to say." His happy face, however, told the whole big story.

The team arrived in their chartered bus behind horn-blowing and siren-screaming auto-

mobiles, hopped out and upon the truck platform, and after coaches wives, Mrs. Clifton McNeely and Mrs. Terry Culley were presented with flowers by Linda Skewes, Pampa High student council president, he said.

Richard Newberry, vice-president of the student council, said, "Welcome, back Harvesters. Pampa High is proud of the way you represented us both on and off the court."

In presenting her floral gifts to the coaches wives, Miss Skewes said, "The Harvesters are a winning team because of their coaches and the women behind them."

McNeely again stepped down on rumors he would enter the college coaching ranks soon. With four state titles in the last seven years and six trips to the state meet in that time, McNeely ranks as the most successful cage coach in Texas. "Right now, they're just rumors," McNeely said of the college coaching plans he is said to be tossing around in his mind.

## Teachers' Pay Raise Plan Given Senate

AUSTIN (UPI) — The controversial 100 million dollar teachers' pay bill, designed to raise base salaries \$800 annually, steamed onto the Senate floor today with the blessings of the upper chamber's education committee.

The committee voted its approval in a lengthy hearing Monday night after proponents of the bill pledged support of almost anything, including a general sales tax, to see the measure enacted and funds provided to pay it.

More than 3,000 persons jammed the Senate floor and overflowed the galleries during the 3 1/2 hours hearing. It was the largest crowd so far this session.

The bill, sponsored by Sen. A. M. Alkin Jr., of Paris, incorporates recommendations of the Hale-Alkin Public School Study Committee. It is estimated it will cost a total of \$107,800,000. About \$86,200,000 a year would be paid by the state. The remainder would come from local school districts.

Fund Problem Arises

Pay for teachers with bachelor degrees would be boosted from a minimum of \$3,204 per year to \$4,000. The floor for teachers with master's degrees would be raised to \$4,125.

There is not a legislator who would not like to boost the teachers pay scale, but if the bill is enacted it adds to their problems. They are being asked to find a way of finding enough funds to provide for state government expenses during the next two years.

## Macmillan Mends Much Of Split Spirits in Allied Ranks

The United States, Britain and France are planning for an East-West foreign ministers conference in Geneva by mid-May to be followed by a "summit" conference in July or August, on the Berlin crisis, diplomatic sources said today in Paris.

UPI diplomatic correspondent Elie Maissi reported the Allied plans for East-West meetings were being worked out by a group of experts, cooperating closely with West Germany, in reply to Russia's March 2 note asking for such talks.

Reports of the Western plans came as British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan met in Paris today with President Charles de Gaulle in hopes of bringing their differing viewpoints more closely into line.

Informed sources said Macmillan already had mended much of the split in Franco-British ranks over their approach to the Berlin crisis.

He was helped to some extent by Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev who made an apparent concession on Berlin Monday night — but one that found no favor with Washington or Bonn.

Khrushchev suggested that Russia go ahead with its plans to turn West Berlin into a "free city," but he proposed that a token garrison be stationed there made up of Big Four or neutral troops.

The plan was criticized in most Western capitals because it did not change Allied determination to resist making West Berlin a free city and because it would in-

## Foreign Minister Meet May Precede Summit

PARIS (UPI) — The Western Allies want to hold an East-West foreign ministers' meeting in Geneva by mid-May, possibly followed by a "summit" conference in July or August, reliable diplomatic sources said today.

They said the United States, Britain and France will propose this timetable to the Russians in their replies to the Soviet note of

March 2, which accepted the idea of a foreign ministers' conference — but only as a preliminary to a summit session.

The Western notes are expected to make it clear that the Big Three will take part in a summit meeting only if the foreign ministers' talks produce some worthwhile result.

Some disagreement has been reported among the Western Allies as to just how much in the way

of results at the preliminary conference would justify a meeting of chiefs of government.

Britain is eager to "go to the summit" on almost any terms, while the United States has made it clear that it is not interested unless it appears that a top-level meeting has a real chance of success. The French position is somewhere between these extremes.

Differences among the Allies are expected to be among the topics Prime Minister Harold Macmillan takes up during his current opinion-sounding tour of Western capitals.

Macmillan was closeted today with President Charles de Gaulle for talks which are expected to produce "broad agreement" between Britain and France on Berlin policy.

The British leader got a chilly reception on his arrival here Monday because of reports that he favored a policy of partial surrender in Central Europe to previous Soviet calls for a demilitarized zone.

But he convinced Premier Michel Debre that Britain is as determined as France to stand firm against Communist pressure in Berlin.

The Prime Minister told Debre that his promise during Moscow talks with Premier Nikita Khrushchev the idea of withdrawing Big Four troops from central Europe did not mean that he had any idea of agreeing to it.

## Baghdad Claims Victory In Revolt

BEIRUT (UPI) — Baghdad Radio claimed total victory today over a right-wing army revolt against the Iraqi government and said a "foreign state" had backed the slain leader of the abortive revolution.

Dispatches from Cairo later today quoted reliable sources there as saying 11 United Arab Republic diplomats had been expelled from the Iraq capital, apparently

on charges of backing the insurgents.

The reports, if confirmed, would create the possibility of an open break between the two biggest Arab powers and pose a grave new threat for the Middle East.

Rebel Radio Silent

The rebel Mosul Radio was silent today in apparent confirmation of the government's victory which would mark the emergence of the Communists as the most powerful force in Iraq. The gov-

ernment called the Mosul Radio "an enemy underground transmitter belonging to a foreign state."

The government broadcast did not identify the foreign state it said was cooperating with the "imperialists," but it warned it to "abandon this intrigue." Some reports said it was aimed at the United Arab Republic; others said it might be one of the pro-Western Baghdad Pact nations.

Wherever located, the Mosul station was silent today. It had not been heard since Monday, and the silence strengthened outside convictions Iraqi Premier Abdel Karim Kassem had crushed the north Iraq uprising in its second day.

Baghdad said Col. Abdel Wahab Shawaf, leader of the Mosul insurrection, "met his death at the hands of the people and soldiers and officers of the army." His rebellion, the radio said, was "smashed and buried at birth."

1,000 Americans in Iraq

Other Iraqi developments: —A Moscow dispatch said Iraq and the Soviet Union have concluded negotiations for "non-political" technical aid and that the agreement will be signed shortly. It meant an influx of engineers and technicians from Russia.

A Rome dispatch said the U.S. embassy there was prepared to handle American evacuees from Iraq should it become necessary for Americans to leave. The embassy estimated about 1,000 Americans in Iraq.

## Auto Contract To Be Re-Let

The contract for three City police cars will be re-let March 31, Pampa City Commissioners decided this morning. The Purley Motor Company sold out after taking the contract and cannot be held responsible to deliver the cars. Bidding will open at 10 a.m. March 31.

After approving the payment of \$28,444.55 in monthly bills, Commissioners passed Ordinance 517 on the first reading. This Ordinance would annex part of N. Hobart, including the drive-in theatre and Catholic Church property.

The City engineer was empowered to mark off loading zones near San Houston Elementary School and Pampa Junior High.

Commissioners discussed parking in relation to the City Hall and the Post Office, also truck parking on S. Cuyler. Truck parking has already been stopped on N. Cuyler. Plans are to amend the parking meter ordinance and set up a 15 minute zone on the north side of City Hall and in front of the Post

Office.

In a paving discussion, City Manager John Koontz was asked to write a letter, allowing for a reduction of collateral for Jupiter Street residents as paving work is done and accepted by the City.

Koontz brought up a new Gas Code, for Commission action, that has been approved by the Plumbing Commission and by the gas companies. This Gas Code will be considered next week.

James T. Crawford Jr. a candidate for the City Commissioner from Ward 4, was present at this meeting.

Commissioners approved the Stockton Construction Company's estimate of \$1,044,491, for water and sewer work. They also approved Wayland Merriman's bill of \$418.46 for engineering services.

At the beginning of the meeting, commissioners wound up some old business with E. R. Bowman of the White House Lumber Company. They said that paving on Harvesters will be done in 1958 or 1960.

## Ike Puts Defense Above U. S. Budget

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower told Republican congressional leaders today that he puts national defense above a balanced budget but feels that his new military budget is "adequate" to defend the nation.

The President's view was relayed by Sen. Leverett Saltonstall (R-Mass.) who said after Eisenhower's weekly meeting with GOP leaders:

"He puts the defense of our country above budget requirements. The defense of our country comes first and will always come first in the minds of the administration."

This obviously was in reply to Democratic charges that the President is more concerned with a balanced budget than in providing an "adequate" defense.

Saltonstall and House GOP Leader Charles A. Halleck said the overall military spending program is adequate even though the chiefs of the military services had expressed reservations.

Taking note of Democratic criticisms that United States should not cut ground forces during the Berlin crisis, Halleck said:

"The offer-all package for armed defense of the country was approved by the Joint Chiefs of Staff."

Halleck said the President probably would make known at his

news conference Wednesday his position on proposed cuts in the Army and Marine personnel.

The Defense Department, meanwhile, announced that the radar warning line across the top of the continent will be extended across Greenland at a cost of more than 27 million dollars.

The line, built to give warning of a bomber attack, now runs from the Aleutian Islands around Alaska and across Canada to eastern Baffin Island.

The President's fiscal 1960 budget calls for an outlay of nearly 41 billion dollars.

"Whenever you spend more than that," Halleck told reporters "you don't strengthen the defenses but you weaken the country by the effect on the economy."

Some Democrats have challenged Eisenhower's judgment on the adequacy of the defenses that would be provided under the new military budget.

## Baby Moon's Instruments Are Sought

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (UPI) — A Discoverer satellite shot tentatively by late this month might involve America's first attempt at recovery of the baby moon's instruments.

Air Force cargo planes known to have been practicing recovery flights near Hawaii will zoom by the 40 to 50-pound payload ejected from the high flying satellite and try to recover the package in nets trailing behind the planes.

The instrument package in the 1300-pound satellite will be fired backwards out of the satellite so that it loses orbital speed and returns toward the earth. When it has slowed down sufficiently from its more than 1800-mile-an-hour velocity, a parachute will open and further slow its descent to assist the recovery operation.

# Business Views

The Treasury and Federal Reserve System announced they are investigating trading in government securities in hopes of "improving the market's function and preventing speculative excesses."

The study was sparked by the sudden collapse of the government bond market last summer. Data will be sought from major participants in federal financing and findings will be published at mid-year.

Major copper producers charge 3 1/2 cents a pound for their domestically mined metal — up 1 1/2 cents from last week. The new level is still 1/2 cent below the charge set by one custom smelter. The firming market reflects strike cut domestic supplies and increasing demand.

Steel producers in the U.S. made more steel last week than ever before and it's only the beginning of a series of records expected in coming weeks, Steel magazine said. Current demand is reflecting a marked improvement in present consumption and continuing emphasis on inventory building.

Leading companies fattened their order books in February but some of the improvement reflected buying in advance of expected strikes during the summer, the National Association of Purchasing Agents reported. This raises the possibility of a poorer third quarter, the association said.

The Richmond - San Rafael Bridge, located on the upper part of San Francisco Bay, is the longest continuous steel bridge in the world, totaling 5 1/4 miles, according to the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce.

### Self-Employed Persons Must Report Earnings

Self-employed persons are reminded by Harold S. Geldon, District Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office to report their earnings for social security purposes with their income tax returns. Generally, these reports must be filed with Internal Revenue Service by April 15, 1959. Any person engaged in a trade, business, or profession covered by

social security who has \$400 or more net profit from his business must report this income for social security purposes. Also, he must pay the 1958 social security self-employment tax on his net earnings on earnings up to \$4,200 for 1958. The tax for self-employed persons on 1958 earnings is 3.8 percent.

Geldon also reminded self-employed persons that the payment of the social security tax is mandatory and not voluntary. Often a self-employed person may have enough exemptions to result in his not owing any income tax, yet the net earnings from his business are \$400 or more, so he must pay the social security self-employment tax.

For further information regarding social security tax questions, consult the nearest Internal Revenue Service Office. For information regarding old-age, survivors, and disability benefits, contact the social security office at Amarillo or a representative from that office when he is in your town. Check with your local postmaster for the dates of his visits.
