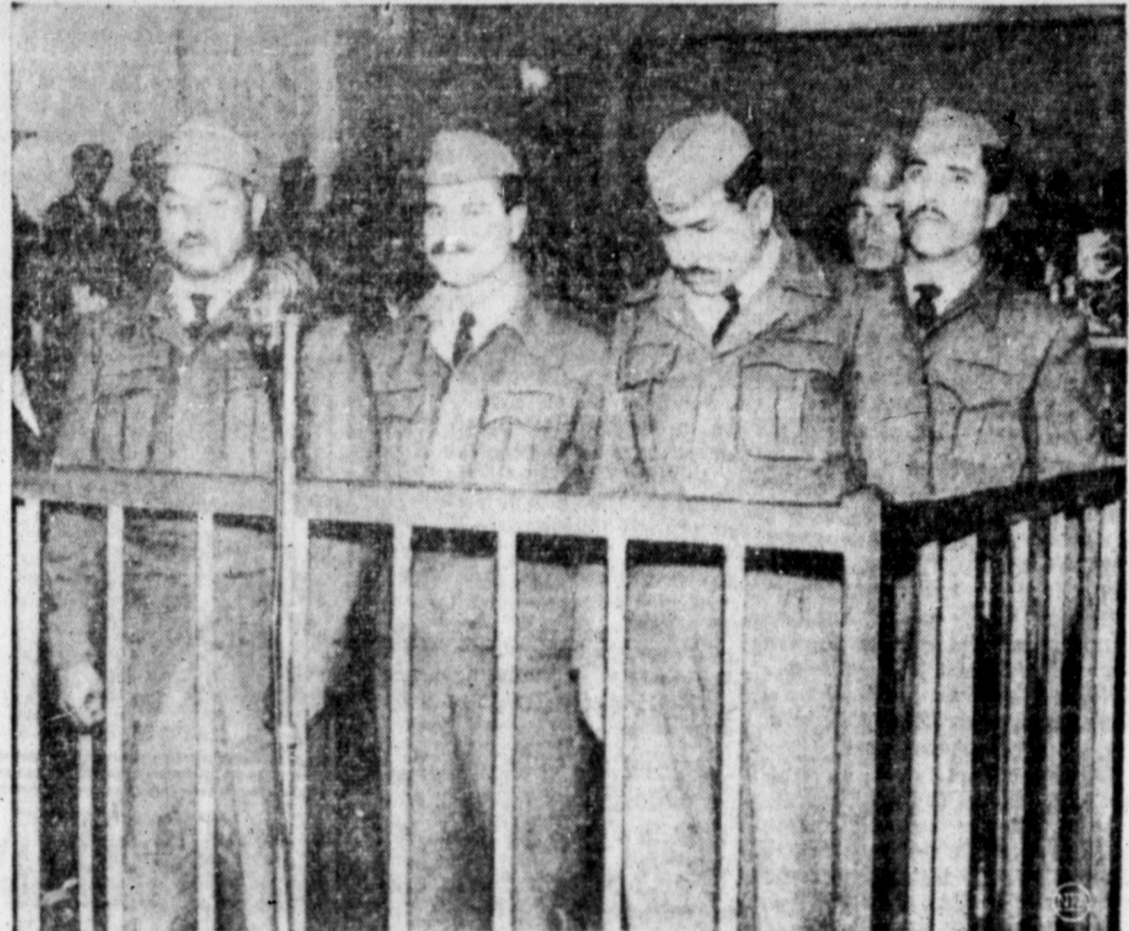

India-Red China Relations Tumble To Rock Bottom; Nehru In Warning

India Will Not Be Dictated To

NEW DELHI (UPI)—Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru told Communist China today it could not dictate to India. He also denied Peiping charges that the Tibetan rebels were operating from India soil.

Peiping's formal charges against India has brought relations between the countries to a new low and today's session of Parliament was a shouting, desk pounding one in which sympathies were clearly with the Tibetan rebels. There were predictions the Tibetan revolt would lead to a major shift in India's neutralist foreign policy but Nehru's statements today were cautiously worded.

He said India should have friendly relations with Red China. He was cheered when he said Peiping could not dictate to New Delhi. Peiping Radio, which had cautioned India not to discuss China's "internal affairs" in Parliament, announced today the puppet Panchen Lama has accepted acting premiership of Tibet and promised to turn the theocracy into a Communist satellite.

Commenting on Peiping's suggestion that Parliament should not discuss the Tibetan situation, Nehru said he wanted to make it clear that "no external force" could restrict Parliament.

The Refugee Question
Nehru said checkpoints bordering Tibet had been informed of India's policy of not allowing any person to cross over unless they had valid passports or certificates to enter India. The statement led some members of Parliament to fear thousands of refugees might be forced to stay in Tibet and be killed by their oppressors.

Nehru said the question of admitting refugees—including the Dalai Lama, the god-king deposed by Peiping—would be settled as it arose and that India could not open its borders to halt the population of another country.

French Troops Kill Reb Chief

ALGIERS (UPI)—Rebel "Colonel Amirouche," most ruthless and successful guerrilla leader in Algeria, was shot to death by French troops Friday, the French army announced Sunday.

Amirouche's exploits had made him a hero to Moslem Algerians and the most-wanted man in Algeria to the French.

He was caught in an ambush and shot down as he and his bodyguard tried to shoot their way to freedom.

Another rebel leader, St. Haoues, died later of wounds received in the same gun battle. French sources said six other Algerian rebels were killed or wounded.

Amirouche and St. Haoues were trapped as they returned from a conference of rebel leaders near Bou Saadiet, 150 miles southeast of Algiers.

French troops closed in on them as they and their bodyguards tried to escape. When the rebels tried to shoot their way out of the trap Amirouche and St. Haoues fell in the resulting gun battle.

It was one of the biggest propaganda victories scored by the French in the four-year Algerian war. Amirouche, an Arab, had caught the admiration of the Moslem population with his daring guerrilla exploits during the past two years, and had become a thorn in the French army's side.

Amirouche's combination of military know-how and general sharpness reorganized the rebel command in the Kabylie and made it one of the spottiest operating in Algeria.

'MOST USEFUL'

Soviet In Appeal For A New Pact

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union appealed again Sunday for a non-aggression pact between NATO and the Warsaw Pact nations and said it was ready to discuss the "disengagement" of Eastern and Western troops from middle Europe.

The official Tass news agency issued the statement in connection with the Washington meeting Tuesday and Wednesday of the NATO foreign ministers and the tenth anniversary meeting of the NATO council immediately afterward.

BULLETIN

LONDON (UPI)—Russia today formally agreed to hold a foreign ministers' conference in Geneva May 11, the Tass news agency reported.

The statement said the Russians were ready to take part in disengagement discussions "for the establishment of a zone of limited contingents and armaments and inspection." Such a freeze on troops was mentioned in the communiqué ending the talks between British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

Much of the statement was designed to show the "aggressive essence of the North Atlantic union's foreign policy line" but it also made these points:

—A summit conference would be "most useful" but Russia believes a conference of foreign ministers concerned should be convened to study the question of a German peace treaty and the West Berlin question.

—The NATO powers were urged to reach agreement on the Polish Rapacki proposal to establish a demilitarized and rocket-free zone in Central Europe.

Red Missile Might Grows; US Alerted

WASHINGTON (UPI)—In the face of Russia's growing missile might, the Pentagon has ordered a further dispersal of U.S. missile launchers to reduce vulnerability to surprise attack.

Moreover, Russian advances in rocketry have been interpreted by the U.S. Air Force chief of staff as "an indication" that the Strategic Air Command, within 18 months may have to be put on a 24-hour "airborne alert."

These developments were disclosed today with the publication of a 1,617-page transcript of heavily-censored testimony on the defense budget at closed hearings of the House defense appropriations subcommittee.

The transcript indicated that subcommittee Chairman George H. Mahon (D-Tex.) and other Democrats were not convinced that President Eisenhower's defense budget is adequate.

They probed for ways to bolster U.S. defenses in view of administration admissions that Russia will outstrip the United States in production of intercontinental ballistic missiles in 1960, 1961 and 1962.

But the military officials—Defense Secretary Neil H. McElroy on down—sided with the President in rejecting a "me-too" policy of trying to match Russia missile for missile in the long-range rocket field. They insisted that the United States, even after surprise attack, would have enough retaliatory power left to destroy Russia.

Employment Up In Pampa; 64 Placements Made

Employment is up and unemployment compensation is down in Pampa, according to Bill Ragsdale, manager of the local Texas Employment Commission office.

The most startling comparison is between March, 1958, when 64 placements were made, and this March with 120 placements.

Unemployment compensation claims have dropped from 1,589 to 954, as of March 25. February claims totalled 1,246.

Placements are rising out of the slack winter months, from 114 in February to 120 in March. There are fewer new applications: 129 this month, 210 in February and 231 a year ago.

Agricultural placements accounted for 18 of this month's total, double the February figure and about three times that of last March.

2 Escape Injuries As Car Hits Train

A 1947 Buick driven by Leo Medley, 24, of Pampa, struck the center of a moving Santa Fe freight train early Sunday morning at the Price Rd. crossing.

Medley and his six-months old son, Nicky Lee, miraculously escaped serious injury. The car, described by patrolmen as a total wreck, was driven from the scene.

Medley, in County Court today, was charged with drunken driving and fined \$100. His license has been suspended six months.

The baby, Patrolman Royce Logan reported, was thrown about 30 feet and landed between the Santa Fe tracks. At Worley Hospital the baby's injuries were no worse than a bump on the forehead.

State Highway Patrolmen Royce Logan and Travis Underwood said Medley drove through a railroad barricade and plunged into the train's 63rd boxcar. The car, spun around by the force of the hit, was virtually demolished. Baby clothes were strewn around the tracks.

Medley said after the crash he found his son about 30 feet from the crossing, bundled him into his car and drove to a brother's home at 333 Naida.

His brother, Jimmie Medley, drove them to the Pig Hip cafe at N. Hobart and Akcock where Mrs. Medley is an employee.

The foursome then drove to Worley Hospital where Medley and Nicky were given first-aid.

The accident was reported to Pampa police and Highway Patrol officers by a telegraph operator at the Santa Fe station. He said a trainman in the freight's caboose saw wreckage on the tracks after the train passed the crossing.

When patrolmen arrived at the scene they found baby clothes and car parts scattered several yards. They found Medley at Worley Hospital.

no longer be a spectator. The Indians were deeply concerned and worried by the Communist oppression in Tibet and bitter about official Peiping charges the rebels were operating from headquarters at Kalimpong on Indian soil—a charge officially denied by the Indian Foreign Office.

Seethe With Excitement

The House seethed with excitement when Nehru appeared before it today. He first said the case of such refugees would be decided on its own merits and cited international law in support of his statement, Red China has forbidden refugees to flee into India.

Nehru said several times India's sympathy was with the Tibetans but he warned that "whatever my government does may have far-reaching consequences."

Moreove, he indicated, any move should be guided by wisdom. Nehru specifically denied official Peiping charges that Kalimpong was being used as a rebel base. He said "we cannot allow Indian soil to be used as the base of propaganda activities" and said when this has happened in the past the foreigners involved have been warned.

Then he referred to a Peiping Radio broadcast which said the Indian Parliament should not discuss China or Tibet since the revolt is an internal Chinese matter.

He expressed sorrow the countries had such different legislatures and hinted it was no business of Peiping's.

Parliament broke into applause at this.

"This parliament will not be dictated to by any external" authorities, he stated.

Demand Red Commemoration

The Indian public and press were voicing increasingly strong demands for condemnation of the Chinese Communist action in Tibet and for a realistic reassessment of India's neutralist foreign policy.

The Hindustan Times, which is very close to Nehru's ruling Congress Party, referred to events there today as "the rape of Tibet."

Whereabouts of the Dalai Lama still was not known, but a reliable Indian report from Kalimpong on the Indo-Chinese border said he and 40,000 of his followers were moving south and eastward.

One unconfirmed report said the 23-year-old god-king was seriously injured in a fall while fleeing from Lhasa.

Red China on Saturday ousted him as leader of Tibet and installed the Communist-sponsored rival, the Panchen Lama, in his place.

Indian reports said radio-equipped Chinese were scattering throughout Tibet to look for him.

Appeal To Nehru

A mass meeting of Tibetans here to appeal to Nehru to take up their cause, said prayers for the Dalai Lama's safety at a mass meeting. They pledged to fight on against the Chinese as long as there is a single Tibetan alive.

The group planned to present a memorandum to Nehru on behalf of the thousands of Buddhists in India and there were reports he would be asked to intercede with the United Nations.

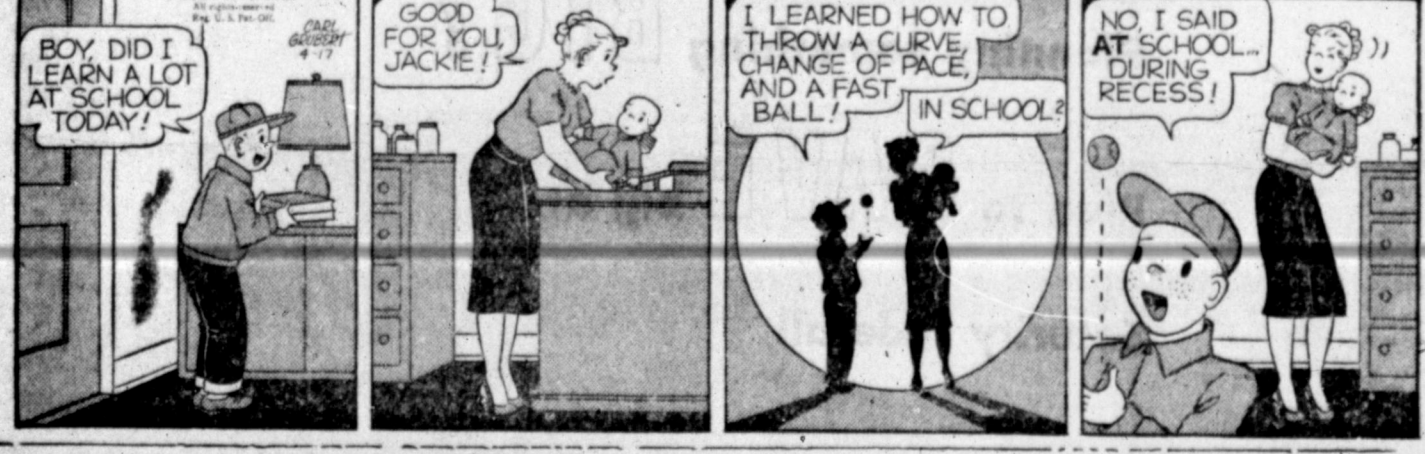

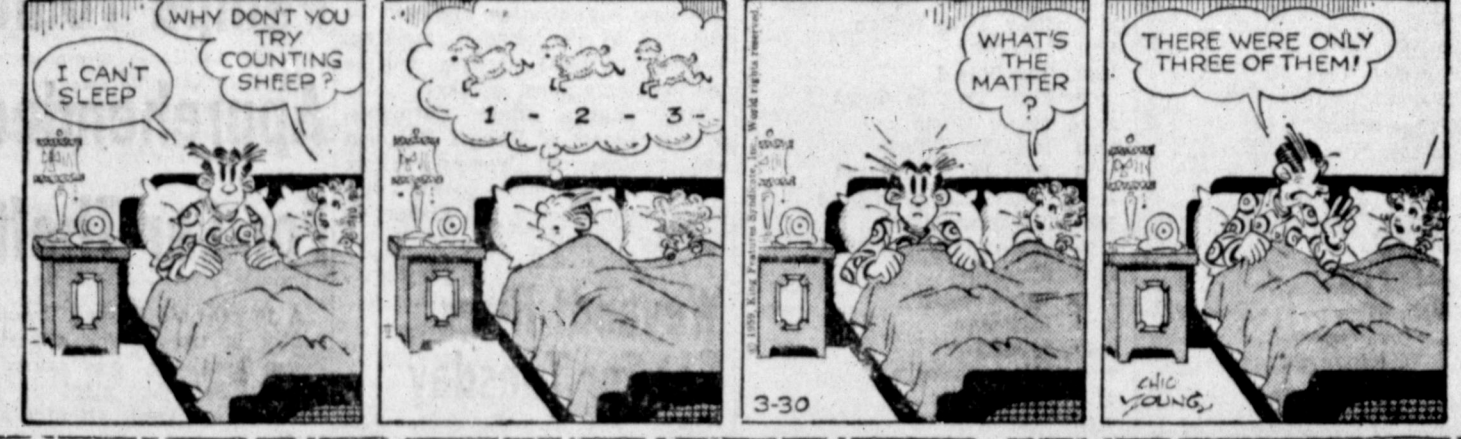

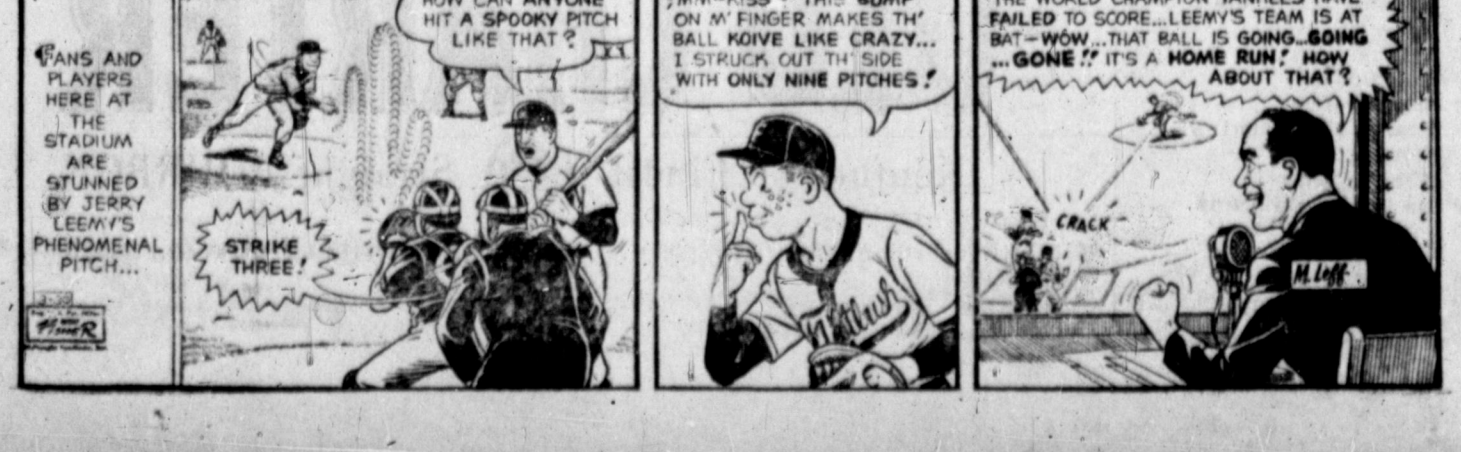

Pampa Dealer Wins Safety Training Prize

A certificate for merit for lending an automobile and a pick-up in the high school driver training program was received this week by Culberson Chevrolet, Inc. authorized new car dealer in Pampa.

The award was made to the dealer by the Texas Automotive Dealers' Association, the statewide association of factory franchised dealers whose members for more than 10 years have loaned cars to high schools for "behind the wheel" driver education. The vehicles are loaned without charge, as a public service.

The local company loaned two cars and one pickup to Pampa High School, Lefors School and White Deer School.

Officials of the state new car dealers association describe the driver training program as a most important part of the campaign to cut down the accident rate of teenagers and those in the early 20's age group.

"Youthful drivers are the reservoir, from which future operators of motor vehicles are siphoned," said Sam H. White, Houston, President of the association. "As the sellers of motor vehicles, our members who have loaned these cars are glad to do everything possible to give them as much advance training as they can."

Records show that students who have been graduated from a high school driver training class have little trouble passing the driver's license tests, and upon being licensed usually make better drivers than those who have not had such training.

Authorized new car dealers have more than \$1,000,000 invested in automobiles on loan to high schools throughout the State for this purpose, according to an estimate by Tom J. Crooks, Manager of the association at Austin.

Many of the cars are equipped with dual controls, for maximum safety during the actual driving instruction procedure, he said.

Shortage of teachers qualified to instruct in "behind the wheel" classes prevents a wider participation in the program by both schools and dealers.

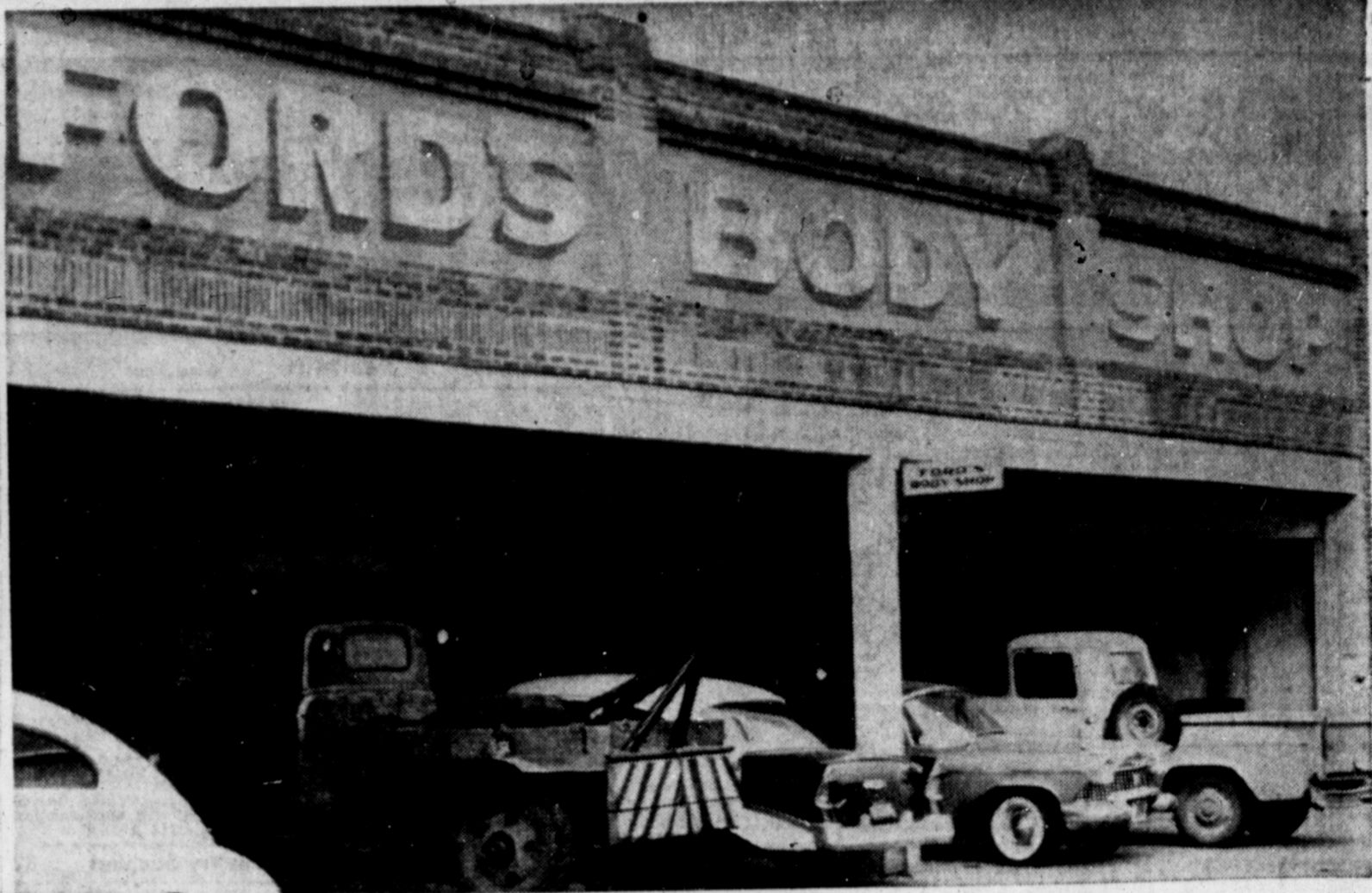
American Sugar Refining Co.

announced it has reduced the price of refined sugar 15 cents a 100 pounds for industrial products and liquid refined sugar. Steep demand for refined sugar and declining prices for raw sugar were cited as reasons for the cut.

House Looks Into Set-up Of Defense Dept. School

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Initially the Defense Department witness didn't have copies of his statement for its reporters, and we thought we must have misheard him. It sounded like what he said was that the department set up a privately-run school for its foreign aid people after deciding this kind of school couldn't be "antelited" by the military itself.

Later I got the text of his statement. Sure enough, that's what he said.

The witness was John L. Holcombe, whose title in the Defense Department is impressive and too long to go into here and who meant, apparently, that the military just couldn't get into orbit with a school like this on its own.

Classes in Plush Apartment
Anyhow, the upshot of the decision was that the department turned its training job over to a firm called the American Institute for Research, which set up classes last fall in a plush apartment house near the Pentagon with sundeck on top and an excellent view of the river.

Converting the apartments into coffee bar, lounging area, auditorium and classrooms cost us \$274,236, including \$16,000 for the institute. The institute then got an
