

PARIS (UPI) - The Western Allies have agreed to take a "tough" stand at the beginning of the Geneva foreign ministers' conference with the Soviets next month, informed diplomatic sources said today.

The western foreign ministers were said to have deided this at the first session of their planned three day Paris strategy talks designed to bring about a solid Western position of agreement before meeting with the Russians in the Swiss city.

At the same time, the sources said, the West has agreed on a three point agenda which it will propose to the Soviet Union at the start of the Geneva talks May 11. These include: German problems, Berlin, and European secur-ity.

There is also an eastern equine variety. Only the St. Louis virus and the two equine viruses seem to have much, if any, importance types cause a disease of horses and have killed a great many of

these animals. Most epidemics of encephalitis from the western equine virus have been worst in infants, especially those under six months old, and in elderly people 60 years old and up.

Strangely enough, in the original St. Louis epidemic in 1933 (it was from this epidemic that the St. Louis virus got its name.) only a small proportion of children and infants was involved. Since that time it has been found especially frequently in adult male agricultural workers. The symptoms of infection with

any one of the viruses which cause encephalitis are not always alike. During infancy, sudden fever and refusal to eat commonly come at the beginning. These are soon followed, by vomiting, muscular "twitchings, some muscular stiffness and especially a stiff

cephalitis are tragic. One mother has written that her child had "brain fever" a couple of years ago. She is now told that the right side of his brain has been damaged. She would like to know whether this may come right

Unfortunately, I cannot give her encouragement. This type of harm to the brain is probably irreversible, though one can hope that enough normal brain tissue is present so that the child can, develop reasonably normally. Much work remains to be done

on the various kinds of encephalitis More information is needed on how they are spread (insects are suspected in some cases), what causes an outbreak to develop, what people are immune or resistant, and what are the best methods of prevention and treat-

An early solution is not likely.

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
