

Mrs. Luce Might Retire From Politics

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower said today he saw no reason why Mrs. Clare Boothe Luce should resign as the new U.S. ambassador to Brazil.

Eisenhower conceded at a news conference that Mrs. Luce's remark about Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Or.) Tuesday following her Senate confirmation may have been ill advised. But he thought it was only human.

Mrs. Luce remarked that her troubles with Morse "go some years back when Sen. Morse was kicked in the head by a horse."

Morse had led a bitter, but futile attack, on Mrs. Luce's nomination.

Eisenhower revealed that, at his request, a special check was made in Brazil Tuesday afternoon. He said this showed that it was quite clear Mrs. Luce still would be welcome as this country's envoy in Brazil. Therefore, he said, he saw no major impairment of her usefulness.

Urged Resignation

Mrs. Luce's husband, magazine publisher Henry R. Luce, had urged Tuesday night that his wife

offer to resign in view of the attacks made on her in the Senate.

Eisenhower said Mrs. Luce had submitted no resignation and he had not been in direct contact with her since the Senate confirmation.

The President also took the occasion to express puzzlement over the delay in Senate confirmation of other administration appointees.

He defended Lewis W. Strauss, whose nomination as secretary of commerce has run into long delays in the Senate.

Eisenhower said Strauss, former chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, was one of the finest public servants he had ever known; that he knew nothing but the best about Strauss' honesty, integrity and capability.

Traces Career

Eisenhower was asked, in view of yesterday's uproar, whether Mrs. Luce should go on to her post in Brazil or follow the advice of her husband and resign.

Before answering directly he traced her career as ambassador to Italy and said he had always

known her as a dedicated, useful public servant.

As for her remark about Morse being kicked in the head by a horse, he said he was sure it was not meant as any disparagement of the senator. Rather, he said, it was perfectly human remark made when she undoubtedly felt heated on the subject.

But even if ill-advised, her remark about Morse was human, the President said, and he saw no major impairment of her usefulness in Brazil.

But there was no immediate

word the blonde diplomat intended to comply with her husband's plea. Only President Eisenhower could say what action he would take on an actual resignation.

Mrs. Luce, in New York, had no comment.

Angers Senators

The White House was warned late Tuesday, it was learned, that Mrs. Luce's post-confirmation criticism of Morse had sharply altered Senate confidence in her as an ambassador.

Some Democrats were reported ready to offer a resolution ex-

pressing lack of confidence in her if she stands on her remark that her troubles began several years ago "when Sen. Morse was kicked in the head by a horse."

Morse was kicked by a horse in 1951 and suffered a broken jaw. He was hospitalized for several days but was not seriously injured.

He is chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee on Latin American affairs, which would have jurisdiction over Brazilian-American problems and (See LUCE, Page 3)

Reb Invaders Won't Give Up

Nix Ultimatum To Drop Arms

PANAMA CITY (UPI) — A Cuban army officer reported today Panama's rebel invaders had rejected a surrender ultimatum, but that a few were willing to call off the invasion if allowed to go free. He called the current situation a temporary truce.

Capt. Raul Torres, one of two bearded Cuban revolutionary army officers who negotiated with the invaders in the captured coastal town of Nombre de Dios, God's name, returned here shortly before midnight to report the results

Castro Raps Revolution In Panama

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad (UPI) — Cuban Premier Fidel Castro denounced the Panamanian invasion from Cuba as an "inconceivable irresponsibility" by military adventurers and said it was potentially dangerous to his own revolution.

Castro arrived here shortly before midnight for an overnight rest on his flight from Houston, Tex., to Rio de Janeiro. He resumes his flight at 7 a.m. e.s.t. and will spend at least two days in the Brazilian capital before flying to Buenos Aires for the conference of the Organization of American States.

The Cuban premier issued his denunciation of the Panamanian invasion in a broadcast to Cuba from his plane shortly before its arrival here. He was particularly angered because many of the Panamanian invaders were Cubans.

"We should be the first ones interested in the defense of the principle of non-intervention," he said, "because only in that way will we have the necessary moral force to meet the future if some day an enemy of Cuba should plan the violation of our soil."

"It is really annoying for us that our own countrymen could do something which can be construed as a negation of the principles that for security reasons, our sovereignty and the destiny of our revolution we sustained publicly."

of his mission to Panamanian officials.

He told newsmen the invaders, mostly Cubans, were trained fighters who were determined to carry the fight to the finish.

"Under no conditions do they want to surrender their arms — no soldier does," he said.

Mission A Failure

Panamanian Minister of Justice Jose D. Bazañ said Torres' mission was "considered a failure by our government." He said the Cuban captain would not return to Nombre de Dios unless requested by the Organization of American States investigating team, which was scheduled to arrive here later today.

Torres described the current situation as a temporary truce, with most of the 80 members of the original invading party remaining in Nombre de Dios. Twenty rebels were reported pushing across the San Blas Mountains in an apparent drive toward the capital.

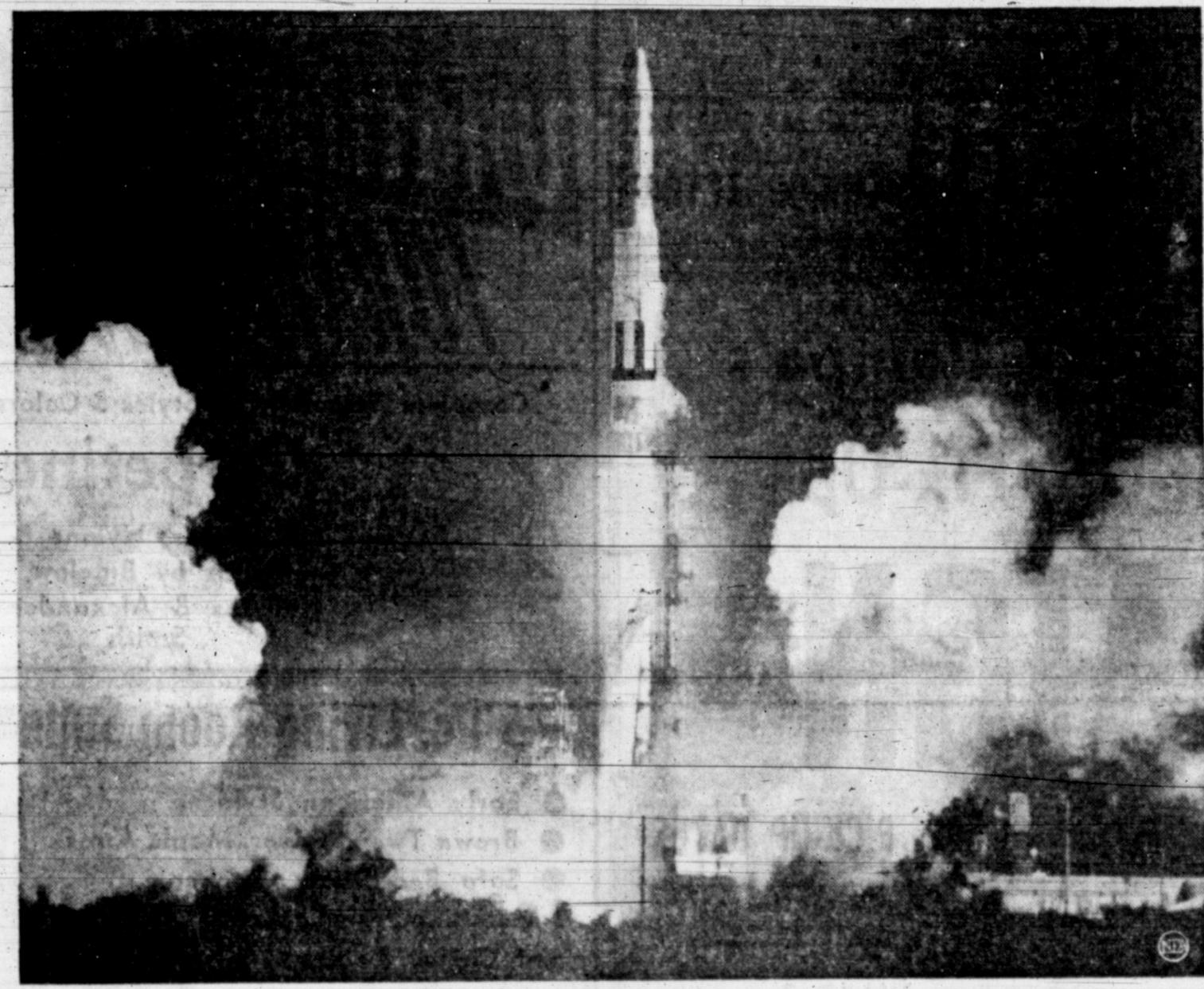
In addition, reports that sizeable rebel reinforcements numbering about 300 men were converging on Panama from Cuba persisted.

The loyalist forces of President Ernesto de la Guardia Jr., strengthened by U.S.-supplied arms and ammunition, were moving to encircle the rebel headquarters and to cut off the 20-man spearhead moving toward Panama City.

Torres, who brought one of the insurgents with him, said the rebels felt they were liberating Panama from a dictatorship.

Castro Condemns Act

He said a few were willing to call off the fight, but only if allowed to keep their arms and if promised immunity from prosecution by both the Panamanian and Cuban governments.

Argument Results In Man's Death

Thomas J. Cussen, an Amarillo auctioneer, died Tuesday afternoon apparently from a blow on the chin during an argument at the Contractors Equipment and Supply Co., 423 S. Cuyler.

According to witnesses, Cussen, 38, was struck once by Bernard Organ, the Pampa supply company owner, during a dispute over the value of merchandise being auctioned, by Cussen and other auctioneers from the Nelson Auction Co. of Amarillo.

Sheriff Rufe Jordan said that Cussen was pronounced dead at Worley Hospital at 5:33 p.m., approximately 50 minutes after being struck.

Organ, who lives at 1300 N. Duncan, has not been charged and according to District Attorney Bill Watson, there will be no further action taken, pending the outcome of an autopsy report.

The body was taken Tuesday night to the Northwest Texas hospital, Amarillo, where an autopsy is being performed this morning by Dr. J. V. Denko.

According to witnesses, Organ struck Cussen once on the chin. The auctioneer took two or three steps and then collapsed. Sheriff Jordan and police officers were called at 5:20 p.m. and artificial respiration was given by a fellow auctioneer, Jim Short.

In inquest hearing at 8 p.m. Tuesday revealed that the body has no visible bruises or lacerations. Justice of the Peace Bill Graham, who presided, ordered an autopsy.

Mr. Cussen, sales manager for the Amarillo company, lived in Amarillo at 6311 Emil. He was also a partner in the operation of a carousel in Wolflin Village.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Thelma Cussen; a son, Tommy; two daughters, Sue and Janis; a brother, John Cussen, of Winchester, W. Va.; and a sister, Mrs. Midge Scholer of Hammond, Ind.

Red Backers Slap At U.S.

WARSAW (UPI) — The Warsaw Pact nations and Communist China lined up behind Russia today with a renewed demand that Western Allies quit West Berlin and a warning that Western nuclear-missile policies threaten the Geneva conference.

A communique published today after two days of meetings here announced the Communist bloc had given its expected approval to the proposal Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko will take with him to the Geneva East-West meeting May 2.

The Communist bloc repeated Moscow warnings that arming West Germany with nuclear weapons and rockets on the eve of the conference hurt its chances of success and threatened world peace.

Gromyko, speaking Tuesday night at a reception, also warned the West against taking "any one-sided steps" before the Geneva meeting. Unfortunately, he added, the West is seeking very intensively to make such one-sided, such unilateral actions.

He did not elaborate but Western observers believed he meant American high-level flights to West Berlin and the delivery of missiles to U.S. NATO Allies.

The communique was signed by Gromyko and the foreign ministers or deputies of Albania, Bulgaria, Hungary, East Germany, Communist China, Poland, Romania and Czechoslovakia. A Polish spokesman called it "moderate" in tone and Gromyko added, "Well, if they say that, it is an objective statement."

The two main problems outlined by the communique were the "liquidation" of the Allied occupation of West Berlin and the writing of a German peace treaty.

Ike Banks On GOP To Aid Veto Power

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower counted today on House Republicans to stop Congress from spilling his record of never having a law enacted over his veto.

The legislation which the Senate passed over the President's veto Tuesday would strip Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson of power over loan-policies of the Rural Electrification Administration.

Republican leaders were hopeful, but not certain, they could muster enough votes to keep the House from enacting the measure when the final showdown vote comes Thursday.

A two-thirds vote of both Senate and House is necessary to override a veto. The Senate vote was 64-29, two more than the minimum required. Six Republican senators deserted the President on the issue.

The significance of the issue which divided Congress along party lines was more symbolic than real. Some members of both parties privately agreed it was mostly just a slap at Benson.

Backers of the bill charged Benson now can exercise a "political veto" over loans the agency wants to make to help rural co-ops finance electric and telephone services. Administration supporters reported Benson never had done so.

The House passed the bill and sent it to the White House on April 15 by a 254-123 vote, slightly less than the two-thirds margin required to override a veto.

PRIOR TO GENEVA MEET

West Chiefs Air Crisis In Berlin

PARIS (UPI) — The Western Allies have agreed to take a "tough" stand at the beginning of the Geneva foreign ministers' conference with the Soviets next month, informed diplomatic sources said today.

The Western foreign ministers were said to have decided this at the first session of their planned three-day Paris strategy talks designed to bring about a solid Western position of agreement before meeting with the Russians in the Swiss city.

At the same time, the sources said, the West has agreed on a three-point agenda which it will propose to the Soviet Union at the start of the Geneva talks May 11. These include: German problems, Berlin, and European security.

Diplomatic sources provided the guidance on developments at the morning session after the foreign ministers had decided to impose a shield of secrecy around their discussions here.

Long Meeting

Secretary of State Christian Herter met for two hours and 20 minutes at the Quai d'Orsay with the British, French and West German foreign ministers. They met again for two hours in the afternoon.

Their aim was to line up an agreed Western strategy in preparation for the Geneva meetings.

The "tough" Western line, the sources explained, would not exclude all concessions. But it would mean that the West would refuse to bow to Soviet attempts to squeeze it out of Berlin.

It also would mean that the West would not lay all its cards on the table at the outset in Geneva.

In particular, the sources said, the Western Allies will take great care not to make any proposal in the "early stages" of the Geneva talks with which the Russians later could trip them up.

A pre-session note of gloom was introduced by French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville, who said the forthcoming Geneva talks may collapse because the Russians have made no substantial concession to end the East-West crisis.

British Still Hopeful

The British took the line there still is a fair chance the Geneva foreign ministers conference May 11 will succeed.

FBI Settles For Long Range Probe

POPLARVILLE, Miss. (UPI) — The FBI today settled down to a long-range hunt for a young Negro and the masked mob that abducted him from the Poplarville jail.

The 40 agents based here were under orders from Washington to continue using "full facilities" in the two-state search for apparent lynch victim Mack Charles Parker, 23.

Scores of south Mississippi residents in this and four adjoining counties were questioned Tuesday and a similar investigation continued in a neighboring Louisiana parish.

The federal government's resolve to continue the investigation until it produces results was indicated when President Eisenhower said "these agents will, of course, continue to provide full facilities to help in any way in this matter."

Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers said the government was "making every effort to assist local authorities in apprehending and bringing the guilty parties to the bar of justice."

But progress toward the arrest of the alleged mobsters who dragged and made away with Parker from the Pearl River County jail appeared slow.



FIRST FIGHT

Sizeable rebel reinforcements from Cuba have converged on Panama where loyal forces, strengthened by U.S. arms and ammunition, were fighting to encircle invaders who have seized a coastal village. A government communique said "several" invaders were killed or wounded in a clash with patrol boats lying off invader-held Nombre de Dios, large star, 75 miles from the Panama Canal, in the first known fighting in the four-day-old invasion.

The threesome entered pleas of guilty and were placed on five years adult probation.

Charged with the theft of a car were Darrell W. Hinchey, 22, Amarillo, and Joe Davis, 17, of Erick, Okla. Davis entered a plea of guilty and was placed on five years adult probation.

Floyd W. Pearce, a 19-year-old Sayre, Okla., man, was indicted for car theft, but made no plea. Pearce remains in custody at the Wheeler jail.

Nation's Capitol Lacks Tools, Money For Civil Defense

The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A lawmaker whose identity regrettably has been lost to history rose in the House chamber a decade ago and said plaintively that if an A-bomb fell on the nation's capital congressmen wouldn't know which way to run.

Shortly thereafter, signs were erected here and there in the congressional corridors directing members to shelter areas. Otherwise, Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.), who currently is investigating the state of civil defense in Washington, concludes that things still haven't changed very much.

Jackson, acting chairman of the Senate's permanent investigations subcommittee, didn't start out to investigate civil defense at all. He was just looking into published reports that some of the Geiger counters, walkie talkies and other emergency supplies were missing from the local C.D. headquarters.

A Frustrating Job
One thing led to another though, and here was the civil defense director for the District of Columbia, Col. John E. Fondahl, explaining what he meant when he told Jackson's investigator recently:

"If there was a catastrophe in the district today, I'd be court-martialed tomorrow."

Fondahl, who has been the civil defense boss here since 1950, said first he was sorry he said this. The subcommittee counsel, Donald F. O'Donnell, said he didn't doubt it, but what was it Fondahl had meant?

The C.D. man sighed. He said he meant he had been given the responsibility of safeguarding the capital, but had been denied the tools and money to do it. He said if the bombs ever fall, people will be demanding his scalp because so little has been done to protect them.

"It's been one of the most frustrating jobs I ever encountered," Fondahl said, shaking his head. Jackson said he could see Fondahl's problem. He said civil defense has been a hard thing to sell. Fondahl said yes, and that the job hadn't been made any easier "by the help we have got from the Congress."

Mostly On Paper
I guess he really meant the help civil defense hadn't got from Congress. Anyhow, Jackson acknowledged that Congress, through its tight control of the purse strings, never has displayed much affection for civil defense.

Fondahl said he has a grand total of five paid workers to help him. He has a mobile emergency communications van, with a 14-frequency radio inside, and no operator to run it. He doesn't have any command center now, except

for one that exists mostly on paper. If the bombs fell, the center would be staffed by volunteers—provided he could get hold of them by phone.

One thing Fondahl does have is a direct phone line to the White House. But apparently it isn't used much. When the President declared martial law in a test evacuation of the capital several years ago, Fondahl was among the last to learn of it.

"Why not take out this phone?" asked Jackson.

"The White House knows it's there," replied Fondahl. "They put it in. They test it almost every day."

Oh, yes. The missing equipment. Not really missing, I gathered from Fondahl. Just nobody to keep it stored and properly counted.

 Mrs. Luce's handling of them. Morse said he would not let the uproar interfere with his conduct of subcommittee affairs. But he also said he thought Mrs. Luce's resignation would be for the good of the country.
Charges Slander
 Here are the Tuesday developments which led to the new crisis in the life of the former congresswoman and actress-playwright:
 The Senate, after two days of debate on the nomination, approved Mrs. Luce as ambassador to Brazil by a roll call vote of 79-11. Morse and others charged she was unqualified and a "purely political" appointee. All 11 votes against her were cast by Democrats.
 Asked by reporters in New York for comment on her confirmation, Mrs. Luce said she was gratified and added: "We must now wait until the dust settles. My difficulty, of course, goes some years back and begins when Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon was kicked in the head by a horse."
 Morse, informed of her statement, arose on the Senate floor on a point of personal privilege and charged she had slandered him by mentioning his old head injury.
 Two other senators who voted for Mrs. Luce said they would have opposed her if they had known of her statement. Another suggested the administration might reconsider her appointment.
"Some Provocation"
 Within an hour, Henry Luce issued a statement in New York saying he had asked his wife to offer to resign her new diplomatic post because her usefulness in the job had been impaired by a political "vendetta" in the Senate.
 Senate GOP leader Everett Dirksen (Ill.), who was in touch with the White House, told newsmen the President felt Mrs. Luce had some provocation for her remark.
 Dirksen said he had been "advised by two sources that among other things," Morse had telephoned Mrs. Luce's physician to "ascertain whether she was under the care of a psychiatrist."
 Dirksen added: "She isn't and wasn't." Morse declined to comment.
 At the end of the day, the White House said it had received no communication from Mrs. Luce following her confirmation. The State Department said any such action would be strictly a White House matter.
 In Rio de Janeiro, high Brazilian officials said they saw no reason why she should resign as ambassador. They said the official Brazilian attitude still was that she would make an excellent envoy.
 Rhode Island was the last of the 13 original states to ratify the Constitution.

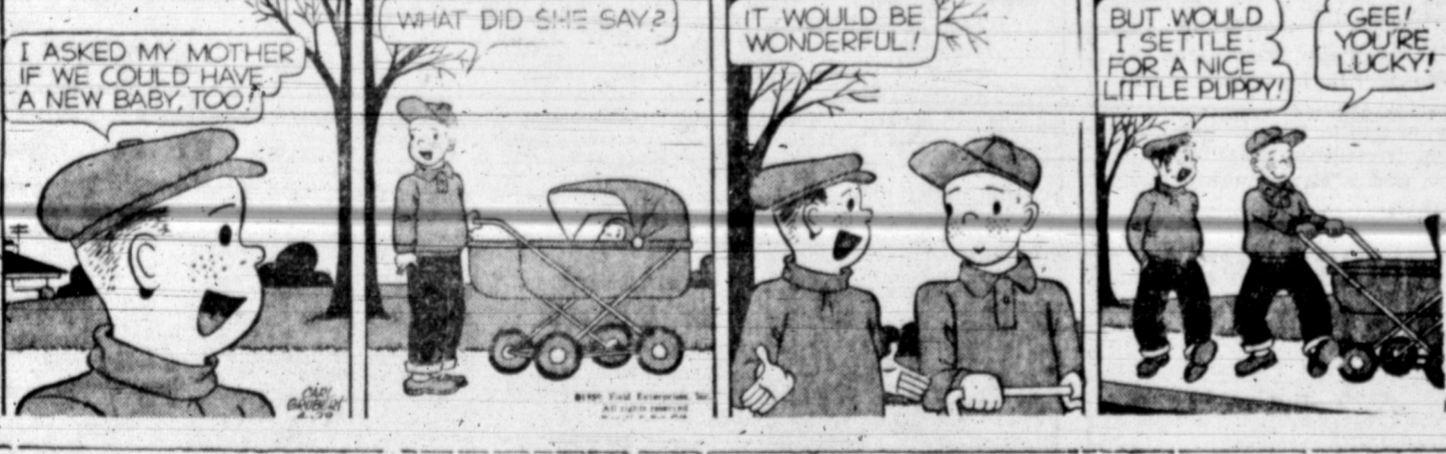

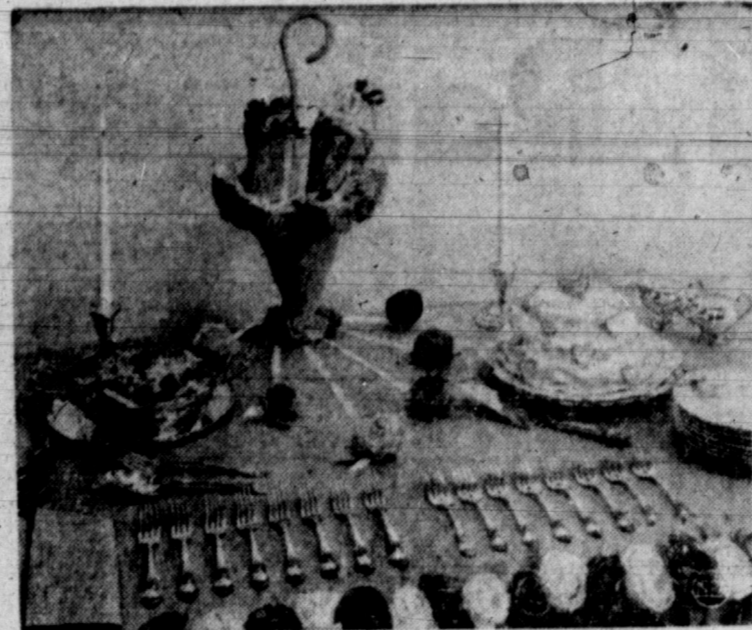
So now, when she runs off with his sand pail, he can't feel comfortable about letting her do it any more than he can chase her and take it away.

There seems to be nothing a young bride-to-be wants more than sterling silver for her future home. Piece by piece or set by set—in any manner she can get it. That's why a sterling bridal shower can be such a delightful and appreciated party. Let each friend bring a gift of silver—large or small—and arrange the beautifully wrapped gifts into a table centerpiece decoration.

Many brides-to-be select the pattern in silverware they want, then register the pattern at the local store where it is sold. The store keeps a record of what has been bought and what is still needed. That makes it possible for friends to help build up a complete set without any duplication. For your buffet, try this recipe:

MUSHROOM AND CHICKEN OVEN BAKE
(Makes 8 to 10 servings.)
One ready-to-cook stewing chick-

en (3½-pounds) cut up (or use 3 cups cut-up or canned turkey or chicken); 2 4-ounce cans sliced mushrooms, drained; 1 tablespoon minced parsley, ¼ cup toasted chopped almonds (optional), 1 cup cooked green peas, ¼ cup chopped pimento or sliced stuffed olives, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 cup broth from chicken, 1 cup light cream or milk, 1 teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon coarse ground black pepper, 1 hard-cooked egg, sieved.

Boil chicken until tender, remove meat from bones and reserve broth. In a greased 2-quart casserole, combine cup-up chicken, mushrooms, parsley, nuts, peas and pimento or olives. Mix flour with a little chicken broth until smooth. Combine and heat remaining broth, cream, and seasonings. Stir in flour paste and sieved egg; cook until thick and smooth. Pour over ingredients in casserole. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 35 minutes.

TOMORROW'S DINNER: Mushroom and chicken bake, parsley boiled potatoes, French rolls, butter or margarine, cold asparagus, vinaigrette dressing, strawberry sherbet, frosted white cake, coffee, tea, milk.

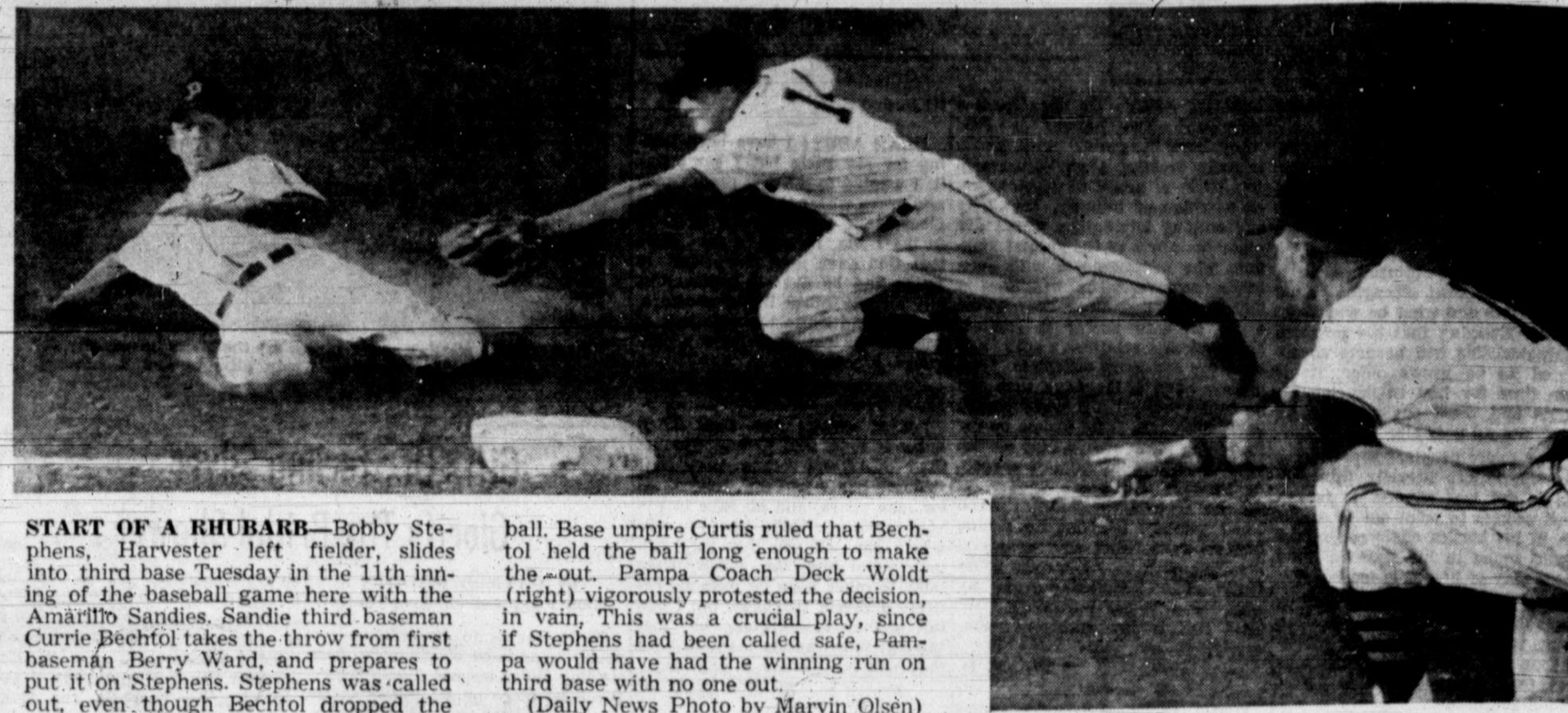

Grenewald, Yager, Both Go Distance

A walk, a sacrifice, and a single in the 13th inning brought in the only run of the game at Harvester Park Tuesday, and gave Amarillo a 1-0 victory over Pampa in one of the longest and best pitching duels ever seen here.

Tuesday's sun was in its late afternoon heaven, setting with splendor behind a high western bank of fleecy-white clouds. But, all wasn't right with Deck Woldt's world.

His Harvesters had just put up their mightiest fight on the baseball diamond since the little dark man assumed coaching command here several seasons ago. Pampa and arch-enemy, Amarillo, had hung enough goose-eggs on the scoreboard to start a small poultry farm.

Later after the game was over and lost, as he softly shoulder slapped one of his infielders, whose eyes were brimmed with tears, the Decker assured, "I've been in baseball a heckava long time, almost all my life, and I've never seen a better played game, by pro or novice."

The near-sightless peepers of old buster here have only on one occasion viewed a closer game... a little 19-inning 1-0, Lufkin over Bryan thing in 1954.

That was five years ago. Ten years from now, we'll still remember both Splendid Scoring Marathons.

Real Mental Kicking...

Always the intent student of every baseball situation, Woldt was mentally kicking himself in the seat of his baggy baseball trousers after the Tuesday thriller.

"I almost sent Ridgway (Pampa shortstop Wendell Ridgway) on home from third when his shortstop errored on a grounder in the 3rd, but instead I played it safe," groaned Woldt, quickly adding, "If I'd have had any idea one run would have meant so much later on, I'd have gambled on Wendell making it home. But that's baseball. You never know what's gonna happen later in the game."

20 Strikeouts, Whew!

Woldt had nothing but glowing praise for the two game hurlers — Amarillo's Ken Grenewald and Pampa's Keith Yager — who matched portside pitches with equal brilliance all afternoon.

"That Grenewald was tough as nails. He's like that every time we face him. I can't understand it. Other clubs have hit him like they own controlling interest in his left arm, but not us. We can't hardly buy a base-hit off him. You can't take anything away from him."

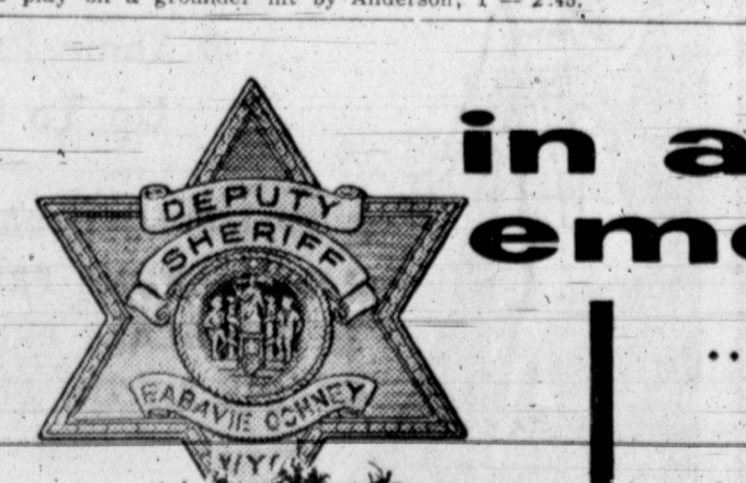
Sandie Threats

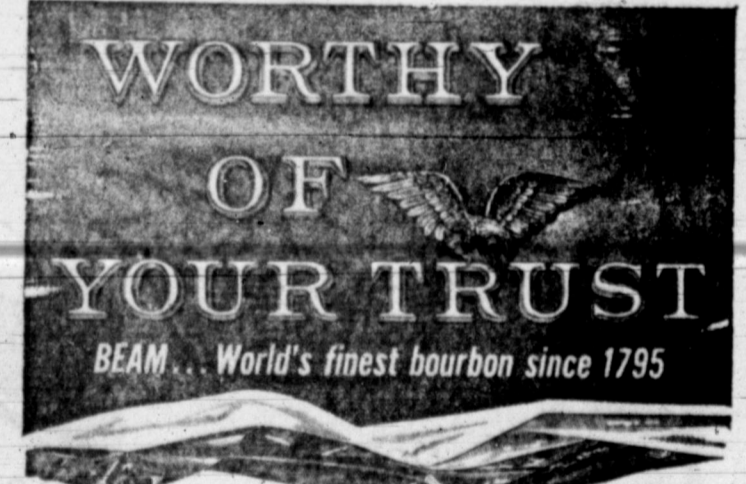

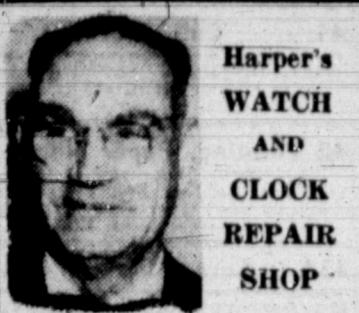

NCAA SLAMS S. CAL. GEORGIA TEACHERS'

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — The University of Southern California and Georgia State Teachers College have felt the sting of NCAA discipline, and other schools charged with athletic infractions may be dealt with today.

The 18-member policy directing NCAA council, which ends its three day spring meeting in New Orleans today, Tuesday rejected USC's appeal to have NCAA rules imposed penalties reduced. 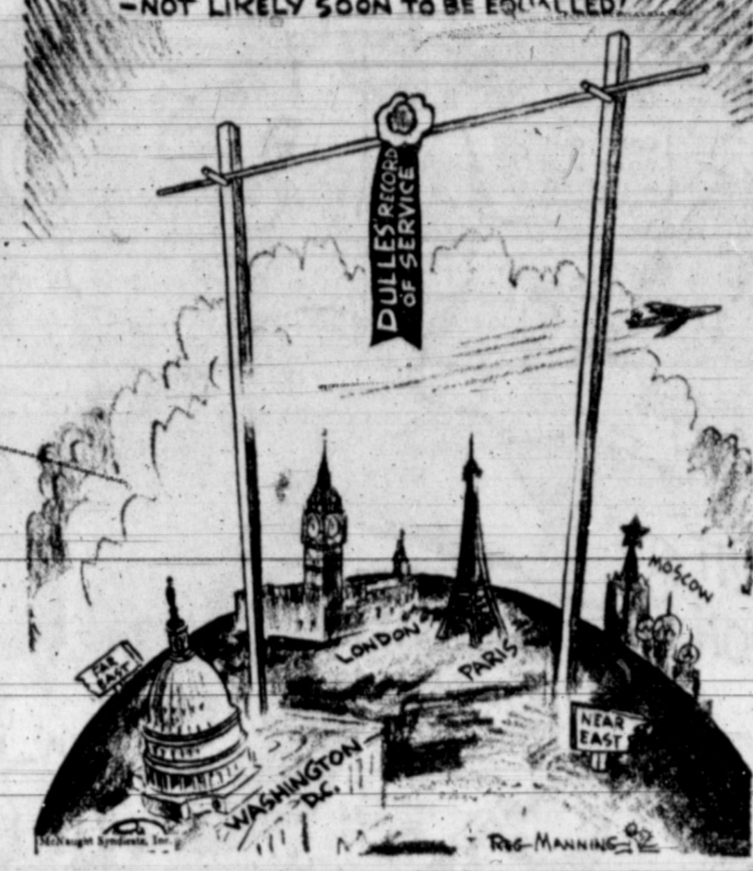

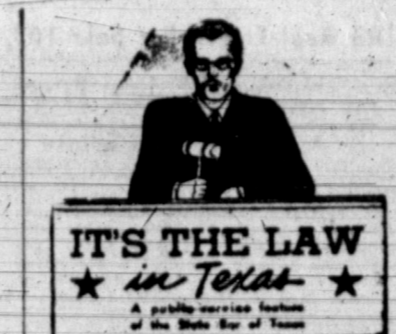

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Law Not An Exact Science
Many people have the impression that a lawyer can tell them with finality what the law is in any and every fact situation. Few realize that in many instances the lawyer, like the doctor, can only give his expert opinion on the state of the law as applied to a particular set of facts.

There are some fact situations, which arise repeatedly, where the law is well settled, and the lawyer can state with considerable conviction the exact rule of law applicable.

However, in many situations, the lawyer, after studying the statutes and the court decisions that are applicable, can only give his best judgment as to what a court would hold the law to be as applied to the particular set of facts presented to him.

How does a lawyer learn how to advise clients on legal questions? First, he must have had six or seven years of academic education. In Texas this means at least three years in a recognized law school. Because the community at large has an interest in the qualifications and conduct of members of the bar, these minimum educational requirements must be met before examination for admission to the bar may be taken.

During the three years of formal legal education, the law student attempts to read, digest, recollect and understand from 10,000 to 20,000 separate cases, statutes, and monographs. He must draw from these an understanding of basic legal principles, or processes of legal reasoning, of methods of fact and legal investigation, and of court procedures which bring relief to clients.

In both counseling and litigation, a lawyer must draw upon a wealth of precedent which he has attempted to store in his memory in order to apply one or more principles of law to the fact situation presented by his client. Ordinarily, many legal principles and rules of statute or decision are involved in even the simplest situation. Too, the problems raised by various clients, like fingerprints, are never exactly the same.

After searching his memory, the lawyer will usually check the pertinent rules and precedents. These are found in an ever-increasing volume of statutes with which modern legislation seeks to regulate many aspects of our life, and in the decisions of the courts, boards and bureaus.

Almost every problem presented to a lawyer requires research in the statutes and law books before

a proper answer can be given. Therefore, you will not receive an immediate answer to your problem from your lawyer, unless it is of the most elemental type. Your lawyer should, and you should give him time to, form his opinions from the authoritative statutes and decisions. You should also understand that, due to the constant fluctuations in our laws, he will sometimes be able to give you only an informed opinion rather than an absolute statement of the law applicable to your situation.
