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Israeli Warplanes Strike Egyptian's Suez Position

Egypt's Aggression On Canal Spawns Attack

Israeli warplanes today struck Egyptian military positions along the Gulf of Suez and in the southern section of the Suez Canal itself in retaliation against continued Egyptian "aggression" along the canal, a military spokesman reported in Tel Aviv.

The raids coincided with a mass parachute drop by Israeli troops over the Sea of Galilee as a reminder to the Arabs of Israel's ability to strike anywhere at any time. The maneuver also was called to bolster the morale of villagers in the area attacked frequently by Arab commandos and Syrian forces in the Golan Heights.

The Arab world meanwhile hailed Cairo's report that its commandos struck 50 miles into the Israeli-held Sinai Peninsula in the first use of helicopters by the Egyptians in such a strike. Israel denied the raid occurred. Damascus Radio said Israel was taken "completely by surprise" by the Egyptian strike.

Cairo Radio described the raid as a "turning point" in Arab strikes against Israel and said the denial by Israeli officials that the raid took place was an "informational scandal."

The Israeli military spokesman did not pinpoint the targets attacked in today's air raids but said all planes returned safely to base in the past Israel has pounded Egyptian radar installations along the coast south of Suez.

The raid Sunday, Cairo Radio said, was one of the biggest operations since the 1967 war from the standpoint of volume of (Israeli) losses inflicted and advanced methods used.

This attack was an example of and prelude to other forthcoming operations, Cairo Radio said.

Riding helicopters for the first time in such a strike, the commandos knifed into the peninsula at dawn and unleashed a 150-rocket barrage that killed "large numbers" of Israelis at two camps, including Israel's military headquarters for the northern Sinai, Cairo said.

Israeli warplanes were driven off trying to launch revenge raids across the Suez Canal Sunday night, Cairo spokesmen said, and Israeli convoys approaching the front were heavily damaged by Arab guns.

Egypt said the raid Sunday morning was in retaliation for the almost daily Israeli air strikes across the Suez Canal, dealing Israel what Cairo military officers called "a taste of its own medicine."

Israeli spokesmen in Tel Aviv said they "categorically denied" the raid occurred.

Investigators Dig Deeper Into Past Of Haynsworth

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Investigators today in and out of Congress both were digging deeper into the background of Circuit Court Judge Clement F. Haynsworth Jr., as a preliminary decision on his nomination to the Supreme Court draws near.

They were looking for more ammunition to fire against Greenville, S.C., jurist before the Senate Judiciary Committee meets to take action on his nomination, possibly later this week.

Inside Congress, Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., pored over Haynsworth's stock market dealings. Bayh was checking every stock or bond Haynsworth bought or sold from the time he went on the federal bench in 1957 until he was nominated for the Supreme Court last month.

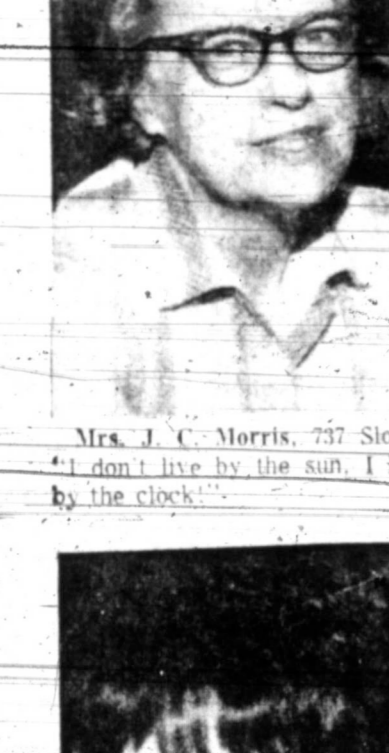

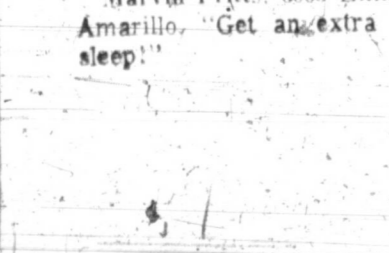

BONN (UPI)—Foreign Minister Willy Brandt, confident of decisive third party support, today asked President Gustav Heinemann for permission to form a new government and unseat Chancellor Kurt Georg Kiesinger.

Heinemann was expected to give his okay to Brandt to form a new government if the Free Democrats—the only other party that won seats in the election—agreed to serve as a junior partner in a Social Democrat coalition.

The fourth major party in the campaign, Adolf von Thadden's extreme rightwing National Democratic party, failed to muster the minimum 5 per cent of the vote required by election laws to enter parliament. Von Thadden said he will go to court to demand a new election.

Official returns said 33.3 million voters gave no party the 249 seats needed for a majority in the 496-member lower house, which elects the government.

The Christian Democrats, government leaders since the nation's 1949 founding, won 242 seats, a loss of three. The Social Democrats won 224, a gain of 22.

The Free Democrats won 30 seats, a loss of 19. Whichever of the two major parties it decides to support will control the lower house.

Foreign currency exchanges remained closed today. They were shut Thursday to prevent speculators from gambling on a possible upward revaluation of the mark following the election.

The Free Democrats said during the campaign they would be willing to join Brandt in coalition. Their votes clinched the election for the first time of a Social Democrat, Gustav Heinemann, as figurehead president of West Germany in March.

Kiesinger's Christian Democrats, the party of the late Konrad Adenauer, sought a formula that would enable it to continue in power.

A Free Democrat coalition with Brandt's party would give the Social Democrats 254 seats.

House Hopes To Finish Military Purchasing Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House this week hopes to do in two days what took the Senate eight weeks to accomplish—pass a multibillion dollar military purchasing bill.

Up before the House Wednesday will be a \$21.3 billion version of the Senate-passed \$20 billion military procurement bill. It includes permission for start of the antiballistic missile system, purchase of the C-5A cargo plane and other projects which drew eight weeks of attacks from Pentagon critics in the Senate.

But when the measure comes up Wednesday, it will be under ground rules allowing only three hours of general debate. After that will come tightly limited arguments on amendments similar to some of those that were launched, largely without success, in the Senate.

These amendments would bar deployment of the antimissile system, cut off additional purchases of the C-5A and prevent construction of additional aircraft carriers. All these amendments were rejected by the Senate and they appear assured of a quick turnaround by the House.

The House version of the bill when it emerged from the Armed Services Committee, carried an extra \$1 billion for Navy shipbuilding. Committee Chairman L. Mendel Rivers pushed the unrequested additional authorization because he believes much of the U.S. fleet is obsolete.

The House bill also would write into law Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird's promise of a 176,000-man cut in military personnel by next July 1.

The same armed services panel starting Tuesday plans to start studying President Nixon's request for authority to select draftees by lot. Congress historically has been cool to the idea, but Rivers ordered a subcommittee to take another look at the plan.

Kidnaped Girl Sold For \$500

NEW YORK (UPI)—Tondelayo Jones, 3, who police said was sold to a South Carolina woman for \$500 was reunited with her mother at Kennedy International Airport early today.

Mrs. Helen Jones on the verge of tears at the end of an ordeal that began Thursday, took the child from two FBI agents who accompanied her on the jetliner flight from Charleston, S.C., via Atlanta.

They really are New York's finest, Mrs. Jones said of police who have arrested two women on kidnaping charges in the bizarre case. The child's light brown hair had been dyed black by her abductors, police said.

FBI agents, acting on a tip, found the child unharmed Sunday at the home of Mrs. Irby Jones (no relation) in Charleston. Mrs. Jones was described as the wife of a respected dentist, Dr. William Jones.

New York police charged Constance Dezonie, 39, and Pauline Coleman, 57, with kidnaping. They were to be arraigned before a U.S. commissioner.

Army Colonel Relieved of Duty

SAIGON (UPI)—The colonel who described the Pacific Stars and Stripes as the "Hanoi Herald" has been relieved of his post as the U.S. Army's chief information officer in Vietnam.

An Army spokesman announced Sunday Col. James Campbell was being assigned to other, unspecified duties in the war zone.

Campbell, who was to become editor-in-chief of the newspaper in January, criticized its war reportage in a speech read to an information officers conference in Taipei Sept. 6.

"I think this conference will be interested in learning that the Pacific Stars and Stripes has earned for itself the title of the 'Hanoi Herald,'" the speaker said.

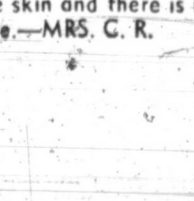
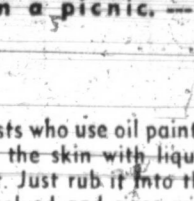
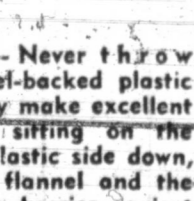
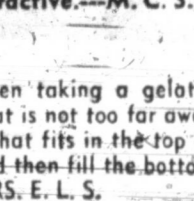
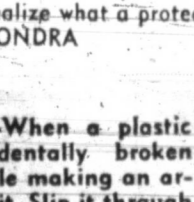
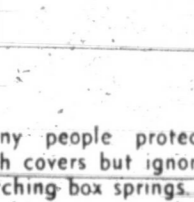
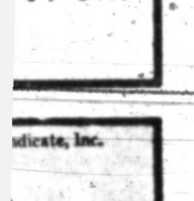
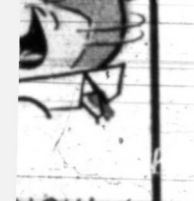
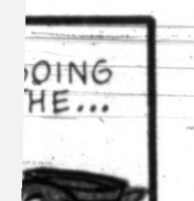
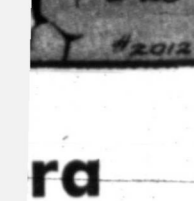
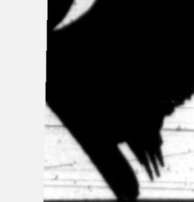

Foreign News Commentary

In Prague's old town square, carved at the base of the monument of Jan Hus, Czechoslovakia's 15th century martyr, is this motto: "I trust that the direction of your affairs will be returned to you again, Czech people." The reference was to a German invasion of Czechoslovakia in 1920. As the Central Committee of the Czech Communist party convened in Prague this week, it was to write a closing chapter on a period of modern Czech history which lasted only from January to Aug. 21, 1968, and to reach a final decision on a man who tried to make reality of the hope expressed at the base of the Hus monument. He is, of course, Alexander Dubcek, who went in those brief months from hero to hostage and who now, at the least is to be shoved into political oblivion by a government which once more has been forced to recognize its subservience to Moscow. At 47, Dubcek was the youngest leader of any Communist nation and the man who overthrew the discredited Antonin Novotny as leader of Czechoslovak Communism. He tried to put a "human face" on the Czech Communist structure, ordered economic reforms, a free press, freedom to travel to the West and talked of secret ballots in elections.

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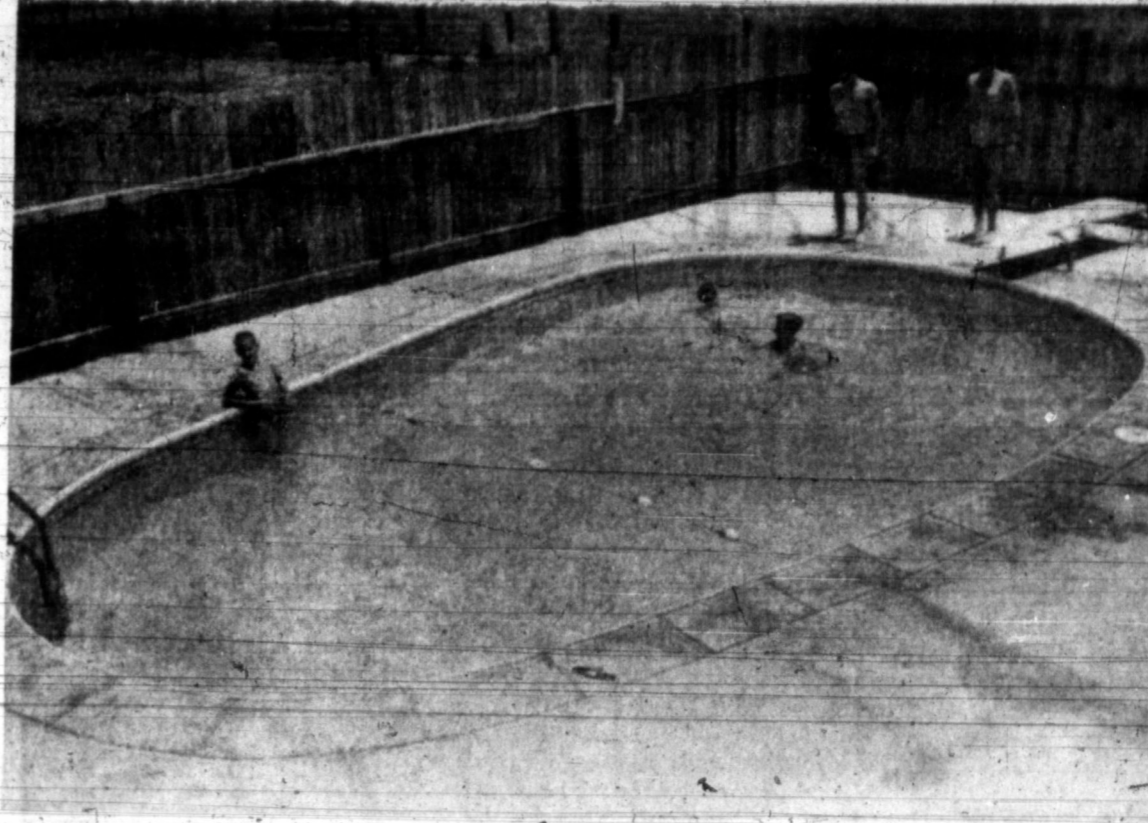

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Few Cases Of Class Disruptions Reported

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The black studies programs are also recurrent demands from students for more say in how things are run on campus.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The new academic year is under way at colleges and universities throughout the country, with a few cases of class disruptions and demonstrations emphasizing the question: Will peace return to the campus?

Some officials at the colleges and in Washington say the signs are hopeful. Others are pessimistic. All are pretty nervous.

One of the key questions, many officials seem to think—is whether the bulk of students—the so-called silent majority which doesn't join rioting—will step forward and lead a restoration of campus peace by working for reforms without violence.

This is the hope of those most concerned with the situation. They believe the ranks of radicals who led the violent, destructive unrest in the last academic year are faction-ridden. But it is being strongly debated whether this means the radical leaders are not as potent a threat this fall.

Two issues that appear to offer the most potential for student unrest are the Vietnam war, including the draft, and
