

TWISTED TRAIN WRECKAGE

The early afternoon quiet at White Deer Wednesday was upset at 12:55 p.m. when 15 freight cars on an east-bound Santa Fe train jumped the tracks in the White Deer freight yards. Seven of the big cars turned over. Photo of the wreckage above was taken from a Cessna 170 single-engine plane shortly after the derail-

ment. Pilot Morris Silver of Pampa flew at about 1,000 feet at 85 miles per hour when this and the accompanying photo were taken. At right lies the wreckage of five boxcars loaded with potash. At left lies a sixth boxcar along with two sets of wheels. Oil cars in the foreground were not present at the time of the derailment.

15 Train Cars Derailed In White Deer; None Hurt

Seven Santa Fe freight cars turned over in a 15-car derailment at White Deer shortly before 1 p.m. Wednesday. No persons were injured in the grinding pile-up.

The derailment occurred at 12:55 p.m. as a 105-car freight train passed through the White Deer. Deer freight yards at an estimated 55 miles-per-hour.

Santa Fe's Chief Dispatcher P. L. Beyers at Amarillo told the Daily News the derailment was caused by a "hot-box" and broken journal on the 68th car. A hot-box he described as 'the overheating of the journal, which is part of the axle.

The 68th car and the 14 cars following jumped the tracks, with the first seven cars turning over and coming to rest in a pile of wreckage.

Troy Maness, a employe of the nearby Wheeler-Evans Elevator office, said he was sitting in the elevator office when the derailment occurred.

"I turned and saw a big cloud of dust out the office window." he was quoted as saying, "then I saw those cars headed toward the office." "I began to make like Bobby front door."

Santa Fe crews arrived at the scene later in the afternoon to begin the work of clearing the main trackage which was badly tork up in - the derailment. The wreckage failed to throw Santa Fe off schedule, as "through trains" were switched onto other tracks at White

Herter To Offer Troop Cuts On Even Keel With Soviets

Germany Liberated Is

BY STEWART HENSLEY United Press International

GENEVA (UPI)-Secretary of State Christian A. Herter planned today to offer to match the Soviet Union in global troop cuts in return for swift liberation of all Germany, starting at once with Berlin.

Herter and the Western powers planned to challenge Russia to permit free elections in East and West Berlin as a test of how all German unification would go. Already dubbed the "Herter plan," the proposal is back by Britain, France and West Germany.

The Western foreign ministers led by Herter set a 21/2 year period for setting up German elections and establishing a provisional govern-

ment that would be united and free.

They offered Soviet Foreign Soil Engineer Minister Andrei Gromyko three power troop cuts, guarantees Jets Talk Here

West Wants Closed Talks

GENEVA (UPI) - The West moved today to determine once and for all Russia's sincerity by pressing for secret meetings that would cut off the Soviet propaganda flow from the four power talks here.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko has not yet committed himself on the Western proposal. But observers said acceptance of secrecy in the talks would indicate strongly Moscow wants genuine negotiations.

They said a rejection would be tantamount to admission that the Soviet government looks upon the meeting mainly as a propaganda forum.





Earnest Money Contract Should Cover Details of Real Estate Purchase

The signing of a contract of sale is an extremely important step in the purchase of a home. Once buyer and seller have signed, the are bound by the provisions of the rights in the transaction are there, by set and determined. If the conract is poorly, and haphazaroly drawn, a harvest of regret may be reaped at a later date.

Sales contracts are often called by other names, such as earnest money contracts, binders, receipts, etc. All of them are for the same purpose and almost without exception involve the deposit of money by the buyer. Some require the seller to put up a good faith deposit. The fact that such deposited sums are usually to be forfeited in event the depositor later fails to go through with his specified contractual obligations lends additional weight to the often stated admonition that no contract should be signed without complete understanding as to its terms.

But many home purchasers (and sellers) rush to sign a hastily prepared contract with very little knowledge of its contents. The pressure of time, the informality of the occasion, the casual appear ance of the contract, and perhaps the fact that a partially printed form is used may contribute in causing the true importance of the act to be overlooked. At any rate, many are lulled into a lapse of good business judgment.

Every significant detail of the bargain should be crystallized in unmistakable terms in the contract of sale. Land and fixtures being sold should be clearly described, A complete description of the property by lot and block, or by metes and bounds, is a must, the street number being inadequate by it

Articles and fixtures included in the sale but no always sold with houses generally should be specifically listed. Included in this cate gory are such items as venetian blinds, removable floor coverings draperies, air conditioning units and others. In purchasing property under construction, complete plans and specifications form an essen-

tial part of the agreement. The price to be paid must, of course, be specified, along with method and terms of payment. I a certain sized loan is a prerequisite to the buyer's ability to com plete the purchase, this fact should be noted. Sad indeed is the prospective purchaser who loses his earnest money when a contemplated loan transaction falls through his contract requiring payment of the entire consideration in cash.

The sales contract should also state the quality of the title to be conveyed to the buyer and the type of title evidence to be furnished.

The buyer's individual circum stances and desires may require that various matters not mentioned above be provided for in the contract. All too often people try to

squeeze a sales contract to fit the ype of printed form on hand, omit ting or leaving to easily miscon strued or forgotten oral agree ment many vital provisions. Do not fall into the "pitfall of the printed form." Too many unfortu nate entanglements have been an nounced by clients to lawyers with the words, "I have just signed a receipt for a house on Blank Street. NEW YORK - Did you ever see Toulouse-Lautrec, live and breathing? I can show him to you. He is a tiny, puckish, infinitely brainy young French comedian with tiny, slightly darkened glasses with silver frames and bows. He is named Pierre Olaf, he could so easily play Toulouse-Lautrec that three times in three different countries he has been asked to do so, and when he was 3 years old he embarrassed his mother to a point where she publicly ignored him. Olaf, who has a totally differ-

ent real name, was the first actor I ever met who could clearly and concisely pinpoint that exact day, hour and minute when the great decision to be an actor for life was made. We were sitting in a shrouded and shadowed 45th Street bistro, so dark it was hard to see your hand before your face, and I peered through the gloom and said: "Pierre, do you know, right now sitting there, when you decided to be an actor, thus horrifying your family, a long line of marine insurance specialists?"

"Of course," he said. "I was 3 years old in a park in Paris. It was a sunny June afternoon and my mother stopped to talk to a friend. I heard music and went to the source. It was a blind man with an accordion. The music entranced me and I began to dance to it. In minutes I had a crowd. My mother's friend glimpsed me dancing in the distance and said to my mother: 'For heaven's sake, look at Pierre. You'd best go get him away from there.' 'It is too embarrassing to claim him in front of all those people. Later, she came and got me. "But how do you know that that

was exactly the moment?" "It's very simple. I passed the hat. Instinctively, I wanted to be

paid for my performance. Any child can dance to music - born actors expect to be paid for it. Later, when I was around 5 years old, we passed the summer at a noted beach resort on the coast and I became disgustingly rich. The Doctor Says:

A series of rather complex questions is presented by a reader. She quotes a newspaper report that a gynecologist had recommended that every woman over 40 should have a hysterectomy as a cancer-prevention step.

She adds that among women she knows it is generally be lieved that it is virtually impossible to find a surgeon to perform a hysterectomy unless there is a clear and present need. Also, that the only unpleasant after-of fects are a tendency to put on weight and become hairier and that treatment to control the aftereffects is very costly.

Finally, the writer notes a widespread fear of the effect of this procedure on marital life. First, I think I should explain what is customarily meant by a hysterectomy

Ordinarily today this consists in the removal of the womb, or uterus, leaving in place the other feminine structures, including the ovaries. Occasionally an operation is performed known as a panhysterectomy, which involves removal of the ovaries and oviducts.


