Sweet Singer Seeking Title

This is the last in a series of articles on young women who will be featured in the Miss Pampa beauty pageant Tuesday night. Miss Pampa will be sent to Beaumont for the Miss Texas pageant, the state preliminary of the Miss America contest.

Nora Stephens from White Deer has blue eyes and a golden voice she hopes will help her become Miss Pampa of 1959.

Miss Stephens is a PRX operator at the Cetanese Plant. She was a 1957 graduate of White Deer High School, where she was much in demand as a singer. Later she attended Frank Phillips College.

Miss Stephens majored in voice for a year before coming to work for the Z. J. Jewelry Company. Three months later she was employed by the Cetanese Corporation. Her contest sponsor is the Pampa Motor and Transfer Company.

The 20 year old beauty will sing "Tenderly" for her talent in her first beauty contest.

The Miss Pampa pageant will open at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday at Robert E. Lee Junior High School. The Jaycees, who are sponsoring this Miss America preliminary, are selling adult and children's tickets to the general public at \$1 and 50 cents respectively.

Besides ten lovely young women in bathing suits and evening gowns, the pageant will feature 14 small girls in a junior miss show.

Following judging by a group of Amarillo Jaycees, Miss Pampa will be crowned by Mayor Ed Wyatt. First and second runners-up will also be named. Dean Kelly, the Amarillo recording artist who emceed the 1958 Miss Texas pageant, will appear as master of ceremonies. Walk-on music will be played by Maxine Milliron, well known Pampa organist.

Texas Is Leader In Traffic Deaths

60 Violent State Deaths Are Recorded

Texas led the nation in Fourth of July weekend traffic deaths and drownings, although the record holiday slaughter forecast by the National Safety Council failed to materialize.

The latest drownings reported were two Latin American boys who drowned while on a fishing trip with relatives in the south fork of Champion Creek, 10 miles southeast of Colorado City, Sunday.

Highway deaths soared to 25 over the weekend, one short of the total forecast by Department of Public Safety officials — and four other Texans died in head-on crashes about 85 miles north of Chihuahua, Mexico, on the Pan-American Highway Sunday night. In all a total of 60 persons died violent deaths in Texas over the weekend, with 25 in traffic, 16 drowned, and 19 miscellaneous deaths — the latter category including homicides and suicides.

24 Deaths Forecast

The National Safety Council had predicted that 350 persons would die in auto accidents on the nation's highways between 6 p.m. Friday and midnight Sunday. Texas Department of Public Safety officials had estimated that 24 would die on Texas highways.

The four Texans killed in the smashup in Mexico Sunday night were all residents of El Paso. They included Rodolfo Madrid, 12, and Maria Elena Madrid, 8, children of Elia Madrid; Mrs. Antonia Allala, 57, Madrid's mother-in-law; and Natividad Allala, 35, his sister-in-law.

Authorities said the Madrid family was headed toward Durango when their auto crashed head-on into a car driven by Trinidad Sifuentes-Hernandez of Juarez. He also was killed.

Injured were Madrid, two of his daughters, Josefina and Alicia, 3, and a young friend of the girls, six-year-old Silvia Rio.

Honoluh Boy Killed

The fatal crash in Texas over the weekend occurred six miles east of Alice at 7 p.m. Saturday. Three persons were killed instantly and two died later in Physicians and Surgeons Hospital at Alice. Another three were injured.

Texas' latest accident victims were Steven Burgett, 16, of Houston; and 12-year-old Patrick H. Taylor of Pasadena, who drowned while searching for the body of an earlier drowning victim.

Burgett died instantly when his motor scooter was struck by a pickup truck. Taylor was drowned while wading in the surf off Bolivar Peninsula near Galveston. He disappeared while helping in a search for the body of Claude Oran Lee, 23, of Beaumont, who had been missing since Saturday.

The two Latin American boys drowned Sunday — Manuel Carrillo, eight, and his 10-year-old brother, Francisco Carrillo Jr., pushed Texas' drowning total to 16, one higher than New York's, which previously led the nation.

Nation Has Safer 4th Than Eyed

The nation's motorists apparently had a safer and saner Fourth of July than traffic experts had expected. The National Safety Council had forecast that 350 persons would die in auto accidents between 6 p.m. local time Friday and midnight Sunday. The mark for a two day Independence Day weekend of '71 was set in 1953.

But at 4 a.m. a.d.t., United Press International figures showed at least 260 highway deaths, no more than the "normal" week-end total, and far below the feared toll.

At least 365 other persons drowned and 50 lost their lives in miscellaneous accidents for a total holiday death count of 478.

Texas led the states in traffic fatalities with 23, followed by Illinois with 16 and Virginia with 15. New York and Pennsylvania each reported 14 killed in auto accidents. Fifteen persons drowned in New York, 14 in Texas and 13 in Michigan.

The council said one of the "most encouraging" aspects was that no one was killed by Independence Day fireworks. "It is perfect proof of what can be done when the nation makes up its mind it simply has had enough of senseless destruction of life and property," a council spokesman said. "If a similar safety record, if only a sliver, could be adopted toward highway irresponsibility."

39 Saved From Blazing Tanker; Six Are Injured

CAMERON, La. (UPI) — White-hot explosions seared the Belgian cargo tanker ANVERS today as firefighters towed it aground and surrendered it to roaring flames. The tanker was beached three miles offshore early today after its 37 crewmen, the captain's wife and the captain had been rescued. But it was feared the burning bulk might drift free again and blunder into a nearby offshore oil drilling rig.

At least six persons, two members of the crew of the 2,600-ton ANVERS, two Navy seamen and two Coast Guard firefighters, were injured. None was believed seriously hurt.

Searing white explosions from magnesium bars stored in the No. 5 hold lighted the early-morning sky and the hull of the ANVERS glowed red.

Three Injured In 2 Mishaps

The Upper Panhandle area experienced fewer than usual accidents over the July 4 holiday, the Highway Patrol office in Pampa reported this morning.

Sgt. E. G. Albers said only three persons were injured; none seriously, in two separate highway accidents. There were five other property damage accidents, none involving injuries or loss of life.

Two persons were injured early Saturday morning when a car went out of control and rolled three times over and one-half miles west of Clarendon. One of the persons injured was the two-year-old son of the driver, Charles Alfred Smith, 23, of Amarillo.

Smith, charged with driving while intoxicated, was later fined \$100 in Donley county court. Another of Smith's youngsters escaped injury in the crash. Neither Smith or the two-year-old was seriously hurt.

A third person was hurt in an accident early Sunday morning north of Childress. He was Wade Swift, address not given.

Sgt. Albers said some counties in his nine-county area have not yet reported their accident figures for the July 4 weekend, but to his knowledge there were no other injury accidents in the area. Officers maintained a tight vigil on area highways and reported that highway travel was lighter and safer than usual.

Second 'Play' Program Starts

The second two-week session of the City's Summer Recreation program opened this morning in the Harvester Fieldhouse. Clifton McNeely, coordinator, reported today. This session was set for Baker Elementary School but was returned to the Fieldhouse because of construction work at Baker. The program will close July 31, at the same time as a Water Safety program sponsored by the Pampa Chapter of the American Red Cross.

The last message from the destroyer USS Wren said: "ABANDON all firefighting stations. Too hot to go on. Beach ship."

The craft was beached three miles offshore and five miles southwest of Cameron, not far from several drilling rigs. A Coast Guard official said "we got trouble" if the ship drifts free again.

Officials said the 600-ton ship, aboard the ANVERS apparently had not been reached by the fire, which raged since 10:23 a.m. Sunday. The entire after-deck was burned out early today and the fire was blazing on the fore-deck.

Twenty-four crewmen and Mrs. Henri Sanglier, the wife of the captain, fled the 442-foot motor vessel ANVERS Sunday night when the fire raged out of control seven miles offshore.

The skipper and 12 other crewmembers, aided by fire parties which had boarded the craft, stayed aboard to battle the flames but shortly after midnight they too were ordered by the Coast Guard to abandon ship.

Two destroyers, four Coast Guard cutters, two tugs and a motorship picked up the survivors from life rafts. Two crewmembers were injured during the blaze, neither one seriously.

The 2,600-ton ship, whose cargo included 800 tons of fuel oil, was bound from Antwerp, Belgium, to Lake Charles, La. when fire broke out in the engine room.

When flames spread rapidly, Capt. Sanglier ordered his wife and 12 crewmembers to take to life rafts while he and the remaining crewmen, assisted by firefighters, tried to contain the blaze.

Cause of the fire was not immediately determined.

West Explains Theater Plans

Pampa theatre manager Paul West said he conferred all day Tuesday with the theatre's architects to iron out any last minute changes. The architects, Collins Flood and Associates, Ardmore, Okla., are expected to open contract bids in about one month. Actual construction is expected to begin late in August or early in September.

The new 1,000-seat structure, costing an undisclosed amount, will be named the "Capri."

"The Capri will be as ready as we can make it," West said with a cautious smile this morning.

It will succeed the old LaNora which this spring was completely gutted by flames in an early morning fire. A second theatre fire destroyed the screen at the outdoor Pampa Drive-in just 43 days later.

West said today the Capri features will include "about 1,000 seats, or 250 more than at the currently thriving LaVista, and about 100 more than at the ill-fated LaNora."

The Capri will have four main aisles, no seats against either wall, a 40-foot screen, 12 feet wider than at the LaNora, and six glass doors at its Cuyler St. entrance.

West said the Capri will have stereophonic sound with 12 speakers spaced at different places throughout the theatre. He believes a cinema which requires a 150-foot stage and screen will not be possible.

When their efforts failed, they were ordered off the burning ship. A tug took the ANVERS in tow and, escorted by two destroyers, headed for shore in an effort to beach the burning cargo-tanker in shallow water off this port city.

Cause of the fire was not immediately determined.

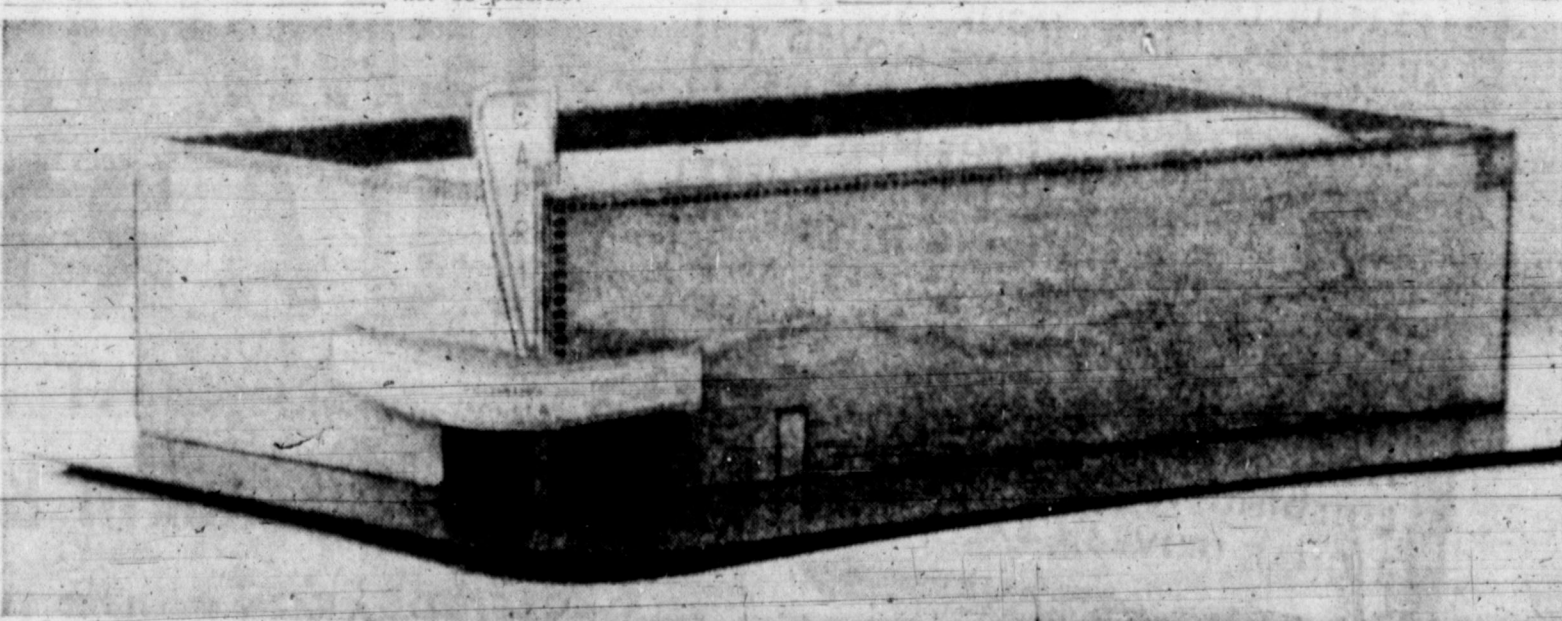
WOMAN RUSHED TO HOSPITAL

Indonesia Cabinet Tosses In Towel

Sukarno Is Big Boss!

JAKARTA, Indonesia (UPI) — The Indonesian Cabinet resigned today, giving President Sukarno full executive powers to run the country. He immediately denied any intention to become a dictator.

Observers believed the army, largest in Southeast Asia, would be the guiding force when Sukarno puts into operation his "guided democracy." This has been likened to the operations of a politburo, but the army itself is the strongest and Communist force in Indonesia.

Sukarno dissolved Parliament, discontinued the provisional Constitution and returned to the 1945 Constitution under which he plans to set up his guided democracy soon. But it was no victory the president could shout about.

The army was clearly the biggest winner so far. Army commanders under the leadership of Lt. Gen. Abdul Harris Nasution, the chief of staff, probably will decide within their own political differences what sort of guidance they will give Sukarno's guided democracy.

Sukarno's lead under heavy army pressure in issuing the decree, Nasution said the ban imposed on political activities in June will remain in effect.

Sukarno is tremendously dependent on the army to hold the position in check while at the same time preventing the Communists exploiting the split between the Moslems and the Nationalist group.

About the only way the parties can be held in check is by force, and most observers believed the army was willing to do that if necessary. The Communists were demanding representation in any new government and the Moslems were expected to demand the same.

BILL MAY BE READY SOON

AUSTIN (UPI) — A 10-man Senate-House Conference Committee, which has been working behind closed doors and under a pledge of secrecy, may have reached agreement on a tax bill to help get the state out of its financial difficulties.

Speculation arose over the weekend that the committee may even have the bill ready for floor action today when lawmakers return to their desks after a Fourth of July holiday weekend.

The committee is trying to get a single, satisfactory tax bill from a 176-million dollar version produced by the Senate and a 106-million dollar proposal advanced by the House.

If the committee reports a bill out today, the legislature will have two weeks to act on it before the end of the second special session.

However, both bills are short of the state's tax need of 180 million dollars for the next two years because neither bill contains the severance beneficiary tax on natural gas proposed by Gov. Price Daniel.

The Senate bill would raise 63 million through a 3 cent-per-pack increase on cigarettes. It also includes a temporary 75 cent increase in corporation franchise taxes and a permanent 50 cent boost.

Other features of the Senate bill are a dollar-a-year increase in drivers' license fees and 1 per cent increase in natural gas production taxes.

The House bill incorporates a one-cent boost in the cigarette tax, a license fee and excise tax on private bottle clubs, and a 1.5 per cent sales tax on boats, motors and pleasure aircraft.

The House bill also duplicates the Senate bill in proposing a boost in the motor vehicle sales tax from 13 to 15 per cent, the corporation franchise tax adjustment and new taxes on cigars and other tobacco products.

Meanwhile, a joint Appropriations Committee is virtually idle as it awaits action on a tax bill. If it comes from a hardware store we have it, Lewis Rowe.

Three Thefts Reported Here

Pampa police reported a flurry of three small break-ins Saturday night. The largest loss was \$32 from a coin changer at the Speed Queen Laundry, 601 Sloan.

Chief Jim Conner said a coin-changer at the laundry was ripped off the building's east wall and carried away. A report of the loss was made early Sunday morning.

Three juveniles were apprehended by police on the early Sunday morning hours after they were seen filching apples from a fruit stand at 201 S. Cuyler. The apples were taken by breaking a window at the stand's main building. Police turned the youngsters over the juvenile authorities.

A third break-in occurred Saturday night at a vacant fruit stand at 1020 E. Frederic. A cigarette machine, not yet removed from the stand, was opened and an undetermined number of cigarettes taken. Police said many packages were opened and scattered about the ground.

Windy City Shines Up For Visit Of Britain's Queen Elizabeth

By BOYD GILL. United Press International CHICAGO (UPI)—Chicago greeted Queen Elizabeth II, who will have a Sunday-go-to-meetin' dress-ness. It threw expense vouchers in the wastebasket in preparing for the first visit by a reigning British monarch and put such a shine on the face of the city—at least parts of it—that even Chicagoans were amazed.

It's doubtful that there was a speck of trash along any of the miles of streets the Queen traveled, and even the pigeons on State Street seemed to have flown in from a bird bath.

Forty horses of a Medinah shrine troop that escorted Her Majesty and Prince Philip on one leg of their procession through the city were washed down in water and alcohol to eliminate offensive odors.

Cleanup crews themselves fitted out in fresh work clothes, were assigned to follow the royal procession and scour streets so that when the procession doubled back, they would sparkle like freshly laid concrete.

Owners of small hot dog stands along the lakefront washed and painted, their stands, raised Old Glory and hoped the royal couple would stop for a red hot.

Flowerboxes were hung under the grimy Wabash Street-elevated line.

Parks were clipped and manicured in a manner befitting golf course greens.

Traffic signals were painted, and thousands of yards of brilliant gold and white bunting were strung out along streets and especially in the dock area where the Queen arrived.

Ten workers toiled all day Sunday adjusting a floating landing dock so the Queen wouldn't have to step a fraction of an inch up or down in debarking from the royal yacht, Britannia. That cost \$8,000.

Altogether, the city spent at least \$40,000 for the most thorough polishing job it's undergone. City officials were quick to point out that the same amount would have been spent eventually anyway.

War Threat Hangs Over OAS Meeting

By JOSEPH U. HINSHAW. United Press International WASHINGTON (UPI)—The threat of a shooting war in the Caribbean hung today over a meeting of the Organization of American States (OAS) in the Dominican Republic's invasion charges against Cuba and Venezuela.

The three countries have placed their armed forces on a war footing. Reports from Ciudad Trujillo, the Dominican capital, quoted high government officials as referring publicly to the possibility of "open belligerence."

The OAS was expected to summon a special meeting of the foreign ministers of the 21 American nations to discuss the tense Caribbean situation.

Dominican Ambassador Virgilio Diaz Ordonez told the organization last week that Cuba and Venezuela backed invasions of his country June 14 and June 20. He said 3,000 men were training in Cuba and 25 warplanes had been obtained by Venezuela in preparation for a new invasion.

Cuba and Venezuela, he said, denied the charges. They said that the Dominican Republic planned to bomb Santiago, Cuba, and Maracaibo, Venezuela.

Diaz Ordonez told the OAS that a threat to the peace existed which required that the inter-American foreign ministers be summoned under terms of the Rio Mutual Assistance Treaty. He said speedy action was needed to avoid "catastrophe" and "bloodletting."

It was doubtful that the Dominican Republic could get the 14 votes needed to invoke the treaty, he said. Instead, the OAS probably will call the ministers meeting on broader grounds, such as to discuss economic problems and means for strengthening representative democracy.

Ray Robinson Will Fight In Germany

NEW YORK (UPI)—Sugar Ray Robinson, spurred to action by a "big new offer from Germany," will begin training Tuesday for a September defense of his share of the middleweight crown, he announced today.

"They want me to defend over there against Gustav Scholz," he explained. "Scholz is German and he's the European champion."

Johansson had the speedster rolling at more than 100 m.p.h. as he approached a treacherous hairpin curve where even expert drivers slow down drastically.

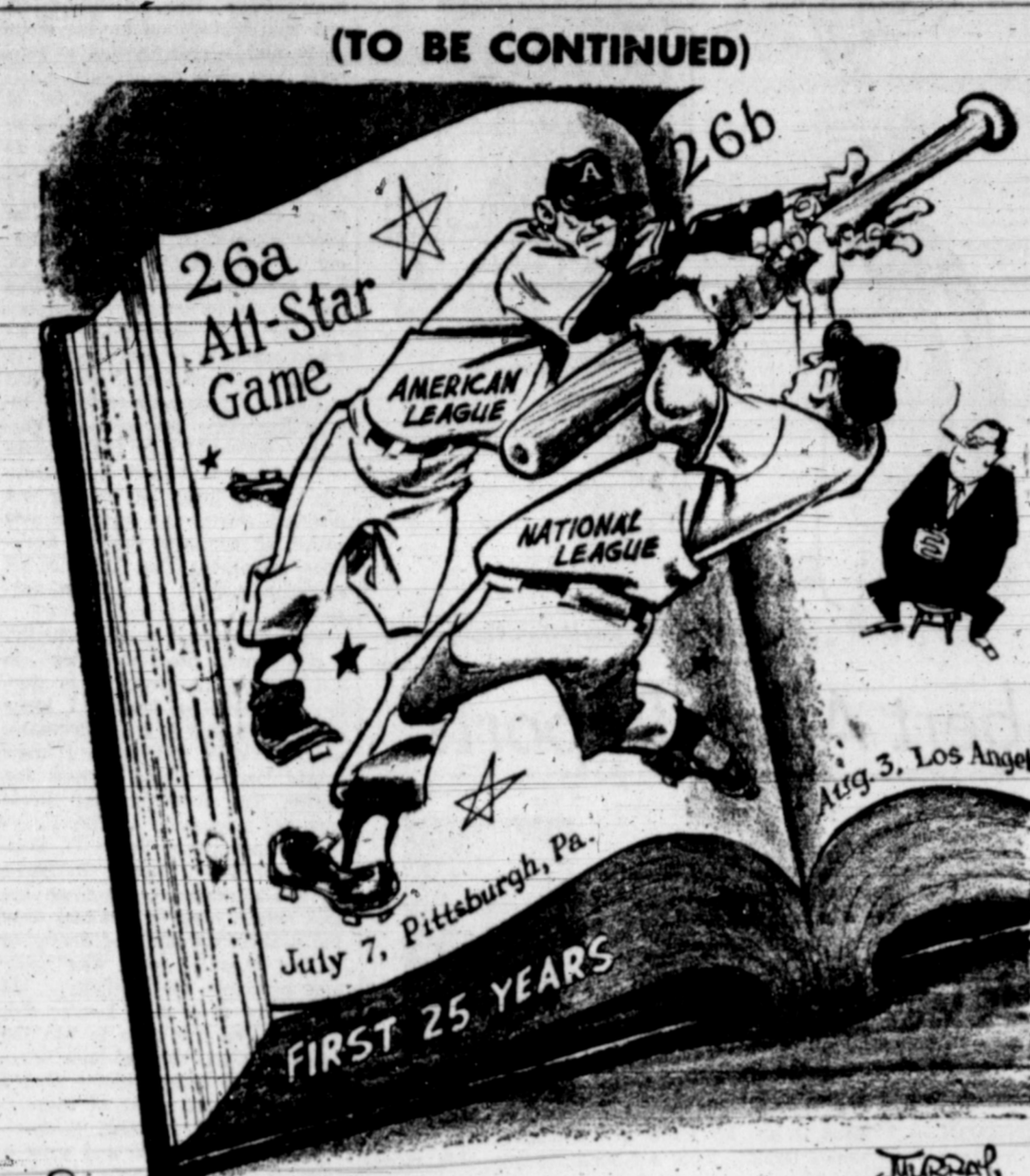
The crowd gasped. Ingemar slammed on the brakes and skidded dangerously, but safely around the curve.

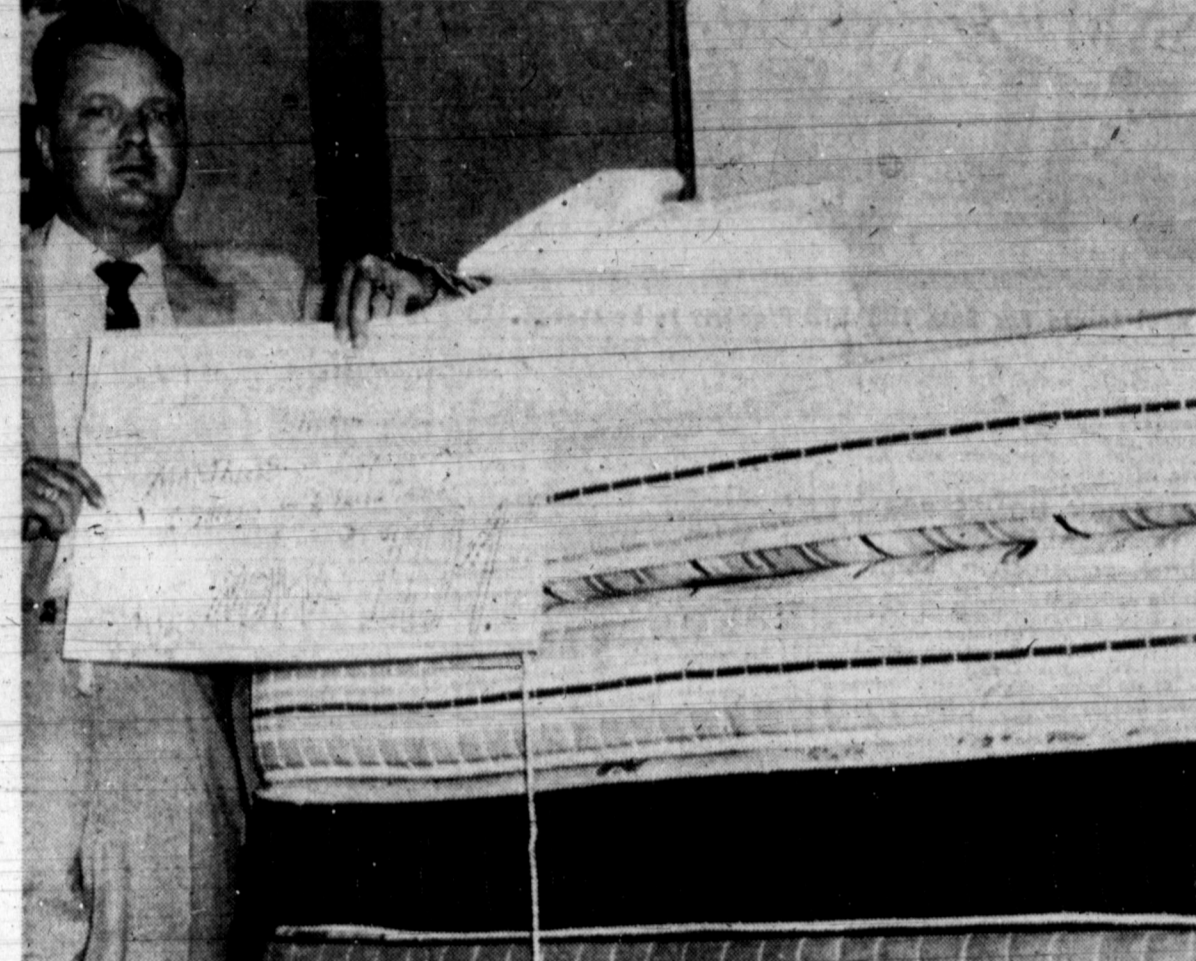
