Early diagnosis and the proper administration of a suitable drug are important. Erysipelas is contagious and therefore the patient must be kept from contact with others in order to avoid spreading the infection.

The fact that erysipelas has beer almost conquered in most parts of the world is the result of better measures of prevention. improved living conditions and diet, and of the discovery of powerful new treatments.

There will always be occasional cases of erysipelas, no doubt, and any mass deterioration of health or a disaster may increase its fre-


