



Living Costs Hit Another **Record High**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The nation's living costs edged upward last month to another record high, the government reported today. The Labor Department said its consumer price index rose 1-10 of 1 per cent to 125.6 per cent of average 1947-49 prices.

It was the sixth time in the last seven months that it climbed to an all-time peak. Higher costs for transportation, medical care, housing and personal care more than offset declining food prices in November. The increase means that 170,000 meat packing, aircraft, and other

It is a little hard to compre hend how the American people are promoting their best interest by having their President traveling throughout the world on the claim that he is trying to promote peace.

The best way to promote peace is to get people to understand the blessings that come from free enterprise - that is, from voluntaryism; from individuals and groups getting what they get by benefiting those from whom they

Certainly Eisenhower cannot very well persuade people to believe in free enterprise. That is true because one cannot explain what one doesn't understand, and Eisenhower certainly does not understand free enterprise, because he was trained, not educated, by the government. He believes in the use of aggressive force. He does not believe that the pen is mightier than the sword or he would never have been in the West Point Army clique.

He was indoctrinated to believe that the state had a right to do things that the individual has no right to do. In other words, he was indoctrinated to believe in a double standard.

The best way, of course, to sell free enterprise, the American way of life, and the ideologies of the Declaration of Independence is by example. And it will be remembered that the Declaration of Independence or the American way of life says governments derive their just power from the consent of the governed, and that doesn't mean from the consent of the majority. It means from the consent of the individual, because no one can give another's consent but the individual 1 1-

Interference And the more we interfere with

other nation's ways of life, the more trouble we get into. Now we're using aggressive force or the tax pistol to force widows and orphans to help support socialism throughout the world. We're-even wondering at this time whether we have a right to require birth control before we make donations that have been plundered from the American people.

If we want to promote the wellbeing of the rest of the world, the best possible way is by example and by persuasion. Let us pull the beams out of our own

eyes rather than try to pull the beams out of the eyes of the rest of the world. And if we would pull the beams out of our own eves and respect creative energy in our own country and eliminate tariff walls and immigration restriction, then we would be setting example to the rest of the world as to what causes peace and prosperity. As the great economist and moralist Frederick Bastiat pointed out, where goods do not cross borderlines because of protective tariffs, soldiers will,

And, of course, if we have immigration restrictions and other nations have immigration restrictions, those people who are crowded into a little territory with small resources and who are penalized for trading and are not permitted to go where there are more natural resources that are not being used and where they can trace their services to the world's highest bidder, can not he expected to supinely submit to this kind of unfair and unjust treatment. They are bound to cre-

ate ill will that leads to wars. If more people understood that any man who creates wealth benefits everybody in the world and that he is not like a man who gets wealth by gambling or by robbery, we would then see that letting a man come to this country and add to the wealth of the world would not injure anybody in this country, but would benefit everybody. That is true because there are plenty of wants and they are only satisfied by labor and the exchange of the products of labor. There would be plenty of jobs for everybody every time they wanted to work if we really understood and believed in the Ten Commandments as expressed in the Declaration of

Yes, it is hard to see how Eisenhower, who really doesn't understand free enterprise but is a politician and appoints men like Warren to the Supreme Court,

can really benefit mankind by traveling all over the world. Let him come back home and set an example of thrift and respect for creative energy of every individual in the world, and thus promote the well-being and the integrity of the American



The Doctor Says:

Your letters and postcards reflect a great interest in the rheumatic diseases. Here are some of the facts that more than justify your concern: Ten million Americans suffer

from some form of rheumatic disorder. Of this army of rheumatics, some 200,000 are totally disabled

incapacitated. In lost wages rheumatic diseases cost the American economy about seven hundred million

and another 800,000 are partially

dollars each year. Sufferers from rheumatic disorders contribute about a quarter-billion dollars annually to promotors of quack diets, devices and "treatments" of one

sort or another.

Now the rheumatic diseases would not be so crippling or so costly if they were as alike as tenpins and we had a specific cure that bowled them over in a single frame. Unfortunately for those who look for a quick and easy solution, there are many types of rheumatic disorder. These types are often as dif-

ferent as the different varieties of infections and while we do have specifics for some of these varieties, there is as vet no cureall in sight despite the boastful claims of charlatans.

But before we go into the matter of cures, let me first outline the types of rheumatic disease seen most frequently in routine medical practice. I shall start with those of childhood and go on to the kinds that come in

You will understand that some times the rheumatic disease of childhood strikes at an adult, Sometimes the rheumatic disease of the adult is met with in childhood. And sometimes different types of rheumatic disease are observed in the same person at the same or different times.

later life.

Beginning in childhood, the largest group of sufferers from rheumatic disorders is the army of a million youngsters with sneaky disease begins with a streptococcal infection, usually a sore throaf. Later, some of the joints become red and swollen but they soon become normal again after the acute episode

has passed.
Unfortunately, rheumatic in-flammation of the heart is not as fleeting. All too frequently, it leaves permanent scars on heart muscle and valves. They never do, and always have to abandon the coin purse and get out their wallets. Nothing slows down a transaction like a coin purse. 


