

popcorn Colored sugar (red or green), if desired.

Combine first five ingredients in saucepan. Stir. Cook over low heat until syrup reaches the "crack" Styrofoam post about 1 inch in stage (290 degrees F.). Pour syrup diameter about 12 to 14 inches in a fine stream over popcorn Mix with metal spoon. Shape into balls and sprinkle with colored sugars, if desired. Cool on waxed paper. 



#### **Better Jobs**

by R. C. HOILES Influence Of National Education Assn. For Bigger Government

I have before me a statement issued by the National Education Assn. on federal support for education.

It is rather difficult for anybody who believes in majority-rule education to defend his position against federal support for education. If it is right for 51 per cent of the people in a community to force 49 per cent of the people to submit to the kind of education that 51 per cent want and make the 49 per cent help pay for it, on the theory that this is necessary so that the children of the poor can get an education, then by all means we should have a larger unit where the richer states would help pay for the education of the children in the poorer states. When one has consented to majority-rule principle in such an important thing as education, he has indeed a very difficult time to oppose its expansion and growth.

On the growth of the power of the National Education Assn., Russell Kirk, writing in the National Review, referring to a large expensive teachers' association building in Indianapolis that overshadowed the capitol of the state, makes this statement:

Less Scrupulous Lobby "In Indiana, as in Washington and in nearly every state of the Union, the teachers' lobby is more powerful, better financed, and less scrupulous than any other lobby. Even the great labor unions play second fiddle to the educationists. (In Washington, the National Education Assn.-which shouts angrily about teachers' poverty - recently dedicated its new NEA Center, 'workshop, center and symbol,' costing \$8,250,-

The only rational explanation that could explain Kirk's statement that the National Education Assn. is "less scrupulous than any other lobby" is that they play on the voters' sympathy for children to get legislation to get control of what the producers get in their paychecks. The labor unions do not use the sympathy racket for children as does the National Education Association.

Back to the National Education Assn.'s statement endorsing the Murray-Metcalf bill for government subsidy for school buildings and teachers salaries, they point out that at the beginning of the new session of Congress the Murray-Metcalf bill will be a live issue. They write: "A number of so-called 'com-

promise' proposals for federal aid for schools have been advanced. These proposed 'compromises,' in opinion of the NEA, would not be compromises on detail but would be major sacrifices of fundamental principles." But they do not say what fundamental principles they would be compromising unless they admit that the individual is nothing, and has no inalienable rights that the majority needs respect. They seem to think that the majority is a principle. But majority changes with the wind. It is no more a principle than the divine right of kings was a principle. It is a way of exploiting the minority.

Then they make this ridiculous statement: "The Murray-Metcalf bill was designed as a permanent program to strengthen state and local control of education by providing the state and local school systems with both the funds and the freedom to use these funds to fit their needs."

In other-words, they are contending that Congress has a right to tax all the people and turn it over to certain groups and let them spend it as they see fit. That is so immoral and so unfair and so unjust that even the Supreme Court recognizes that he who pays the fiddler writes the tune; that the federal government cannot finance any project without controlling it. And that has been the history of all Federal support in any local or state func-



# The Doctor

by EDWIN P. JORDAN, M.D.

In the shooting season in our country, I can see from my study, the hunters and their dogs traipsing through the brush in search of game. But whether the hunters are my neighbors or city chaps with sport cars parked at the side of the road, whether they're armed with fowling pieces or high powered riflesand whether they're accompanied by hounds of uncertain ancestry or highly bred pointers, nothing happens until the quarry is flushed.

In the practice of preventive medicine, the technique of flushing is called "case finding." As in hunting, nothing can be done with therapeutic equipment or ammunition until the case finder can flush the patient who is threatened by, or afflicted with, the preventable disease.

In contrast to the deadly objective of hunting, the purpose of case finding is preservation of the quarry's health or life.

Since YOU may be the most important person in a case finding program and the health or life you save may be that of your own child, let me suggest how you may "point" or "flush" a youngster whose welfare is endangered by the complex illness Here are the important facts

Egyptian queen)." With her orn-Most often the first phase of the rheumatic attack is a sore throat. Least often, it is an attack of scarlet fever, erysipelas or St. Vitus dance (chorea). The attack of sore throat may be limited to a slight scratchiness or it may be severe with high fever and intense pain.

The mild attack is every bit as dangerous as the severe illness. You might be quite justified if you decided to treat your child with home remedies and spare the expense of a doctor's

Whether mild or severe, approximately 10 - to - 20 per cent of these attacks of sore throat are caused by a particular brand of streptococci.

Of attacks of streptococcal sore throat, perhaps 3-to-5 per cent lead to rheumatic involvement of the heart. This means that for every 300 attacks of sore throat, there will be one, two or three children whose hearts will suffer permanent damage. Put another way, of each 16

children or adults, you meet who have heart murmurs, leaky valves or bad circulations, perhaps 95 were victims of rheumatic fever. In another column, I'll tell you




