FURR'S

Host of Apalachin 'Barbecue' Dies Of Heart Ailment In NY

JOHNSON CITY, N.Y. (UPI) — Joseph Barbara, the "stick friend" gangster who has been indicted and jailed a number of times, died of a heart ailment Wednesday night without revealing the secret purpose of that underworld convention.

Barbara's illness had prevented his questioning by state and federal investigators who have indicted and jailed a number of the nation's biggest "name" criminals for allegedly lying or refusing to talk about his hilltop barbecue party.

Barbara, 53, had been in Wilson Memorial Hospital in critical condition since a second or third heart attack on May 29.

At his bedside were his wife, the former Josephine Vivona of Endicott, N.Y., his daughter, Angelina, and his two sons, Peter, a University of Buffalo student, and Joseph Jr., who had been associated with his father in a soft drink bottling and beer distributing business and had attended the Apalachin meeting.

Funeral Plans Incomplete
The sons said early today that their mother had been placed under sedation and that funeral plans would not be made until she is able to decide on them.

The Sicilian-born Barbara gave up both his business and his home after state police rounded up his guests, alleged by authorities to be the leading figures of a "who's who in the Mafia." The business went with the suspension of his state license as a result of the party. The home was sold last month for \$130,000 to a developer who announced plans to convert it into a tourist attraction.

Apalachin neighbors are protesting this plan as an offensive "shrine to crime."

Makes Wheelchair Appearance
Barbara's only public appearance since the meeting was in federal court at Syracuse, where he pleaded innocent, from a wheelchair, to an indictment charging evasion of \$14,000 in federal income taxes.

Court-appointed physicians had examined him repeatedly and shortly before his final heart attack had told the state investigations commission that he would be able to testify before it for short periods. He was under summons to do so.

Twenty-seven of Barbara's guests, including Vito Genovese,

since convicted of narcotics conspiracy, and Joseph Profaci, alleged elder patron of the underworld Mafia, were indicted by a federal grand jury in New York City May 21, on charges of conspiring to obstruct justice by refusing to tell the purpose of the Apalachin meeting.

Barbara and his elder son were named as co-conspirators but not as defendants. Joseph Jr. is under indictment for perjury for his testimony before state investigators about the meeting.

Board Okays Barrett Plans

The Top O' Texas Foundation has approved preliminary plans for the Barrett Memorial Convalescent Home, submitted by the Pampa firm of Moore and Hollar.

The architect's drawing shows a four-winged building with a lounge, office, kitchen and other facilities. Plans for the 60 bed convalescent home will be taken to Austin in an application for Hill - Burton Funds, according to Foundation President Arthur Teed.

The building will cost \$300,000. Half of this amount will be paid out of Hill-Burton funds if the application is approved. The Top O' Texas Foundation thus far has carried out a quiet fund raising campaign as a start on this \$250,000.

At the last meeting, members discussed the formation of a 15 member advisory committee. A memorial contribution was received for Mr. C. H. Gull.

MAN SUFFERS HEART ATTACK

P. D. Gross, 48, 1078 Varnon Dr., was reported in satisfactory condition today at Highland General Hospital after suffering a heart attack Wednesday afternoon at the Pampa Concrete Co., 629 S. Russell.

A Pampa Fire Department rescuator was called to the scene at 1:40 p.m. and a few minutes later Gross was taken by ambulance to Highland Hospital.

passed earlier by the House. It substituted the Senate's version of the bill.

Addressing the joint opening session, Daniel presented again most of his spending and tax ideas that he gave the first special session.

He called again for passage of his abandoned property act that was killed in both previous sessions. He also defended his severance gas tax by saying, "The people and their family budgets should not be taxed any heavier than corporations and natural resources."

\$200,000 a Day
He reminded the lawmakers that every day of each session is costing the state \$200,000 in additional taxes.

After the joint meeting, House members pushed through the general spending bill by a 53-39 vote; introduced 14 tax bills, including general sales tax measures and a state income tax and then adjourned for a long Father's Day weekend until 11 a.m. Monday.

The Senate elected Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress to the post of President Pro-tem during the special session before quitting work until 10:30 a.m. today.

Gov. Daniel didn't let the chance go by in his speech to lobbyists.

"I understand some of the gas lobby has decided to make this session an all-out fight against the governor," he said. "I am not the first governor who has been cursed and criticized... and I hope I will not be the last."

Gov. Daniel was received by the lawmakers with three standing ovations during his talk. It was the best reception he has received since the opening of the regular session in January.

Basden Files Suit For Compensation

L. M. Basden, a resident of Gray county, filed a \$14,035 compensation suit Wednesday in district court, naming the Hartford Accident and Indemnity Co. as defendant.

Basden, employed by the Schaffer Drilling Co., alleged he suffered total incapacitation in an accident Nov. 21, 1948 in Elk county, Oklahoma. He alleged he suffered chest, jaw and hip injuries when struck in the chest by tons during the drilling of a well.

Basden's petition Wednesday asked for \$35 a week for 401 consecutive weeks.

TWO TAIL GUNS, SOLE DEFENSE

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy said today a pair of tail machine guns is the only defensive armament normally carried on its Far Eastern patrol planes like the P-4M Corsair shot up by Red jets Tuesday.

The service said in a statement that such light armament was "normal" for the 10 to 15 four-engine Corsairs flying reconnaissance missions in the Far East.

The statement followed a furor touched off when crew members of the crippled plane said in Japan they could not return the Communist fire because their guns lacked certain "hard-to-get" parts.

But the Navy said Wednesday the top and front guns were dismantled to make room for reconnaissance equipment. The 20 mm tail guns were knocked out by tracer bullets from the two Red MIGs.

Flights Called "Suicide"
One congressman said it "was almost suicide to send such planes on patrol missions close to Communist territory without better protection. Parents of two of the flyers, including the wounded tail gunner, complained that the crewmen were "sitting ducks."

Meanwhile, suspicion centered on the North Koreans as the attackers. The plane was 45 miles from North Korea over the Sea of Japan when jumped. The Air

Force said all Russian MIGs sent to the area were part of North Korea's forces. A Navy source said he did not think the jets were flown by Chinese Communists, who also have received Soviet MIGs.

In its statement today, issued in response to queries by United Press International, the Navy explained that the Corsair originally was built for anti-submarine and mine warfare.

"As an offensive aircraft it originally had three turrets: A tail turret to defend against attacks from the rear and an upper turret and a bow turret for offensive attacks on surface targets such as submarines and shore batteries adjacent to the area being mined," the statement said.

Daniels Files Damage Suit

A \$896 damage suit was filed Wednesday by Steve Daniels, Pampa, against Henry Brewer, 623 W. Foster, as a result of a mishap June 7, 1958.

Daniels alleged that Brewer was negligent after an accident in which Brewer's driverless car ran into the side of Daniels' Russell Street Apartment building, 323 S. Russell. Damages to the apartment house were set at \$896.

The accident occurred while Brewer was working on his car's motor. The car suddenly began moving, the petition said, and rammed into Daniels' apartment house.

along Miami's northeast bayfront. All along the 12-mile long path of the storm trees up to three feet in diameter were uprooted, automobiles tumbled and smashed like tin cans, glass store fronts blown in, signs toppled into the streets and buildings roofless.

An hour after the storm passed, police were given orders to shoot looters on sight. Power and telephone service to the tornado areas were disrupted.

The funnel cloud loomed out of a spectacular lightning and rain storm that dumped up to three inches of water on many sections of the city in one hour's time. Winds hit 50 miles per hour outside the tornado area, the Weather Bureau said.

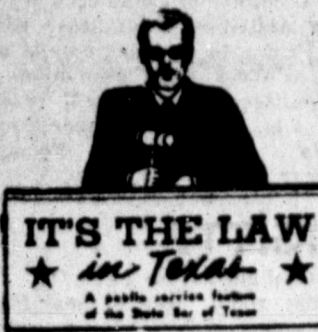

Evidence
A trial aims to settle a dispute when the parties fail to do it themselves. For this the court needs facts.

Simple: Well, no. For if the parties could agree on the facts, a settlement out of court would be easy. But as a rule each side has its own story, and the trial judge or jury must hear witnesses and view physical evidence to decide what took place. In doing this the court applies the rules of evidence.

It took centuries for the court to work out rules by which a judge can say what is proper or improper evidence.

1. In "Hearsay," for example, someone who did not see the event reports what someone told him about it. Courts seldom allow such evidence, except in rare cases such as where the dying words, say, of a murdered person may be vital.

For one thing, courts frown upon hearsay because no one in court can cross-examine the eye-witness to find out what actually took place, or to judge whether his story merits belief.

News In Brief

INVITED TO MOVIE SET
VIENNA (UPI)—Italian screen star Sophia Loren has invited Soviet Defense Minister Marshal Rodion Malinovsky to sit in on the filming of her latest movie "Olympia." Malinovsky currently is on a state visit to Austria, where the Paramount production is being shot on location.

Russians Like Movies
MOSCOW (UPI)—Russians are the biggest movie-goers in the world, according to the official Soviet News Agency Tass. City dwellers in Russia visit the picture an average of 23 times a year while their country cousins go 11 times annually, Tass reported.

ANIMALS KILLED IN TESTS
LONDON (UPI)—More than 2,000 animals were killed in experiments at Britain's chemical warfare establishments in the past six months, the government reported Monday. Minister of Supply Aubrey Jones told the House of Commons the experiments were designed to devise means of defense against the possible use of chemical weapons in war.

TRY A CLASSIFIED ADP

Suppose in a battery case the jury has to find out whether Jones knocked Smith down or not. The judge would have to rule out any evidence that Jones, say, was rich and Smith poor. Such a fact, even if true, has nothing to do with the "issue." Moreover, such irrelevant facts often confuse jurors or arouse their prejudices.

3. Only an expert like a doctor, an appraiser, a chemist, a pharmacist, or an engineer can give opinions as evidence, and he must show his qualifications as an expert before the judge will let him express his views.

Lawyers keep inadmissible evidence out of court by making "objections." When the judge "sustains" an objection, the jury may not hear the evidence. Or if the jury to ignore it. 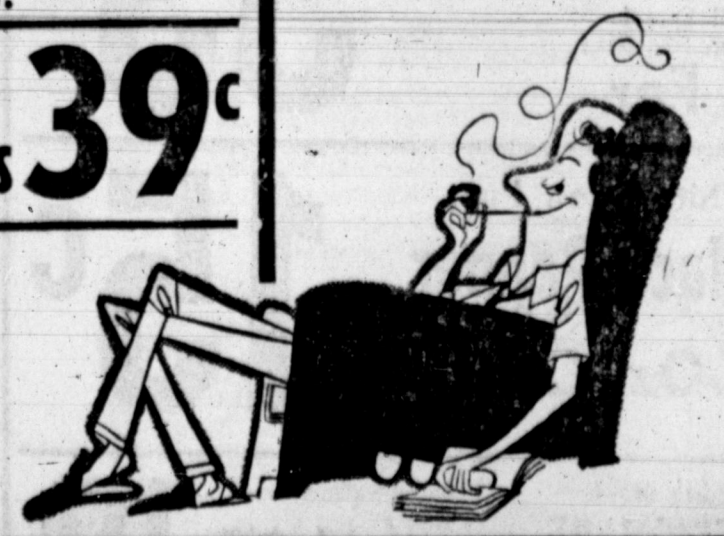

Two He-Man Dishes Guaranteed To Put Sparkle In Man-Of-House Eyes

Next to Women, men tend to prefer beer. The ideal combination is the woman who knows how to cook hearty meals served with beer.

Beer is traditionally a man's dinner drink. Dry and sparkling, it cries out for the kind of husky food that puts a hungry gleam in a strong man's eye. Beer and sauerkraut, beer and sausage, beer and beef — the list is practically endless.

It's a wise wife that knows the appetizing qualities of a glass of beer on the dinner table. She buys it in cans — so easy to store in the refrigerator — and serves it in tall glasses or mugs.

Beer has many advantages as a beverage with meals. It stimulates the appetite. It has a mildly relaxing effect on the body as a whole, so that the tensions of a hard day at the office tend to disappear. Barbara Hall, food technologist and beer-tasting expert for Continental Can Company, points out that the dry flavor of beer brings out the taste of many foods. HUNGARIAN GOULASH

1 1/2 pounds beef chuck or round, cut in 1-inch pieces
 1 tablespoon flour
 3 tablespoons butter
 2 cups thinly sliced onions
 2 teaspoons salt
 4 teaspoons paprika
 2 cups water
 1/2 cup canned beer
 Rool beef in flour. Melt butter; add beef and brown. Add onions, salt, paprika and water; simmer 1 hour. Add beer, simmer 1 hour longer or until fork-tender. Serve over hot caraway noodles. YIELD: 4 servings.

 1 cup julienne cut or diced cooked ham
 1 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
 1/2 cup sour cream
 1 teaspoon dry mustard
 1 teaspoon salt, or as desired
 Combine frozen French fries and well-chilled eggs, vegetables and ham. Blend together mayonnaise or salad dressing, sour cream, and seasonings. Ham With Beer Glaze
 1 smoked or ready-to-eat half ham (6 to 8 pounds)
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 2 tablespoons prepared mustard
 Whole cloves
 1/2 cup beer or ale
 Place ham, fat side up, in shallow baking pan. Bake in a slow oven (325° F.). If smoked, bake 25 minutes per pound, or until meat thermometer registers 160° F. Brazil Tries To Stay Out Of Poor House

WASHINGTON (UPI)—There is an old law to the effect that a fool and his money are soon parted, and it will be a long time before that one is repealed. How-

ever, Congress is being asked to amend it a little. Edward N. Gadsby, chairman of the Securities & Exchange Commission, didn't exactly use the word "fool" in his testimony for a Senate banking subcommittee. He spoke of the "unsophisticated investor" and the fellow "lured by spurious get-rich-quick schemes."

Gadsby said he and his helpers have discovered some loopholes in the laws Congress passed in 1933 and 1934 to protect investors from a repetition of some of the things that happened to them in 1929.

Things like maybe another big break in the market? Sen. Harrison A. Williams Jr. (D-N.J.) wondered hopefully, running over the list of proposed amendments to the existing securities laws.

No Repeal Seen
Unfortunately not, Gadsby said. Market prices, which recently have hit record highs, come under the law of supply and demand, it appears, and that's one law that can't be repealed.

"I think it's fair to say that the ingenuity of a large number of talented persons has been employed since 1929 to design proper statutes regarding the sale of securities," Gadsby told Williams. "We have been unable to picture any statute to do what you imply—prevent a fall in the market price."

What he does want Congress to do, Gadsby said, is amend the securities laws to make it a little bit harder for us to be suckers. "The need for added investor protections and the strengthening of our enforcement hand," he said, "is particularly imperative today in view of the current extremely active securities market."

What he meant here, I deduced, is that with all the money being made in the market these days, just about everybody is getting in, and that inevitably a certain number of crooks are standing ready to fleece anybody they can. Action Is Hampered
Already there have been some complaints, and Gadsby said his helpers can't always take the steps that are needed.

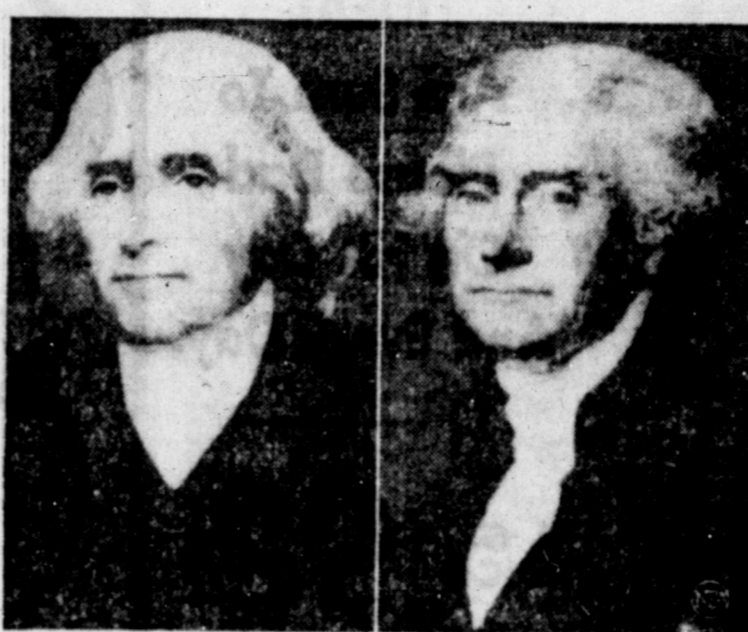
For example, one registered investment adviser said cross his heart he hadn't done anything wrong. But when the SEC men asked for his books so they could see for themselves, he didn't have any. Eventually, his clients lost \$600,000.

Under one of the many amendments sought by SEC, people like that would have to keep books, and also let SEC see them. Neither Williams nor Sen. Prescott Bush (R-Conn.), the other Senate present, asked Gadsby for advice on the market. I guess they knew he wouldn't supply it.

However, there's one additional old law I wish they had asked him about. This one says what ever goes up must come down. If that's been repealed, I'd sure like to know it.

Foes Of Communism Organize Indian Non-violence Drive

In Trivandrum, capital of Kerala state in southernmost India, a few days ago a woman in a cotton sari lay face down in the dust across the roadway leading to a tax collector's office.

Around her, a group of men carrying Congress and Socialist Party flags shouted slogans demanding that the Communist Party get out.

Since it would have been a violation of Indian custom for police to have touched a woman, she stayed there for two hours until policewomen arrived to lead her peacefully away.

It was not an isolated incident. Throughout Kerala opponents of the Communist regime were organized in a Ghandi-like campaign of non-violence to drive the Communists from office. But inevitably there was violence and for the central government headed by Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru it posed an aching problem which had no place in Nehru's avowed policy of peaceful co-existence with the Reds.

State Created in 1956
Kerala came into existence as a state in the fall of 1956, emerging from its previous status as merely a linguistic area within the borders of Travancore-Cochin State and Madras. Its 92,000-square-mile area makes it a little larger than the state of Kansas but its huge population gives it a density of 800 persons to the square mile.

For 20 years the area has been a stronghold of communism which gained strength through years of crop disaster and unending hunger.

In March, 1957, Kerala became the first Communist state within the British Commonwealth.

In free elections the Communists won amply by telling the people that food and clothing could be had by toppling Nehru's Congress Party "reactionaries and stooges of America and Britain" from power.

The Kerala Communists operated within the limits of their paradoxical situation.

Operated Within Law
They held the office, but the central government under Nehru controlled the money and the armed forces. Therefore, they operated within the law.

Within the law, a systematic campaign was undertaken against employers, including a denial of police protection in times of Communist-generated strikes and violence. Violence against anti-Communists became a way of

life. The Communists also took over public education and that, along with control of internal security (the police force) gave them the two traditional weapons the Reds always have used to subvert a people.

The present strife arises from a legally recognized Communist attempt to take over selection of teachers for private schools, most of which are religious in character.

Although the call for resistance said it should be non-violent, the death list is mounting.

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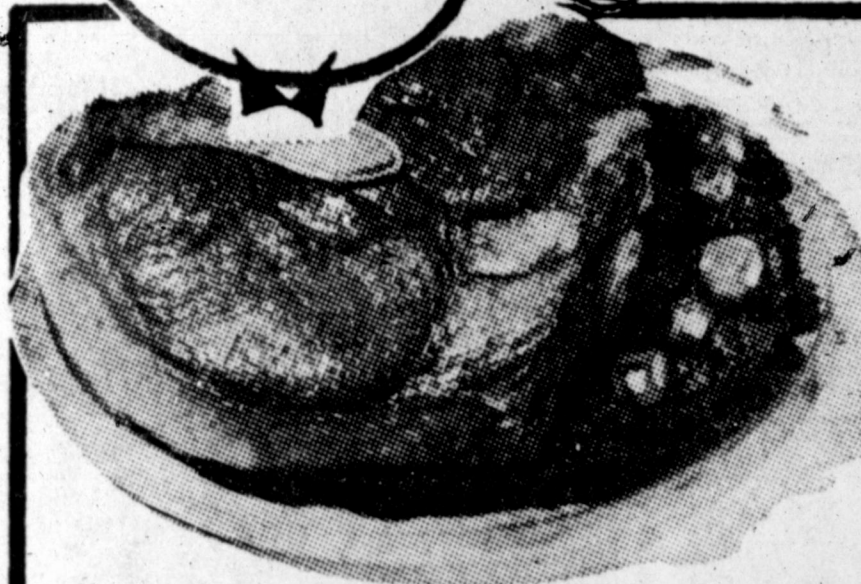

Value Of US Bonds Tied to Dollar Value

WASHINGTON (UPI)—What hit that once-prized item, the U.S. government bond?

The first hit was by a charge of buckshot from the U.S. Supreme Court in 1935. The court held that the Treasury need not redeem government bonds in gold.

The opinion tied the real value and real interest on U.S. bonds to the real value of the dollar. Since then the dollar has shrunk in real value until it is worth today less than 50 cents, compared to its purchasing power value of 20 years ago. The U.S. dollar has been suffering from a misery called inflation which in those 20 years has eaten up half of the dollar's previous value.

Three Presidents

The Supreme Court decision on gold redemption in itself would not have been so much except for what was beginning to happen just then and what has continued to take place thereafter. Collaborators in these events so harmful to the U.S. dollar were three men, each of whom was a president of the United States. They were:

Franklin D. Roosevelt, Harry S. Truman and Dwight D. Eisen-

hower. Each of these, in turn, presided over the Executive Department of the United States when that department and the U.S. Congress were on an inflationary spending spree.

FDR and HST were Democratic presidents and they were, by and large, spenders. Each had a hot war to keep the spending tempo high. DDE is a Republican and, like his immediate predecessors, Eisenhower has a war going although his is cold. A basic difference between FDR and HST is whereas the other two generally took the spending line.

Eisenhower Highest

FDR and HST were high tax presidents, DDE was committed to tax reduction and managed to put one through. In view of these basic differences on taxation and spending, it is remarkable that in his six years of White House service, Eisenhower has collected more in taxes and spent more government money than HST was able to collect and spend in eight years or FDR to collect and spend in 12.

They all have, in common, Treasury deficits, each having spent more than the Treasury collected. Their combined expenditures aggregate more than one trillion dollars—\$1,190,920,000,000. The dictionary defines a trillion

New car sales by dealers in the first third of June averaged 20,220 a day—highest rate for the initial period of any month since April, 1956. These deliveries were nearly 3 per cent ahead of the first third of May and 46 per cent above the like 1958 period.

Richard J. Sargent, Westinghouse Electric vice president, said appliance industry sales to dealers of refrigerators, electric ranges and home laundry equipment in the first five months ran 19.5 per cent ahead of a year ago. He predicted 1959 would be a record year for major appliance manufacturers with total sales topping the previous high of \$8 billion in 1956.

Stockholder population of the U.S. growing at a rate of better than 1 million a year for the past three years, reached 12,490,000 in early 1959, the New York Stock Exchange reported. The exchange's third census of shareholders showed a growth of 45 per cent since the 1957 census in 1956 and nearly 100 per cent since the first count in 1952.

More than 80 per cent of the nation's life insurance companies are opposed to variable annuity policies, a poll made public by Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. showed. A variable annuity is one that has a fluctuating yield that depends on the market prices of selected common stocks.

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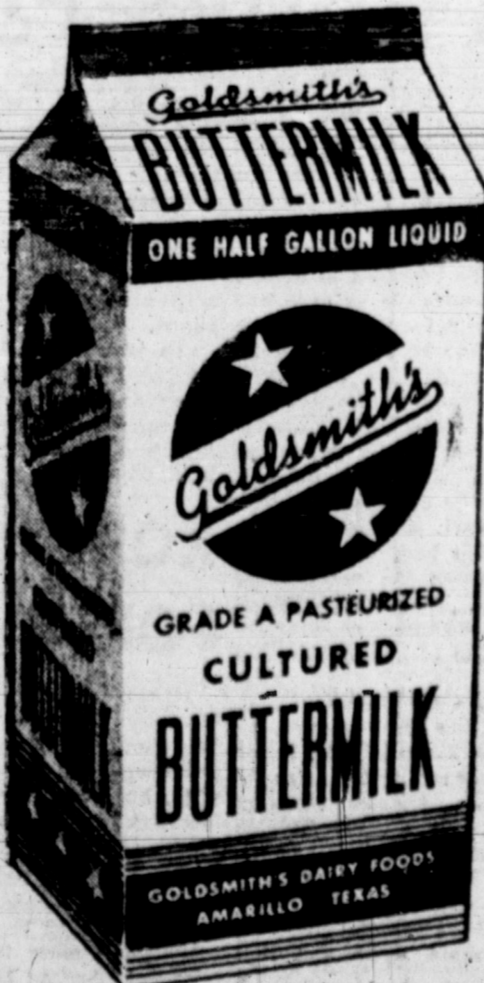
