Steel Strike **Efforts Hurt** By Charges

NEW YORK (UPI) - Efforts to bring agreement in the fourweek-old steel strike were snarled again today with a new sharply critical exchange between union and industry leaders.

United Steelworkers of America (USW) President David J. Mc-Donald, who was absent from federal mediation talks here Monday said in Pittsburgh he was "sick of that show in New York" and indicated he would not return until industry negotiators are replaced by "people of authority."

R. Conrad Cooper head of the four-man committee representing 12 major steel firms, with which the union began negotiating three months ago today, retorted quickly that McDonald knows the team has "full authority" to bargain.

Last Civil War Soldier Dying at Houston Home

'I Want to Go Home,' Says Walter Williams, 116

HOUSTON (UPI) - "I want to go home," old rebel Walter Williams, 116, the last survivor of the Civil War, said early today as he lay near death at the Houston home of his daughter. Mrs. Willie Mae Bowles said Williams talked quietly

with her during the night. "He didn't say much, Just: 'I'm cold,' and 'I want to

go home'," Mrs. Bowles said. Did "home" mean his farm at Franklin, Tex., or his memories the Confederate days in Mississippi, Mrs. Bowles

"I don't know, his voice was awfully weak, he just wants to go home," she said.

Mrs. Bowles said it was difficult to tell when Williams was conscious.

"He can't hear any more," she said.

Williams' physican confirmed Monday that the end for the old soldier was "only a matter of days."

"He's taking less food every day," Mrs. Bowles said. "He's getting weaker." Dr. Russell Wolfe said Monday that the aged Confederate veteran was "sinking" and has to be fed through an eyedropper. Committee Starts

"He's getting weaker every day. There's nothing we can do about it." Wolfe said Williams has been able to take only a mixture of milk, eggs and water for several days.





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

Age, Weight Could Stop Moore

By OSCAR FRALEY United Press International

NEW YORK (UPI) - Time, tide and the tortures of making weight Wednesday night well could spell the end of ancient Archie Moore's seven-year reign as light heavyweight champion of the world.

The muscular marvel from San Diego won fighter of the year and fight of the decade honors last year when he came off the deck four times to stop Yvon Durelle. It was one of the ring's greatest displays of gameness.

But it just may go the other way at Montreal Wednesday night

despite the 3 to 1 odds favoring old Arca in this rematch.

It isn't so much, according to veteran fight men, that Archie is 43 going on 49 or that Durelle, the fistic fisherman from Canada, is riding a rising tide. They see Moore's eclipse in the fact that once again he has been forced to pare his 209 pounds plus down to the 175-pound limit.





The Most Dangerous Clause In The U. S. Constitution

The editor of a magazine called "First Principles in Morality and Economics" has a very interesting and enlightening article under the heading "The Worst - Most Dan-Year gerous - Clause in Any of the United States".

To save the reader the time of looking it up, it is Paragraphs 5 and 6 of Section 8 of Article I of the Constitution giving the following general powers to the Congress of the United States:

5. Money, weights and measures. To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures. *:6. Counterfeiting. To provide

for the Punishment of counterfeit-Coin of the United States. 'The editor of "First Principles",

"No state shall . . . coin money, vestment of funds is growing, with emit Bills of Credit, make any thing but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts." Then the author remarks that

this clause restricting the states was undoubtedly a wise limitation. Then he inquires in this man-

The question is: were the states prohibited from doing those things for the narrow technical reason that they should not 'complexify' monetary and credit matters; or were they prohibited from doing those things because one or all of them are wrong in prinriple; that is, should they not have those powers because no government of any kind, high or low, big or small, should have all those powers?"

In other cases some special operation or treatment is indicated. The application of heat around the ear area may be helpful.
