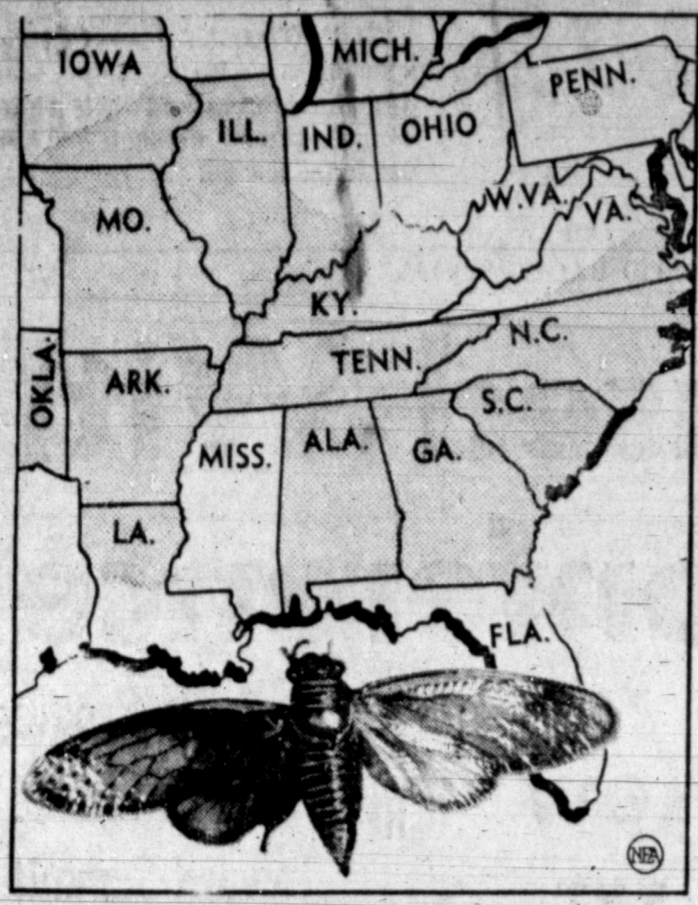
## \$1,000 Bond Set

## Farley Facing Political Struggle Due To Religion

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Perhaps James A. Farley can illuminate that troublesome question of religion in politics which has become timely again because Sen. John F. Farley, is a Catholic.

For those who came in very late: Jim Farley was campaign manager of Franklin D. Roosevelt's 1932 and 1936 electoral triumphs. Farley balked at a third term. When FDR was nominated in 1940 for the third time, Farley refused to manage his campaign again.

Farley in 1940 was himself a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination in token opposition to term No. 3. He would have settled happily for second place on a ticket headed either by John N. Garner of Tennessee or the late Cordell Hull of Tennessee.

In his book, "Jim Farley's Story, the Roosevelt Years," Farley develops the devious story of FDR's third term nomination. It was a political none such properly counted as the best planned and organized spontaneous draft in the history of U.S. politics. The third termers feared the Farley's candidacy might wreck the plan. Perhaps even FDR feared that.

Meeting with Cardinal Mundelein relates that he was summoned by Cardinal Mundelein of Chicago, and met with him on July 12, 1939, in New York. The Cardinal had a major purpose, to persuade Farley to support FDR's third nomination and election. Farley wrote this: "James," the Cardinal studied me earnestly, you have always been most frank with me, so that I feel entirely free in broaching a most confidential matter to you. It is my sincere feeling that a Roman Catholic could not be elected President of the United States at this time or for many years to come. I hope, therefore, that you will do nothing to involve the Catholics of the country in another debacle such as we experienced in 1928 (when Alfred E. Smith of New York got the Democratic nomination)."

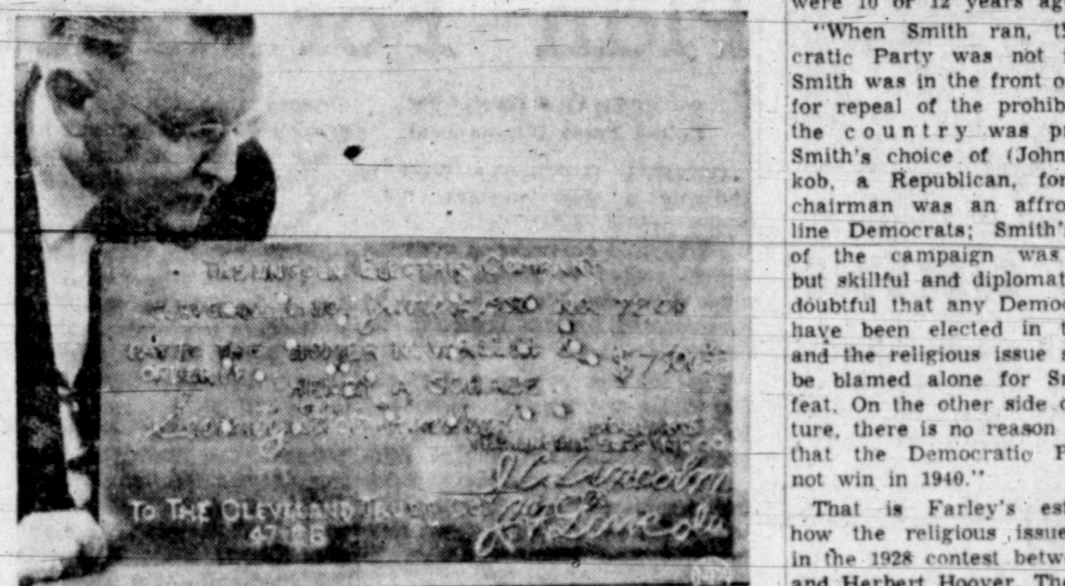
Farley's response was that he did not feel free to discuss FDR's third term possibilities because "I do not think you are the proper person" with whom to discuss them. Cardinal Mundelein expressed absolute confidence that FDR would seek a third term. Farley thought not, although he could not be sure.

"James," Mundelein insisted, "I do not believe a Catholic could win."

Farley's Reasons  
Farley replied: "A great many persons, among them the vice president (Garner), senators, representatives, and party leaders feel differently. Men who know something about politics. Conditions are not the same as they were 10 or 12 years ago."

"When Smith ran the Democratic Party was not in power; Smith was in the front of the fight for repeal of the prohibition law; the country was prosperous; Smith's choice of (John J. Raskob, a Republican, for national chairman was an affront to old line Democrats; Smith's conduct of the campaign was anything but skillful and diplomatic; it was doubtful that any Democrat could have been elected in that year; and the religious issue should not be blamed alone for Smith's defeat. On the other side of the picture, there is no reason to believe that the Democratic Party will not win in 1940."

That is Farley's estimate of how the religious issue weighed in the 1928 contest between Smith and Herbert Hoover. There should be some comfort for Kennedy in that estimate. It seems to cut the issue of religion in politics down to size.

South ruffed with his last trump and made his final mistake. He played the ace of clubs and now East made both his king and jack.

**College Grads Eligible For Flying Training**

Married men who have a degree from an accredited college or university and who are between the ages of 20½ and 26½ may now take flying training. Sgt. Wilson, Air Force recruiter for Amarillo, said today.

Trailer Wrecked North of Lubbock on U.S. 84, three cars were washed off the highway and a semi-trailer overturned by high waters near Shallowater. An 18-mile section of U.S. 84 between Lubbock and Littlefield was closed for a while because of high water.

Police at Slaton said water ran curb-to-curb there after the storm hit at 1:45 a.m. A family identified only as the "Boykins" were asleep in their trailer home when they awoke to find it being blown over by the wind. The family had stopped in Slaton for the night en route to Montana.

The cool front which had touched off the daily thunderstorms over the week end kept readings as low as 51 degrees at Dalhart, 54 at Amarillo and 57 at Lubbock this morning with other readings behind the front generally in the 60s. South of the front, however, readings were as high as 82 at Corpus Christi.

High straight winds gusting up to 80 miles per hour and battering hail ranging from the size of marbles to golf balls pelted the Snyder area during torrential rains that dumped an estimated inch and a half into the area inside of 10 minutes.

High winds also struck at Slaton, 65 miles to the northwest of Snyder, unroofing several homes. Heavy downpours also temporarily closed some roads in the Slaton area as well as an 18-mile section of U.S. 84 between Littlefield and Lubbock.

Ambulances Abandoned Darkness hampered rescue operations by the Department of Public Safety, Snyder police and firemen and civil defense officials. Ambulances were slowed down

and in several instances had to be abandoned by rising water. C. E. Patton, radio dispatcher at the Snyder Police Department, said the crushing winds appeared to be straight.

But he said they unroofed homes, toppled trailers, ripped down antennas and smashed windows throughout the area.

He said one man was seriously injured when his trailer home toppled on him. And it took an ambulance ordered by Patton for an injured person more than an hour to get to the victim.

Fire Chief Abandons Car Snyder fire chief B. A. Porter said he had to abandon his car in the southeast section of the city. He said water was over the hood.

The worst hit by high water appeared to be the southeast and northeast areas of Snyder. Many of the residences being evacuated were Negro homes.

"We don't know that all of the homes are in danger of being flooded out, but we aren't taking any chances," Patton said.

The dispatcher said it might be well into the afternoon before complete damage and injury lists could be compiled.

He said storm drains couldn't handle the deluge and water was "backing up all over town."

Several small creeks in the area quickly spilled over their banks.

No injuries at Slaton. The DPS office at Lubbock said Slaton was also hit hard. It tore several roofs off houses, and knocked down power lines and small trees, but no injuries were reported.

High water swamped several roads in the Slaton area, and U.S. 84 between Anton and Littlefield was closed.

The institute will place emphasis on methods of identifying and assisting gifted high school students. The Tech institute — one of 50 being held throughout the nation — is sponsored under a \$30,000 National Defense, Education Act grant.

Dr. Beatrix Cobb, institute director from Tech, said, "The chief purpose of this year's institute is to upgrade the skills of counselors already certified by the state. Next year's program will be designed for school counselors yet to be certified."

Each institute participant will earn six hours of graduate credit in psychology and education, with the West Texas School Study Council underwriting credit expenses.

The men said they put their 14-foot motorboat in McKeller Lake intending to reach the river channel and go up river to land at the Memphis waterfront. Their wives drove to the landing place.

Urdak and Green said that as they reached the main channel the boat's motor began missing and they turned into an inlet and beached their craft.

They said they hailed passing boats but no one heard them. Urdak was fully clothed. The rest wore only bathing suits, but life preservers helped them keep warm.

The men's wives waited three hours at the landing, then called police, who alerted the Coast Guard and city marine rescue squadron.

A search boat found the men and children after a two-hour hunt.

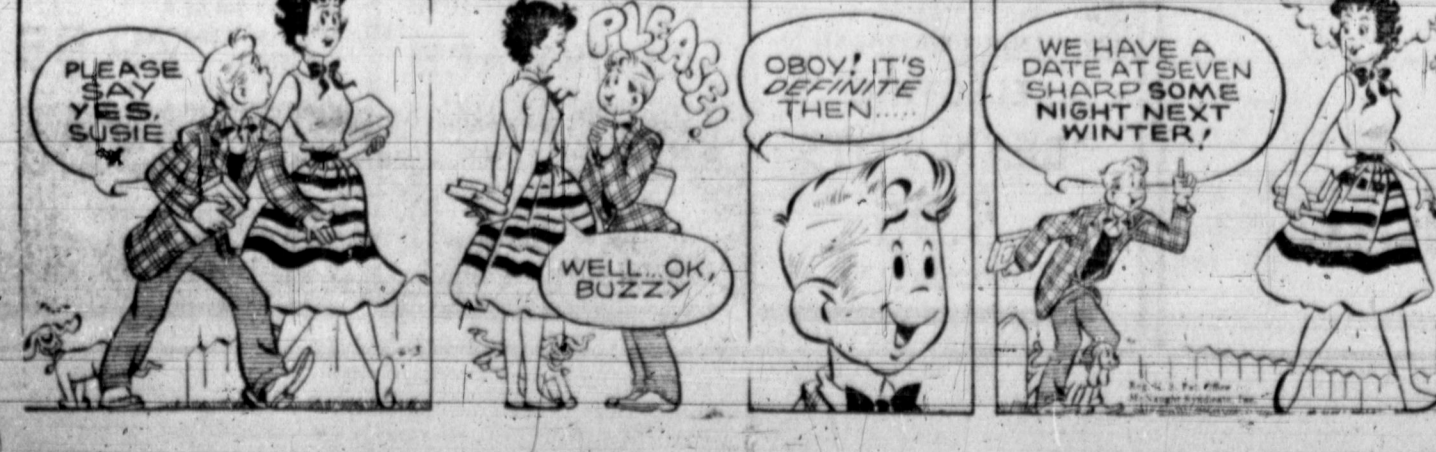

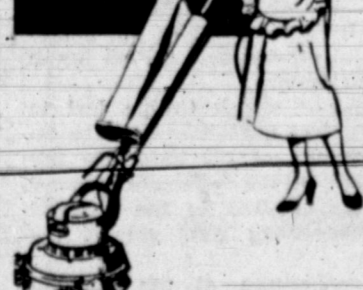

# Red Griggs the pipeline

The four-minute mile, once considered an impossibility, is now common. And it may not be long before the 9 second—or 9.1 or 9.2—hundred dash is in the same class.

Until a few years ago, the record was 9.4, and not even such great sprinters as Jesse Owens had been able to break it. But in the last decade no less than eight sprinters have run the hundred in 9.3.

The first five to tie the new world record were Mel Patton, Jim Golliday, Dave Sime, Bobby Morrow, and Leamon King. This season, they were joined by three others—Bill Woodhouse, Roscoe Cook, and Jack Mostyan.

Only one of the three, Woodhouse, is a "name" sprinter. Cook is a 20-year-old University of Oregon sophomore who was unknown until he equalled the world mark last weekend by beating Morrow and Ray Norton in the California Relays.

Mostyan is a Maryland high school boy. His performance, in a meet three weeks ago, was so incredible that officials measured the track to see if it was really a hundred yards.

### RECORDS BY THE DOZENS

When a high school boy and an unknown sprinter can tie a record, it's a pretty safe bet that the record won't last long. It may not be too many years until the 9.3 hundred, like the four minute mile, is not a record to shoot at, but a minimum standard of excellence.

Of course, there is a limit to how fast a human being can run, but that limit may be a lot lower than has been thought.

It's not only in the 100-yard dash, though, that recent track records have been set. In the same meet in which Cook equaled the record, the Texas sprint relay team set a new mark for the 440-yard relay.

Wally Wilson, Eddie Southern, Hollis Gainey, and Ralph Allspaugh blazed down the quarter-mile track in the unbelievable time of 39.6.

Also in that meet, Cook cleared 15 feet in the pole vault, among them Don Bragg of North Carolina and Jim Graham of Oklahoma State. The 15-foot pole vault was once in almost the same category—at least for college boys—as the four minute mile.

Mostyan isn't the only high school boy who has done some world record setting this spring, either. Dallas Long, a 17-year-old Arizona high school boy, has been putting the shot more than 60 feet. The 60-foot shot is another of the "impossible" marks which have been broken.

The guy who first said "the sky's the limit" sure knew what he was talking about.

### Brown, Rossi In Title Fight

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Champion Joe Brown, slender Negro boxer-puncher, is favored at 13-5 to beat Italian Paolo Rossi, a baldish raw-boned slugger, tonight in their battle of "oldest men" for the world lightweight crown.

They are the oldest pair to fight for the 135 pound title: Brown, 33, and Rossi, 31. But each is still such an effective puncher that some "sportsmen" are offering 7-5 that the bout at Uline Arena does not last its scheduled 15 rounds, regardless of the winner.

Promoter Goldie Ahearn expects a near-capacity 7,500 and a gate of more than \$50,000, despite two days of steady rain that curtailed somewhat the sale of tickets for this indoor show.

Washington's first title fight in 18 years will be televised nationally by ABC at 10 p.m. e.d.t., with a local blackout on a 100-mile radius. The last championship fight here was on May 23, 1941, when Joe Louis won on a seventh-round disqualification over big Buddy Baer.

Brown, who now lives at Baton Rouge, La., is making his seventh defense of the title in his 100th professional fight. He hopes within the next year to equal or surpass the eight successful defenses made by the late Benny Leonard who retired undefeated.

However, Joe indicated in his last three performances that he will be slipping. He kept his title by an eyelash after 15 furious rounds with southpaw Kenny Lane. He lost a non-title decision to Johnny Bussio but managed to beat Bussio in a title fight, last Feb. 11, over the full 15-round route.

living in New York—earned tonight's shot by coming through his last nine bouts unbeaten, although held to one draw. ## Catholics Set For San Juan Swimming Party On June 24

DALLAS (UPI)—Thousands of Catholics in Texas and Mexico will bathe in the Rio Grande on June 24 in a traditional Mexican religious observance marking the feast day of San Juan.

The custom of organizing swimming parties on San Juan's Day originated in Mexico more than 300 years ago. It commemorates Christ's baptism by San Juan el Bautista (St. John the Baptist).

Rev. Father Simon Stock, pastor of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Dallas, said the ceremony is also observed in parts of Spain.

According to Mexican folk belief, bathing in rivers and streams on San Juan's Day purifies the body and makes hair grow long and luxuriant.

**Day Begins Early**

This year the border's heaviest concentration of religious celebrations is again expected in the El Paso-Juarez area where an estimated 3,000 persons annually observe San Juan's Day by bathing in the Rio Grande.

In Mexican border cities and villages, the Saint's Day observance, popularly called the "Day of the Juaneas," begins long before sunrise.

Mariachi musicians signal its opening by wandering the streets giving serenades called "gallos" (rooster serenades) because they are held about the time roosters begin crowing.

At daybreak, the Mariachis serenade the Juaneas and Juanitas, who are celebrating their Saint's Day, with the traditional "Las Mananitas" (Little Morning Songs).

**Vendors Keep Busy**

Worshippers organize swimming parties shortly after daybreak. Many carry statues of San Juan to the Rio Grande and these, too, are bathed in the river.

Bathers and onlookers throw flowers into the river, turning it into a floating garden. Vendors selling tamales, pozole, and "tarts of San Juan" pitch camp on the riverbanks where they usually do a land-office business.

Musicians on both sides of the border keep busy all day singing to the many Juaneas and Juanitas in Texas and Mexico. So do the Mexican folk poets who compose verses dedicated to Juaneas and Juanas. The poets read their verses at family gatherings.

**An Old Tradition**

After bathing in the river, worshippers attend masses in honor of San Juan. Mexican folkways are linked with the religious observance.

Crus said over the years it has usually rained in Mexico on San Juan's Day. "For that reason the people say 'casi siempre San Juan llora' (St. John usually weeps on his feast day)." Crus said, "But according to folk beliefs the saint weeps 'good tears'."

"To play this role I am trying to keep from judging him. An actor must approach a characterization without deciding whether the person is good or bad. I had no love for Mussolini when I accepted the part, but I think I've managed to put my feelings aside."

A relative newcomer to Hollywood, Persoff is familiar to TV fans and Broadway's first-nighters.

## Americans Complacent About Reds' Spying Inside U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The shocking story of Communist spying in the United States rambles on. It arouses less public interest than last year's fashions in women's skirts.

Why it is that the American people are so complacently headed about the deadly menace of communism to the American way of life is a baffling question. The warnings have been loud and they have been sounding for a long time.

Back there in 1930 one Dimitri Z. Manuilsky spoke in Moscow before the Lenin School of Political Warfare. Among other things, Comrade Manuilsky said:

"War to the hilt between communism and capitalism is inevitable. Today (1930), of course, we are not strong enough to attack. Our time will come in 20 or 30 years (1950 to 1960). To win, we shall need the element of surprise. The bourgeois (that's us) will have to be put to sleep."

**Peace Movement**

"So, we shall begin by launching the most spectacular peace movement on record. There will be electrifying overtures and unheard-of concessions. The capitalist countries, stupid and decadent, will rejoice to cooperate in their own destruction. They will leap at another chance to be friends. As soon as their guard is down, we shall smash them with our clenched fists."

The House Committee on Un-American Activities cited that speech in a report and remarked: "The Soviet Union's protestations of peaceful intent and a desire for true friendship with the United States are an utter sham. This is one fact that stands out sharply as a result of this commu-

American citizens seem not to be aware of or to care little about communism's determined plans for a bright, new Red world. In a letter some months ago discussing this fat-headed complacency, President Eisenhower wrote: "I am often astonished... at the apparent apathy of so many Americans."

FBI regularly warns his fellow citizens of their danger, but there is little evidence that they heed his words. Hoover's warning this month was that the Communists were stepping up their efforts to recruit young people and workers in vital industries. He said:

"The Communist aim is, of course, to eat into our economic life and freedom."

In April, Hoover warned that U.S. Communist leaders were going into "full scale action" here under new orders from Moscow. A Justice Department official estimated that in a rather recent 18-month period the FBI referred 481 espionage cases to the department. That is near an average rate of one a day.

There are scores of books on the subject of economics in our high schools and colleges. Most of them take up the task of trying to show that laissez-faire capitalism is "out-modern," "unjust" and "passé."

BETTER JOBS

Political Science Text The reason I have been discussing for several issues a book called "Principles of American Government" used in the political science class at Santa Ana Junior College is that I have never found a book on political science in any involuntary school that clearly explained a voluntary government as expressed in the Declaration of Independence.

There is a natural reason for this, because non-free enterprise schools are based on involuntary government. So, it makes little difference what text you use, you get about the same indoctrination for a bigger government encroaching on the rights of the individual.

What the authors of this book do not seem to understand is that under free enterprise we cannot distribute more than is produced, nor can we distribute less than is produced, unless the government interferes with the free and natural division of labor.

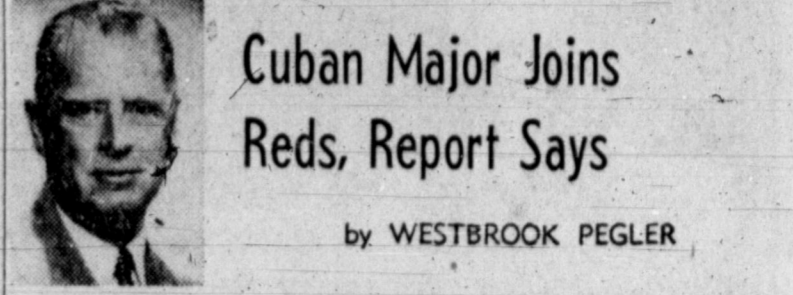

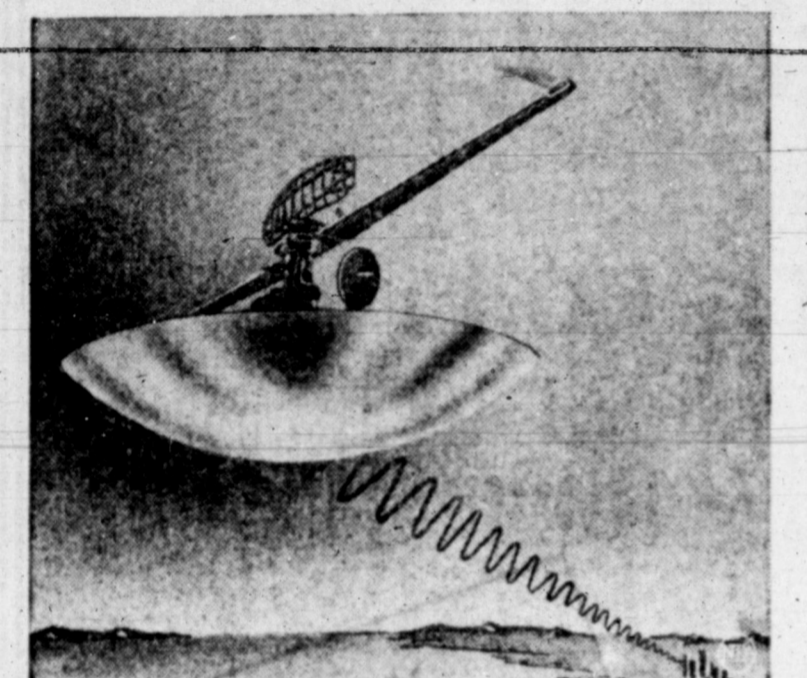

Cuba's Caribbean neighbors view with considerable suspicion Prime Minister Fidel Castro's recent disavowal of any intent to meddle in the "internal" affairs of other nations. They believe it was dictated more by practical politics than by conviction and that Castro realized he would have to secure his revolution at home before exporting it to Haiti, Nicaragua or Guatemala. They believe his decision also was prompted by the quick action of the Organization of American States in curbing the attempted invasion of Panama from Cuba. However, they say it is a breathing spell only and that the Caribbean will continue to be a powder keg so long as the crusade-minded Cuban government offers haven to revolutionaries.  
**SHAKEUP:**  
Poland's Premier Josef Cyrankiewicz is the subject of this popular story: "Poland would have been sure of a gold medal in the last Olympics if we had entered Cyrankiewicz for the water government were to make the
