

Trio Of Kidnappers Caught In Guymon

GUymON, Okla. (UPI) — An Ohio woman whose scribbled note in a Tucumcari, N. M. restroom triggered a search for kidnappers, hailed a cruising police car here late Thursday night and led to the arrest of three persons.

The woman, Mrs. Eugene Bailey, 26, of Akron told Guymon police Chief R. L. Shepherd the two men and a woman had slugged her in the stomach and

showed her into their car at Albuquerque, N. M. "Don't play with us, we'll get your kids," Mrs. Bailey said they told her. She has two children. Arrested at a motel without a struggle were Jesse Kenner and Harold Holliderton, both about 35, who gave no addresses, and Lois Stripping, 28, Farmington, N. M.

FBI Enters Case Shepherd said he thought all the names were aliases, however. FBI agents were questioning Mrs. Bailey this morning. Shepherd said the woman told him the four had stopped at a Guymon motel at about 11 p. m. Thursday and that she had protested she needed a cup of coffee. She said the trio allowed her to go to the motel coffee shop, but that on the way she spied a passing police car and hailed it down.

Shepherd said he had heard of no alert for the woman at the time, but a short time later "I heard about it on television." "We took the woman to a hotel and then went out to the motel and arrested the others," he said. "They came along without any trouble." Two-State Search "The men look like boxers or wrestlers, but the striking woman is fairly good looking," he commented.

Lawmen from New Mexico to Texas launched a search for the four after a note reading "I've been kidnaped, help please," was found in the woman's rear room of a truck stop on U.S. 66-54 at Tucumcari. It was signed "Jeanette Bailey," and bore an additional phrase, "headed for Amarillo."

The note was scribbled in ballpoint on the back of a check on the First National Bank of Akron, Ohio, which bore the name and address of Mrs. Eugene Bailey. Telephoned for Funds Bailey, an artist in the ad department of the Akron Beacon-Journal, said his wife left home May 29 on her vacation with a friend, Tanya Barstoff, 27, of San Francisco. Mrs. Bailey, 26, took the family car and the couple's two children. The distraught husband said his wife telephoned him at the trailer court where they live Tuesday night and left word she needed money. He sent \$50, which had not been picked up by Thursday night. Mrs. Bailey reportedly had been living in Albuquerque and worked (See KIDNAPERS, Page 3)

Attorneys Fight Family Of Long On His Sanity

GALVESTON, Tex. (UPI) — Attorney Adrian S. Levy Sr. said today the jurisdiction of Texas courts to declare Louisiana Gov. Earl Long insane will be challenged on grounds Long was brought into the state against his will. Levy made the statement as reports circulated that the FBI was investigating the possibility Long was kidnaped. An FBI spokesman refused to confirm or deny the reports, but admitted Long may

have been kidnaped in a "technical sense." Levy is the spokesman for a team of attorneys fighting the attempt by Long's family to have him declared insane and committed to a mental hospital for 90 days. A full fledged hearing on the petition by Mrs. Long and the governor's cousin, Dr. Arthur Long Jr., is set for Tuesday. "Done for Own Good" "We will challenge the jurisdiction of Texas courts on grounds

that the governor was brought into this state forcibly, unwittingly and unwillingly," Levy said. "I won't make the statement that he was kidnaped, however," Levy said, "because there were circumstances indicating that it was done for his own good." Levy and two other Texas attorneys were appointed by Probate Judge Hugh Gibson to represent Long at the Tuesday's hearing. Long asked his legal advisor and close friend, Theo Cangelosi, also to be in court. Cangelosi is chairman of the Louisiana State University Board of Supervisors. He agreed to sit in as a member of the legal battery, but pointed out that he has no license to practice in Texas. Levy said there was a strong possibility that the jurisdiction of Texas courts would be attacked Monday, the day before the scheduled hearing. But he said there has not yet been a definite decision. "We are still studying the matter," he said. "But we definitely will challenge the court's authority to force Governor Long to submit to mental treatment," Levy said. "The fact that he is governor of Louisiana has nothing to do with it." (See LONG, Page 3)

Gromyko Won't Lift Ultimatum

By STEWART HENSLEY United Press International GENEVA (UPI) — Andrei Gromyko refused today to withdraw the Russian one-year Berlin ultimatum, despite Western warnings it would wreck the Big Four conference and hopes for a summit meeting. But the West agreed to meet Gromyko in one more secret session Monday. There were strong private indications that the Soviet Union might back down then. Gromyko told the West his new Berlin proposal was intended neither as an "ultimatum" or a "diktat." In the same breath, he then reiterated Soviet demands for the West to get out of Berlin. An American spokesman commented afterward that Gromyko "at least publicly disclaimed any intention to bring pressure under duress of threat."

When a British spokesman was asked if the British consider the ultimatum withdrawn, he replied, "That is my understanding." Secretary of State Christian Herter told Gromyko it is "important" that Soviet intentions be "fully clarified" in order that we would know exactly where we stand from the point of view of any continuation of our discussions. Basis for Discussion At a Big Four plenary session this morning, Gromyko adopted a conciliatory tone and declared his new Berlin plan was "a statement of position" which might become a basis for discussions on the solution of such important questions as the Berlin question and an all-German government. Then he turned right back to his rejected provisions of his

NUEVO LAREDO, Mex. (UPI) — The prominent Texas preacher who lost his church post because of an "improper" involvement with a woman whose marriage he was trying to save, has also lost his wife. McBirnie has vanished from San Antonio. One report had him in New York seeking spiritual guidance from a noted clergyman, but this was discounted. Another report, which was unconfirmed, said he was in San Diego with the unnamed woman that started his troubles. She has also been divorced. When McBirnie told his congregation of his "involvement" with the woman, he asked to be replaced and refused to resign. His changed his mind, however, and submitted his resignation Sunday, Wednesday night, the congregation voted to accept it. The court records stated the divorce was by mutual consent, and that both parties appeared in court. The divorce was granted by Judge Eduardo Garza Villamor in Des Moines, Iowa

Fidel Replaces Five Ministers

HAVANA (UPI) — Premier Fidel Castro shook up the Cuban cabinet today in the face of growing opposition to his controversial plan to carve up large Cuban farms. The bearded revolutionary, who overthrew dictator Fulgencio Batista nearly six and a half months ago announced replacements for five ministers, including the minister of Agriculture. The announcement came early this morning at the end of a long cabinet session. It climaxed reports that some of the cabinet ministers had threatened to quit unless the land reform law were modified. The official announcement gave no indication whether the five outgoing ministers resigned or were fired. Cattle ranchers, tobacco and sugar growers have fought the land reform law. The United States formally added its voice to their cause Thursday. In a note to the Cuban government the U.S. State Department expressed "serious concern" that the law failed to provide prompt and adequate compensation to U.S. investors. The reform law, published June 3, stipulates reduction of all land holding to 1,000 acres. A number of U. S. sugar companies will be affected. The U.S. statement said it was sympathetic to the Cuban objective of land redistribution but implied that the way Cuba was doing it would hurt Cuba as well as foreign investors. Tobacco farmers in Pinar Del Rio Province have threatened open revolution if the government carves up their lands. Cattle growers have launched a fundraising drive to conduct a publicity campaign against aspects of the land reform law they object to.

High Winds, Heat And Rains Leave Texans Weary

United Press International A line of vicious thunderstorms drove out of Oklahoma deep into Central Texas early today, breaking tree limbs, shattering windows and damaging roofs. Amon Carter Field, between Dallas and Fort Worth, reported winds up to 47 miles an hour and the wind blew 55 miles an hour in Dallas. In Fort Worth, the wind blew over a concrete wall at a bottling plant, broke windows and damaged roofs. Police said damage was "in the thousands of dollars." In Dallas, the storm, striking at 2 a. m., tore the roof from a drive-in grocery, broke windows and toppled trees and knocked down telephone and electrical wires. Blast Rocks Train Platform

BOSTON (UPI) — A mad bomber whose ingeniously contrived time bomb blasted apart a rapid transit station and injured 38 persons was sought here today by a team of crack detectives. More than a score of men were assigned to the investigation in an urgent effort to track down the maniac before he could strike again. An escaped mental patient with a record of previous bombing attempts was considered a prime suspect. Three persons were critically injured in the blast late Thursday in the crowded North End District. Of the three, only an 81 year old man, Abraham Roberts, was considered early today to be in imminent danger of dying. He was struck in the neck by flying metal. Searched For Evidence Police ballistics experts swarmed over the area until late Thursday night picking up bits of the bomb. They said the person who planted it "knew his business." The explosive force was said to be about equal to a World War II 100-pound aerial bomb. The station is about 30 feet above the ground on the Metropolitan Transit Authority's elevated tracks. The platform is outside the sheltered waiting room. Authorities said the bomb was planted in one of the public coin operated lockers, common to most railroad and transit station waiting rooms. Six dry cell batteries were found in the twisted wreckage late Thursday night and police believed they were part of the bomb. Traces of black powder and other chemicals were also found by investigators on the lockers. The explosion occurred just as a two-car train came to a stop at the edge of the platform. Ballistics experts theorized that this may have been more than coincidence. They said it was possible the madman somehow wired the bomb so that the train entering the station set off the explosion. The blast ripped apart the waiting room. Many Persons Knocked Down Huge beams, chunks of metal and razor-sharp pieces of glass flew in all directions. Some 300 persons in the immediate area were knocked flat. Debris rained down on the street below, cutting and injuring many passersby.

8 INJURED DURING MAY

Eight persons were injured in auto accidents on city streets during May, bringing the year's injury toll to 54. Police Chief Jim Conner reported today. The total number of injuries is almost double what it was one year ago when only 28 suffered injuries through May. Conner added that through today Pampa has gone 372 days without a traffic fatality. May's accident figures also showed there were a total of 43 accidents on Pampa streets, among them 15 at intersections. Seven of the persons hurt were injured in non-intersection accidents. Most (30) of May's accidents occurred during daylight hours, and only two occurred during the normally dangerous dawn and dusk hours, Conner also noted that 15 accidents were blamed on motorists failing to grant the right of way, and eight were caused by reckless driving.

Reds Open Up!

TAIPEI, Formosa (UPI) — Red Chinese shore batteries and a Communist ship shelled one of the Nationalist offshore islands in the Matsu complex today, the Nationalist Defense Ministry announced. Rear Adm. Liu Hoh - Tsai said land-based guns and a three-masted junk poured more than 430 shells onto tiny Keelung island. The junk withdrew under Nationalist counter-fire, he said.

OF TEXAS LEGISLATURE 10-Man Committee Works To Avoid Second Session

By LLOYD LARRABEE United Press International AUSTIN (UPI) — A 10-man conference committee from both houses of the Texas Legislature began work today to find a compromise solution to the controversial 151 million dollar tax bill and avoid a second special session. The current 30-day special session called by Gov. Price Daniel to solve the state's financial problems after lawmakers couldn't agree to a new tax program during the four month regular session is scheduled to end Tuesday. In the balance today is the money measure needed to finance proposed increases in state spending for the next two years. The Senate drastically altered the House-approved bill and sent it back to the House for concurrence Thursday. The House refused to concur. If the conference committee of the five members from each house can reach an agreement on the bill, it will go to the governor for signature. If it doesn't agree, the bill is dead. It would mean a clean start in a second special session.

Ramsay Breaks Tie

House Speaker Waggoner Carr appointed Repeal V. L. (Bo) Ramsay of Beckville, W. T. Oliver of Port Neches, Don Kennard of Fort Worth, Alonson Jamison of Denton and George Cook of Odessa. From the Senate are Sens. R. A. Weinert of Seguin, Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, Charles Herring of Austin, Jimmy Phillips of Angleton and Bruce Resipan of Corpus Christi. It took a rare tie-breaking vote by Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey to get the tax bill out of the Senate and back to the House. The five-man Senate State Affairs Subcommittee drastically rewrote the tax bill backed by the administration and approved by the House. The House refused,

101-40, to accept Senate amendments which knock out Daniel's recommendations and put the major share of new revenue on the shoulders of cigarette smokers and users of other tobacco products. Senate backers of the altered bill fought off a swarm of proposed amendments. There were only a few minor changes. It left intact a three-cent-per-pack increase on cigarettes, designed to raise \$3 million dollars over the next two years. The tax on cigars and tobacco products was cut back from 25 to 12.5 per cent and the upper chamber added a 15 per cent sales tax on boats and boat trailers. The major items proposed by Daniel which were knocked out were a proposed severance tax on dedicated natural gas, a revised corporation franchise tax formula, and a general 2.5 per cent increase on all utilities.

Women Sensible In Matters Of Tipping

WASHINGTON (UPI)—One way to beat the high cost of travel this summer is let your wife handle the tipping. Another is to stay home.

A new book on the subject, written by a fellow who ought to know, recommends a for and against these solutions, respectively.

The author is Michael Frome, for many years travel editor of the American Automobile Assn. Frome says if you're smart you still can get out on the road, have fun, and come home with all your gold fillings.

His book is called "Better Vacations for Your Money." Frome says if all you have in mind is saving your dough, you better forget the whole thing. He does have lots of ideas though for easing the pain.

Tipping Not Required
"You don't have to tip anybody, anywhere, anything," counsels traveler Frome. "You do so only because you want to—in appreciation for service well-rendered."

He must have known you won't believe this. That's why he says let your wife do it.

"Women are especially sensible in matters relating to tipping, fair but not foolish," he says. "I must be true, too, because I've heard many a cab driver say the same thing, sort of."

Frome, being an old man, naturally starts out with the presumption you will be going by car. He says it will help to get it fixed first, because the local mechanics are cheap compared with those you will find in somebody else's home town.

Once under way, figure \$30 per thousand miles for the gas and oil. From there on, you can write your own budget. It appears there are three courses to follow, ranging from expensive to uncomfortable.

Camping Easier
Taking them in reverse order, there is camping. Frome says 22 million people did it last year. Camping he says, is not what it was in the good old days, and thank goodness for that, anyway.

The difference is in the fine new camp sites, with conveniences like showers, sometimes with hot water, going up in state and national parks all over the country; also in the \$150 to \$300 worth of fancy camping gear he says you will want.

After recovering from this initial investment, four campers can hope to get by on \$100 a week. But don't try it just to save money. If you like to rough it on a foam rubber bed, Frome says maybe the motel route is for you.

If so, figure \$10 to \$12 a night for the room; at least \$5 daily per person for food.

For a week in a cottage somewhere at the beach or the mountains, \$90 is average rent.

For those who just want to sit down, Frome has a kind word for the resort hotel, from which he says all the guests come away feeling like millionaires. This is possibly because they are millionaires. Anyway, he suggests \$325 a week, "and up" as a likely price for a family of four.

Credit cards help. Take all you've got. But ready cash hasn't gone out of style. Figure a budget long before leaving, Frome advises, then add 10 to 15 per cent. I guess the author reaches his literary peak in this 160-page book on page 97. In a sentence that can't be improved, he says: "Be prepared to pay."

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'Sonic Boom' Startles North Central Texas

FORT WORTH (UPI) — A loud explosion, believed to be a "sonic boom," startled hundreds of residents in north central Texas late Wednesday night. It broke windows, caused a garage to collapse, and frightened a deputy sheriff who thought someone had put a bomb in his car.

The blast appeared to center over Fort Worth. But residents in surrounding suburbs and at Sherman reported it appeared to be overhead. It was heard as far north as Clinton, Okla.

Authorities had not been able to pinpoint the source of the blast at last report, but most feel confident it was a "sonic boom" — caused by a high speed plane breaking the sound barrier.

Several persons reported two planes broke the sound barrier at the same time.

Jim Floyd of the Tarrant County Sheriff's department had one of his keys in the ignition of his car and stepped on the starter. He thought his car had been bombed. "It cut 10 years off of my life," Floyd said.

A Fort Worth woman reported she saw an airplane with an "unusually bright light" make the shock. It knocked Arnold Gachman from a chair as he watched television.

Hundreds of nervous residents over the wide area flooded news agencies and police stations with calls asking the cause of the disturbance.

It apparently caused a garage to collapse in Fort Worth, and shattered dozens of windows, including two large plate glass store fronts, and set off two burglar

alarms. Convair said it had a plane in the air at the time of the disturbance, but said it doubted its aircraft was the cause. Both Carswell Air Force Base and Perrin AFB said they had no aircraft in the area at the time.

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Fight Looms For Boys' Statements

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI)—Prosecutor William Hopkins said today he would fight to get into evidence the statements four white youths made to police after the rape of a Negro coed from Florida A&M College.

The soft-spoken 19-year-old girl was unshaken under cross-examination Thursday in her story that the four youths abducted her in her evening dress the night of the spring formal dance, held a knife at her throat and raped her seven times. Her name may not be used under Florida law.

Portions Verified
Substantial portions of her story were verified by two white deputy sheriffs — including the one who caught the four youths now being tried here — and an officer who said she told him right after their arrest that all four raped her.

Ollie Stoutamire, 16, is the youngest of the defendants. The others are Willon Collinsworth, 23; Patrick Scarborough, 20; and David Beagles, 18.

The prosecutor brought out that all four made statements in the presence of himself and deputy W. W. Slappay and that they had been advised of their constitutional rights. The deputy confirmed that the statements were made voluntarily.

Denied She Consented
The girl denied Thursday under cross-examination that she had consented to have relations with the white youths if they would return her afterwards to the college.

"Why did you submit to them?" Hopkins asked.
"There were four men with a shotgun and a knife around my

neck," she said. "There was nothing I could do but do what they said for me. If I knew they would kill me I didn't."
Joe Cooke Jr., a criminology student at all-white Florida State University and a part-time deputy sheriff, testified he found the girl on the back floor after he halted the car with the four whites and held them at gunpoint.

Somoza Says He Cannot Be Forced To Flee

President Luis Somoza of Nicaragua has boasted he is "no Batista who can be forced to board a plane and leave the country."
He does, indeed, hold important cards in his defiance of the rebels who invaded from neighboring Costa Rica and whose numbers have been reported variously at from a few score to a few hundred.

His younger brother, Anastasio Somoza Jr., is commander-in-chief of Nicaraguan armed forces which number around 4,000 and are better armed than most Central American armies.

He has only a tiny air force, but the rebels have no air force at all, and apparently no heavy weapons.

Commercially, Luis Somoza holds the trump card over dissatisfied businessmen who might be tempted to throw in with the rebels. Nicaragua exports cotton and coffee but for almost everything else is dependent on imports. The government controls those all-important import licenses, without which the businessman must starve.

A Heady Business
Yet rebellion is a heady business and in Latin America the smouldering hatreds of the out for the ins gained strength, prestige and hope from Fidel Castro's Cuban victory over forces which at the outset outnumbered his rag-tag army better than 1,000 to 1.

Both Somozas have gone out of their way to belittle the strength of the present rebellion, although Luis lost no time in calling upon the Organization of American States (OAS) for help in quelling it.

The OAS refused to intervene but has appointed an investigative group.

Since 1923, Nicaragua, largest of the Central American states, has been operated almost as a private corporation by the Somozas.

Killed By Assassin
An assassin's bullet set down Gen. Anastasio Somoza in September, 1936, but his sons moved in and took over with scarcely a hitch.

Luis' immediate reaction to the present difficulties was:
"My father often warned me that you cannot feed too much meat to a young baby and now I know what he meant."

Today they are strangers to the movie screen. Lanza fled to Rome. Miss Powell turned to night clubs and TV. Kathryn Grayson rarely performs at all. Esther occasionally takes time off from her swimming pool company for a TV spectacular. Dailey is a night club booby.

Howard Keel was up there with the big ones, too. Only he is determined to remain a movie star — by playing straight dramatic roles.

"It's either that or set my sights for opera," the big guy said.

"There have been so few musical pictures I've had no choice. I never get offers for musicals anymore. My last one was 'Kismet' in 1935, and believe me, it was a real bomb."

Keel cited Bing Crosby and Frank Sinatra as other singers who've managed to stay afloat by trading in their pipes for histrionics.

His last two pictures, in which he didn't warble a note, were "Floods of Fear" and "The Big Fisherman." In the latter he wears a flowing beard portraying Saint Peter.

She shares one big problem in common with all women: a shortage of time. Here, this TV Emmy Award winner tells how she uses her time to get the very best possible beauty results.)

For a television actress life is endlessly demanding — and rewarding. Though I must always look my best on that small screen, I have very little time to myself for beauty care.

So it's natural that my TV appearance and the way I look in private life should blend. The one life spills over into the other. My working day starts at 7 a.m. and continues, after my show, with story conferences, business luncheons, afternoon appointments with my agent and so on into a long day. I am also a wife and a homemaker, in the midst of redecorating a large apartment. It follows that I have very little time to myself ever.

My TV hairdo, as you may know, is a pony tail. But it's a wavy pony tail and it's versatile. I wear mine in combination with feathery bangs and I can put it up in seconds for more formal affairs.

In addition, I own several false hairpieces. It's not that I need additional hair. I just think that these hairpieces are great for times when my hair doesn't look right and it must. For after all, I do go swimming or neglect to pin curl my hair and I still must face that camera. It seems to me that every woman should own at least one hairpiece and make it regular use of it. It can make life so much easier.

Eye make-up is a form of cosmetic that I carry over from TV into my daily life. My own lashes are thick and curly but light, like my hair. So I darken them with mascara and line the lid with a pencil. Then I add a little white stroke at the outer end of each eye. I can't explain why, but this seems to extend the eye and make it look far larger.

I apply lipstick with a brush (and a steady hand) since this gives me a perfect outline. But, like all women, I make a mistake now and then. When this happens, I use another brush, dipped in white, to correct the outline. It seems to me that the new white lipsticks, used with a brush might work in the same way.

Away from the cameras, I wear glasses. I'm extremely nearsighted and I love pretty frames. I own 14 pairs of glasses in every conceivable shape and color and I change them just as I change a dress.

I have, in short, made of the beauty problems that women all over the country have. And, like many women who are pressed for time, I must tackle them in short order, solve them efficiently and come up looking sharp. The best way to do this, I've discovered, is by efficient planning. The hairpieces are part of this plan. So is the lipstick brush and so are the glasses. They all add up to a more attractive me in less time.

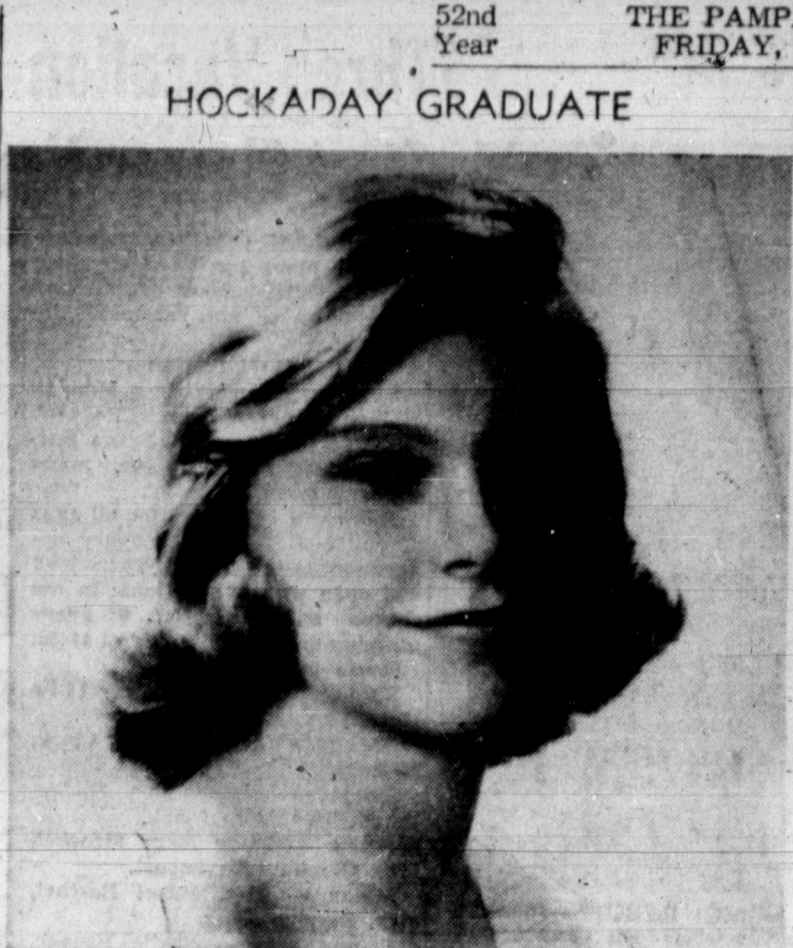

Marinated Meat Is Heart Of Successful Kabob Cookery

Kabob cookery has become an honorable art in the United States. Cooked indoors or out, tender cubes of marinated meat alternated with vegetables on skewers and then broiled, produce a succulent main course.

The marinating of the meat for hours is very important. Lemon juice or wine vinegar, ripe, hot pepper sauce are ingredients generally used, together with mustard and other spices and herbs. Experiment until you find the combination most satisfactory to your taste.

MIGNONETTE OF BEEF
(Yield: 6 servings)
One-half cup salad oil, ¼ cup lemon juice, ½ cup red wine, ½ teaspoon Tabasco, 1 teaspoon dry mustard, ¼ teaspoon thyme, 1 bay leaf, ¼ teaspoon salt, 1 medium onion, sliced; 2 pounds beef sirloin, cut in 1½-inch cubes; 2 medium green pepper, cut in 1½-inch pieces; 1 pound medium mushrooms, 12 small whole onions peeled.

Blend salad oil, lemon juice, red wine and Tabasco in shallow bowl. Add dry mustard, thyme, bay leaf, salt and onion. Add meat cubes. Let stand 5 hours or overnight. Alternate meat and vegetables on skewers. Place in preheated broiler or on grill about 4-inches from heat. Broil 20 minutes, turning occasionally and brushing with sauce. The tang of hot pepper sauce adds zip to this salad dressing.

(Yield: 2 cups)
One cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, ½ teaspoon Tabasco, 1 teaspoon paprika, ¼ cup chili

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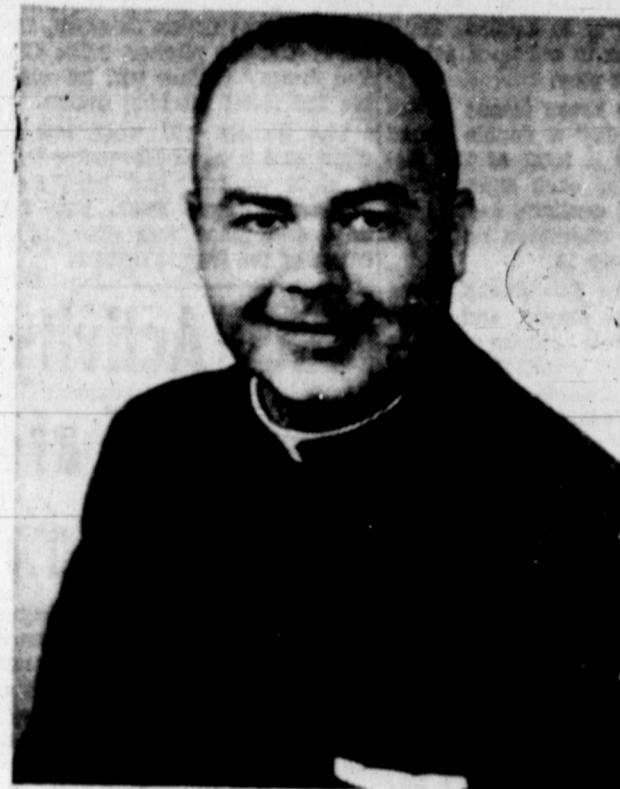

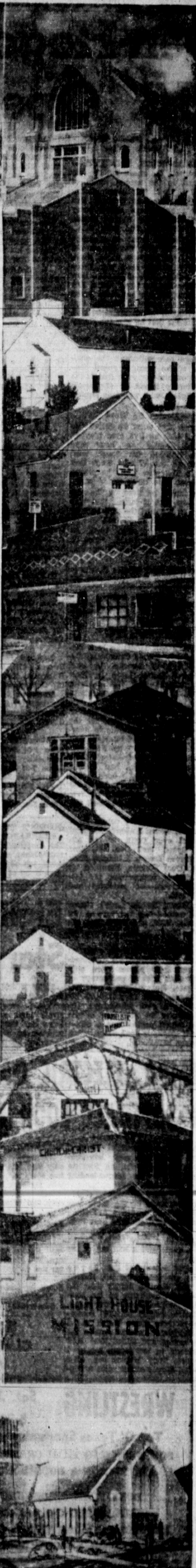
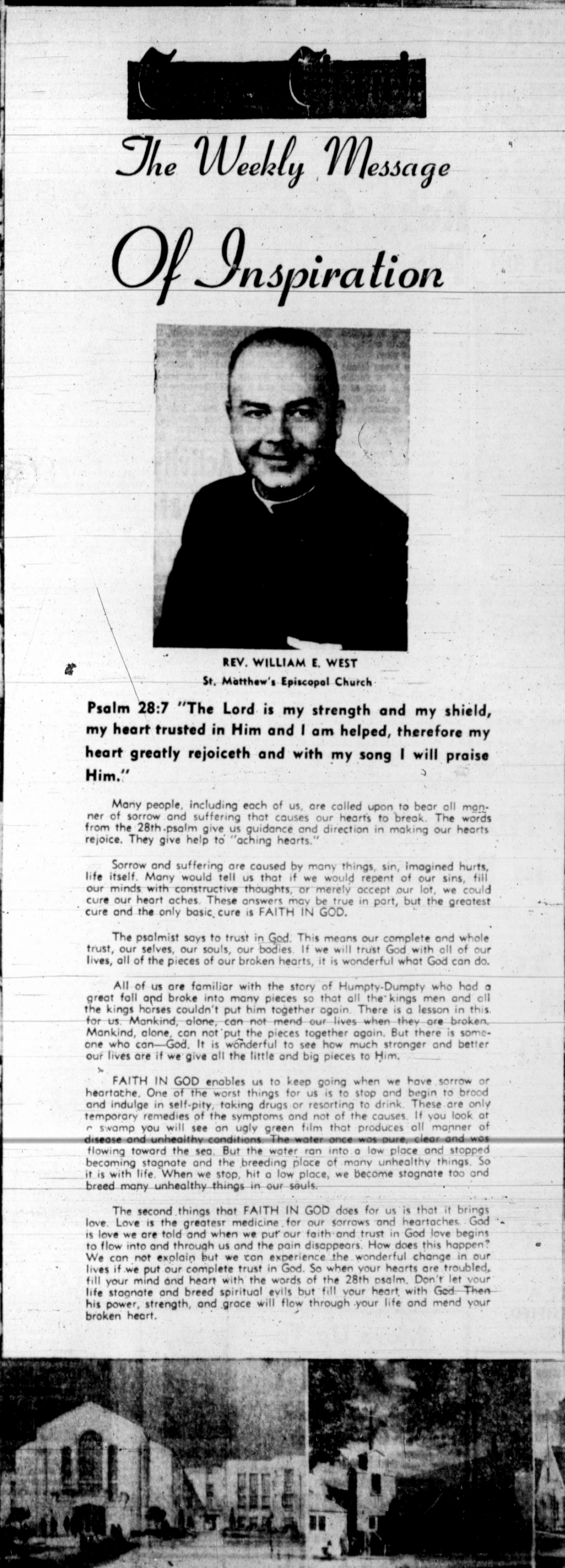

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Panel Probes Into Unborn Happenings

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (UPI)—A panel of medical scientists heard it suggested that the things that can happen to people before birth might be the most important events of their lives.

The suggestion was made by Dr. A. S. Norris of the State University of Iowa. When science knows more than it knows now, he said, the obstetrician will be able to practice preventive psychiatry in behalf of the unborn. In fact, he will be "the first line of defense against mental illness," Norris said.

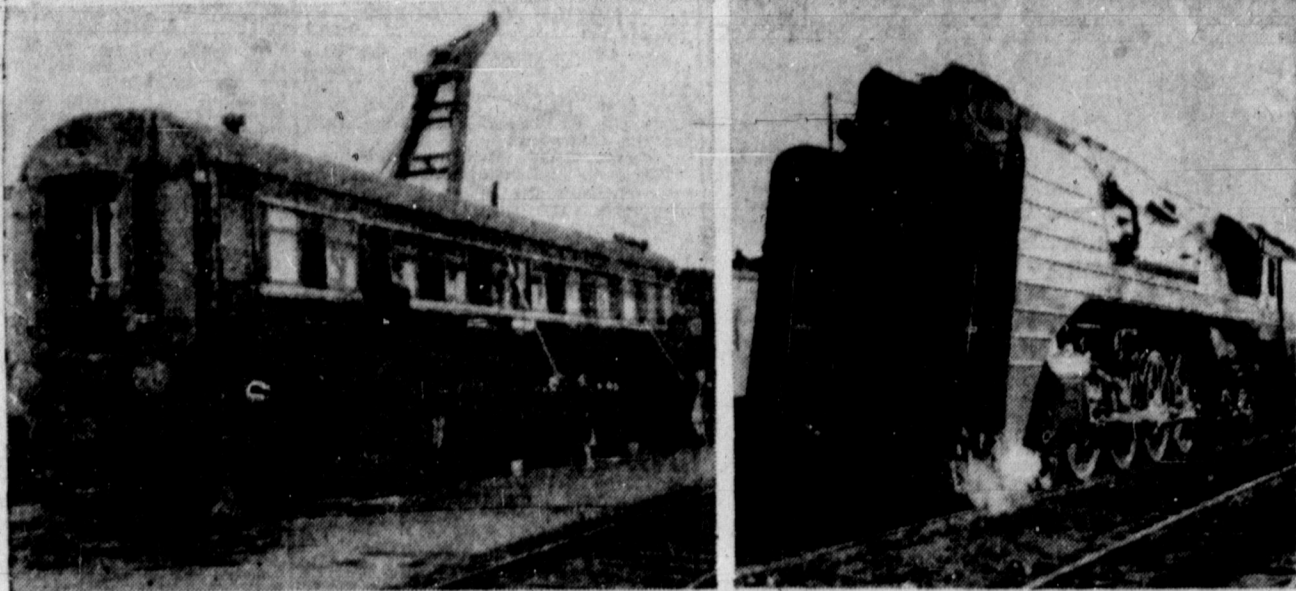
The panel discussion was a feature of the annual meeting of the American Medical Association. It called attention to the usually ignored fact that we all live approximately nine months before our lives begin officially.

Before-Birth Environments
Norris thought it a pity science has paid so little attention to the influences of people's before-birth environments while making elaborate studies of how after-birth environments mold people into what they are, good and bad.

He pointed to the situations in which before-birth environments rob after-birth environments of most if not all molding influence. Some human beings die before they are born. Others are born mentally or physically defective. The accent was on the bad, of course, because science is ignorant of the good which before-birth environments create beyond the fact that most people at birth are quite normal.

But people are born with astonishing endowments of body and mind, as well as with defects, and science has never been able to show heredity is the FULL explanation. Norris's complaint basically was that the little which is known points to the importance of happenings in the before-birth environments, and why don't scientists get more facts?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Morton Gould is a symphonic composer, which he said means he writes songs that millions of people don't sing. But you never can tell, he said, and when one of his ballads winds up in the juke box top ten he will want his share of the dime.

This did seem reasonable, and in fact I had assumed my recent investments in a local delicatessen in "Kookie Kookie," "Happy Organ" and other such current classics included at least a small cut for the geniuses who composed them.

Not so, Gould told a House Judiciary subcommittee. Gould said Congress, when it wrote the copyright law back in 1909, somehow failed to foresee what would evolve from the player piano.

The law said when people played music for profit, except on the Nickelodeon, they had to cut in the composer. Now the subcommittee was told, we music lovers shove a half billion dollars each year into 500,000 juke boxes, direct descendants of the exempted player piano.

And about all the operators have to say to the song writers, it was claimed, is "I Can't Give You Anything But Love."

Goodbye" the juke box owner may call you "Dream Lover" but the fellows who generated these tunes will be something less than "Enchanted."

Richard Ahlert, a music publisher who took a chance with writer Jack Vaughn on the musical farewells to Jimmy which currently are being heard in saloons all over the country, told the committee this song is doing fine, as songs go.

He said it may even pay his firm for the 80 other new items it has issued, which nobody much has been buying. Especially, he said, if Congress will plug up the loophole through which all those nickels, dimes and quarters have been slipping into the juke box.

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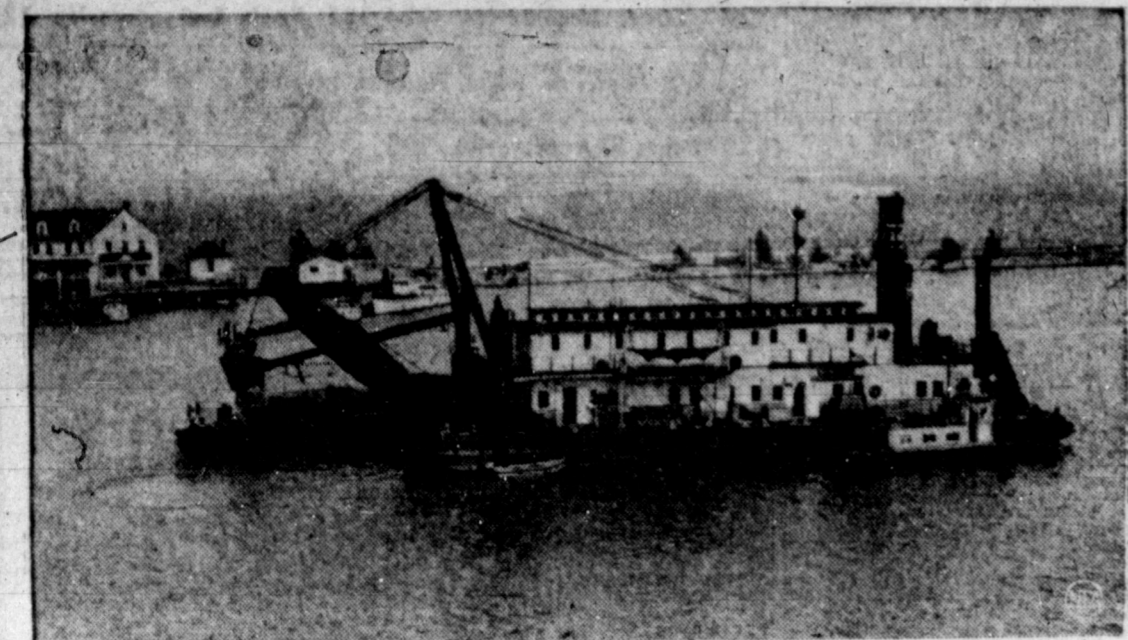

Presbyterian Church Enters Drive To Oust Death Penalty

A campaign to abolish the death penalty is gaining strong support from U. S. religious bodies. The latest big denomination to enlist in the drive is the United Presbyterian Church. Delegates to the recent Presbyterian General Assembly at Indianapolis, Ind., voted overwhelmingly for a resolution declaring that capital punishment "cannot be condoned" by the Christian conscience.

Other major Protestant and Jewish organizations which have come out against the death penalty include the Protestant Episcopal Church, the American Baptist Convention, the Society of Friends (Quakers), the Central Conference of American Rabbis, the Protestant Council of the City of New York, the Massachusetts Council of Churches and the greater Chicago Federation of Churches.

The Union of American Hebrew Congregations, principal voice of reform Judaism, has asked its members to study and debate the question with a view toward taking a stand at their general assembly next November.

Strong sentiment against the death penalty also has been expressed in Methodist and Lutheran churches and may result in official statements from their next national meetings.

The U. S. Catholic hierarchy has not spoken out so far. Catholic teaching has traditionally upheld

the right of the state to protect itself against serious crimes. But many Catholics believe it is not necessary to put offenders to death to protect society.

The power of kings and judges to condemn men to death for certain crimes is older than recorded history. In earlier times, such executions were frankly regarded as vengeance against the criminal. But as Judeo-Christian teachings permeated Western civilization, the rationale for capital punishment shifted.

The main argument made for it today is that fear of being sent to the gallows (or the electric chair or gas chamber) deters many potential murderers, rapists and arsonists from crimes they would otherwise commit.

Opponents say there is no evidence that capital punishment actually has such a deterrent effect. They point out that the death penalty already has been abolished in every country of Western Europe except France and Britain, and in nine states of this

Business men, encouraged by rising sales, have increased their planned spending for new factories and machines, the government reported. Capital spending this year on new plant and equipment is expected to hit \$32,565,000,000, an increase of \$73 million over the figure predicted by the government in March.

The steel industry offered to modify its wage freeze proposal if the union steelworkers union would accept eight changes in the contract designed to eliminate "waste and inefficiency" in the plants. The union speedily rejected the plan on the grounds it would destroy the union.

Budget Director Maurice H. Stans said the deficit for the fiscal year ending June 30 may be \$100 million less than the \$12,900,000,000 previously estimated because of a substantial increase in federal revenues. Expenditures still are expected to be close to the January projection of \$80,900,000,000 while revenues should top the projected \$68 billion.

The Bureau of Mines estimated Texas crude oil demand in July will average 2,650,000 barrels daily, same as forecast for June. Gasoline supplies rose last week at a time when they normally drop because of seasonal demand from motorists, the American Petroleum Institute reported.

Houston Out As Texas City With Most Murders

DALLAS (UPI)—Dallas has edged Houston for the dubious honor of the Texas city with the most murders for the first quarter of 1959, an FBI crime report shows.

Dallas had 21 killings to 20 for Houston for the first three months. Houston sometimes is referred to as the murder capital of the nation. It still led in other categories of crime in Texas cities for the period, the report showed.

Dallas reported seven rapes compared to 26 for Houston, 114 robberies compared to 164 for Houston, 170 aggravated assaults compared to Houston's 1,828, 281 theft over \$50 cases to Houston's 752 and 427 auto thefts to Houston's 732.

Fort Worth had 14 killings and 11 rapes for the same period and 73 robberies, 42 aggravated assaults, 876 burglaries, 153 felony thefts and 248 auto thefts.
