





Every once in a while, a beof internal secretion decides to get into the act. It then adds its. secretion to the secretion put out by the normal gland and that's when trouble begins.

When the secreting tumor is situated in the thyroid gland, you will most likely recognize it as a goiter. Your doctor will then have to decide what kind of goiter it is and what to do about it.

· Most goiters are not really tumors at all. They're merely enlargements of the normal gland resulting from deficiency of iodide in the soil and water of your neighborhood. Iodide - deficient arras are usually found away from salt water, which has abundant supply of this important element. In the United States, the goiter belt used to be in the central states until it was discovered that the thyroid gland could be kept from enlarging by adding iodide to table salt, drinking water and

animal feed. If your goiter is not due to a simple iodide deficiency, it may be a true tumor. Then your doctor has to decide whether it's benign or malignant and, if it's benign, whether it's causing you enough trouble to require treatment by

medical or, surgical methods. The problems that arise in glands you can't see are no different from those caused by the goiter, except that the swelling is not visible to you or your doctor. Hence it's more difficult to

detect. Benign tumors also cause problems when they develop the characteristics of malignancy. These precancerous growths, as they're called, are often located above the upper lip. Sometimes, they're recognizable by their appearance rather than their location, like the black mole or the shiny white plaques that appear in the mouth.

One of the many good reasons you should have a health examination at least twice a year when. you get older is to give your doctor the opportunity for recognizing these precancerous growths before they've had a chance to become

Many of them can be destroyed by X-ray or radium before they get a chance to harm vital tis-

Others are preferably cut out so that the pathologist is given tissue for study under the microscope. He'll then decide whether you'd better have additional X-ray ous cell that may have been left



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
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
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
