"Defrauded College Students"

Since this column beheves that the kind of an education the youth of the land is subjected to will largely determine the kind of a society we will have in the future, an article in "National Review" by Russell Kirk under the heading "Defrauded College Students" we think should be of interest to everyone. This is the way Russell Kirk, who is History and Political Science Professor at Post College, Long Island University, New York, presents the way we are treating the youth of the land: "With increasing vehemence,

many of the better students in American universities and colleges are protesting against waist-high culture. At several institutions during the past few months notably the University of Wisconsin, where the average grade is now B instead of C - students asked that the college require more of the students - of themselves, that is - and offer greatter nutriment for the mind

Students with natural intelligence, some decent curfosity, and a desire to know first principles are in a sorry plight in American colleges nowadays. First of all, a great many young people have been admitted to our crowded colleges who have neither desire nor aptitude for the higher intellectual disciplines, and so grow bored, and infect others with their boredom. Second, the level of instruction at most institutions is so low, on the average, and the method so perfunctory, that dull professors dampen whatever taste for ideas many student, may have possessed. Third, the proliferation of meaningless and worthless course been so great, and the hierarchy of humane and scientific studies has been so deliberately neglected, that few students can find any end or meaning to their college tasks - and so shrug their shoulders in irony or bewilder-

"At Wisconsin, as elsewhere, the better students have been saving that the scholarship of many of their teachers is shoddy; that the apathy of the student is exceeded by the apathy of the average instructor; and that while the mediocre or inferior student is coddled and perhaos given the grade of B (superior!), the student of independent mind often is negalized for daring to deviate from the current ortho-

THE QUESTION (The Wall Street Journal)

So now we are going to have a Taft-Hartley injunction and an eighty day hiatus in the steel strike, Then what?

It is possible that this two-word question may be answered by a negotiated settlement, in which case all the other questions raised by a nation - wide steel strike will be put back in the closet. But there is no doubt that such a strike, prolonged enough, will confront the country with a hard political decision. There's no denying that here a private dispute can become a public matter.

Already the Washington air is tr' of proposals of what to do to protect the national interest and the public safety. They vary in details from some sort of compulsory arbitration to out - right Federal seizure of the mills, but the common denominator in all proposals of this kind is the use of Government power to override the rights of both management and labor. They would deny both the rights of the owners of the companies to say "no" and the rights of the steelworkers not to work on terms unsatisfactory to them. If this is what the country comes

to, it seems to us, it will be a sad day; it would differ only in its processes from the high-handed proposal of President Truman draft the railroad workers into the army. And what would be saddest of all, we think, is that such a "solution" would be wholly unnecessary were our laws wisely drawn in the first place. For what all these proposals

come down to is an attempt to close down a whole vital industy instead of limiting the power that makes that possible.
