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Khrushchev Tours Iowa Farm Today

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On his first day in the capital of this agriculture-rich state, he said that a meeting at least one year with President Eisenhower would be a good thing for the world.

Known as the "fall corn state," Iowa no longer fits that description. Modern hybrid corn grows better but produces more and later ears.

Met Khrushchev Last Year

Khrushchev planned to spend several hours in the rich corn country lands of Roswell Garst, well-to-do farmer near Coon Rapids who produces hybrid seed corn and choice cattle for market.

Garst met and impressed Khrushchev on a visit to Russia in the spring.

The Communist visitor also will meet with Adlai Stevenson, the 1960 Democratic presidential nominee, take a look at agricultural research at Iowa State University, and have a chicken and ham lunch in a big eat on the Garst farm.

In a brief and sober speech at dinner tendered by Des Moines Mayor Charles Iles Tuesday night Khrushchev urged that the earth be furrowed by plows—not rocks and tanks.

He admitted Russia lags in agriculture but added "it is possible to overcome this lag within a short time."

Flew From California

Garst said Khrushchev's primary interest in visiting Iowa was "to find out why 12 per cent of the people in the U.S. can produce enough food for the 100 per cent and with a diet high in the meat type of human protein—and why it takes 50 per cent of the people in the Soviet Union to produce a diet substantially lower in the meat type of human protein."

"This is what I basically intend to help him discover," said Garst, "and this is what he basically wants to know."

Khrushchev flew to the Midwest corn belt from California after a rigorous West Coast schedule and ate a hot dog smeared with mustard at a meat packing plant shortly after his arrival. He retired to his hotel suite early to rest up for a busy day.

He did not tarry after his banquet speech, read from a prepared text.

'VOODOO KILLER' HEARING IS BATTLE OF PSYCHIATRISTS

ATLANTA (UPI)—A clemency hearing for Annette Lyles, 34, accused "voodoo" poison murderer, became a contest between a hypnotizing defense psychiatrist and a "darkhorse" state psychiatrist today.

The state called in Dr. J. Shannon Mays, one of two psychiatrists who examined the silver-haired Macon restaurant operator before her trial and conviction for the murder of her 9-year-old daughter Marcia.

Dr. Trajan E. Shipley, 34, spent some 40 hours with Mrs. Lyles after she was sentenced to die, testified Tuesday that under hypnosis she blamed her own mother for the child's arsenic death.

Mrs. Lyles, while in hypnotic trances, denied guilt in the poison deaths of two husbands and a mother-in-law she also is charged with murdering, Shipley testified. Little of this evidence had come out in Mrs. Lyles' publicized trial last October. In fact, the case was as sensational a mystery at the state Pardons and Pirois Board hearing as was trial testimony about her voodoo rites.

The board heard a tale of forged wills and letters, testimony about rival post-hypnotic suggestions, a romance about a "hexed" lover and drinks laced with arsenic.

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Meanwhile, the bodies of his brother, his wife, Dora, 41, and their 10 children were at the Swanson Funeral Home here pending funeral arrangements.

The 375-pound instrument package, it is understood, will contain small rockets which will be aimed and fired by remote radio control. The package will be launched by an Atlas-Able rocket at Cape Canaveral, Fla., in the early days of October when the moon is in a favorable position. The Atlas-Able consists of an Atlas ICBM as the first stage plus second and third stages evolved from the Vanguard rocket.

Total thrust will be only about two-thirds as great as that attributed to Russia's space-probe rockets, and the package will weigh less than half as much as the 860-pound Lunik II.

But the guidance system for the American package apparently will be far more advanced than Lunik's and more important for the future of space exploration.

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According to Radio Moscow, Lunik II was put on course by guidance mechanisms which operated as long as its rockets were firing. Then, like an intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM), it rested on a long trajectory to target.

It was fine marksmanship but did not depend upon space penetrations into space. A spacecraft using initial guidance would miss Mars or Venus many thousands of miles.

Over 5 Inches Of Rain Falls, Streets Flood

One of the greatest deluges of rain in the city's history, a two-hour cloudburst that began about 4:30 p.m., dumped between 3 and 6 inches of rain on Pampa Tuesday.

At least five cars—caught in city underpasses and low spots were completely under water. Dozens of others were trapped on city streets with water hood high.

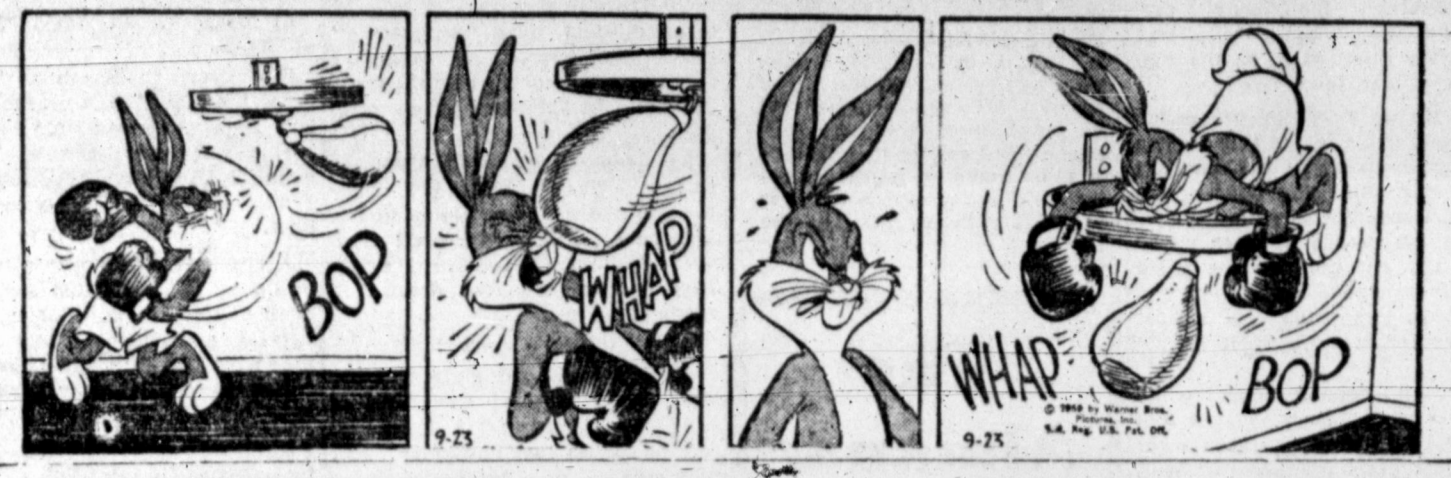

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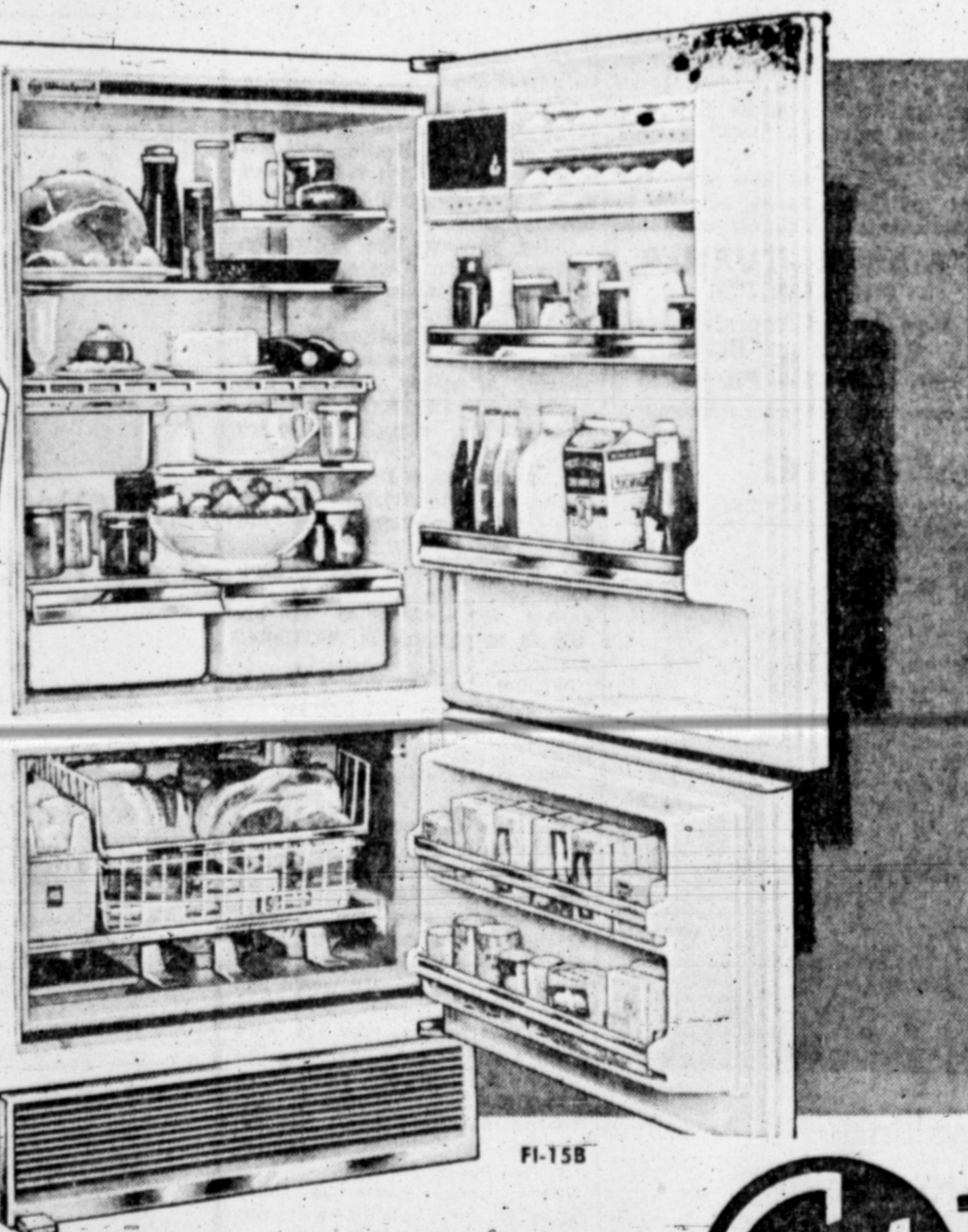

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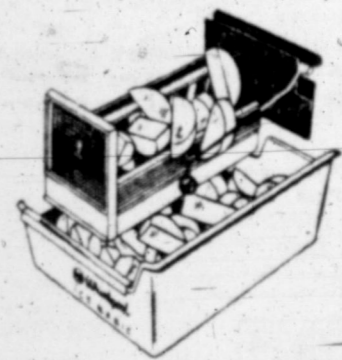
