Pampa may get local air transporation service to Dallas and Oklahoma City under an application with the Civil Aeronautics Board in Washington, D.C.

The application, filed by the City of Amarillo and the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, asks for new and supplemental air transportation service /between Amarillo and communities in Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Tex-

A similar application has been filed by Dallas and the Dallas Chamber.

One air route would provide transportation between the terminal points of Amarillo and Dallas, with the intermediate points of Pampa, Childress, Vernon, Wichita Falls and Fort Worth. The Amarillo-Oklahoma City flight

route will have Pampa and Clinton, Okla. as its intermediate stops.

A pre-hearing conference in this Southwestern Area Local Service Case is expected to be held in Washington sometime this fall. An Examiner's hearing in this case will be held sometime in 1960. A final decision by the CAB is not expected until late 1961.

The application is expected to be supported by all towns that would benefit from the extension of service, according to E. O. Wedgeworth, manager of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce.

The local chamber has an active Aviation Committee, headed by Woodrow Adcock, which plans to put an airline ticket service into operation this fall.

In the play of the hand South won the opening spade lead in dummy and led a spade to his ace. When both opponents followed to that lead he ruffed a spade high, played jack and a small diamond, ruffed another spade with du mmy's last trump and eventually conceded a club trick.





The Doctor Says by EDWIN P. JORDAN, M.D.

Nearly all of us have one or more blemishes of the skin commonly known as moles:

Q-I am 67 years old and have two moles of moderate size on my chest. Even though they have not changed in color or size. I wonder if they could be removed? Would you comment?-H. J. L. A-A mole, also known as a

nevus or birthmark, is a growth

on the skin of congenital origin which comes in many different varieties. This particular question probably refers to one which is black, because of pigment in the tissue. These in turn come in two particular kinds, one which is raised, and the other which is flat. Generally speaking, it is the flat type which is more likely to produce difficulty. Either variety should be watched from time to time for changes in size or color In which case it may be advisable be considered in some instances, particularly if the mole is in a location where it is likely to be irritated by the rubbing of cloth-

ing. Some who have studied the subject believe that when necessary they should be removed by surgery or with an electric needle. Q-My husband, who is 38, has been told he has Paget's disease in his right arm. Would you discuss this?-Mrs. L.

A-This is known also as osteitis sease of the bone in adults. Little is known about its cause, but is diagnosed primarily from an Xray film, although there are somechemical changes in the blood. A specific treatment is lacking. though some have used high calcium diets with the addition of vitamin D. Treatment also includes mechanical methods and measures aimed at alleviating the symp-

Q-I am 42 years old and five months pregnant. What are my chances of having a healthy normal child? I have three other-children from 22 to 14 years old, all of whom are healthy, but have been told that for a woman over 40 to have a baby is suicide. What do you think?-Mrs. R.

A-There are an enormous number of women over 40 who have given birth to perfectly healthy children and it certainly cannot be considered as suicidal. The chances of going through the pregnancy sat-Isfactorily and having a healthy, normal child are favorable. ************


