

Reds Enter City Hall Second Day

BERLIN—(AP)—For the second straight day, belligerent Communist-led demonstrators forced their way into Berlin's city hall today. They broke up a meeting of the anti-Communist city council and immediately tried to substitute a handpicked regime of their own.

Farmers Face Shortage of Storage Space

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A serious shortage of grain storage space threatens farmers with the loss of several hundred million dollars in income this year.

The Agriculture Department estimates the storage shortage at upwards of 1,000,000,000 bushels. It is most acute in the corn belt, where a crop of 3,500,000,000 bushels of this grain alone is nearing the market.

Officials said farmers are likely to suffer losses from deterioration of grain and a drop in market prices below levels promised by the government's support program.

A farmer can get the benefit of the support program for grain only if he has it stored safely. This help is in the form of loans and agreements to buy the grain next year.

If he cannot get commercial storage or does not have acceptable facilities on his farm, the grower is out of luck so far as price support aid is concerned.

His only alternative may be to sell his grain on the market at a price below the support level. Some grain experts predict corn soon will sell from 15 to 25 cents a bushel below the support price of about \$1.45 a bushel.

The vastness of the storage problem can be measured by the fact that this year's indicated production of grain is 1,350,000,000 bushels larger than last year and 1,275,000,000 larger than the average for the past ten years.

And the building of storage facilities has not kept pace with the sharp gain in production. Right now the problem of storing the grain rests principally on the farmer. But next year it may be shifted to the government itself.

It is possible that some 800,000,000 bushels of grain stored under 1948 price support loans will be turned over to the government when those loans fall due next year.

The farmer has the privilege of delivering the grain to the government as full payment for his loan. He usually does this when the market price is at or below the support level.

Officials say they do not know what the government would do with the grain. It has \$10.8 a bushel (See STORAGE, Page 12)

Top o' Texas Fair Will Be Annual Event

Instead of limiting the fair participation to Gray County residents, all interested persons in the Top o' Texas area may now enter exhibits in the annual event, Taylor continued.

Mrs. E. A. Bryant and Mrs. Ralph Thomas, co-sponsors of the textile department, have released rules for the women who participate. They are:

1. Make hems appropriate for style and material.
2. Make button holes.
3. Sew buttons on, using shank.
4. Sew snaps and hooks on with button hole stitch.
5. Have stitches regulated for material.
6. Be sure all pockets do not have raw edges at top. Turn down hem, stitch at top, then turn hem back. Finish top edge.
7. Have trimmings suitable for garment. Never use fancy trimming on work dresses.
8. Cuffs and collars should be put on with bias facing. Never serge in with rest of garment.
9. Press each seam carefully as finished before you go on.
10. Use pads in shoulders of dresses according to style.

The fair will open officially to the public Wednesday, Sept. 23, and will close Sept. 25. Hours each day will be from 2 p. m. until 11 p. m.

Clinic Gets Pampa's 12th Polio Victim

Walter H. Myers, 21-year-old employee of the Cabot Company, is the twelfth case of polio for Pampa. Dr. Julian M. Key, county health officer, said this morning.

Myers was sent to the Plainview polio clinic this morning in a Duaneck-Carmichael emergency ambulance after physicians diagnosed his illness as polio. He was admitted to a local hospital Tuesday, but his illness was not immediately diagnosed.

Residing at 323 S. Russell since Aug. 19, Walter recently returned from Arkansas where he married Wanda Cooper Aug. 16. He worked on his job Saturday making up the time he lost when he went to Arkansas. Mrs. Myers is a Pampa girl. Her parents only recently moved to Arkansas. She plans to go to Plainview today to be with her husband.

Richard Potter, 19-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Potter, 320 N. Perry, was admitted for treatment in the polio ward of the Plainview Sanitarium and clinic Wednesday night. He is the twelfth polio patient there. Myers' case is the eleventh.

Word from the Plainview clinic this morning disclosed there are now 27 polio patients there. Myers will be case 28. The clinic is equipped to care for 30 patients adequately. Many of the Texas polio cases have been sent to the Hendrix Memorial Hospital in Abilene because of the crowded conditions of the Plainview clinic.

All the patients in the polio ward are much improved. Plainview physicians said this morning. Edith Mae Wertz, 27-year-old Dalhart girl, was dismissed yesterday. Also Michael Lettig, eight-year-old boy of Dalhart, and Wayne Douglas Tomlinson, 14-month-old boy from Lubbock, were released this morning.

Governor Pardons County Convict

Governor Beauford Jester yesterday approved the extension of clemency (conditional pardon) to Charles Hefer, former Gray County man, who was convicted here in 1930 in 31st District Court for murder and sentenced to 99 years.

Hefer was sent to the penitentiary for his part in the murder of Homer Crabtree, Lefors cattleman. Crabtree was stomped to death near Lefors over a cattle theft argument.

Hefer's partner in the crime, Emmett Thompson, was tried in Vernon, under the charge of venue statute, and given 15 years for a part there.

He has worked for the Skelly Oil Company for 20 of the 22 years he had lived in Pampa. He was a veteran of the first World War, and was a member of the Sapulpa, Okla., Lodge No. 179, A.F. & A.M.

2ND PRIMARY IS TOMORROW

State, county and precinct candidates tomorrow will go over the last hump in the decisive Democratic runoff of nomination for office that, in most instances, means virtual election.

Tomorrow's vote-grabbing game climaxes a month of feverish activity by candidates seeking the final Democratic nod of approval for office.

The election this time has been petitionless, up to the time of this writing, and no signs of any such instruments as requests for supervisors (watchers) at the polls, or no-campaigning pledges Saturday on the part of candidates, or their friends, has been seen. Prior to the first primary both were widely circulated.

Outwardly, the campaigns for county judge, county commissioner, Precinct 2, were quiet no rallies, pepmeetings, pie suppers or the like—but the candidates themselves buzzed like bees running hither and yon seeking support and votes in the final test of political strength.

Little was heard in Pampa over the lively Precinct 1 commissioner race, but reports coming from Lefors claimed the campaigning was hot in both camps. Alva King is out to win the commissioner's seat from incumbent Joe K. Clarke. Clarke and his allies were battling to keep him on the County Commission's Court.

In the meantime, the Parker Voting boxes for the Gray County Democratic Runoffs tomorrow will be located at the following places: Precinct 1—Lefors School Building; Precinct 2—Baker Building, Pampa; Precinct 3—Andrew School Building; Precinct 4—Bell residence, Alanoed; Precinct 5—Lefors School Building; Precinct 6—Lefors School Building; Precinct 7—Farrington School Building; Precinct 8—Woodrow Wilson School Building; Precinct 9—Court House, Pampa; Precinct 10—Store Building, Kingsmill; Precinct 11—Store Building, Kingsmill; Precinct 12—Store Building, Kingsmill.

Estimates for county judge-waxed warmer by the hour as the ethical deadline to cease campaigning drew closer. Neither was able to go into any heavy campaign spending because their balances for legal campaign expenses were rapidly depleted during the campaign, although both had enough left for a few runoff campaign cards.

The horse-race county commissioner test in Precinct 2 has long been regarded to be a popularity contest between Irving Cole and J. W. "Bill" Graham, both of whom have been successful in handling finances that are comparable to amounts handled by the county.

The probable race for Precinct 2, that would wind up in an upset in the first primary when W. F. "Bill" Langley defeated Carl Tucker as runner-up to incumbent Earl Lewis, wasn't as stormy this time, but still had his share of "straw" votes.

As usual, all liquor stores and bars will have to close shop tomorrow and the Texas Employment office will close its doors during the day.

Estimates of voting interest in this second primary varied; the forecasts running from one-half to two-thirds the number of eligible voters.

Red Hearing Issue Tops in GOP Race

WASHINGTON—(AP)—New signs cropped out today that the Republicans plan to do hard at the Communist-in-government issue in the election campaign.

Senator Revercomb (R-W. Va.), facing one of the hottest senatorial fights in the country, told a reporter he is making a big talking tour of what he calls the administration's failure to root Communists out of the federal service.

In a speech at Keyser, W. Va., the senator declared that "it is not only wrong but certainly is not un-American to take steps to protect America."

President Truman twice has called the Congressional spy investigations a "red herring" intended to take the public mind off the refusal of Congress to adopt his cost-of-living program.

Revercomb is opposed in the November election by Matthew M. Neely, former Democratic senator and representative, who has AFL backing.

Revercomb's employment of the Communist issue is expected to be copied by other Republicans who think the Congressional investigations and the current international arguments with Russia are absorbing a major share of the public's attention.

He was rushed to the Pampa Hospital where X-ray pictures were taken. The shoulder is mangled, but none of the pellets pierced the bone or damaged the shoulder, his physician said.

Robert is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Marion Phillips, Route 5, Wellington.

'Silly' Remedy Cures Hiccups
PASADENA, Calif.—(AP)—A 69-year-old retired building contractor who has been plagued with hiccups for nearly two years at last has found a remedy that works. Theodore L. Svendson had tried all the usual remedies, a spent months in hospitals and had consulted some 60 doctors. But he kept on hiccupping at the rate of about 10 per minute.

Lat Saturday night Joseph W. Lambert, Los Angeles, called on him and tried him to try his remedy. It consisted of bending at the waist and drawing water from the far side of a glass.

Handwriting Expert Called In by Probers

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The House Un-American Activities Committee assigned an investigator today to track down a new report that Alger Hiss and Whittaker Chambers once were interested in the same old farm near Westminster, Md.

The committee also brought in a handwriting expert in an attempt to get to the bottom of the widely different stories the two men have told about their relationship a dozen years ago.

The latest story the spy investigators are trying to run down is that Hiss made a down-payment to a real estate agent on the Maryland farm but lost interest in the property and didn't complete the purchase. Then Chambers was purchased. Then Chambers was purchased and he bought the farm later and his former wife said to have lived there for a while.

Rep. Nixon (R-Calif.) told reporters the committee intends to see if "this is another link in the chain of evidence or just pure coincidence." It is possible, he said, that it is possible the two men were "much more closely connected than previously indicated."

The committee members claimed some success: a sworn statement by ex-Communist Louis Budenz that he always had considered Hiss to be under-party discipline.

Hiss' former top-level State Department official, has heatedly denied any Red tinge. He called Whittaker Chambers a liar Wednesday for telling the committee that Hiss had a leading part in a proffer Communist underground here.

Chambers, self-described former courier for the underground, stuck to his story and said it is Hiss who is lying.

The committee summoned the handwriting expert to check the writing of a William Roscoe against the signature "William Foster" a title transfer of Hiss' old Model A Ford in 1936.

Rosen, 64-year-old native of Australia who runs a valet shop here, testified yesterday at a secret committee meeting. But Rep. McDowell (R-Bra.) said he refused to answer any questions about the Ford transaction or to say whether he ever had had any Communist affiliation.

Chambers, whom Hiss has acknowledged knowing and befriending under another name, claims Hiss wanted the car to be turned over to some poor Communist organizer.

Hiss maintains he simply threw the Ford in on an apartment sub. (See SPY PROBE, Page 13)

Rain Saves Water Supply

A city official said this morning that a rain such as that which fell early today has saved the city from having to ration water several times this summer.

City Manager Steve Matthews said if there is a consistently hot weather for more than about 10 days, the city water pumping system begins to lag in keeping a reserve of water.

The city has used about 3.1 million gallons of water during the peak day this summer, and the reservoirs hold four million gallons. This reserve is necessary for fire protection, and against possible pump failure. No pumps have failed this summer, Matthews said. Another reason there has been no rationing of water.

A rain cuts down on garden, lawn and flower watering. Matthews said, thereby helping the water department appreciably in keeping up its reserves.

The city has called a bond election for next month, when voters will be asked to allow \$500,000 for sewer and water system improvements.

A number of towns in Texas are now, and have been, rationing water, it was said. "We are pretty lucky—if we don't have a pump to go out," Matthews said.

Danny Kaye Wants Return Of Vaudeville

By BOB THOMAS HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — Danny Kaye is campaigning for the return of vaudeville, and if anybody can revive that long-dead art form it's Danny.

"I'd like nothing better than to see a whole chain of vaudeville houses open up across the country," dreamed the fast-tongued, wild-haired comic. Would he play them? I asked.

"Would I play them?" he emphasized. "I look this to mean yes. Danny's enthusiasm for vaudeville stems from his recent date at the Palladium in London, where he seems to have created one of the most noted minor revolutions since Guy Fawkes. The comic glows with such tales as being acknowledged in the English Press as "Our Danny."

"It was out of this world," he continued in his "Happy Times" dressing room. "Only in England could I have found audiences like those. They were mature, com-

prising those who go to legitimate theaters as well as young people. I could play anything for them."

American film theater audiences are different, he said. Primarily a younger crowd, they are not given the higher-brow Kaye routines.

He cited other differences. In England he was often on stage for an hour; here he is limited to 25 minutes (he often takes more) to provide a turnover of attendance. Over there all seats are reserved for the two daily shows at 6 and 8:30 p. m. A performer doesn't see some of the same faces show after show, as often happens in U. S. film houses.

Today's feature: Laughton's ten best. Want to know a distinguished actor's opinion of the ten best films of all time? I hope so, because I have put Charles Laughton to the trouble of selecting his ten favorites.

It's interesting that he picks only one of his own pictures, "Ruggles of Red Gap." His reason: "Because of that unbeatable team—Leo McCarey and Abraham Lincoln."

Here are his other choices: "The Gold Rush" and "The Kid." "It Happened One Night," "39 Steps," "Best Years of Our Lives," "Vaudeville."

Oil Production Hits New Record

TULSA — (AP) — America's crude oil production soared to a daily average of 5,520,428 barrels, a new all-time record, during the week ended Aug. 21, the Oil & Gas Journal reported.

The figure was an increase of 19,090 barrels over the previous week's production and 16,985 barrels more than the previous record of 5,503,730 barrels set for the week ended Aug. 7, 1948.

States reporting increases include: Oklahoma, 4,550 to 428,800; Mississippi, 3,395 to 127,320; Arkansas, 1,800 to 82,825; Colorado, 500 to 47,140.

Declines include Louisiana, off 750 to 481,550. Production was unchanged in New Mexico, 132,960, and Texas, 2,446,600.

PRUNE YEAST BREAD
1 cup coarsely ground prunes
1-2 cake compressed yeast
1 cup lukewarm water
1-2 teaspoon salt
1 egg
5 1-2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
2 tablespoons dark molasses
1-2 cup bran
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
To prepare prunes, cover generously with water and boil 15 minutes. Drain, remove pits, and put through food chopper using coarse knife. Measure 1 cup prunes. Crumble yeast into large bowl. Add water, salt and beaten egg. Stir until yeast is thoroughly dissolved. Add 2 cups flour and beat until smooth. Add molasses, bran, prunes, and melted butter or margarine; stir until thoroughly mixed. Knead in remaining flour. Knead well on floured board. Return to bowl, rub butter or margarine over top, cover, and store in refrigerator several hours or overnight. Turn onto floured board and knead well. Divide dough into two parts and shape into loaves. Place in greased pans and let rise in warm place until almost doubled in bulk. Bake in moderate (350 F.) oven about 45 minutes to 1 hour. Makes 2 small loaves or 1 large loaf and 1 pan roll.

Scarce Turkey Crop Predicted for Fall

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Turkey supplies will be scarcer and prices higher during the coming holiday season, the Agriculture Department forecasts.
This year's turkey crop is the smallest in ten years. It was estimated at 31,710,000 birds, ten percent fewer than last year. Production has dropped each year since the 1945 record crop of 44,221,000 birds.
The department said this decline reflected unfavorable producers' prices in relation to feed and other production costs.

JUMP-SHIFT BIDDING IS A GAME DEMAND

the part of the original bidder. We all know that a jump-shift bid by partner is a game demand bid; but expert players do not always treat that type of bid by the original bidder as an absolute game demand, although I think they should.
In this hand, South has a count of 20 points—three for the king of spades, 10 for the ace-king-queen of hearts and the fifth heart, and seven for the ace-queen-jack of diamonds. He opens the bidding with one heart, and his partner makes the minimum response of one no trump, for which he must have at least 6 points.
In the point-count system, a count of 26 points in the combined hands is needed for game. South has 20 and his partner has advertised at least 6. Therefore South must assure a game contract.
Karpin says in his booklet that a jump-shift rebid by the opening bidder is made on a hand which contains 19 or more points. It is true that with 19 points, if you find your partner with only 6, you will have a combined count of only 25 and occasionally the game will not be made. However, partner's minimum response may be based on 7, 8, or 9 points, so you should not be too pessimistic. South, of course, does not have this problem in today's hand. He knows that the 26 points needed for game are in the combined hands. He bids three diamonds, telling partner that he holds at least 19 points and wants to go to game.
All North has to do is to select the suit, hearts or diamonds, or he could go to three no trump if he had good stoppers in spades or clubs and no support in hearts or diamonds. He selects three hearts and South goes to four hearts.
The only losers in the combined hands are a spade, a diamond and a club.

But Ananias had a cheat and a liar, and his wife was evidently no better. How they came to be members of the Christian community is strange, for it would seem that they had little to gain by joining a small and unpopular group, subject to persecution.
But having professed to be Christians, they were under obligation to act as Christians, though apparently there was no obligation for them to follow the example of Barnabas. What was wrong was their lying and cheating about the matter; and according to the story in Acts they came to a sad end.

Common Ground by E. C. HOILES

"Mass Education" (continued) I have been quoting for the last several issues from the recently revised chapter "Mass Education" by John Ruskard taken from his book "The Bankruptcy of Liberalism" published in 1942.

Commencing with yesterday's article, Mr. Ruskard succeeded so sum up the various objections to public mass education. The objections discussed yesterday were (1) that it tends to throw together a mass by force young people of a high type with the low element, with the resulting degradation of all, and (2) that in our public schools the children become the prey of Humanitarians bent on reshaping the world and society in violation of cosmic laws and as a result are being instructed in economic and social ideas and ideals.

It is not true that work is degrading even for children. On the contrary, it is decidedly ennobling, and children should be helped to develop pride in their ability to be useful."

"4. Recently nation-wide attention has been called to Chicago University, where it was discovered that there is something radically wrong with college education. It is certainly right time that some one in position to be heard should forward and give public notice of the trouble which afflicts not only our colleges but our entire public school system.

It seems to have been a matter of common consent that intellectual and cultural status of a community is properly measured by the cost of its schoolhouses. Throughout the country there has been a race to spend public money on flashy schools. The opinion is general and deeply rooted that without schooling there can be no education, while a diploma showing graduation from a school is a guaranty that the owner is educated up to the limit of the school's curriculum.

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG news behind the news

WASHINGTON — Although the administration's front-line statesmen cannot afford to make such a damaging admission publicly, they have been talking in private about a "cold war" with Russia, which began three years ago after the surrender of Japan, would have to concede that Stalin has won not only preliminary skirmishes but also major battles.

The Marxists, as recent proclamations from Moscow emphasize, never expected to obtain world domination through war except in the final stages. They have always figured that they would swallow capitalist nations by creating economic and political chaos, confusion, privations and by promoting factional dissension within and among the Stalin democracies.

It is in this light that the Kremlin's three-year gains have been analyzed by the more philosophical and penetrating members of Secretary of State Marshall's staff. Although still hopeful that the menace may be checked through an outpouring of American funds and arms during the next few years, they admit that we seem to be losing the struggle.

DISASTER — Stalin himself has told such eminent Americans as Harold E. Stassen, Eric A. Johnston, Joseph E. Davies and even Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith that he anticipates a major economic crackup in the United States within a short time. To other interviewers he has said that his purpose is to accelerate the day of disaster, without war.

That staggering figure does not include the cost of military aid and equipment which we will furnish to Western European nations' mind with useless material, or to spend his time reading anything but the best, and only on the subjects which interest him particularly. An ambitious student will scan a book for what he wants to know, make a note of what he finds worth his attention, and then reread. That is how people become educated. For individuals of that type, schooling is little but waste of time. Brought up thus in companionship with great authors and thinkers, the man of education forms friendships of the most intimate kind. He is never lonely and needs no time-killing entertainment. Whether in the palace or in the novel dressed in gala attire or in rags, he has bosom companions who never fail.

Therein lies the chief value of education. "A person who has become interested in good reading and has discovered where to find it, has been introduced to the best society both past and present."

Pirates Whip Phillies Twice As Kiner Blasts 35th Homer

 Pirates' Kiner's home run was the second in two seasons at Hialeah. Kiner's record of 35 homers is ahead of his own of a year ago when he crashed 31 round-trippers.

Ed Stewart squeezed home Al Kozar with the run that gave the Washington Senators an 8-2 victory over the St. Louis Browns.

ICC Decision On Railroad Not Final

DALLAS - (AP) - An Interstate
Commerce Commission examiner's
recommendation that the Texas
Electric Railway Company be al-
lowed to abandon its interurban
service was held back from becom-
ing final by exceptions filed by a
Dallas packing plant and a trans-
portation union.

ICC Examiner Lucian Jordan
had recommended that the
ICC allow a local United Transpor-
tation Workers, an affiliate of the
CIO Utility Workers of America,
and George A. Hornel and Com-
pany.

The transportation workers ar-
gued that employees should be cut
in on benefits from salvage of the
trackage.

The packing company asked that
service be continued until other
trackage could be run into the
plant, now served exclusively by
TERC.

C. F. McAuff, TERC vice presi-
dent, said the company had no
statement to make. Officials will
await a final ruling from the
ICC on issues left from becoming
final and the exceptions before going
ahead with plans to stop service,
he said.

Western Allied liaison officers at the city hall said nonCommunist assembly leaders will put squarely before the Soviet commandant, Maj. Gen. Alexander Kotikov, a demand that he say whether he will provide police protection to insure an orderly council session.

The Socialist speaker, Otto Suhr, was directed to ask Kotikov to grant a personal interview with a parliamentary delegation. It is understood that if the Russian commandant ignores these requests, the parliamentary majority probably will decide to move to the American sector.

Most of the demonstrators appear to be youths of about 18 or 19 years old. They contrasted sharply with the 10,000-member mob which smashed into the building yesterday, but the effect of their demonstration was the same.

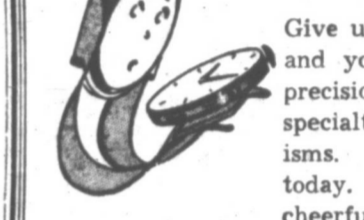
