Robbery Suspect Nabbed

Arrested At Store

Ray Beesley, 32, of Pampa has been positively identified as the robber who took almost \$1,000 from George Gray, 800 E. 10th at 4:47 p.m. yesterday. Police officers who were on duty at the time of the robbery were told by the man entering the store that he was a customer and stayed until two other men entered. He said the man threatened him with a "pinch" and demanded all his money. Gray said the man was wearing a "pinch" and a "jellybean" in the store. While police received a report of a stolen green station wagon from Floyd Voss, a witness name could not be learned. Police saw a man leave the store and drive off in a station wagon fitting the description of the stolen vehicle. A short time later, a man walking to Colburn Chevrolet, 201 E. 10th, was "working" on coin change boxes in the store. He was later seen to leave a station wagon in a green station wagon, and on investigation it was determined the change boxes had been changed on.

Cuban Hits Castro In Resignation

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (UPI) — Cuba's paratroop commander quit his job Monday with blasts at Premier Fidel Castro as a would-be superman and his brother, Raul, as a "vindictive jellybean." It was reported today.

The newspaper La Nacion said Capt. Mandel Rojo del Rio left by air for the United States after mailing a letter of resignation to his superiors in Havana. His present whereabouts were unknown. Like other former supporters of Castro who have turned against his revolutionary regime, Rojo charged that Communists have "sneaked into the Cuban army." Rojo, who came here on leave late last year to visit relatives while a broken leg was mending, said in an interview published by La Nacion that there is something "devilish" about Castro. "He (Castro) thinks of himself as a superman," the Cuban officer said. "There is something diabolical in his eyes that frightens even the bravest man. They reflect madness."

DeGaulle Set For Showdown With Massu

PARIS (UPI) — Paratroop Gen. Jacques Massu issued a carefully worded communique today pledging his loyalty to the chief of the French army in Algeria but not directly to President Charles de Gaulle.

An angry De Gaulle abruptly summoned the major general to Paris for a showdown on whether he was plotting an army-backed anti-De Gaulle uprising in Algeria. Massu was accused of harsh criticism of De Gaulle at a moment when unrest in Algeria was increasing every hour, both among the army and the right-wing French settlers who fear a "sellout."

It was Massu, 51, lean and hawk-faced head of army and civilian affairs in Algeria, who led the May 13, 1958, revolt which swept away the fourth French republic and brought De Gaulle to power. He was quoted this week by a German newspaper as saying the army was wondering if it had made a mistake in backing De Gaulle, hinting at the use of force and accusing him of becoming a leftist. Later he denied making the statements.

Today after a morning-long conference with Armed Forces Minister Pierre Guillaume, Massu again denied the interview and affirmed his loyalty to the Algerian commander-in-chief, Gen. Andre Challe. Massu's third-person statement said "the efforts of General de Gaulle to restore peace in Algeria has conferred on him the confidence of the Moslem masses."

His statement said nothing about the confidence of the European settlers, but in Algeria it was eroding visibly.

Testimony Bad For Friend Of Doctor

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — "It was the first time I had ever seen the girl happy." The witness was convict John Patrick Cody and he was describing the reaction of red-haired Carole Tregoff when she told her he had murdered the wife of Carole's lover, Dr. R. Bernard Finch.

When Miss Tregoff realized that Cody was lying, he said she told him, "Jack, you can back out if you want to. But if you don't do it the doctor will do it. If the doctor doesn't do it, I will do it." The state charges that Carole and the surgeon did murder Mrs. Barbara Jean Finch the night of July 18 outside the Finch home in suburban Los Angeles, with the doctor firing the fatal shot into his wife's back. Cody testified Tuesday that he convinced Carole and Finch he had done the job, collected his \$1,400 fee and blew it all at the dice table in the casinos along the "Strip."

Five Dead At Amarillo In Grinding Car-Train Crash

Doctor, Wife 3 Children; Hit By Chief

AMARILLO (UPI) — Did the clanging bells and blinking lights at the railroad crossing panic Dr. Robert Lee Brown as the Santa Fe Chief highballed toward Amarillo, its whistle shrieking in the cold, crisp air?

That's one of the questions the Department of Public Safety is trying to answer today. The train smashed into the Brown's car at an S-shaped curve, just 200 yards outside the Amarillo city limits Tuesday night and killed Dr. Brown, 37, a prominent veterinarian, his wife Dorothy, 34, and two of their three children, David, 6, and Robert Jr., 9. Sharon, 11, died early this morning after brain surgery. She stopped breathing twice during the operation, then finally died at 12:40 a.m.

The train, traveling 79 miles per hour, was en route from San Francisco to Chicago when it crushed the car and hurled bodies and twisted wreckage 200 yards down the track.

An air of mystery surrounds the accident. Engineer W. W. Wheeler said he saw the car pull up to the crossing and pause, then just before the train arrived, it lurched forward.

"There wasn't a thing I could do," Wheeler said. Patrolman Fred Lenz of the DPS said Dr. Brown might have been too close to the tracks and the blinking lights and bells as the safety bar dropped across the right side of the road may have panicked him.

"His foot may have hit the accelerator, or he may have tried to back up but put the car in the wrong gear and shot forward," Lenz said. "He may have gotten caught underneath the gate as it dropped, or he may have passed it on the left side. There wasn't a scratch on the gate."

It was also learned the DPS was investigating the possibility the accident was no accident, but officers declined to comment on this theory.

Initially, at the time of the accident city officials were meeting with representatives of the State Highway Department completing plans to build an overpass at the crossing.

Dr. Brown and his family recently moved back to this area from Wycotte, N. J., where he had been employed with a drug firm. He joined Dr. J. L. Markham in a veterinary clinic at Canyon, Tex., about 20 miles south of Amarillo.

Before moving to New Jersey, he operated a clinic with his two brothers, Dr. Dean Brown and Dr. Joe H. Brown, at Amarillo.

The crash site was in a high mountain valley, at about 8,000 feet altitude. Royal Air Force and American mountain rescue teams headed for it immediately.

The plane, a Martin-Mercator twin-engine patrol craft, was on a flight from Naples, Italy, to Adana, Turkey.

If the wreckage is that of the missing plane, it will mean two major plane crashes occurred in Turkey Tuesday night with the possible loss of 56 lives.

A Scandinavian Airlines Caravelle jet crashed at Ankara Airport in a fog, killing 42 persons including one American. Officials were reported checking the possibility that the Turkish control tower and the plane crew made twin errors to cause the crash.

The twin-jet Caravelle, banking for a gentle curving approach to Esenboga airport, snagged its right wing on a low hill within sight of the airport and exploded on impact with such force the clothes were ripped from the victims. It caught fire immediately.

Pegler Files For Divorce
TUCSON, Ariz. (UPI) — Columbus Westbrook Pegler, 65, filed for divorce Tuesday, complaining his 47-year-old wife for nine months harassed him and prevented him from sleeping.

Pegler, a syndicated newspaper columnist who makes his home here, married the former Pearl E. Doane last May 11. It was his second marriage and her third. Both her previous marriages ended in divorce. Pegler's first wife died in 1955.

ANKARA, Turkey. (UPI) — Wreckage believed to be that of a missing U.S. Navy plane with 18 persons aboard was sighted today in the snow-dusted Taurus Mountains of Turkey.

There was no immediate report of either signs of life or bodies near the wreckage.

Coronado Inn Opened With Formal Banquet

The end became the beginning last night at the formal opening banquet and dance at Pampa's \$1,250,000 Coronado Inn. Long years of hard work were brought to an end, and a plan set in motion as the first guests filled the rooms of the new hotel.

Jeff Williams, banquet speaker from Chickasha, Okla., and nationally known humorist, said early in his talk, "This hotel marks a corner-turning in the future of Pampa." He brought the subject of his speech into play when he then remarked that all and sundry "should worry about this community hotel, worry and work for its success." His topic was "Worry — But Don't Go Nuts."

The overflow crowd, the majority of them workers in the drive to build the hotel, were told that the Coronado Inn was no accident of good fortune. Williams said, "Men, not accidents of geography, build communities. And that is what you are doing here."

"One step won't take you there," he cautioned, "you've got to keep walking — one word won't keep you enough, you have to keep on talking — one inch is not tall enough, you have to keep on growing — one deed is insufficient, you must keep performing."

If Kennedy runs, he will test his strength in the Midwestern territory of Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.), who already has thrown his hat in the Wisconsin ring.

Kennedy's brother, Robert, had advised against entering Wisconsin's primary and Kennedy was known to agree with his brother that such a race against Humphrey would be "tough."

Dixie Demos May Bolt At Party Meeting

JACKSON (UPI) — A possible 1960 party bolt by southern Democrats was shaping up today.

Dorens of top southern politicians expressed agreement with comments on national politics made Tuesday by Ross Barnett following his inauguration as governor of Mississippi.

"In the past we have had experiences in our relationship with the party," said Barnett, a 61-year-old militant segregationist. "We have seen nothing that would indicate that future experiences will be any different."

He recommended the Mississippi party convention reassemble after the national convention picks a candidate to "determine the proper course of action."

Barnett departed from his prepared speech to say: "Thanks for what looks to me like southern unity crystallizing right here in Jackson, Mississippi today."

His audience included Gov. John Patterson of Alabama, Gov. Ernest Hollings of South Carolina, Gov.-elect Jimmie Davis of Louisiana, and lesser officials from throughout the South.

Scandal Rocks Staid Old Yale

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (UPI) — A 14-year-old girl and a telephone have put six Yale undergraduates in the position of being little black sheep who have gone astray.

The 14-year-old received a phone of her own for her birthday. One of the calls she made errantly connected her with a Yale dormitory. Neither party hung up.

That mischance call has led to a scandal which has rocked Yale from Mory's restaurant to President A. Whitney Griswold's office.

Six undergraduates have been charged with "lascivious carriage" in connection with two alleged incidents when the girl visited Calhoun College following the telephone call. Twelve other have resigned from the university and more arrests are expected.

Detective Capt. William F. Holoman, of the New Haven police, said the "alleged intimacies" occurred at Calhoun College, but students from other colleges in the university were reported involved.

The girl identified the undergraduates from their pictures in the Yale year book, Holohan said. One of the students charged was Stephen White, 19, of Paterson, N.J. His father, William B. White, principal of East-Side High School in Paterson, said his son denied being involved in any incidents.

Killed As Plane Crashes Turkey

ANKARA, Turkey (UPI) — A Scandinavian Airlines Caravelle jet-passenger plane banking a gentle approach to Esenboga airport snagged its right wing on a low hill Tuesday night and wheeled to earth with a fiery crash that killed 41 of the 42 passengers.

The second plane, a U.S. Navy C-119, was feared to have crashed near Adana, Turkey, 250 miles southeast of Ankara, with persons aboard. NATO planes on a search at dawn for the patrol craft which last landed in 50 miles from Adana on routine flight from Naples.

The crash of the U.S. Navy plane would be the third air disaster in two days, bringing the toll to a possible 107 lives. Fifty jets were killed Monday night in the crash of a Capital Airlines jet Viscount near Holdcroft.

The weather was nearly perfect as the SAS Caravelle, named Orm Viking, made its slow approach to Esenboga, the airport which President Eisenhower led on his trip to Turkey. The crash was 8:40 p.m. and visibility was good.

An air traffic control officer at Esenboga was watching the approach over the low and rolling hills which ring the airport. The plane completed its turn around the airport and was coming in, he said.

At that moment we saw a strong flash of light appear several kilometers (a mile and a half) west of the airport and the plane's radio immediately became silent."

Milady's Spring Suit Features Seven Types

NEW YORK (UPI)—The suit, classic portion of a woman's wardrobe, comes in several popular versions for spring, 1960. Members of the New York Couture Group featured at least seven suit types in collections being shown this week to visiting fashion reporters. They are: The soft suit, with small collar edged away from the neckline and an eased fit to the jacket. The costume suit, with accompanying print blouse and jacket lined in the same fabric. The Chanel suit, named for the French designer, Gabrielle Chanel, who first popularized the casual, cardigan jacket. It comes with an overblouse or tuck-in shirt. The fitted jacket suit, with three, four or five buttons closing the single-breasted front. The double breasted suit, usually with jacket reaching only to the waist, worn with pleated skirt. The suit with the wide neckline, an open area providing a

setting for many strands of pearls, bib necklace or scarf; the jacket is cropped at the waist. Suit jackets come in three lengths—those that skim the waist, hug it, or cover the upper hipbone. Sleeve lengths range from a chilly, above-elbow to bracelet-length, leaving bare enough of the forearm to show jewelry. Most skirts are narrow, but each collection includes a few suits with skirts flared, gored, or pleated. Here are highlights from the seven manufacturers who showed Monday: Maurice Rentner—Designer Bill Blass featured the cupola silhouette for daytime and dress-up. The cupola suits had a rounded look at the top—jackets with dropped shoulders, sleeves molded into a dome, small collars. Dresses were given a rounded look at the top with the dome sleeve for day; but for cocktail hours, the top of the dress was slim, the skirt full. Branel—The top-heavy look showed in cape collar treatments for slim dresses and costumes. Typical was a slim dress of black and white check wool, with patent leather belt, double row of buttons up the front, and wide collar almost a cape in its dimensions. Harvey Berin—For daytime, the major silhouette was the pencil slim "walking stick" dress, a classic with this firm; the figure-hugging dress is cut with small rounded collar or narrow band-collar, standing away from the neck. Originals—This coat house featured silhouettes straight to moderately full. Braid trimmed several cardigan coats—one of them flame red with black. A new fabric is a wide-ribbed wool jersey, which can be crumpled and still emerge wrinkle-free. Edward Abbott—Slim dresses molded through the midriff, and with flaring or cape-style sleeves, shoulder—extending collars and necklines. B. H. Wragge—New colors and fabrics highlighted the works of

designer Sydney Wragge. He introduced "sun tan," a blend of burnished gold and bronze, and safari silks, all handwoven in India. Adele Simpson—This collection, highly wearable from its classic wool and silk suits to its floral prints, included an old favorite—the coat dress. Each had a wider look through the shoulders from use of capelets, fichus or big sleeves.

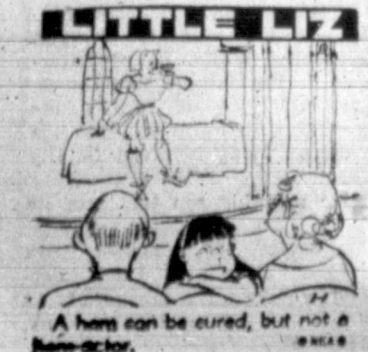

When Julie's younger brother was given his sled last Christmas, he was forbidden to use it on a certain steep hill favored by local daredevil tobogganers. Yesterday, passing Long Hill, Julie recognized Doug's familiar red stocking cap in the crowd of big boys hauling their sleds back up the icy slope. On her arrival home she reported his disobedience. When Doug was told it would cost him a week's use of his sled, he got furious at his sister. Calling her a "rotten squaler," he said she made him "so sick at his stomach" that he wouldn't sit beside her at the dinner table. Julie pretended that his accusation didn't trouble her. But it did. Joining her sisters as she dried the dishes, her mother said: "Doug thinks you told on him to get him into trouble. Maybe he's wrong. Maybe you tattled on him to keep him out of trouble. If so, why don't you tell him so?" Later Julie did. She marched upstairs to Doug's closed bedroom door, knocked, and shouted through it: "Hey, you're crazy! I'm not a rotten squaler! I told on you because I didn't want you to break your leg like Howie Morrison did on Long Hill last winter." At breakfast the next day, Doug resumed his usual place by his sister at the table. All children do not tattle on each other out of spitefulness. If they do tattle out of spitefulness, it's only for one reason. They've been given cause to expect their parents to deliver spiteful punishment to the offending child. They know that our gods retaliate; punishment from us—and want their brother or sister to be on the receiving end of it. But if the tattling child has cause to trust our discipline as just, he knows he's delivering his misbehaving brother or sister to instructive rather than retaliating action. Under these circumstances, he should be encouraged to reject the bad name, "squaler."

Texas Tech's Home Economic School Plans All-Cotton Vogue Fashion Show

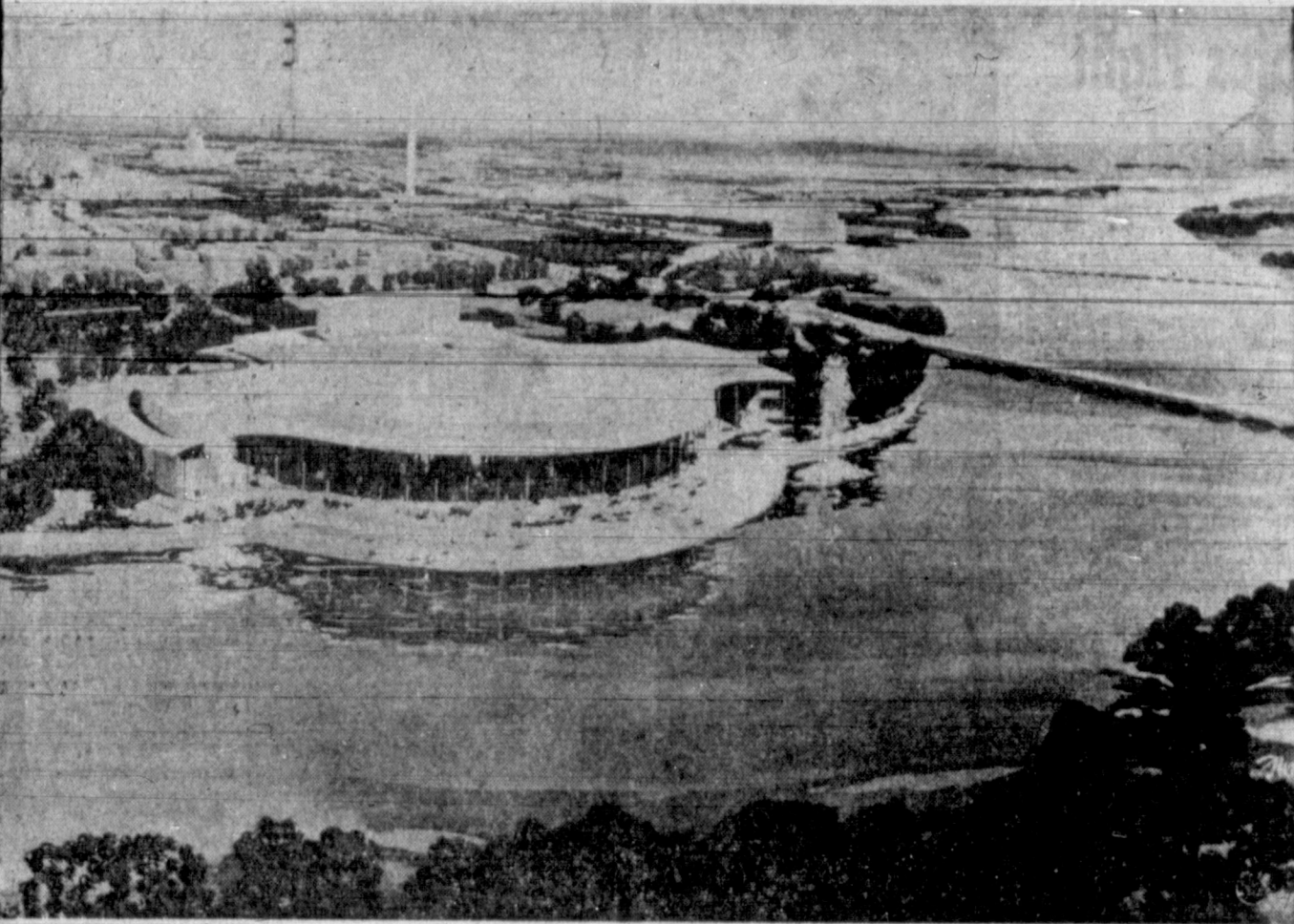

Democrats As Guests On Ike Foreign Trip Seems Unlikely

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower it seems is likely to reject demands that he take along Democrats on his foreign travels, particularly his June trip to Russia.

The White House announced that the Chief Executive, who flew back late Sunday from a quiet hunting weekend in southwest Georgia, would make a 10-day visit to the Soviet Union June 10-19.

Assistant Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield (Mont.) immediately suggested that Eisenhower invite Chairman J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to accompany him on the Russian journey.

Mansfield and former President Truman also want Democrats included in the Eisenhower party at the May East-West summit meeting in Paris.

On the Russian trip, Mansfield said, it also might be a good idea to include Sen. Alexander Wiley (R-Wis.), ranking Republican member of the Foreign Relations Committee.

By inviting leading members of the Senate to the summit and to Russia, Eisenhower would insure "continuity in foreign policy," Mansfield declared.

Administration officials took a dim view of Mansfield's proposal. They noted that past Democratic presidents, notably Franklin D. Roosevelt and Truman, took no Republican senators with them on their foreign trips.

Plans for the state visit to Russia were announced simultaneously in Moscow and Albany, Ga., where Eisenhower spent a hunting weekend at the Blue Springs plantation of W. Alton Jones, board chairman of the Cities Service Oil Co.

Details of the Russian trip will be announced later. The only city currently on his itinerary is Moscow.

PARIS (UPI)—Runaway New York heiress Gambia Benedict today wrote a blunt four-word epitaph to her brother's efforts to persuade her to leave her married boy friend and return home.

To Be Judged By Its Weight Or Content?

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower's new budget is a good book to curl up with on a rainy afternoon — if you need exercise. But I wouldn't recommend it for reading.

I mean this is no volume to be taken lightly. Even in a supine position you can get a vigorous workout just lifting the tome of your tummy to turn the pages.

Each year when the President sends his budget to Congress, I assume the burden of inspecting it from a physical, rather than a fiscal, standpoint.

In times past, the first thing I did was weigh it. But this has become impractical.

The postal scales in our office only register up to four pounds and for the past two or three years the budget has exceeded this limit.

I did determine, however, that the President was able to cram more money into less space this year. For fiscal 1960, it took him 1,027 pages to explain how the government intended to spend 77 billion dollars.

For fiscal 1961, he managed to fit plans for spending \$79,800,000,000 into only 952 pages.

I guess this is what the economists mean when they talk about "tight money."

Tight or loose, money should be more plentiful in the new fiscal year. The U. S. Mint, according to the budget, plans to turn out two billion coins, an increase of 100,000 over current production.

Unfortunately, almost half of the new supply will be pennies. The Mint, incidentally, reports that it will cost more to make money in fiscal 1960. Its budget for penny production has gone up from 93 to 97 cents per thousand.

I don't like to quibble over small change, but a couple of things in the budget puzzled me. For instance, the President asked Congress to raise postal rates but didn't increase the congressional stamp budget. What he did increase was the stationery budget.

I can't figure out how our Congressmen are going to write more letters and pay more for stamps with the same amount of money. I also am a little worried about the Supreme Court's budget and its troubles with dirty birds.

Last year, the court asked for \$35,000 to buy an "electronic bird elimination system." With thousands of starlings roosting on the court every night, "bird elimination" is a big problem.

For some reason, Congress didn't appropriate the funds and this year, for some reason, the court

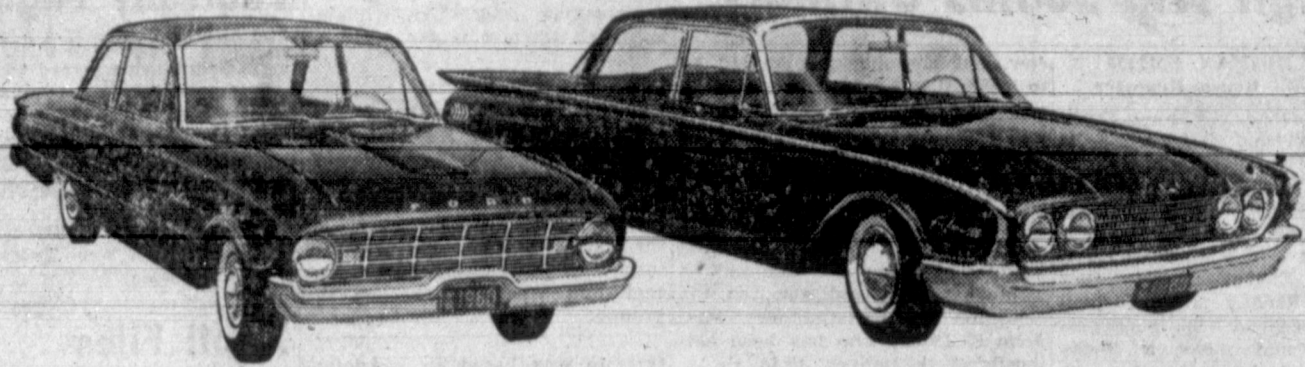

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UPI)—U.S. Veterans Administrator Sumner G. Whittier announced the successful tests which restored the use of nerves and muscles paralyzed by strokes. Whittier said the tests were conducted at the Veterans Administration hospital at Durham, N.C., and that "results were rated as excellent or satisfactory in 20 of the 27 cases and even in the seven others there was some improvement." The VA administrator said the method consisted of "a series of electrical impulses applied to the arms 10 times a minute for a half-hour at a time, twice daily, plus the patients' mightiest efforts to move, if only a fraction of an inch, his paralyzed arms." Whittier made the disclosure at a forum in preparation for the White House conference on aging, scheduled next January. Whittier said the experiments at Durham involved 27 patients whose average age was "well in the fifties." He said all of them had been suffering from paralysis for at least four weeks. "Some of the patients," he said, "had not moved their arms for a year, two years, and suddenly, this miracle of motion."

Rabies Fight Instituted

ROSEBUD, Tex. (UPI)—Dr. A. B. Rich, director of veterinary public health for the Texas Department of Health, called for a program of wildlife reduction to help stem a rabies epidemic in four Central Texas counties. He met with county commissioners from Milam, Falls, Robertson and Bell. The four counties are plagued with rabid foxes and skunks. "The situation is acute and calls for emergency control measures," Dr. Rich said. "These counties are running a grave risk of having a dog rabies epidemic, which of course almost always is followed by human exposure to rabies." The county commissioners plan to hold public meetings in each of their respective counties to plan emergency control measures. "This will put the matter into county jurisdiction," Rich said. "The county health officer will have authority to institute a vaccination program for dogs and impoundment of strays." Dr. Robert M. Tiltworth, a veterinarian from Cameron, estimated that at least a dozen cases have been lost in the past two months because of rabies. One Rosebud rancher said he has lost a cow and two calves in the past 15 days. "We don't know the exact source of infection, but statistics show mostly wildlife rabies at this time," Dr. Rich said.

Hydrofoil Ship Talked

WASHINGTON (UPI) — government hopes to launch in 18 months a passenger that will skim across the water with the aid of "water wings," twice the speed of the fastest ocean liners. The Maritime Administration disclosed the tentative June launching date Monday in announcing it had signed a contract for construction of the ship. The vessel, to carry up to 100 passengers, would make use of hydrofoils, wing-like structures protruding downward from under the ship's hull. As the ship's propeller lifts thrust, the hydrofoils will lift hull out of the water so that vessel, freed of water resistance, can skim the surface at speed and with little pitching tossing. The newly designed 80-ton vessel will travel at 60 to 80 knots, officials are optimistic that a knot vessel is possible. Existing ocean liners generally maintain about 30 knots.

FBI Succeeded On Apalachin Deal When Chips Were Down

WASHINGTON (UPI)—When the chips were down in the trial of 20 delegates to the Apalachin hoodlum convention, it was the Federal Bureau of Investigation that came up with most of the evidence. U. S. District Judge Irving Kaufman in New York laid out sentences of from three to five years. The mob was found guilty of no more than conspiracy to refuse to talk and thus to protect themselves by withholding from the government the purpose of their Apalachin meeting. The nature of the crime alleged put the matter within FBI jurisdiction. It is not generally understood that the authority for the areas of investigation by the FBI are precisely defined and limited by law or executive order. Congress enacted a law after the kidnaping of the Lindbergh baby to authorize the FBI to act in kidnap cases. Kidnaping is one of 46 items within FBI jurisdiction by act of Congress or executive order. The list ranges from anti-trust investigations to enforcement of the Mann Act which forbids the interstate transportation of a female for prostitution, debauchery or other immoral purposes. The FBI got into the Apalachin case because it is the U. S. and other payments to individuals — totaled a record \$380,100,000.

Pastrano, Luedee Meet In TV Bout

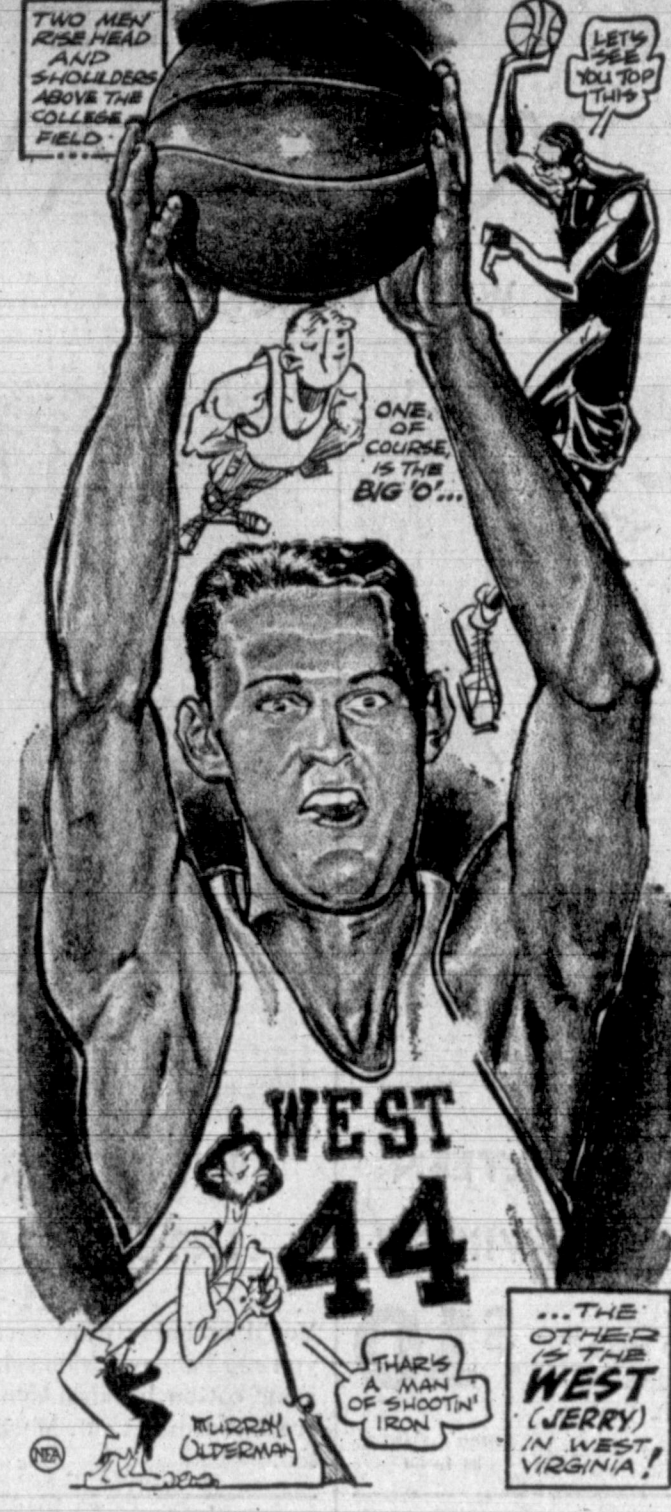

Harvesters Three Games Out After Tuesday's 52-48 Loss

AMARILLO — Palo Duro's Dons dealt Pampa's District 3-4A championship hopes a virtual death blow here Tuesday night, by whipping the Harvesters, 52-48.

The Dons took charge in the last quarter and led all the way through that period, to win a game which had previously been tied 11 times, and in which the lead had changed hands eight times.

The loss, Pampa's third in district play by less than five points, left the Harvesters with a 2-3 District 3-4A record, three full games behind Borger and two games behind Palo Duro and Plainview.

Borger defeated Lubbock Tuesday night, 62-52, to boost its district mark to 5-0. Plainview edged Amarillo in double overtime, 62-60, to remain tied with Palo Duro for second place, with a 3-1 record. In the only other district game, Monterey nipped Tascosa, 40-39.

Apparently, only a complete collapse by Borger, a split in the Plainview-Palo Duro series, and a nine-game Pampa winning streak could salvage the Harvesters' hopes now.

Pampa could, however, aid its cause somewhat with victories in

its next two games — at Plainview Friday night and with Borger at Pampa Tuesday.

Last night's game was strictly a "shooting match" between two fast-breaking teams, with Palo Duro being a little bit "faster on the draw."

After a neck-and-neck battle for the first three quarters, and a 41-41 tie going into the fourth, Palo Duro took the lead and kept it in the final period.

A jump shot by Bill Kliser and a drive-in layup by John Hover put Palo Duro ahead, 45-41, but a layup by Craig Winborn of Pampa cut the gap to 45-43. Steve Carter, however, hit a jump shot and widened the Dons' margin, to 47-43.

The signing of the U. S. - Japanese security pact out of the Japanese Prime Minister's office in Tokyo must come to a halt with another pressing problem - what to do about Red

A large part of Japanese pleasure in the new pact stems from the fact that it makes Japan an equal partner of the United States, a sovereign status not achieved since World War II.

The hostile demonstration by Communist Japanese youths upon the departure from Washington of the loudspeaker of Japanese states also illustrate that the treaty is not universally popular.

Hostile extremists youths follow the Communist Party and therefore would oppose a close link with the United States.

Socialists, many of whom are anti-United States, feel the pact draws Japan away from the area of greatest interest, Asia, and renders more difficult the establishment of friendly relations with Red China. Pressure for closer ties with China is both political and economic, and is not limited to extremists.

Senior adviser in Kishi's own Liberal Democratic party, Kenzo Sumitomo, recently returned from an extended tour of China and warned the regime will be "a mighty force within five or 10 years." He did not face up to the real Communist China today is awakening nation," he declared. "It is not wise to expect her from international dealings."

Japanese businessmen also look on the pact with some concern. Before the war, some 20 per cent of Japan's exports went to the United States and 10 per cent of her imports came from there.

Japanese trade with Red China is in a comparative trickle, the balance running against Japan.

In contrast, Japanese U. S. trade runs to approximately a billion dollars annually, about equally divided between imports and exports. Counting U. S. military and other expenditures, the balance is on Japan's side.

Nevertheless, the desire for trade with Red China lingers on, and actually could become strong enough to oust Kishi from his job. Deciding what to do about China, Japan also must decide what to do about the Nationalist Chinese government on the mainland. Red China has made recognition a condition for establishing trade ties with the mainland.

But to recognize Peking as the official Chinese government would mean to withdraw it from Taipei, and Kishi is unwilling to take that step. Another firm friend of the United States.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Democratic National Chairman Paul Butler has issued a formal call for the party's 1969 convention.

Butler included in the call a reminder that delegates must promise to try to get party nominees on their state ballots.

He also noted that the committee had approved a revised plan for allocating votes at the convention.

The convention will open at 8 p. m. e.s.t. July 11 in the Los Angeles Memorial Sports Arena, "for the purpose of selecting the president and vice president of the United States of America, adopt and promulgate a platform and to take such other action with respect to any other matters as the convention may deem advisable."

Soviet Finds Budget Disappointing

LONDON (UPI) — Moscow radio Tuesday called President Eisenhower's budget for the coming fiscal year "disappointing" because military allocations "are reduced at all."

In a mildly worded commentary read in English at North American listening stations, the Communist radio said "certain cold war interests are trying to freeze the war high level of arms competition."

The broadcast further charged: "You can't reinforce the peace by intensively preparing a nuclear and rocket war."

This was an apparent reference to increased outlays for missiles in the new budget.

Castro Attacks Bring Relations With Cuba To Their Lowest Point

HAVANA (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro's new attacks on the United States and such leading officials as Vice President Richard M. Nixon appeared today to have brought U.S.-Cuban relations to the lowest point in years.

In a radio broadcast Monday, Castro described Nixon as "insolent" and said the U.S. attitude toward Cuba was "excessive and insulting."

Both comments stemmed from American protests against seizure of U.S.-owned property in Cuba by Castro's land reformers, Nixon said in a recent speech that Cuba had adopted a policy of "confiscation without compensation."

The Premier assailed Cubans "who applauded a foreign ambassador in movie houses"—an apparent reference to the enthusiastic reception accorded newsreel shots of U.S. Ambassador Philip Bonsal's recent return from Washington.

Castro said he will go on the air again soon to present "important documents" purporting to prove that "a foreign embassy" is taking part in an alleged campaign of "provocation against Cuba."

Cuba." He gave no details.

The bearded leader appeared on the radio show for the specific purpose of receiving a \$25,000 check for arms purchases from commentator Jose Pardo Llada. Pardo said the money was contributed by listeners.

"We are ready to fight," Castro said. "The arms are for the defense of our sovereignty, but the important thing is that behind each gun is a man ready to defend the country."
