What Are The 'Work' Rules?

No. 2
In the last issue I was quoting Frank Chodorov's article on "The Controversial 'Work Rules'" that are one of the primary causes of the steel strike. The last is-sue quoted Mr. Cooper of United States Steel Corp. as saying: ". , if the company wants to realign work or change methods without installing new equipment, it is usually denied that right." Then Mr. Chodorov continues as fol-

lows:
"In a highly complicated plant there are ever so many alterations in methods that suggest themselves to observation and study, and which in the aggregate can effect more savings than many improved pieces of machinery. Just how much can be saved in costs by the free introduction of such changes in the steel business it would be impossible to guess; probably improvements which supervisors have thought of and have dropped because of anticipated union resistance are more important than those management has been prevented from introducing. At any rate, the strong position the comof 'work rules' indicates that the possible savings amount to big

"One of the 'work rules' which has been widely publicized is that applying to the operator of a crane which lifts a kettle of molten steel. Because of the intense heat in the cabin of this crane, the company years ago gave the operator a relief man. When the cabin was air-conditioned the need for the extra worker disappeared, but the union insisted that he be retained - and obstruct I the change by filing a grievance. The issue was settled n favor of the company - but only after two years of argu-

"In one plant, the men were allowed to take time off for coffee whenever the operation on which they were working stopped, which was periodically. Later the operation was made continuous, and the company suggested that the men take their coffee breaks individually, rather than en masse, as they had been doing. The suggestion met with fero-

cious resistance. "After the war one company put a crew of fourteen elderly men on a day maintenance job. Some of the men eventually died and the company found that they could get along without a crew of fourteen; also that the work, which was easy, could best be done at night. The union insisted

that those who died had to be replaced and that the crew must be employed during the day.

"A particularly dirty job en closing for cleaning up. Later the dirtiness was eliminated from the work. Nevertheless, the men insisted on taking their showers on company time. Their claim

Featherbedding "The seniority rules are especially pernicious. When a change in an operation means the elimination of one man, and he is transferred to some other department, he automatically loses the seniority privileges and prerogatives he has built up; even though he takes no cut in wages, he starts at the bottom rung in the new department. Of course the union will not tolerate this

demotion. How many men are for that reason retained on iobs where they are absolutely useless, non - productive, is hard to estimate. The wages they draw and to the cost of production and are reflected in the price of the commodity. "Union leaders are in characwhich inconvenience their mem-

THE D.A.C.'S DANGEROUS PROPOSALS

The Democratic Advisory Council, at its recent meeting in New York City, advocated new federal spending, which if approved by Congress, would leave the arerage citizen without a dollar in his wallet.

In a massive attack upon the sound money program of the Eisenhower Administration, the Council called for a huge expansion in government spending for welfare. To facilitate this spending it wants to abolish the monetary curbs which provide firm money discipline of the Treasury and Federal Reserve Board. It wants greatly eased credit restrictions, which add up to one thing: inflation.

The range of programs recom mended by the Council is so wide that it is hard to believe sane men believe they could be put into effect without impairing the nation's economy. That's not an exaggeration. The Council proposes the creation of a federal agen cy to promote appreciation of music. It also proposed that federal funds be spent to train psychiatrists and that their services be made available to every citizen who believes he has need of such service.

Frankly, anyone who believes that the country can afford such absurd spending programs must be in need of psychiatric help, Just look at some of the things the Council advocated: Federal spending for communi

ties that want to integrate their public schools: federal spending for the housing of "moderate income' families; federal spending for air purification and recreation, and federal spending to "cure" juvenile delinquency and to educate adults. The Democratic Advisory Coun

cil also proposed, among other things, that more federal power projects be authorized, that foreign aid be increased because "the responsibility of this age has fallen upon us," establishment of seashore recreational areas, and "help" for farmers by means of direct income supplements. Topping the list of welfare plans

is a proposal that free medical care be provided for the whole body of social security beneficiaries. There also would be a 30 per cent hike in social security payments and large-scale federal housing for elderly persons.

The precise cost of these grandiose proposals cannot be readily ascertained. But it is obvious that they would place on the taxpaying public burdens such as have never been known or imagined. Such colossal federal spending also would have the effect of creating the biggest inflation in the history of the modern world. Even if only a handful of these spend ing proposals were enacted into law, the result wuld be a terrifying erosion of the value of the gollar. Thus the result of the D.A.C. proposals would not be help for poorer citizens but mass impoverishment by sudden infla-

tion of prices. It is tragic that highly placed Americans would tell their fellowcitizens that what they are urging are "benefits." The D.A.C. "benefits" would simply strip the country of the stable dollar that is the protection of all groups. One can only hope that the good common sense of the American. people will make them realize that Federal "benefits" are the most expensive presents they can receive and deny them opportunity to grow and prosper within a free economy. But the Democratic Advisory Council is assuming that most of the people can be

fooled most of the time. It should be remembered and remembered thankfully by all Deniocrats - that the D. A. C. is a self-constituted body which has assumed unto itself oracular staius whatsoever within the Democratic party.

The Weekly Message

Of Inspiration

"Which of the two did the will of his father? They said, The first."

We are amazed at the number of times Jesus told a short story in order to illustrate a spiritual truth. Here is the parable of the two sons who were commanded to work in the vineyard. The first one refused, but later repented, and went and did as his father requested. The second son was more polite. He said that he would work, but failed to go. Jesus then asked which of the sons had done the will of his father. Of course the answer was obvious. Words were not enough, but the one who had actually put in the day's labor had fulfilled the obligation.

Let us take note that in our modern age making promises which are not fulfilled is a common characteristic. We have put so much emphasis on personal relation - getting along with people - that it seems better to many of us to say "yes" even though we have no intention of fulfilling the request. The number of people who are dependable is in the minority. Nowhere is this more apparent than in the church. Christianity to many people is little more than a vague sentiment of good will, no discipline and no real obedience given. We are a generation which says "yes" to God when all the time our actual practices are saying "NO".

It is obedience that leads us down the road to real joy and satisfaction in the Christianity life. The first son was at least honest and did not intend to promise what he was not going to fulfill. It was only after much thought that he saw that he had not treated his father very well, and that he owned him a day's labor in the vineyard. Out of his obedience he found the way to a right relationship with his father. He discovered the real test of a man's life. The test of obedience. Jeus always stopped men when they sought to please him with flattery. Always his emphasis was upon doing the will of the Heavenly Father. A person may be regarded as respectable in his society, but the ultimate test in our Lord's teachings was upon obedience. If our modern critics regard us as having too much doing in our Christianity, then the answer is that doing is at the very heart of the Gospel as it was taught by Christ.

Christianity is a venture. It is a way of life which means that is has demands and obligations. It has standards to which we must be loyal and values which we must accept as our own. For many of us it will demand giving up what we planned for ourselves, and going to work in the vineyard of our Father. The easy going Christianity of the Second son will not do, and the Father will not be content with such a response. There is a price to be paid and a faith which demands the courage to venture forth for God.

But the result of a complete response is experience. In the Gospel of John we find these words, "If any man will do His will, He shall know of the doctrine, whether it be of God or whether I speak of myself." (John 7'17). Thus, in this one statement of Jesus, we are told that the experiences which come to men are the fruit of DOING. If a man says to us that he will follow Christ after he has found the answer to all his questions about Him. We are forced to say that he will never be a follower. Christ's way of life is an experiment, and only when we follow Him obediently do we come to experience the joy

and victory which he promised. "And Samuel said, Hath the Lord as great delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices, as in obeying the voice of the Lord? Behold to obey is better than sacrifice, and to hearken than the fat of rams." (I Samuel 15'22).




