Weather Whether Or Not Bone Chilling All Over State

A bone chilling north wind sent temperatures below freezing in most of Texas today. Far Northeast Texas remained almost paralyzed from an ice storm that toppled power lines and tree limbs.
"It was about as cold as it's been this year over most of the state," meteorologist Gilbert Pitts, of the Fort Worth Weather Bureau, said. Temperatures slid to freezing or below freezing as far south as San Antonio, which recorded 32 degrees. The low in the state was 14 at Amarillo. At Dallas, north of Amarillo, the mercury went down to 1 above. It was 1 above at Shamrock, 15 to 20 miles an hour north winds swept the state. The end wasn't in sight for the biggest episode of cold weather of winter. It's going to get even colder, Pitts said. Temperatures were expected to

Pestilence Threat In Quake Ruins

AGADIR, Morocco (UPI) — Crown Prince Moulay Hassan ordered rescue work to stop in the pestilence threatened ruins of Agadir and demolition work to begin at once. This meant death to any of the living trapped in the rubble.
Rescue teams of many nations were picking through the ruins in hopes of finding a few more alive in the devastated city where 5,000 to 6,000 were believed to have met death when an earthquake hit Monday night.

It's Back To Gilded Salt Mine For Paar

NEW YORK (UPI) — Jack Paar returned to town Wednesday night and NBC put him back on his \$100,000 job.
He was greeted at the airport on his arrival here from a three-week self-imposed exile from his late night show by NBC officials and fans wearing "welcome back Jack" buttons.
"I'm glad to be back, but I'm not dancing in the street," Paar said of his reception. He had hurried off his show Feb. 11 because the network cut out a joke it thought was objectionable.
"I'm sorry about the whole thing," Paar said as the final word. He will take over his show Monday night.
Paar's vacation sulk had taken him to Florida, San Francisco, Honolulu and Hong Kong, but his return to the "Jack Paar Show" had been decided early in his travels.
"I gotta go back," he said Wednesday night.

Thermometer Uses All Its Degrees

Pampa shivered in minus one-degree weather this morning under clear skies.
Snow that has been falling since Monday let up, but the respite promised to be short-lived, with more snow forecast for late Friday night or early Saturday morning.
Pampa schools have not closed through the current spell of weather.
Utility companies have not had any interruption of service due to the snow.
Sergeant E. G. Alders of the Texas Highway Patrol warned that roads in the area are snow-covered and slick, but there has been no interruption of travel.
Temperatures today are expected to climb into the 20's with a low of 10 degrees forecast for tonight. Skies are expected to remain clear until late tomorrow afternoon, when they will become partly cloudy.

Ike Trip Marred Only In Uruguay

WITH EISENHOWER (UPI) — A heavily guarded President Eisenhower left Uruguay today for home, ending a triumphant four-nation South American tour that was marred in Montevideo by student riots and a tear gas barrage that sent tears streaming down his face.

Eisenhower took off aboard the propeller driven Columbine III for Buenos Aires where he transferred to an Air Force jet for the flight to Ezeiza Air Force Base in Puerto Rico for three days of golf and relaxation.
President Arturo Frondizi of Argentina greeted him at the Buenos Aires airport during the 30-minute visit. He had received another great welcome when he visited Buenos Aires last week, and an honor guard of Argentine troops was waiting today.

Unusually heavy security precautions were placed in effect at the U.S. embassy in Montevideo where he spent the night, at the helicopter pad where he took off for Carrasco airport and at the airport itself where he boarded the Columbine this cool, cloudy morning.
In a farewell speech he reaffirmed the good neighbor and good partner policies of the United States toward Latin America where he received vociferous welcomes in four capitals including Montevideo—despite the letting students demonstrations.
He stepped under heavier security precautions than ever experienced at the White House. Police and soldiers ringed the area with armored vehicles. Firemen stood by with anti-riot hoses. Police dogs roamed the park area nearby.
In his last remarks in Uruguay, Eisenhower said the United States government would consult the Latin American countries on social, economic, political and security problems on a bilateral as well as a multi-lateral basis.

Ike Peregrinations Hailed As Victory

MONTevideo, Uruguay (UPI) — American officials hailed today President Eisenhower's tour of South America as an unqualified personal success which had raised the stock of the United States in the area—at least for the time being.

They admitted, however, they were worried about what might happen when the rosy glow generated by the visit fades.
These officials face the task of finding some way of translating into specific action the generalized promises made by Eisenhower concerning intensified U.S. cooperation in the economic betterment of the hemisphere.

Eisenhower magnetized vast crowds in Brazil, Argentina, Chile and Uruguay with his personal appeal and appeared to have left citizens feeling that the United States was going to move quickly to do more for them in the future.
The American officials acknowledged that unless the warm feeling left in Eisenhower's wake is followed by definite actions, the good effects of his tour will not last long.

Area Road Work Planned

Two new construction projects in Gray and Roberts counties have been announced by the Texas Highway Department.
State Highway 273 from U.S. 66 at McLean north 8.5 miles, and F. M. Highway 282 north and east of Pampa 3.5 miles, will be widened, graded and resurfaced.
Construction will begin on the roads as soon as weather permits. The project will be zoned for a maximum speed of 45 miles per hour and motorists are asked to observe warning signs.
G. K. Reading, supervising resident engineer for the Texas Highway Department in Pampa, explained that traffic will be routed along the present roadbed or on especially constructed detours.

LONDON (UPI) — Princess Margaret's fiancé discovered today the king-sized money problems of a commoner marrying into royalty.
Antony Armstrong-Jones learned he must refuse a reported offer of \$25,000 for a sampling of his pre-engagement photographic work. Since his new fame as Margaret's bridegroom - to - be, there's a great demand for his work.
While Armstrong-Jones studied his purse problems, he underwent royal schooling at Buckingham Palace in preparation for his marriage to the princess.

Sen. Morse Conceded Leading Position In Oregon Primary

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Backers of rival Democratic candidates conceded the front-runner position today to favorite Sen. Wayne L. Morse in the Oregon Democratic presidential primary.
But unless he becomes a more serious candidate than he is now regarded, a Morse victory in the May 20 Oregon vote would minimize the importance of the prospective five-man contest.
Morse already had been entered in the Oregon primary by petition before Oregon Secretary of State Howell Applegate entered six others under discretionary power granted by state law.
It was immediately announced that two of the six — Adlai E. Stevenson, 1952 and 1956 Democratic presidential nominee, and Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) — would withdraw.
Applegate also entered Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson and Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.), two undeclared candidates, along with Sens. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) and Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.).
Symington declined to comment except to say that he would not withdraw his name. Johnson also indicated he would leave his name on the ballot.
"My current responsibility is on the floor of the Senate," Johnson said. "I have no plans to act in any way on the action in Oregon."
Since neither Johnson nor Symington has any plans for entering other state primaries, the Oregon vote will provide the only pre-convention test of their voting power.

Militant Students Plan Mass Walkout

More than 1,000 militant Negroes threatened mass resignation from an all-Negro college today—possibly to begin integration attempts at Auburn University and the University of Alabama.

Their action swiftly followed an order by Gov. John Patterson and the Alabama Board of Education Wednesday aimed at blocking Negro efforts to desegregate lunch counters and other eating facilities in Montgomery, the state capital. The board ordered nine students expelled from Alabama State College and 20 others put on probation.

Patterson personally asked for the expulsion order. A few hours later, the Rev. Ralph D. Abernathy, a Montgomery Negro leader, told the college students the governor's action was "one of the greatest blunders in the history of education in Alabama."
The students promptly voted to quit school. They had vowed earlier this week to "make news" at Auburn and the University of Alabama.

Observance Of 4-H Week Slated Here

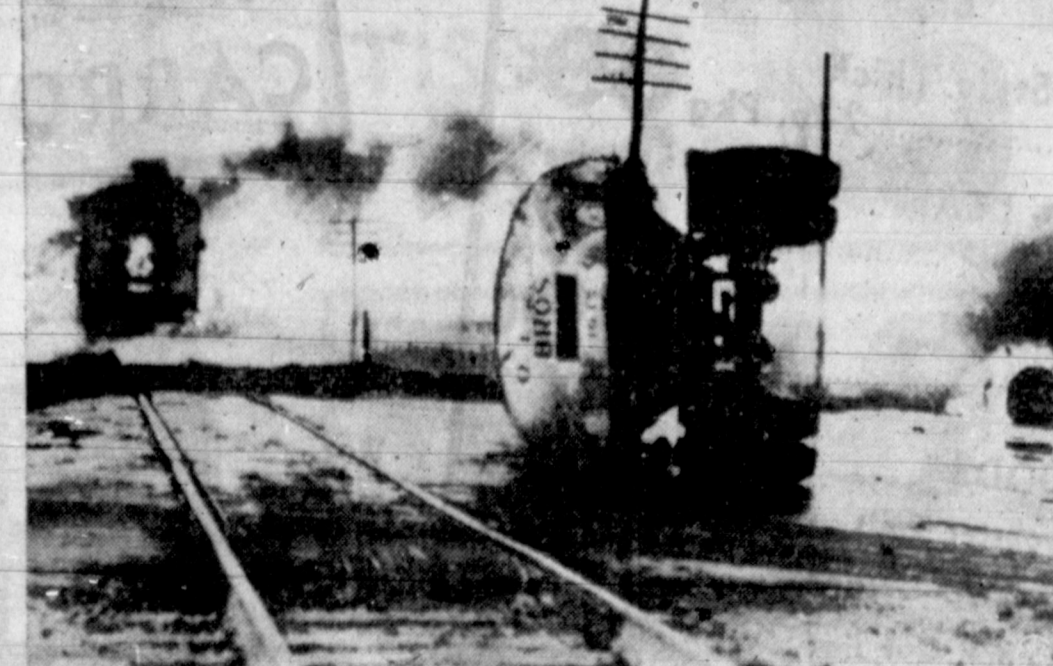

The main purposes of 4-H Club Week are to acquaint more young people with opportunities available to them through joining or forming 4-H Clubs, to assist new members in starting projects in farming, homemaking, community service, and other activities; and to inform the public about 4-H aims and methods.

Artful In Finch Trial Summation

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Prosecutor Fred N. Whitehead today launches the last act of his dramatic final arguments in which he pictures Carole Tregoff as a Lady Macbeth who drove Dr. R. Bernard Finch to kill his own wife.
The jolly-looking Whitehead, his pleasant manner cast by the way-side, has the last word among the attorneys in the love murder trial. The jury of seven women and five men may get the sensational murder case by Friday, with the life or death verdict rendered anytime thereafter.
Whitehead pictured the handsome surgeon, Miss Tregoff and Finch's slain wife as latter-day Shakespearean characters caught in a Macbeth-like tragedy.
Carole, 23, a beautiful young woman from modest beginnings, goaded the love-sick 42-year-old doctor into carrying out a brutal plan to kill his wife last July 18, Whitehead said.
The motive: So that ambitious Carole could step up from being the receptionist at Finch's medical center to the lady of the house, Finch's wife, and therefore a woman of wealth, prestige and social position.

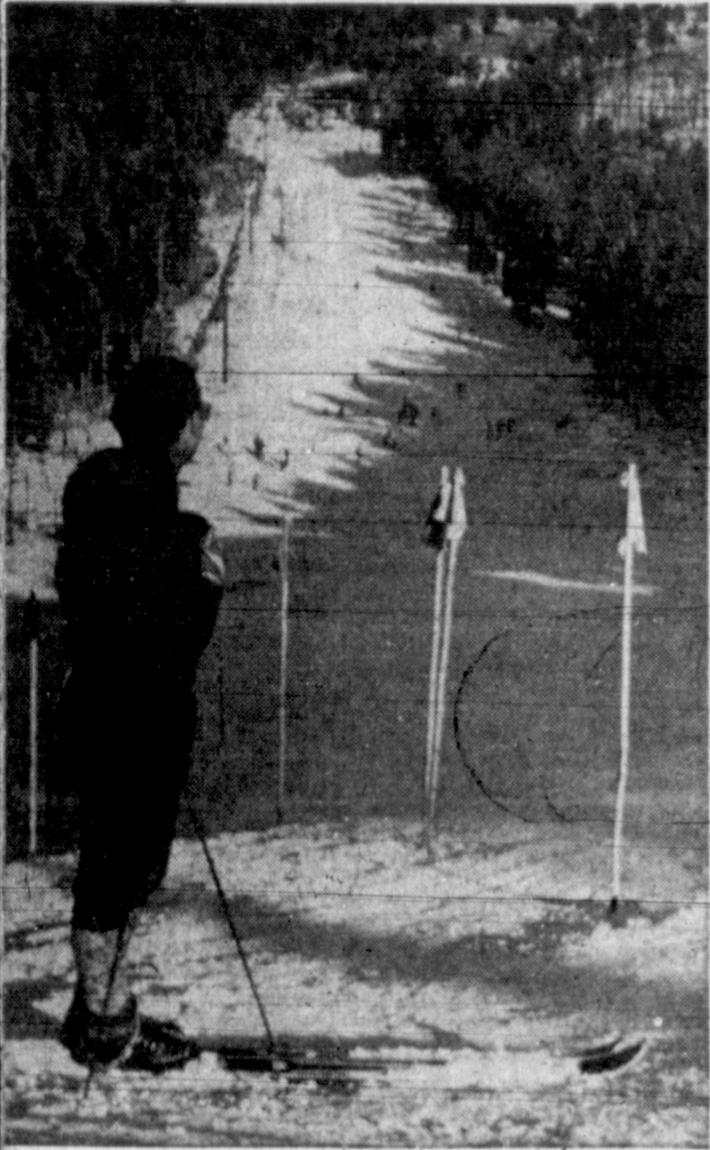

Skiing Conditions Made To Order In Colorado Springs

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — Skiers don't have to depend on the weather to pursue their favorite sport in the Pikes Peak Region since Ski Broadmoor opened its new 3,000-foot long run on Cheyenne Mountain, southwest of Colorado Springs, southwest of Colorado Springs, southwest of Colorado Springs. The run is covered with artificially made snow. The dimensions are hardly those needed for ski competition, but the course was designed for recreation and practice use. It's similar to one planned near the Air Force Academy, north of Colorado Springs, which will use artificial snow during "dry" periods. In addition to the 3,000-foot long run, Ski Broadmoor also has a 1,200-foot long side trail for advanced skiers. The snow machine combines water and air under pressure to make

snow. Temperatures must be below freezing. An inch of snow can be laid down in an hour. Skiers ride a double chair lift to the top end of the run; for those who don't want to go to the top there's a station half-way up where they can drop off. The run is lighted at night so it can be used from 9:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily. Open since Nov. 29, Ski Broadmoor will operate thru March, each year. Weekends feature slalom races, with entries ranging from snow plowers to waders. Occasional torchlight parades down the mountain are an added feature at night. Ski instructors are Ernst T. Krasovic and Otto G. Scheibler, both from Innsbruck, Austria. Original plans provided for expanding Ski Broadmoor, and the added facilities will be completed when the season begins in the fall of 1960.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

NEW YORK, March 3 (UPI)—Science stocks still challenge the imagination of both active traders and institutions as they outperform many of the top industrial issues included in the averages, notes Lucien O. Hooper of W. E. Hutton & Co. But the imagination, he points out, is of a type based more on nebulous and abstract ideas of "inevitable" growth rather than on absolute mathematics. "Certainly it has a high element of 'vogue' in it; and it is only fair to say that the vogue already has had a long life, as such things go," Hooper opines. He believes the interest in the so-called science stocks at this point "must be based to a considerable extent on speculative psychology rather than fundamentals. Right now, the psychology is vigorous," he notes. "Hill of Tarik" The Rock of Gibraltar is named for Tarik, leader of the Moors who seized it in the 700s. 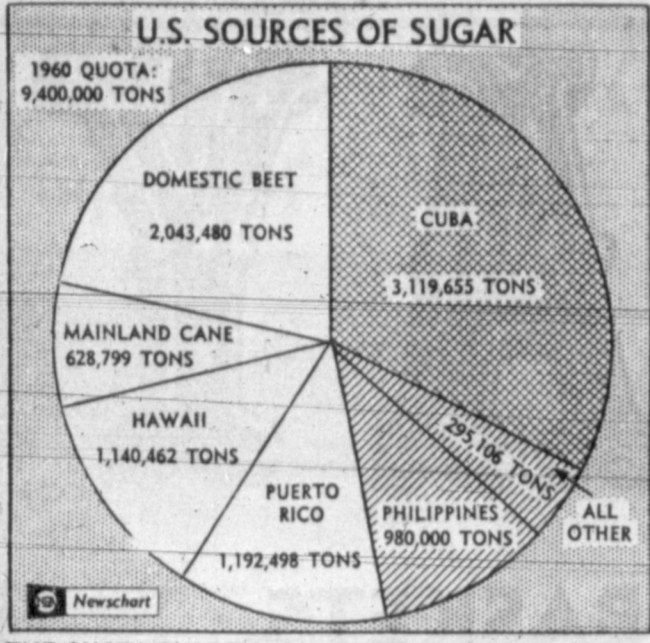

All Things Equal, Gross National Product Rise Seen

NEW YORK (UPI)—Imagine it's 1965—and we have lived the economic life we should. Then, says a famous investment banker, each of us can make a trip to Europe or buy a new car. Reuben Thorsen, chairman of the executive committee of the stock exchange firm of Paine, Webber, Jackson & Curtis, says we should be producing goods and services at a \$600 billion annual rate within five years. "To reach a gross national product of \$600 billion by 1965," he says, "we will have to increase our invested capital, stabilize the value of our money, improve the relationship between management and labor, and meet the growing threat of foreign competition." "We can do these things if we have the will." This is the nub of an article he has written for his company's new 16-page, four color publication, prepared for investors. Other articles delineate how a professional analyzes stocks, the theory of stock market action, and what a woman should know about investing. Thorsen told United Press International that it is natural for people to become over-optimistic during periods of strongly rising prices and over-pessimistic when prices decline. Recent softness in stock prices, he says, may not reflect anything more than the healthy readjustment in a long-term up-trend that began some years ago. He believes higher levels of economic activity will be fostered by continuing population increases and rapid gains in discretionary spending power. The rapid advances in technology are creating new industries and new opportunities for enterprising people, he says. "In terms of today's stock market," he says, "it's my opinion that the Dow-Jones industrial average at around 600 more nearly represents a 'normal' level of stock prices than a level of over-

valuation. "The vigorous advance since the low point of October, 1957 of 420 in the D-J industrials requires a period of consolidation before the next sustained broad-scale advance begins." Thorsen holds it would not be surprising if the stock market averages trace out a trading range over the next 12 months with prices not going materially lower than the estimated secular trend level of 600 in the industrials. In the future we can lay the ground work for a new marriage, he indicates. This depends on our recapturing foreign markets through bringing down manufacturing costs—a development that "will need real cooperation between management and labor." "If we achieve these economic gains over the next five years," he says, "we can expect a continuation of the underlying upward trend." "We assume there will be some periods of recession in which economic gains will be consolidated and average prices of shares trend downward." "But barring a series of international crises or prolonged labor strife, it would seem that 800-850 for the Dow-Jones industrial average is a reasonable expectation." Read The News Classified Ads.

Shoe Factory Fire Kills 52 Koreans

PUSAN, Korea (UPI)—Fire raced through a rubber-shoe factory in this South Korean port early Wednesday, killing at least 52 Koreans and sending 44 to the hospital. Damage was estimated at \$400,000. Except for two men, all of the dead were girls employed in the factory. The injured were burned, trampled in the rush for the exits or hurt when they jumped from second or third floor windows in the plant. Mass funeral services for the victims of the tragic blaze will be held today. The fire at the Kukje Rubber Manufacturing Company's No. 2 plant flared up about 8 a.m., as the factory's overnight shift was preparing to leave. There were about 400 workers in the plant. The flames, fed by the highly inflammable rubber products stored in the factory, raced through the upper floors of the

three-story building. There were only two exits from the upper floors to the street, and one of those was blocked by the fire. Read The News Classified Ads.

Role Of Gay Princess Always Suited Margaret

(EDITORS NOTE: This is the second in a series of three on the life of Princess Margaret.)

LONDON (UPI)—As a child princess Margaret dubbed herself "holy terror" but from the moment she wore her first tiny crown—at age six—she was the world's "princess charming." Through photographs and anecdotes she seemed to emerge when she was a little girl, everything romantic minds could like a princess to be. Her older sister, Elizabeth, destined to be queen, was considered a serious one. But Margaret was gay and precocious, full of life and mischief. Once she put tapioca into her older sister's bath salts. Another time she was dressed as an angel for a costume party and her mother, the queen said, "Well, darling, you will have to

be very good now that you are dressed as a holy angel." "Oh no," said Margaret. "You see, I'm a holy terror." She was a quicksilver child. Her comments were often sophisticated and witty beyond her years. She had an irrepressible sense of humor. Even at two she could sing in perfect tune. It soon became apparent she had a great talent for music and mimicry. At three she developed probably the first of her remarkable friendships among the world of the talented and imaginative. This was with Scottish playwright Sir James Barrie, author of "Peter Pan." He wrote a play in which he used some of her childish dialogue and arranged to pay her in pennies for the plagiarism. At six she made her first public appearance, wearing a tiny crown, at her father's coronation. The pomp and ceremony, the busy days when the royal family moved into Buckingham Palace, seemed a little bewildering to the little princess "since my father turned king," she said, "I don't seem to be anyone at all." Afterwards her childhood was a spattered round of days in which she was privately tutored, spent long hours racing down the palace's endless corridors and bicycling in its walled-off garden. She made her first speech at 14, the same year she met Peter Townsend, then a 29-year-old wing commander. As a teen-ager she assumed her first royal responsibilities and began to make more and more public appearances. At 17 she accompanied the King and Queen on a South African tour. The same year she was bridesmaid at the wedding of Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh. At 18 she went to the continent for the first time, on a "special mission" to The Netherlands to represent her father at the enthronement of Queen Juliana. During these years she began the gay life in which she became known as the "dancing princess." She was the world's most eligible princess. Her most casual smile could start marriage-rumors circling the globe. Her name was to be linked with dozens of the world's most eligible men. And her father had a handsome aide named Peter Townsend. (Next: Townsend and after.) Great Britain and the United States are the only civilized countries which do not commonly use the metric system.

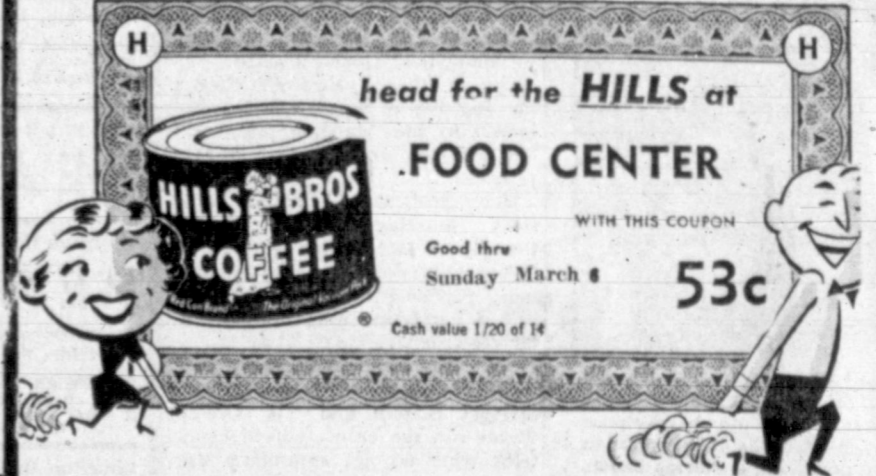

Place toasted bread cubes in a greased (1 1/2 quart) baking dish. Melt 1/2 cup butter in a 2 quart saucepan; add onion and saute until tender. Blend in flour, salt, pepper and sage. Add milk and gradually stir in lemon juice. Pour tuna and celery sauce over toasted bread cubes in baking dish. Combine bread crumbs, pimiento and 1/4 cup melted butter. Sprinkle bread crumb mixture over top of casserole. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) for 20 minutes.

GOLDEN WESTERNER CAKE
3 sticks (1/2 lb.) butter or margarine

Enticing Taste Treats Concocted With Coffee

Some exciting new recipes for the adventurous cook have been compiled by the roasters of Maryland Club Coffee. The Coffee-Frappe and the Coffee Mousse are almost as easy to make as a good pot of coffee. Some of the others are more difficult, but certainly well worth the effort for an enticing taste treat.

COFFEE FRAPPEE (Serves Six)

1 1/2 cups milk
2-3 cup Find Grind Maryland Club Coffee
4 egg yolks, lightly beaten
1 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 pint heavy cream, whipped
Place milk in saucepan with coffee grounds. Scald. Set aside for coffee flavor to be absorbed by milk. Strain through damp cheesecloth of double thickness. Put milk in top of double boiler. Add sugar and egg yolks to milk. Cook over hot water about 12 minutes or until mixture coats spoon. Cool. Add vanilla. Fold in whipped cream and freeze in ice cream freezer.

COFFEE MOUSSE (Serves Six)

1 cup very strong Maryland Club 24 marshmallows
1 cup whipped cream
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 cup grated, unsweetened chocolate
Combine 1 cup very strong coffee with 24 marshmallows in the

top of a double boiler. Heat until marshmallows dissolve stirring occasionally. Pour in mixing bowl and allow to cool. Refrigerate. Beat 1 cup whipping cream until firm. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla extract. Fold cream into coffee mixture. Scrape bottom of bowl to mix thoroughly. Put in individual parfait glasses and keep in refrigerator until needed. Before serving, garnish with whipped cream or grated bitter-sweet chocolate.

COFFEE KISSES (1 1/2 dozen Kisses)

Preheat oven 240 degrees
1 cup sugar
3 large egg whites
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons water
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
3 tablespoons Instant Maryland Club

1 cup walnut meats
Stir 1 cup sugar, and whip 3 large egg whites with 1/4 teaspoon salt until firm. Gradually add 1/2 cup sugar, whipping constantly. A wire whisk works best. Combine 2 teaspoons water with 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add this liquid a few drops at a time alternating with second 1/2 cup sugar. Whip constantly. Fold in 3 tablespoons instant coffee and mix thoroughly. Add 1 cup nut meats. Drop by half teaspoons on very lightly greased baking sheet. Bake 1 hour in 250 degree oven.
COFFEE GINGERBREAD
Preheat oven 350 degrees

1/4 pound butter
1/2 cup strong, hot Maryland Club 2 eggs
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup light molasses
1 1/2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
2 teaspoons ginger
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup powdered sugar
4 tablespoons cream
1 tablespoon vanilla extract

Melt the butter in 1/2 cup coffee. Beat 2 eggs with 1/2 cup granulated sugar and 1/2 cup molasses. Mix well. Add to coffee and butter. Beat vigorously. Sift 1 1/2 cups flour. Measure, and re-sift 2 times with 2 teaspoons baking powder, 2 teaspoons ginger, 1 teaspoon cinnamon and nutmeg. Stir into coffee mixture and beat until smooth. Do not overbeat. Batter is very soft. Pour 1/2 inch thick in a buttered, floured pan 9" x 13" or baking dish. This is a thin gingerbread not a high, doughy one. Bake in 350 degree oven for 25 minutes or testing straw 2 1/2 inches out clean and dry and sides start to shrink from side of pan. Now blend 1 cup powdered sugar until smooth with 4 tablespoons cream and 1 tablespoon vanilla. White gingerbread is still warm. Frost. Cut when entirely cool and frosting is set.

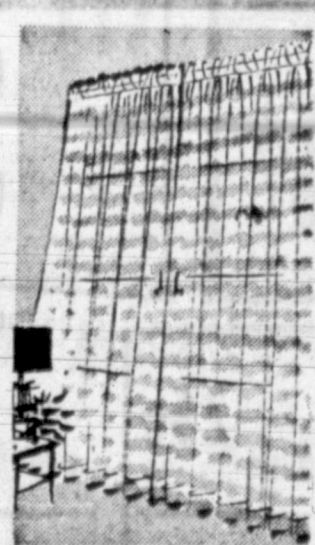

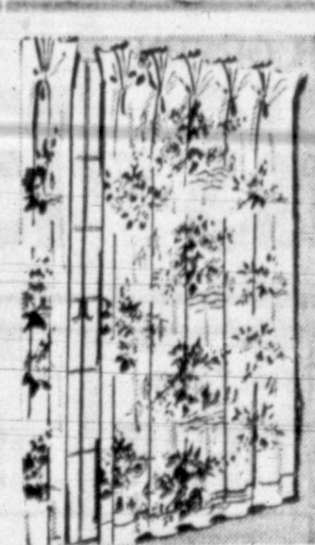

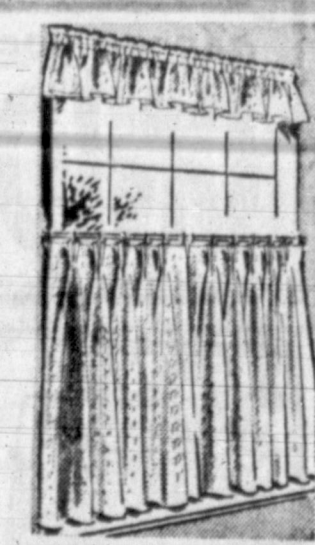

The amazing thing about the Cuban regime is that he takes most of the rules, and comes to get away with it. The answer seems to lie in the fact that business and some governments, including the United States, have become disillusioned at their ability to get along with the bearded revolutionary.

The bulk of the Cuban people have not. The Cuban National Bank is under direction of a man with no experience in finance and who is more used to financing a rift than a check.

No matter that foreign investment is being cut to zero. No matter that sugar cane is idle. No matter that the vaunted agreement to sell five million tons of sugar to the Soviet Union cost the Cubans more to produce than they possibly can receive from the sale.

The Cuban peasant may not understand the slogan "Cuba for the Cubans" but he likes the end of it.

He also likes the sound of government-supplied housing and the land. It hasn't all come out, but he believes it will. The Cuban treasury never has in his concern and isn't now. Two recent events are illustrations of the workings of the Castro time. But have an effect on the United States.

It was the death-knell for foreign investments in Cuba and it inevitably slow the advance which Castro so ardently claims for the Cuban people. It fits the revolutionary pattern which was anticipated when national bank was taken over by leftist Ernesto (Che) Guevara. In similar vein was the Cuban government's recent bald announcement it would be willing to tolerate its differences with the United States but only on grounds of a U.S. pledge that it would take no action damaging to Cuba's economy.

FCC Called On Carpet By Inquirers

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House payola investigators today summoned the head of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to explain why he branded their charges of broadcasting corruption as "gross exaggerations."

The House legislative oversight subcommittee called FCC Chairman John C. Doerfer to testify as the inquiry shifted to the question of what federal agencies have done to stamp out payola and other radio-TV deception.

Rep. John E. Moss (D-Calif.) said he planned to ask Doerfer "about a recent speech in which the FCC boss remarked that allegations of widespread deception and corruption in broadcasting were 'gross exaggerations.'"

Moss said he also intended to ask Doerfer why the FCC had to be, as Moss put it, "almost pushed to the point of exercising more than routine interest" in payola charges.

Rep. Peter F. Mack (D-Ill.) said he wondered why the FCC had held up the license renewals of only four stations in the Boston area, all mentioned in the subcommittee's payola investigation, when "surely there are other stations throughout the entire country where these practices occurred."

Cost: The Senate's civil rights talkation is costing "much in grayed nerves and weariness but as one official put it: 'there's no earthly way of figuring' the added dollar and cents expenses of the four-day-old filibuster. 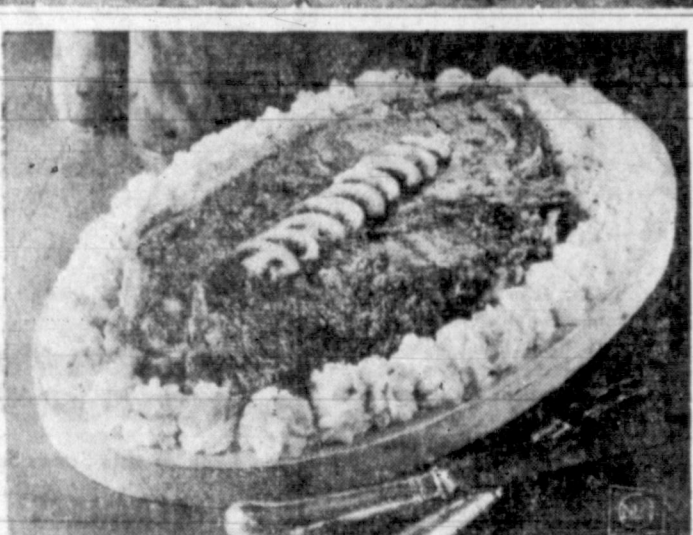

NEW YORK (NEA) — Hang on to your billfold and change purse. A 25th anniversary again 20 years since pre-packaged foods first hit U.S. store shelves, touching off a revolution in "American buying habits" is still gathering momentum today.

10 Most Common Tax Questions Answered

Tax questions are not new to the employees of the Internal Revenue Service. The well-trained tax employees who answer the telephone and talk to the taxpayers in person at the IRS offices in North Texas answer more than 100,000 questions every year. Even though the tax folks give the same general answer to thousands of questions, they point out that each taxpayer has an individual problem that requires the application of the law to his particular case.

1. Do I have to file a separate return? Form 1040-A for each W-2 I receive? Answer: No. You only file one income tax return. You combine all the income reported on the W-2's given you by the employer for whom you worked during the year.
2. I am a housewife! What's this community property business? Why can't I file a separate income tax return on the income I earned myself? Answer: Texas is a community property state. The income that the husband earns, as well as the wife, belongs one-half to each. If the husband and the wife both have income they must either file a joint return including all of the income or split all of the community income and expenses. When they file a separate return, each must include one-half of the income and the expenses for the community on his or her return.
3. I am having trouble taking my medical expense deduction. I am over 65. Can I deduct all of my doctor bills and my drugs and medicine expenses? Answer: No. You must subtract 1 per cent of your adjusted gross income from the amount paid for medicine and drugs before taking the deduction. However, since you are over 65, you may deduct all of your doctor bills without reducing the total expense by 1 per cent of adjusted gross income. You are limited to a maximum deduction. The amount varies, depending upon such factors as number of dependents, whether you file a separate return or not, and whether you are disabled.
4. I am having trouble on my dependent deductions. I help support my cousin during the year. Can I claim him as a dependent? Answer: No. You cannot claim your cousin as a dependent unless he lives in your home and does not file a tax return himself.

not file a tax return himself and you contribute more than half of his support. You should check your tax instructions on claiming dependents. Check — (1) support test, (2) gross income test, (3) head of household test, (4) citizenship test, and (5) joint return test. All of these tests are set out in the instructions.

5. I go to school. I worked during the summer and earned \$500 on which income taxes were withheld. I have a refund coming but my Dad tells me he is entitled to my exemption and I must claim zero exemptions on my income tax return. Joe took the income tax course at school. He says we can both claim my exemption. What about it? Answer: Joe is right. Your Dad is entitled to your exemption since you are a school child. The individual filing a tax return always claims his own exemption. There are no zero exemption tax returns. Read your instructions carefully since the double exemption in this one case is fully explained there.

6. I am a traveling man. My company reimburses my expenses. Can I deduct my travel expenses on my income tax return? Answer: Yes, but you must also include the amount that your company reimbursed to you as income. Read your instructions carefully on business and travel expenses since you may not be required to report either the travel expense or the reimbursement in your case.
7. I lost a \$2,000 diamond ring during 1959. Can I claim a tax deduction? Answer: No. You cannot deduct your losses of cash or other personal property. You can deduct theft or embezzlement losses in the year of discovery.
8. Can I claim cigarette tax in Texas? Answer: No. Cigarette tax is not deductible in Texas. It is in some other states, but not in Texas. Other state taxes are deductible, though, such as personal and real property taxes, gasoline tax, poll tax and automobile license.
9. I work for myself. I didn't file an estimate and pay my income taxes during the year. Can I avoid a penalty by filing my tax return before January 31? Answer: No. If your income taxes are not withheld or if you have income outside of your salary, you are required to file an estimated return on April 15 during the tax year or on June 15, September 15, or January 15, depending upon when you earned the money during the year.

If you had income in January 1959, filing an estimated tax or a Form 1040 in January 1960 will not avoid a penalty. The penalty is imposed on taxpayers who do not file and pay timely. Be sure to file your estimate for 1959 on or before April 15.

10. Can I claim depreciation on my car which I drive back and forth to work? Answer: No. This is a commuting expense, like bus fare. You can claim depreciation on a car used in your business for that percentage of the car used for business purposes. However, if a business automobile issued to commute to your place of business, the cost must be determined, and eliminated from business expenses. Read your instructions carefully on depreciation. If necessary seek professional tax help.

The tax folks are always willing to answer your questions but advise a careful reading of the tax instructions. Taxpayers having more complex individual problems can purchase a 14-page booklet called "Your Federal Income Tax" for 40 cents through any Internal Revenue Service office. Businessmen may also purchase a copy of the "Tax Guide for Small Business," covering business problems, for 40 cents.

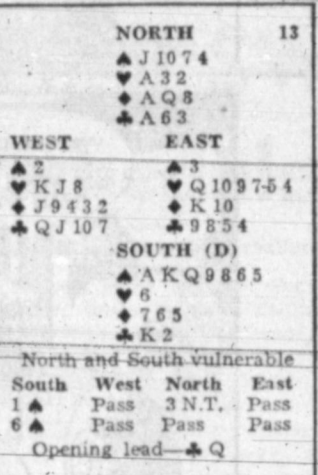

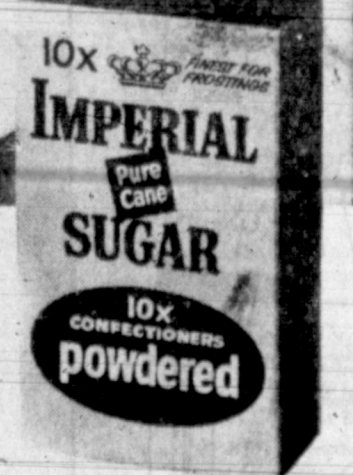

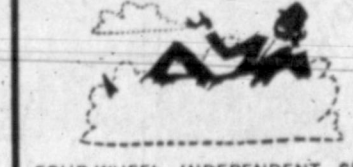

Hitler Tried To Stop Ike By Arrest Order

LONDON (NEA) — I have just seen what is believed to be the only copy now in existence of a warrant for Dwight D. Eisenhower's arrest.

The warrant, printed in German as a leaflet, was air dropped on German soldiers and civilians in January, 1945, on Hitler's orders after the Allies crossed the Rhine.

In it, the then General Eisenhower is labeled a war criminal. His photograph published along with a physical description and such details as his alleged favorite hobby (architecture).

This unusual document is part of a collection of 3,000 aerial propaganda leaflets, said to be the world's largest private collection, owned by Reginald G. Auckland of the tiny village of Sandridge in Hertfordshire.

Auckland, 39, served as a teletype operator at General Eisenhower's headquarters in Algiers and thus the arrest warrant is of particular interest to him.

Today Auckland, an ex-Royal Navy signaller, is the postmaster of Sandridge. In the village post office which also serves as his general store Auckland explained how he began his curious hobby.

"I started out as a collector of German stamps," he said. "Then I got interested in the propaganda stamps that were issued during World War II and ended up collecting leaflets."

Auckland's collection is insured for \$9,000 and includes not only leaflets dropped during both world wars, but those dropped by the U.S. in Korea, the British in Kenya and in the Malayan jungle, the French in Algeria, and by Nigerian politicians over Lagos as late as September, 1959.

The postmaster draws a careful distinction between "white propaganda," which is more or less above-board and "black propaganda," which does not disclose its source.

"In the cold warfare of the future black propaganda will come into its own," he predicts. "Hitler used it when he dropped forged money, forged ration coupons on countries that he wanted to disrupt."

"For example, leaflets will be dropped on enemy territory and made to appear as though they originated with an underground movement within the country itself."

Most valuable items in his collection are three leaflets dropped by German V-1 rockets on England in 1944, valuable because the rest of the leaflets were burned when the V-1s exploded.

"These are the first propaganda leaflets ever to be dropped by rockets," he claims, while predicting that intercontinental missiles will be used for this purpose in the future.

Hitler was the supreme master of aerial propaganda, according to the postmaster. Unlike the Allies, who concentrated on breaking German morale on the home front, Hitler aimed at undermining the morale of the front-line soldier. Some of the themes which Hitler hammered home:

1. A rich man's war: a typical leaflet shows on one side photographs of bank notes, including a \$1,000 bill, rows of white crosses in a military cemetery, on the reverse.
2. Dissension among the Allies: British soldiers are told that while they are away at the front American G.I.s are having a good time with their wives, sweethearts, daughters.
3. The horrors of the V-1 rocket: One leaflet claims that the flames of burning London can be seen on the continent.
4. Malingering: Soldiers are told how to simulate various forms of illness from heart disease to a nervous breakdown so that they will be sent to the rear.

Red China further refined the Hitler techniques during the Korean War. On one occasion the Reds scattered cruel Christmas cards over the American lines showing "capitalist" lolling on a Florida beach while American infantrymen are knee-deep in Korean snow.

Evangelist Stares Down Witch Doctor

KISIMU, Kenya (UPI)—Evangelist Billy Graham walked right up to three witch doctors who were believed to be trying to fix a curse on him Tuesday and looked them square in the eye.

The incident occurred at the conclusion of a huge rally at which the North Carolina evangelist preached to more than 10,000 persons.

The service went very well, and at the end of it, 500 persons were persuaded by Graham to make "decisions for Christ."

As the crowd began to disperse, the three Jajuo witch doctors attired in grotesque tribal dress walked up to within 100 feet of Graham's platform and stared at him impassively.

It was believed the witch doctors were trying to put a curse on the blond, tall minister. Their leader, Okelo Onoko, 90, who has three wives, smoked the traditional "conjuring" pipe of his trade.

Graham went down and walked up to the three strange men, who fixed their painted eyes on him fiercely. Graham didn't flinch.

"God loves you and Christ died on the cross for you," he told them through an interpreter.

The witch doctors didn't flinch, either, and after staring at Graham a minute longer, turned and stalked off.

Washington Window

WASHINGTON (UPI)—North Dakota Republicans hope Vice President Richard M. Nixon will have a change of heart before all the chips are down in the state's socko special senatorial election.

The date is June 28, which is a long way off. The vice president, however, already has informed Republicans in North Dakota that he will not be able to help them elect a GOP senator.

North Dakotans feel badly about that. This is not just another election to fill an unexpired Senate term. The vacant seat was held by the late Sen. William Langer. Langer was a maverick, but he was a Republican maverick. The GOP desperately wants to hold that Senate seat.

Also, the special election in June will test farm state sentiment. Republican Senate seats are up for grabs this year in other farm states, notably in Colorado, Nebraska, Iowa, South Dakota and Kansas. North Dakota returns in June will indicate what may be expected elsewhere in November.

The North Dakota election comes just a month before the Republican national convention in Chicago. Election of a Republican would be a shot in the arm for the convention. The Republicans will have no crowd-rouser contest in their national convention. Nixon is a shoo-in for the presidential nomination.

Good news from North Dakota could inspire the Republicans in Chicago and they could use some of that. They would look with more confidence to elections in other farm states, not only for

the Senate and House but their presidential ticket.

Those are the circumstances which North Dakotans believe may persuade the vice president to change his mind about campaigning in their state before a special election. The risk to Nixon, of course, would be that election of a Democratic senator would in some degree a repudiation of his campaign efforts.

In contrast to the vice president's reluctance, another North Dakotan, another Republican answered up that would be glad to help.

His name: Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York.

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
