Poland To Sell Planes To Castro

Poland has agreed to sell Cuba rplanes, helicopters and heavy machinery in exchange for sugar, coffee, tobacco and fruit, the For-

eign Ministry announced today ... The announcement did not say what kind of planes Premier Fidel Castro's revolutionary regime expects to get from Poland. The government has been col-

lecting funds from individuals and organizations here to buy warplanes "for the defense of Cuba." The United States and Britain have refused to sell Cuba military planes or helicopters for fear of heightening tension in the troubled Caribbean.

The trade agreement with Poland was the latest of a number of deals the Castro regime has made with the Communists in line with plans to "diversify Cucountries in the world."

The most notable previous ar rangement was the cut-rate sugar deal with Russia negotiated by Soviet Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan during his recent visit

"The Essential Nature Of Adam's Sin-Not A Sin Against Altruism But Against Laws Requisite To Cooperation'

Since I believe most of our spiritual data comes from the misinterpretation of the Scriptures and since I believe Frederick Nymeyer is a keen student of the Scriptures, I want to. continue to quote from his February magazine of "First Principles In Morality And Economics". Mr. Nymeyer is not only a student of the Scriptures, but he is a keen student of economics. He is a very busy man that publishes a magazine.

I have a note from him, since I ordered a few extra copies of the February issue, stating that he is soon going around 'the world, mostly on business. He is the director of half a dozen corporations, and likes to know the causes of prosperity in various lines of business, as well as general prosperity in all lines of

I think his interpretation of the Garden of Eden is exceptionally interesting. This is the way he

"There is no hint in the test in the Garden of Eden that Adam was to demonstrate by the way he responded that he was expected to be an altruist. All that was required was that he honor the property rights claimed by God on the fruit of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil.

"The tree could have had no magical characteristics in itself. It was instead a symbol of the good of knowing that the property rights of others needed to be respected; and it was a symbol of the evil of willfully violating the property rights possessed by

"The test did not require that Adam sacrifice himself for another, which the test, if it were altruistic, would have required. The 'sacrifice' by Adam of not eating from the particular tree was almost certainly a mere bagatelle, in the sense that Adam's position was not measurably worsened by not being authorized to eat the fruit of that one tree. "If Adam did not see fit to recognize the title to ownership that God reserved to Himself in regard to the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, he would have no sound reason for claiming any property rights for himself. If A does not recognize that

B has property rights, then B is not likely to recognize property rights which A claims. Where will men then be? (1) They will? be acting like beasts who know no property rights in any real sense; or (2) there will be property rights, but they will rest only on strength and coercion: strong will seize what is valuable; the weak will be exploited: society-will be founded on coercion by the strong, and not on contract rights and obligations

binding all men. "Why was abstaining from eating of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, under the circumstances described in the Garden of Eden, an excellent test and symbol of what God was requiring of men, having endowed them with reason? It was such a ter because: (1) it allowed unrestricted latitude to Adam to utilize every resource available to obtain food except that to which someone had a prior title; (2) his-in-centives were not restricted; he could work wholly for himself: self-interest was not sin, and, because personal incentive was left unitammelled, great achievement as fostered; the prospects were that, under the spur of a natur-

al incentive, he (Adam) would try to improve his circumstances; but (3) the restraint on his incentive consisted only in not letting him exploit another by seizing what belonged to another. "Self - interest plus the straints of the Law of God-that combination - is superior to altruism. The advantage of the combination is that it stimulates

great effort, without damage to others, Altruism contrarily lacks (ûnder the law of creation) any real spur of incentive. The combination, self - interest plus the Law of God, constituted the equivalent of a powerful engine and good brakes. Altruism lacks a good engine. Because it lacks a good engine, brakes are rather

J., who was comm sioned by the Arthur Jordan Foundation, restorers of the Harrison Memorial Home in Indianapolis, to write the definitive biography of Benjamin Harrison, 23rd president of the United

The current volume covers the years between 1865, the end of the Civil War, and the entry of the White House in 1888. Father Sievers, with felicitous style and the unchecked drive of a dedicated historian, has found a wealth of hitherto unrecorded detail, has documented with zeal and the result is a book of unusual depth and closeness to the subject.

Anyone who knows American history is aware that Banjamin Harrison was a not conspicuously famed Indiana lawyer who, at a time when political dishonesty was almost a way of life in this country, became President without literally lifting a finger to achieve the office. He did not seek, he did not once compromise his honor or impair his integrity. The book is called "Benjamin Harrison: Hoosier Statesman," and enjoys access to the only just released private papers and hitherto unpublished memoranda of Louis T. Michener, who was campaign manager for Har-

Harrison came back from the war to face tough, grinding situations. His law practice had been long neglected and for three years the household and other bills had piled up. He was not one to ignore them or dump them into the escape of bankruptcy. He faced up to what he owed and buckled down to earn the money to pay off. A series of exceptional and provocative courtroom cases brought him national renown, notably those involving Nancy Clem, a murderess, and . P. Milligan, a Civil War trait-

A new Republican Party was rising in the Indiana area and he cast his lot with it, his gift for oratory swiftly marking him for ortance in an era when oratory was a golden key. The difference was that Harrison's oratory had substance whereas most oratory of the day had merely words. He became junior senator from his state during the Arthur and Cleveland administrations and rose from there





SUPREME PENALTY-A total of 3,666 persons were executed in the United States in federal and state institutions during the 30 years from 1930 through 1959. Thirty-one were women. In 1959, 49 executions were carried out, one more than the record low of 48 in 1958. Forty-one were for murder and eight for rape. Prisoners' ages ranged from 18 to 58; the average was 34. Gas was used in nine executions, electrocution in 40. With a few exceptions, such as for treason, seven of the continental states do not have the death penalty (including Delaware as of April 2, 1958). In South Dakota the penalty was abolished from 1930 to 1938; in Kansas from 1930 to 1934. Although a record total of 164 prisoners were awaiting execution at the close of 1959, the average number of executions is declining. Data from U.S. Bureau of Prisons,
