The blast went off successfully at the desolate French test site near Reggane at 12:15 a.m. e.s.t., just a few hours before Khrushchev and President de Gaulle were to resume their secret talks.

Youth Conference Backs Federal Funds Outpouring

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The White House Conference on Children and Youth called today for an outpouring of federal money to improve the nation's schools.

It also:

—Expressed support for Southern Negro students conducting sit-down demonstrations against racial segregation.

—Urged President Eisenhower to "use all means at his disposal, including the prestige of his office," to speed nationwide compliance with Supreme Court desegregation decrees.

—Endorsed the principle of "family planning" and said both public and private agencies should be prepared to assist married couples who seek "rational advice and services for child spacing."

—Proposed a general strengthening of public welfare programs.

Demanded Renewed To Ban Space 'Armies'

Inspection Method Proposed By U.S. In Successful Orbit

GENEVA (UPI) — The United States renewed its demand today that the Russians agree to outlaw military operations in outer space. It said such a ban could be inspected by "not more than 30 people."

Western hopes were reported to have risen at the separate three-nation nuclear arms ban conference here for an early agreement among the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union for a treaty to outlaw nuclear weapons tests.

Chief U. S. Delegate Frederick M. Eaton told the 30-nation disarmament conference that the United States believes that not even as many as 30 inspectors would be in place at any one time except when a space asset has been announced.

"Relatively adequate" tracking facilities for detecting any breaches of such an agreement as the United States wants "already are available," Eaton said as the party moved near the end of its third week.

At a news conference afterward, Eaton was critical of Soviet tactics thus far in the treaty.

"Pounding the table for emphasis," Eaton pointed out a warning that the United States is here to do business.

"We intend to talk disarmament," Eaton said. "But up until now, I must say in all candor that our view is that the Soviet bloc has been talking propaganda, not disarmament."

"Until they change their tactics, this conference cannot move forward to the work envisaged for it by the (United Nations) General Assembly and by the four foreign ministers."

'Tiros' Sends Weather Data

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI) — The United States first satellite into orbit around the earth today to photograph the world's weather conditions from space. First reports said it showed a big storm area over the Midwest.

A Weather Bureau official in Washington said several hours after launch, the Tiro satellite already had sent back some "very fine pictures" of the earth's cloud and storm pattern.

Harry Wexler, chief meteorologist for the Weather Bureau, said the satellite's success "established the feasibility of space weather stations—a question about it."

The 270-pound satellite's findings may give scientists a way to predict well in advance the weather or movements that trigger tornadoes, hurricanes and storms that blot the earth's surface.

An Air Force three-stage Thorable rocket thundered from its pad at 8:40 a.m., aimed at an orbit 400 miles above earth.

Dr. A. K. Thielen of Space Technology Laboratories later said, "It is in orbit. It is up."

However, scientists had to wait for computed information after the satellite's first pass around earth to determine whether it had reached the exact orbit desired.

Thielen said the payload could still be useful even if its distances from earth vary as much as 120 miles. He added that "if the orbit is roughly circular, it could stay up for a long time."

Although a civilian project, TIROS may have military implications. Such a satellite would be useful in predicting weather early enough in advance to enable strategic planning of troop movements during wartime.

The delicate compact payload rode in the nose of the Thorable rocket, one of the most reliable in the U.S. stable of space vehicles.

The 90-foot-tall rocket, bathed in fog just before launch, lifted its 105,000-pound weight from its pad in flame and smoke. It rumbled through low-hanging clouds and climbed high into the sky heading toward the North-East. It hit high-altitude layers of cold air, touching off a brilliant, white vapor trail.

The weather "eye" satellite, shaped like a pillbox and covered by banks of 9,000 solar cells, was aimed toward an orbit that would take it around earth once every 90 minutes or so, covering an area between Montreal, Canada, and Santa Cruz, Argentina, in the Western Hemisphere.

Sitdowns In Marshall May Be Resumed

MARSHALL, Tex. (UPI) — Negro sitdowns may resume today if the Harrison County court-house is not ordered closed by a Texas judge.

The President's state visit was made and the ensuing fire hose incident made Marshall into what one officer described as a "powder keg" of racial tension. Marshall has been quiet since Wednesday night. The streets have been virtually deserted after dark. Even drug stores on the town square have been closing early, at 8 p.m.

United Press International learned from a Negro student who took part in several strategy sessions Thursday that the "taken" sitdown attempts would be made at 12:30 p.m.

The students planned to stage them at the same three places where the first sitdowns were held Saturday — the P. W. Woodworth (40-cent) (See SITDOWNS, Page 4)

Student Body Quits School

BATON ROUGE (UPI) — Officials at all-Negro Southern University faced a major rebellion today with the threatened withdrawal of the school's entire 5,300-member student body.

What began as a protest lunch counter segregation in downtown Baton Rouge developed into a struggle between students and educators at the university Thursday when the students began mass withdrawals.

Students quit the school in protest of the suspension or expulsion of 18 students who led sit-down demonstrations in Baton Rouge earlier this week and a mass protest march on the capitol Wednesday.

The protest march, in which nearly 5,000 students participated, was the largest massive resistance movement in the South to date.

Students quit the university, 10 miles north of Baton Rouge, by the dozens and continued to boycott classes.

An official in the registrar's office estimated that 2,600 students have withdrawn. Some 2,700 more had signed withdrawal slips or planned to do so by late Thursday.

Flooding Checked Downstream

Around the clock sandbag operations against enraged rivers were paying off in Nebraska today but new floods elsewhere in the Middle West brought the number of homeless to 6,000 persons.

National Guardsmen, civil defense workers and volunteers were winning the battle of the levees in Nebraska, hardest-hit state in the Midwest flood belt.

Although close to 4,000 persons were homeless in the state, the floods failed to make a major breakthrough.

However, the tons of water surging down flooded streams in the country's mid-section were pouring into the great Mississippi and Missouri Rivers.

Chunks of ice tore seven 15½ ton gates from an electric power dam on the Mississippi at Keokuk, Iowa. The breakthrough was expected to cause a three-foot flash rise downstream.

The Weather Bureau at Memphis, Tenn., far downstream, issued its first flood warning for lowland residents in five years.

School Vote Tomorrow

Pampa voters will have a choice of three candidates in tomorrow's school board election.

In the race for the post are chairman Bob Andis, Dr. Ray Hampton and insurance man Marvin Bowman.

Polls will open in the Pampa Junior High School lobby at 8 a.m. and will close at 7 p.m. The junior high school will be the only voting place.

Gray County Clerk Charlie Thul said 139 absentee ballots have been received, and one is still out. He said if that ballot is received by noon tomorrow, and was postmarked before midnight, March 29, it will be counted.

Health Officer Warns Of Possible Rabies Epidemic

City Health Officer Dr. Malcolm Brown warned parents today against letting children get or get near any type of wild animal, especially skunks.

Dr. Brown said there seems to be a rabies epidemic affecting skunks at the present time, and they are extremely dangerous to children.

He also pointed out that children's pets should be immunized against the disease, and cautioned them against contact with stray dogs.

There are two children now under treatment in Pampa for rabies.

One of the children is from White Deer, the other from Pampa.

He also said hunters should concentrate on killing skunks and stray cats while in the fields to assist in wiping out the disease.

Five Killed In Headon Smashup

SNOWMAN, N. M. (UPI) — Five persons died late Thursday night when two automobiles smashed head-on in New Mexico about three miles north of the Texas-New Mexico line on U.S. Highway 84. There were no survivors.

The victims were Stetson A. Jones, an airman stationed at Holloman Air Force Base, Alamogordo, N. M.; Geary Edward Jones, (221 Virginia Ave.), Alamogordo, N. M.; an unidentified woman; Mateo Ruyter Carrasco and Jose Velez Martinez, both of Dexter, N. M.

The two men named Jones and the unidentified woman all Negroes, were in one car and Carrasco and Martinez were in the other.

The El Paso County sheriff's office said the car in which the Negroes were riding had Texas license plates.

The cars were demolished and parts of the automobiles were scattered over the highway. Other vehicles were used in separating the mangled cars.

Dem Chairman Lauds Sitdowns

BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI) — Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler today applauded Negro demonstrators against integration of lunch counters and other facilities.

Butler praised what he called "the inspiring example of moral courage which has been set by young people in the South and in other sections of our nation in protesting in a peaceful but direct and forcible fashion the indignities of segregation."

He said the demonstrations "will long serve to remind some of the rest of us that the spirit of liberty and individual dignity still burns in the minds and hearts of millions of young men and women."

Butler made the statements in a speech prepared for a mock Democratic convention at Morgan State College, a Negro school.

Youngest Parachutist Is California Boy, 12

ANAHEIM, Calif. (UPI)—Twelve-year-old Nick Neely, all 70 pounds of him, was trembling with fright.

The sixth-grader was standing on the wing of a Cessna 442 plane as it flew over Sky-Lark Airport at 3,500 feet.

"Look at me," shouted Nick, a brave smile on his face. "I'm scared to death."

Then above the sound of the rushing wind a man in the plane screamed "Go!" and little Nick without a moment's hesitation jumped into space Tuesday to become what is believed the world's youngest parachutist.

His arms out wide in a perfect spread eagle, Nick plunged earthward for a second before a static line grew taut and released a parachute.

It's open," cried Nick's parents as they anxiously watched from the ground.

The 24-foot canopy blossomed and Nick's tiny figure slowly swung beneath it. He manipulated the guide lines and came down within 28 yards of his predetermined landing spot at the southern California field.

The Parachute Club of America

said the youngest jumper on its records before Nick was 14.

Nick had prepared for the jump for the past year, learning how to peek his own chute, how to jump how to land and roll over without injuring himself.

It started when his dad, Roland, an aircraft worker, took up the sport of parachuting known as skydiving. From his dad and ex-paratrooper Joe Parker, who accompanied him on the jump, Nick learned the art of jumping.

His mother, Betty, with slight misgivings, went along with Nick's desire. She made him a light-blue jump suit embroidered in yellow across the chest the name: Nick Neely.

Nick also wore a crash helmet and a parachute he packed himself when he made his jump.

"The kid trembled all the way up, but he went out without a bit of hesitation," said Parker, who jumped about a minute after Nick.

"If this is what he wants, I won't try to stop him," said his mother.

"I won't either," said his father. "Now that the worst is over."

The buxom San Francisco City College coed announced Thursday she was giving up school for a show business career.

Sandy accepted a two-week contract paying \$250 weekly at the Sahara Hotel to appear in a comic skit with Dave Barry.

Her costume, she said, will include a sweater—the article of clothing which college officials thought she should not wear because her 41-26-37 figure was too distracting to male students.

More Cuts In Foreign Aid Forecast

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A \$136,500,000 cut in President Eisenhower's foreign aid program voted by the House Foreign Affairs Committee shaped up today as a mere starter. Additional cuts of more than 1,500,000,000 were forecast.

The President asked for \$4,175,000,000 to finance military and economic assistance in the year starting July 1. The committee Thursday, all but finishing work on the authorization bill, trimmed this to \$4,038,500,000.

But an appropriations subcommittee handling funds for the program seemed certain to cut far deeper than that, Chairman Otto E. Passman (D-La.) told a reporter today he believed the people and Congress would be "greatly disappointed" if the subcommittee allowed more than \$2,500,000,000.

Mace Missile In Air Thursday

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—The Air Force successfully fired another of its swept-winged Mace guided missiles about 1,000 over the Atlantic Thursday.

The shot came shortly after a jet-powered Hound Dog missile, launched from beneath a B-52 bomber wing, soared several hundred miles before landing on its target off the West Coast of Florida in the Gulf of Mexico.

The Mace, a 44-foot-long weapon, tested engineering improvements.

The Foreign Affairs Committee also wrote into its bill a stern warning to the President that it wants no more aid funneled to the Fidel Castro government in Cuba.

Other major developments:

Rackets: The Senate Rackets Committee went out of business at midnight after three years of inquiry. But the demise may be only temporary. A resolution to extend its life until next Jan. 31 is pending on the Senate calendar.

Bombings: FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover has suggested to Congress and federal aviation authorities that bombings on commercial airliners could be prevented by X-raying passengers' baggage.

Hoover also proposed that fire in cockpits of commercial planes proof tape recorders be installed to record conversations of crews as an aide to accident investigators.

SELECT FISH PLAN—MOSCOW (UPI)—Japan Thursday turned down a Soviet plan for sharing the red salmon catch and claimed it was technically impractical to sort red salmon from other types of fish. The move came at a three-hour session of the Soviet-Japanese fish negotiations, the Soviet news agency Tass said Thursday night.

Poland To Sell Planes To Castro

HAVANA (UPI)—Communist Poland has agreed to sell Cuba airplanes, helicopters and heavy machines in exchange for sugar, coffee, tobacco and fruit, the Foreign Ministry announced today.

The announcement did not say what kind of planes Premier Fidel Castro's revolutionary regime expects to get from Poland.

The government has been collecting funds from individuals and organizations here to buy warplanes "for the defense of Cuba."

The United States and Britain have refused to sell Cuba military planes or helicopters for fear of heightening tension in the troubled Caribbean.

The trade agreement with Poland was the latest of a number of deals the Castro regime has made with the Communists in line with plans to "diversify" Cuban markets and strengthen commercial and political ties with all countries in the world.

The most notable previous arrangement was the cut-rate sugar deal with Russia negotiated by Soviet Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan during his recent visit to Cuba.

LOGS 530 MILLION MILES WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Federal Space Agency reports that the Pioneer V sun satellite has logged more than 30 million miles since its launching at Cape Canaveral, Fla., March 17. The 26-inch sphere is in an elliptical, 54.5-million-mile orbit around the sun between the earth and Venus.

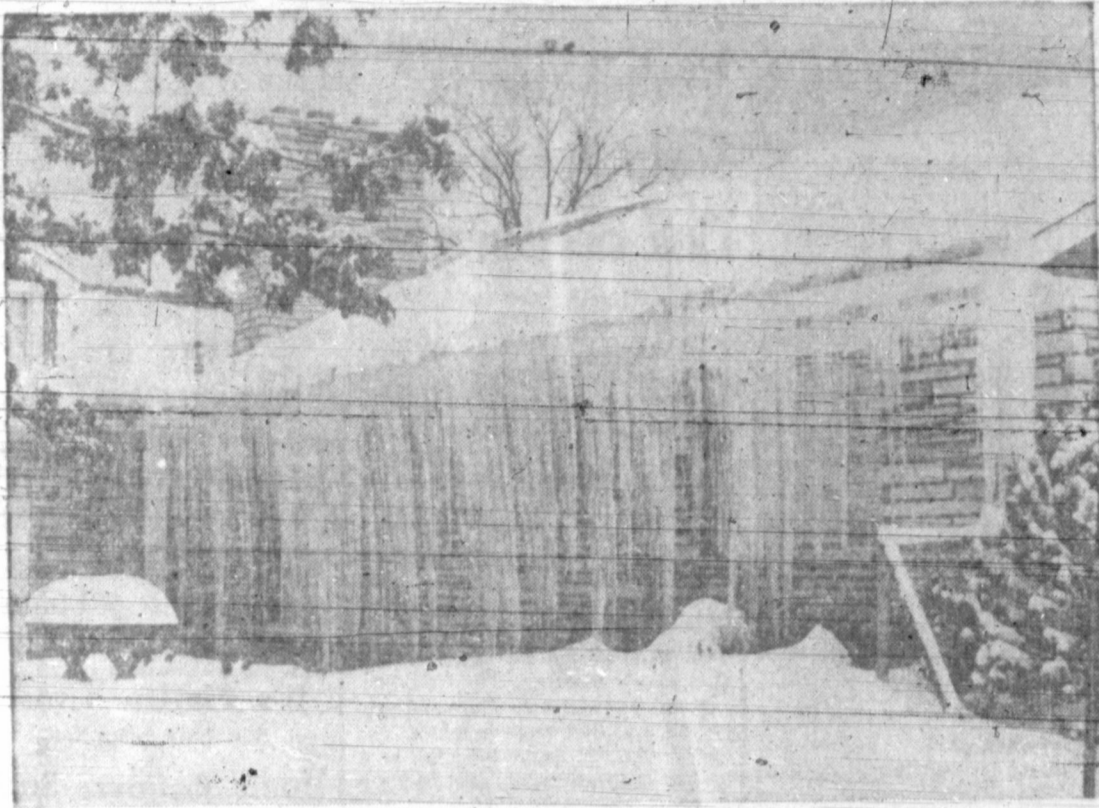

Segregation Demonstrations Follow Pattern Through South

Negro students opened the third month of their anti-segregation campaign today with new sit-down demonstrations at segregated lunch counters, new lawsuits, a mass withdrawal from classes at one college and a call to boycott the big pre-Easter store sales.

"Stay out of town until freedom is assured all over the stores," Negro students at Tallahassee, Fla., were urged. "No new outfit at all this Easter season. The students are fighting for very good reasons."

The pattern of demonstrations Thursday followed what has become almost a daily routine in all southern states except Mississippi for the past two months.

Ten Negro college students and a Negro minister were arrested for staging the first lunch counter demonstration at Birmingham, Ala.

Twenty persons, including 11 white college students, their professor and his wife from MacMurray College at Jacksonville, Ill., were arrested at Montgomery, Ala., for eating lunch together in a Negro restaurant.

The president of the Roanoke, Va., NAACP urged desegregation of city facilities without demonstrations but told a membership rally that if it comes to boycotts or sit-downs "I hope you are going to be ready."

Students of Southern University (Negro) near Baton Rouge, La., signed "withdrawal" cards threatening to leave classes unless 18 students expelled for their part in a big anti-segregation demonstration are reinstated.

A bi-racial committee at High Point, N.C., reported "encouraging" progress on a proposed compromise that would have all variety stores in the city integrate facilities on a 60-day trial basis.

A federal court suit on behalf of 18 Negro pupils at Memphis, Tenn., demanded immediate desegregation of all Memphis city schools.

Texas Gov. Price Daniel called for an investigation to find out if Communists inspired a demonstration at Marshall, Tex.

'Liberal' Tag On 'Rocky' Said A Hoax

ALBANY, N.Y. (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's undisputed leadership of the powerful New York Republican organization was shaken today and Democrats charged his claims of liberalism had been "exposed as a hoax."

The multi-millionaire governor, who will head the state's big delegation to the Republican national convention in Chicago this summer, was handed the most serious setback of his political career when the GOP-dominated state Senate rejected two of his major legislative recommendations for 1960.

During the closing hours of the annual legislative session, lawmakers turned down a Rockefeller proposal to outlaw racial or religious bias in the sale or rental of private housing throughout the state. Earlier, Republican lawmakers blasted his recommendations on a nuclear fallout shelter program for the state's 16 million residents.

Rocketteller said he was especially "hurt" by failure of the Senate to approve the anti-bias legislation after he had maneuvered it through the Assembly.

He said rejection of the bill would harm the Republican Party nationally.

Democratic state chairman Michael H. Prendergast laid failure of the anti-discrimination bill at Rockefeller's doorstep. He said the governor's 1960 legislative program "unmasked him as the courageous champion of liberal thinking for popular causes."

Political Ad Seeks Votes Of Protestants

MILWAUKEE (UPI) — Demands poured in today for an investigation of a political advertisement urging Protestants to vote for Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.) in the Wisconsin presidential primary Tuesday.

The religious issue, ever in the background in the campaign between Humphrey and Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.), a Roman Catholic, flared into the open Thursday when the advertisement appeared in most of the state's weekly newspapers.

The two-column, six-inch advertisement "Let's give Humphrey a square deal. A leading pollster reports solidarity of Catholic voters for Kennedy is far greater than that of Protestants behind Humphrey. Included are normally Republican voters who said they would back Nixon against any Democratic except Kennedy."

"Should Republican voters like those quoted above determine who the Democratic nominee should be?"

Wisconsin Gov. Gaylord A. Nelson, a Democrat, was asked to investigate the ad, which he labeled "reprehensible" in a "crude and offensive attempt to stir up religious prejudice."

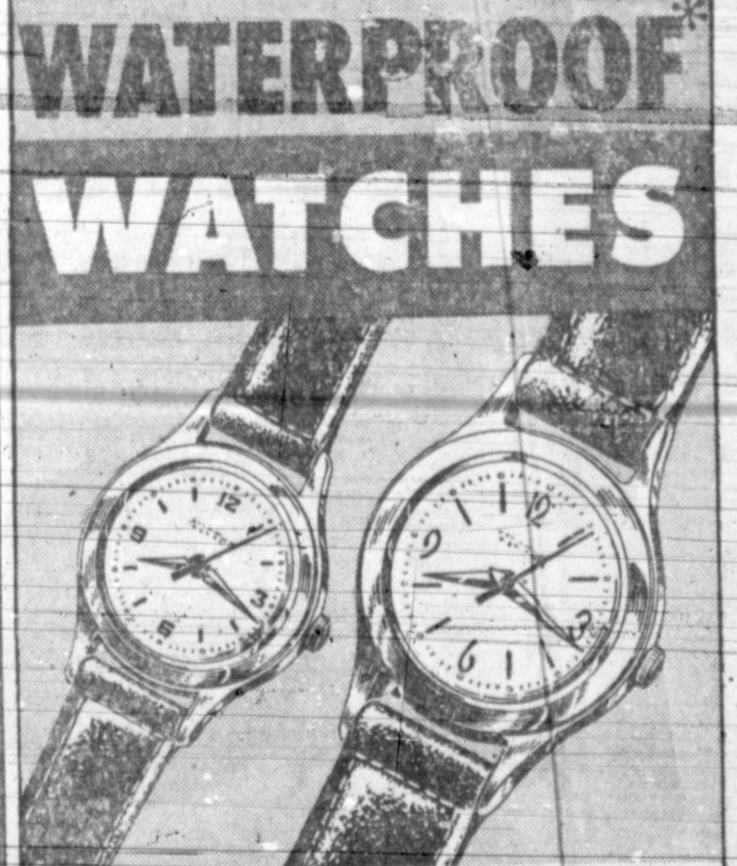
Both Humphrey and Kennedy and all their followers remained categorically firm in denying any connection with the advertisement.

Early this morning the man who has admitted being the promoter of the idea was found in Chicago, preparing to take a bus back to his Tampa, Fla., home. Charles Greene, formerly of Milwaukee and a one-time state chairman of the Democratic Party, refused to say who was involved in the matter with him.

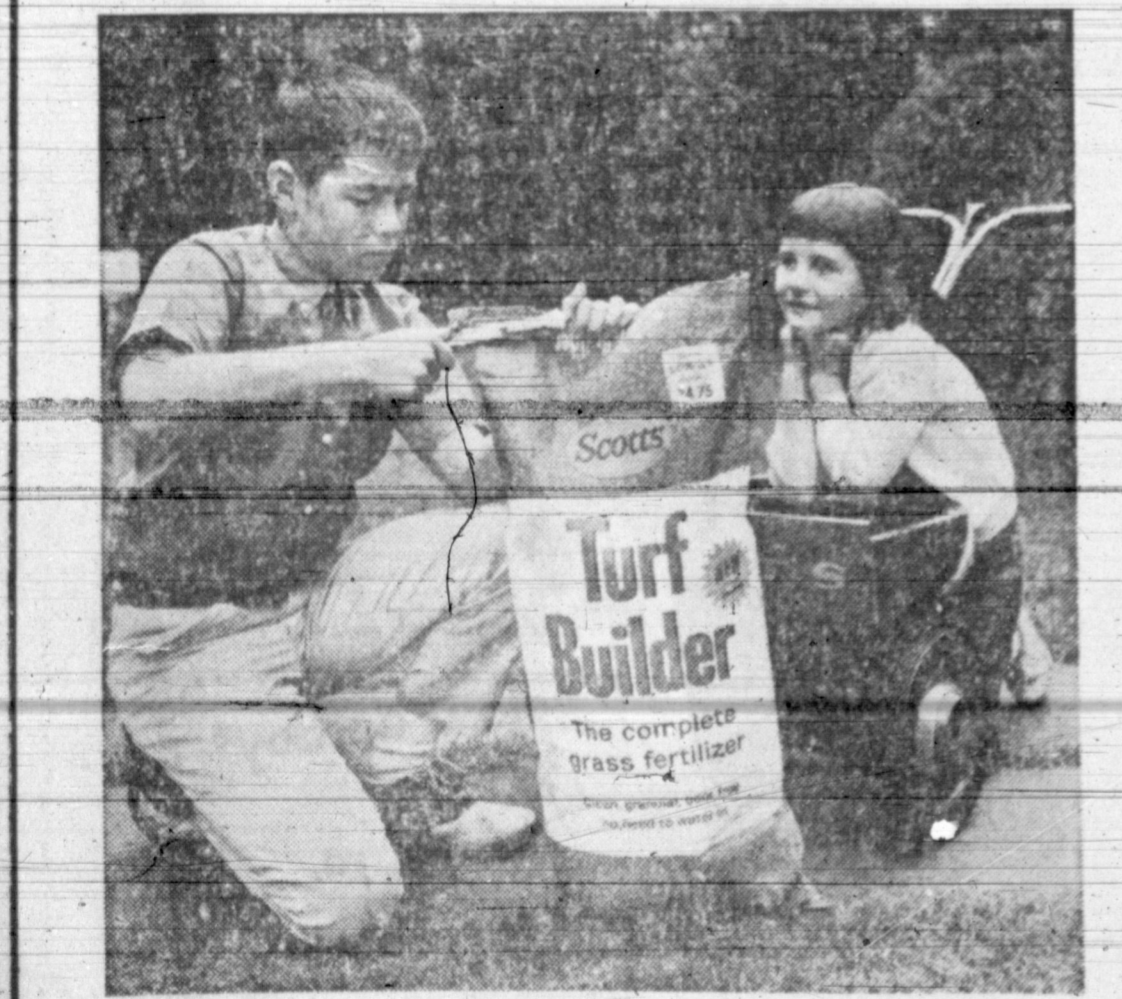

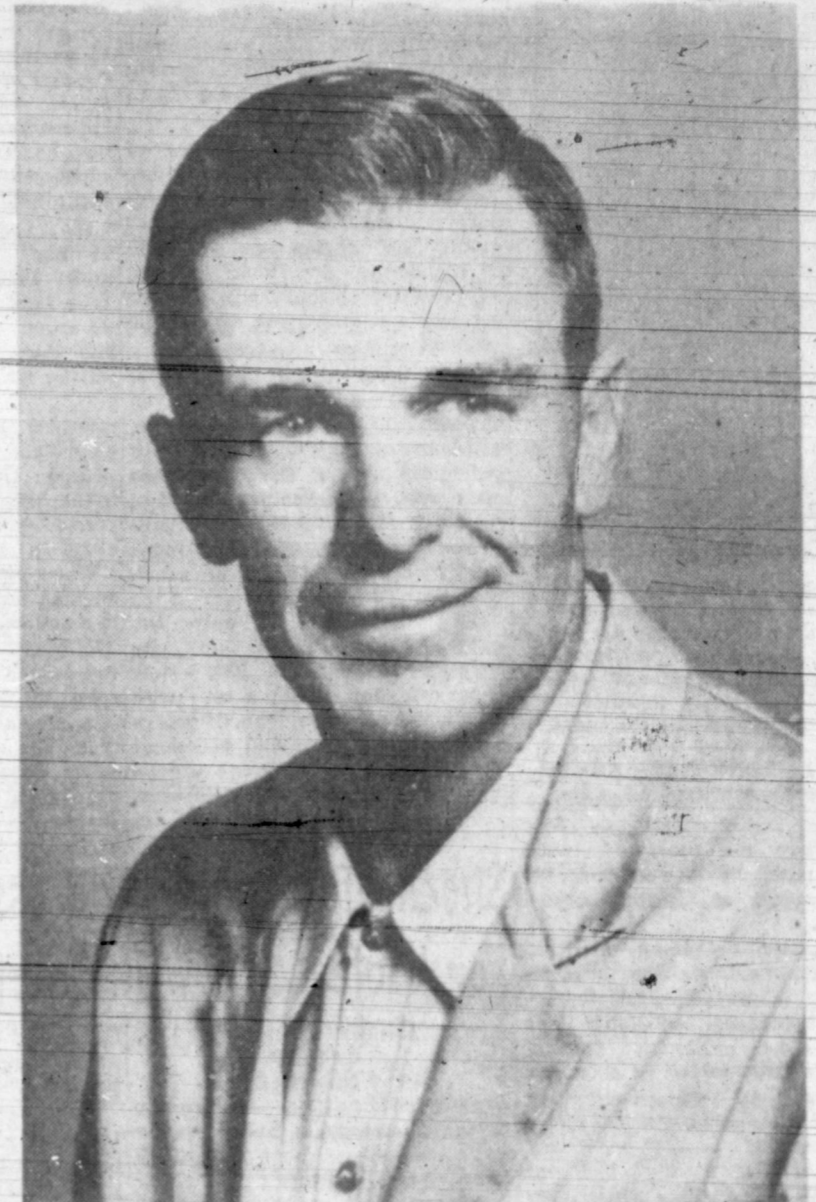

Shock Of Changing Addresses Lessened For Adolescents With Careful Planning

WOMAN'S VIEW By GAY PAULEY UPI Women's Editor NEW YORK (UPI)—Moving day to the homemaker means clutter and confusion, but eventually clean closets. What does it mean to a child? Emotional upset? Shock? At least two national organizations are worrying about the matter, especially since we've become a nation of changing addresses. An estimated 11 million Americans will move this year, compared with 31 million a decade ago. The American Assn. for Childhood Education, Washington, said this meant that six million children from five to 13 years will pull up roots and plant them elsewhere. The American Assn. for Family Living, a child study group with headquarters in Chicago, studied the effects of moving for one of the nation's carriers (Allied Van Lines) and found that "the emotional effect depends mainly on

the age of the individual child and its existing relationship with its parents." It indicated that if the child is loved, is emotionally healthy, and there is a happy household atmosphere, there is little danger of upset. Each association put together a list of suggestions for making M-Day a happy one for children. Here are some from the family living group. —If you have an infant, see that you are near him, feed him on schedule and cuddle him often. However, baby is the one least likely to be upset by moving. —The pre-school child is the most vulnerable. Give him a preview of his new home by a visit if possible, and let him pack a favorite toy in his suitcase. —You can tell the school-age youngster about the move and reasons for making it. Let him select the color scheme for his room in the new house; in addition to arranging the furniture as he wishes. —Don't try to erase all memories of the old home overnight. Let the ties be loosened gradually. —Be tolerant of disturbing symptoms if they do occur and don't deny a child's need for extra attention. —To older children, such activities as the Little League, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts are all important affairs. Make every effort to insure a place for children in such organizations before you move to the new community. —The pre-school child probably is better off with a neighbor on the day the moving men arrive. The Childhood Education Association booklet suggested: —"With a few dolls, a wagon and some empty boxes, the whole process of moving—packing, loading, taking off, eating on the way, unloading, unpacking, more eating—can be acted out again and again before the day arrives." This conditioning was suggested for pre-school children. —"Let there be no hurry about getting all the settling done. Stop for snacks frequently. If neighbors' children are on the fringes, invite them in for a share. Stop work occasionally for a walk to the near-by grocery, drugstore or postoffice, or for a short ride to see where Dad is working, or to locate the library or the ball park."

Theologians Study Age-Old Question: What Is Hell?

RELIGION IN AMERICA By LOUIS CASSEYS United Press International

Is hell a place of eternal punishment to which unrepentant sinners are consigned at death, and from which they can never hope to escape? There are passages in the Bible that seem to say it is, and this view has been incorporated in the traditional teachings of many Christian bodies, including the Catholic Church and most fundamentalist Protestant denominations.

But some Christians cannot accept the idea that hell has a one-way door. They believe that God's love for his human children is such that he intends for all of them ultimately to be saved. Both viewpoints have been under intensive study during the past five years in a special commission of 43 Protestant theologians. The commission was appointed by the United Church of Canada, a denomination created in 1925 by the merger of Canadian Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregationalist churches.

Its report has been published in a 126-page booklet entitled "Life and Death—A Study of the Christian Hope." Anyone who turns to this report seeking pat answers will be disappointed. The commission concluded that the Bible does not provide "a Baedeker's guide to the next world" and that no particular doctrine of final judgment can be conclusively proved by proved by scriptural texts.

On one hand, it said, Christians "cannot and dare not deny the reality of hell. Jesus may have been speaking symbolically" in His parables about the last judgment, but His teachings add up to an unmistakable warning that men face a "final reckoning before God." He made it crystal clear that "sin is a desperately serious matter... and must have dire consequences" for the unrepentant sinner.

Moreover, the Canadian theologians said, the concept of punishment after death is not inconsistent with God's nature as a loving and merciful Father. "Some form of punishment, in the next world if not in this, may be necessary if sinners are to be brought to a realization of what their rebellion has meant to God in the rejection of His love and the frustration of His purpose."

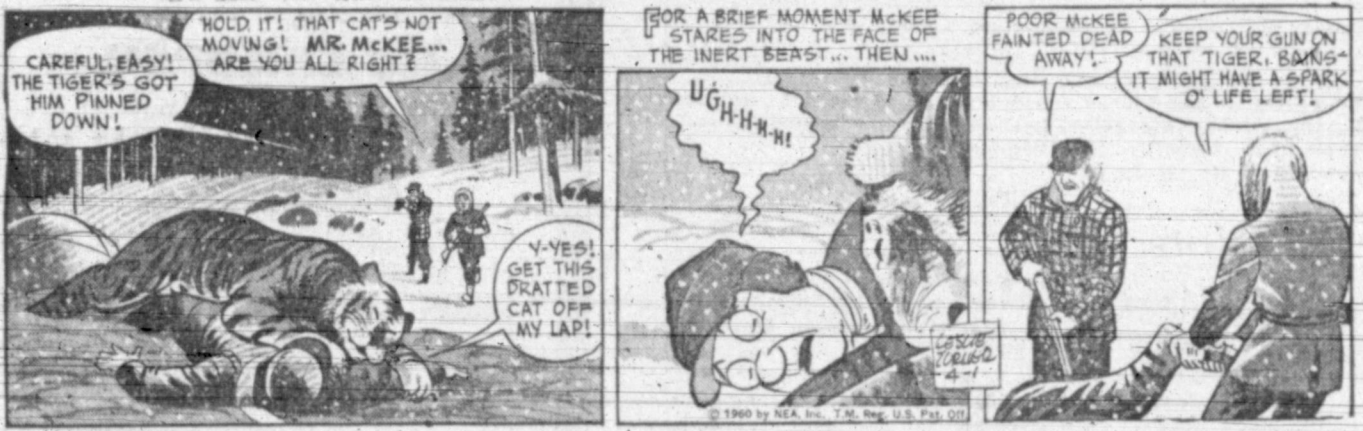

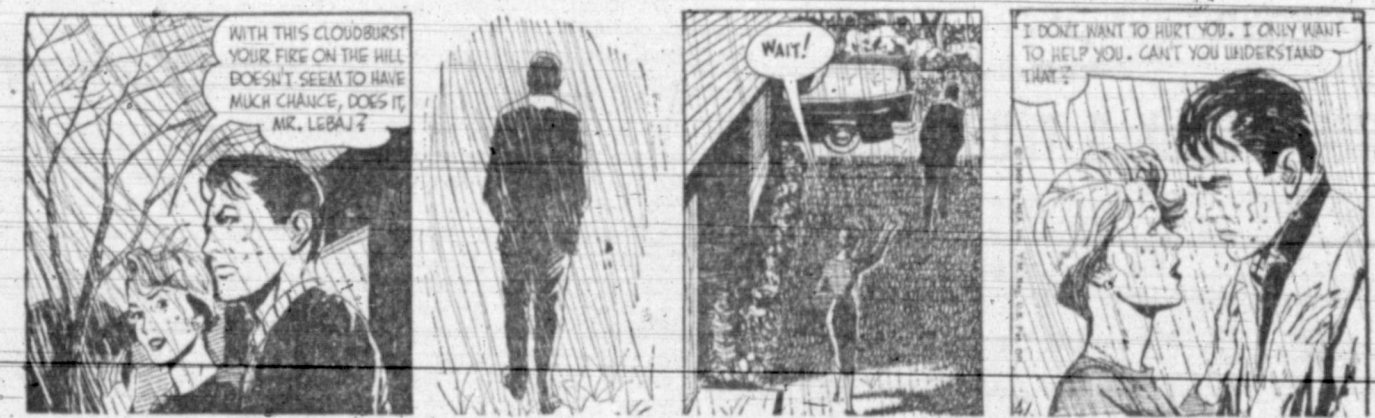

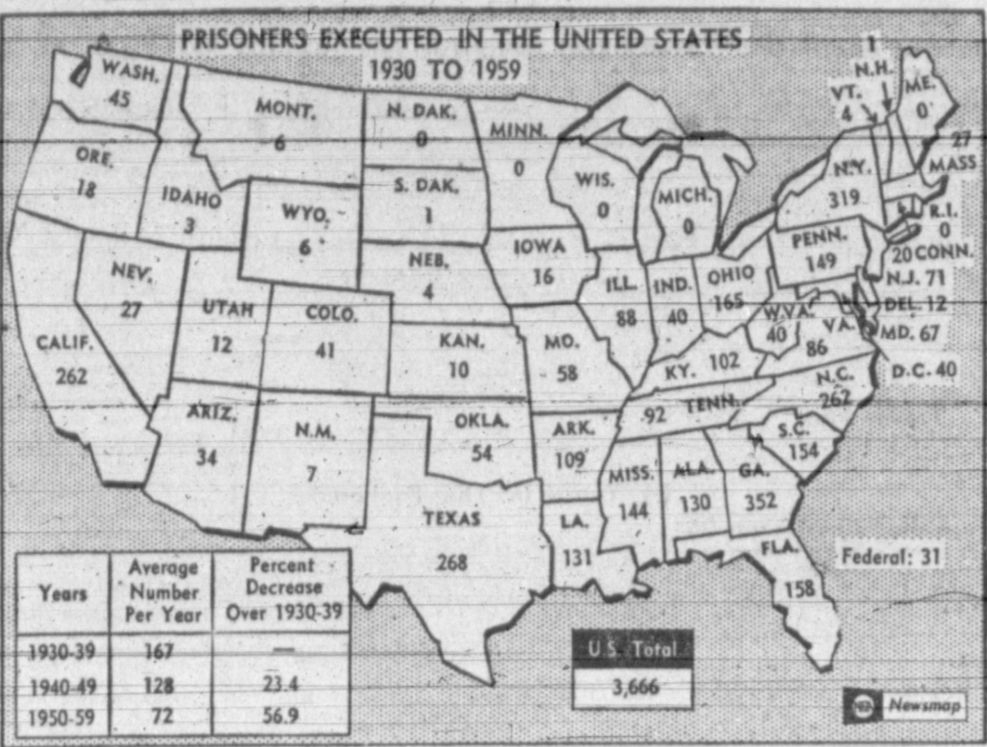

SUPREME PENALTY—A total of 3,666 persons were executed in the United States in federal and state institutions during the 30 years from 1930 through 1959. Thirty-one were women. In 1959, 49 executions were carried out, one more than the record low of 48 in 1958. Forty-one were for murder and eight for rape. Prisoners' ages ranged from 18 to 58; the average was 34. Gas was used in nine executions, electrocution in 40. With a few exceptions, such as for treason, seven of the continental states do not have the death penalty (including Delaware as of April 2, 1958). In South Dakota the penalty was abolished from 1920 to 1938; in Kansas from 1920 to 1934. Although a record total of 164 prisoners were awaiting execution at the close of 1959, the average number of executions is declining. Data from U.S. Bureau of Prisons.

"Our father did six months before I was born," Jeanne said. "And, in order to take care of the family, Mom borrowed money on her earrings."

"Mom was left with no money or insurance policies, just those earrings, and they were worth about \$2,000. Dad bought them for her as a special gift and they were beautiful cut diamond drops."

"That's all mom had left to pull us out of tough situations when the five children were growing up. Whenever a major problem arose, she'd pawn the earrings."

"All my four brothers were working enough just to keep us going," she said. "Those earrings became a source of strength

to us.

"I guess Mom pawned them twice a year for 10 years," she laughed. "We never left them in the pawn shop though, my brothers would always find some extra work to pay the loan."

"Jimmie wasn't a big star then. He was only starting out in vaudeville and couldn't help out much. My brother Harry was going to medical school and sometimes mom hooked the earrings to pay his tuition."

"Schooling was important with my mother and she would always borrow money for our education," Jeanne explained. "Many children in our neighborhood never graduated from high school, but mom saw to it that all of us got an education."

Mrs. Cagney's persistence paid off. Of the four Cagney boys, Jimmie is a successful actor, Harry, a doctor, Bill, a producer and real-estate man, and Ed is a retired doctor.

What became of the good luck earrings?

"When mother died in 1945, she left them to me," Jeanne said. "But, they were made for somebody who looked like mom. So they never looked good on me. Seeing that I couldn't wear them, I had the earrings made into a beautiful ring," she said.

"I treasure that ring very much. To me, it represents the survival of the Cagneys."
