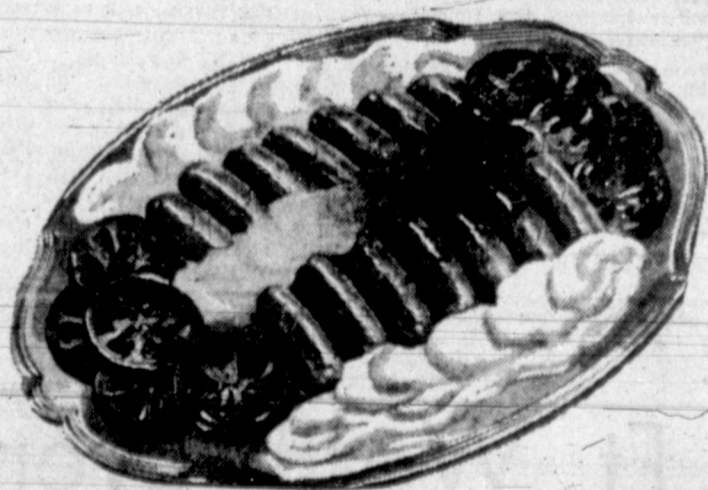

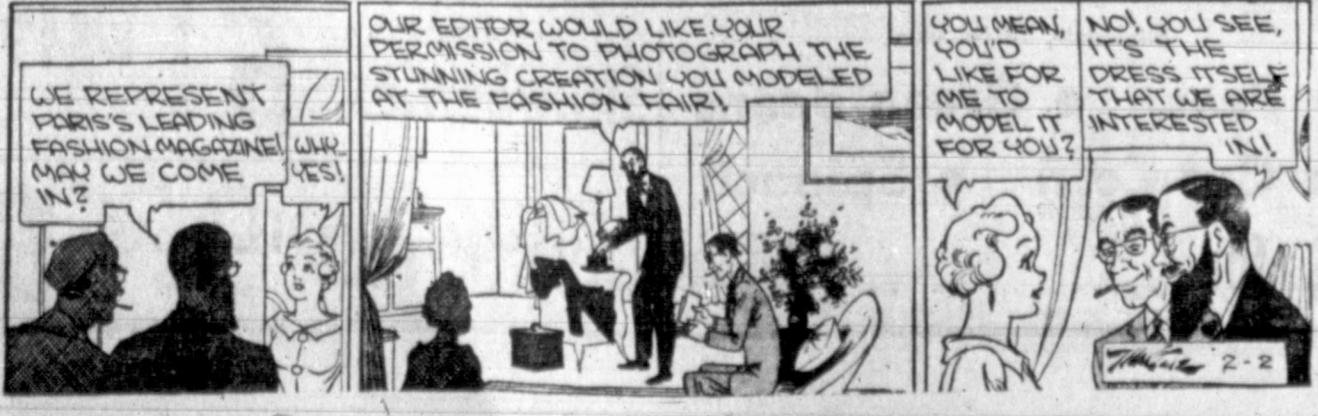

SAFARI FOR SOUL

WITH BILLY GRAHAM IN AFRICA

ACCRA, Ghana — It was nearly ten o'clock at night. Clusters of window shoppers eyed shirts and lamps in an imposing Accra department store. On the sidewalk nearby sat a woman selling bread. Beside her slept four little children. Unworned leaves lay in a tray in the dusty street. In nearby market areas which would soon bustle with activity scores of men slept in doorways, on porches and on the pavement. They had come to Ghana from neighboring countries hoping to earn a meager living by carrying head loads and guarding buildings with their bodies. A few hours earlier, fifteen thousand Ghanians, including the Lord Bishop of Accra, had thronged the brand new seaside sports arena to hear an American evangelist proclaim Christ's love as the answer to mankind's hate, greed and frustration. Dressed in strikingly colorful tribal habits and religious garbs, people had come on foot and in hundreds of taxis, modern buses and "mammy trucks" with plank seats and fascinating motto signs. Magnificent public and commercial buildings rising all over this budding capital reflect the inflow of foreign capital and a new sense of values centering on education, trade and prestige. Prime Minister Kwame Nkrumah's picture is everywhere, even on the tip pins of his followers. A few miles up the winding Kumasi Road, astride a mountain ridge, nestles the magnificent country house of Nkrumah, who is hailed in government-controlled papers as Africa's Messiah. The symbol of a new religion called Africanism, who, they say "may well be the second Christ who cometh when the babes in the womb are suffering from Stroutium Ninety."

Marine Guards Disgraced

LONDON (UPI)—Seven of the U. S. Marines who guard the embassy here are being sent home in disgrace as cigarette and whisky smugglers. Four sergeants and three corporals were reduced to private Monday by a court-martial, fined and ordered back to the United States. A British newspaper said the seven men would be flown back to the states today, but the report could not be confirmed immediately. U. S. authorities have refused to identify the erring guards. The case against the Marines was based on testimony by a Dutch aircraft worker — husband of a former embassy telephone operator—who said the Marines sold him tax-free cigarettes and whisky. The worker, Lambertus van Veggel, had eight bottles of untaxed whisky and more than 35 cartons of cigarettes in his car when he was caught. He told police he had more than 370 cartons of untaxed cigarettes at home. Veggel was fined \$700 for illegal possession of the untaxed goods. His \$2,750 automobile was confiscated because he had not paid customs duty on it.

Bandits Rob For Money Or Kicks?

CHULA VISTA, Calif. (UPI)—The masked bandit has struck again and left two more waitresses nude and complaining. One waitress who was disrobed at gunpoint three times is threatening not to go back to work. The bandit hit the same bar for the third time Monday. He robbed the bartender and two male customers of \$100 and locked them in the men's room. He turned to Mrs. Geraldine Stoner and another waitress, Mrs. Mattie Book, and ordered them to take off their clothing. "She knows what to do," he said pointing to Mrs. Stone, who had received the same treatment on his two previous visits. After the women undressed he cut the telephone wires, gathered up the waitresses' clothing and fled. The same man robbed the bar

last Wednesday and fled with the women's clothes, and also struck about six months ago. He has not molested any of his victims. Police said he apparently was the same man who robbed another bar Sunday night, took \$148 and clothing from two waitresses.

SOVIET BLUNDER
Russia may have tripped into one of its greatest diplomatic blunders in its postwar relations with Japan. It has threatened to keep two Japanese islands, which it got in World War II, unless Japan tears up its new security treaty with the United States. Such is the national indignation in Japan at this interference that it has served to counter the highly vocal opposition to the treaty among Japanese leftists. The backfire may bring the Russians up sharply in their dealings with other Asians.
BATTLE FOR BIZERTE
When France gave Tunisia its independence four years ago, it kept the huge strategic naval base of Bizerte. Now the Tunisians want that too and are starting to start next Monday Tunisians turn the psychological screws. Starting next Monday Tunisians probably will begin a series of protest strikes, demonstrations and diplomatic pressures gauged at further making life miserable for France in North Africa.
IKE'S LATIN TRIP
The U. S. Secret Service will, as usual, accompany President Eisenhower on his Latin American trip. Not the least of its worries will come when he hits Chile. This nation is plagued by one of the most active Communist groups in South America. The Communists and other leftists have seized every occasion to blame Chile's economic plight on the United States. This, in part, will be an impression Eisenhower will try to correct.
BLACK GOLD
The search for oil in the Sahara and other regions of the world appears to have as an exciting future as it has a past. Present prospects are that West Europe, in 15 years, will double its demand for energy and U. S. needs will increase by 60 per cent. This is to say nothing of the needs which will grow in Africa and Asia. Atomic energy may take up some of the slack but it still will be a baby by 1975.

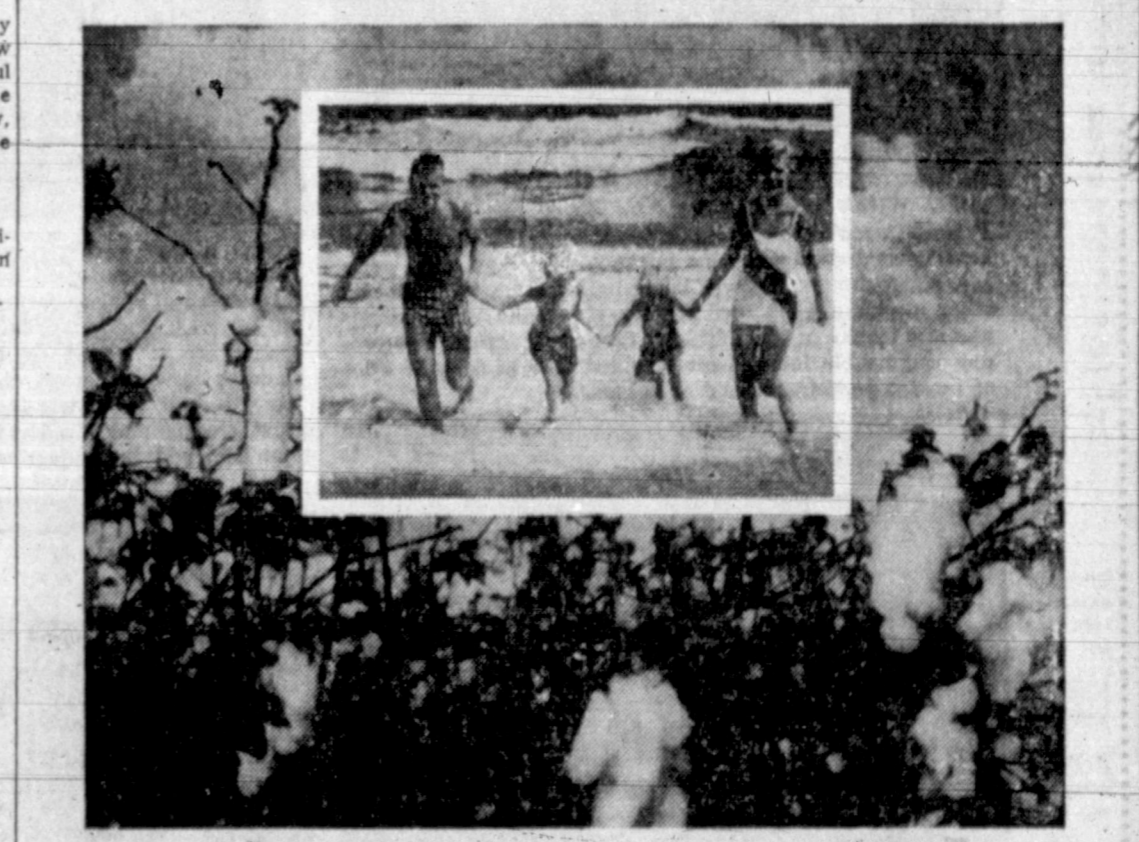

Ailing General Said Improving

NEW YORK (UPI)—Further gradual improvement was expected today for Ailing Gen. of the Army Douglas MacArthur who has been hospitalized since Friday with a urinary tract disorder. The five-star general, who celebrated his 80th birthday a week ago, was visited Monday by Lt. Gen. Leonard D. Heaton, surgeon general of the Army, who flew here from Washington. Heaton had operated on President Eisenhower for ileitis in 1956. He conferred with MacArthur's specialist, Dr. George W. Slaughter. They issued a statement which said MacArthur was showing gradual improvement which can be expected to continue. Slaughter said later that MacArthur is progressing better than normally would be expected. He indicated that the general has a stronger constitution than most men his age. 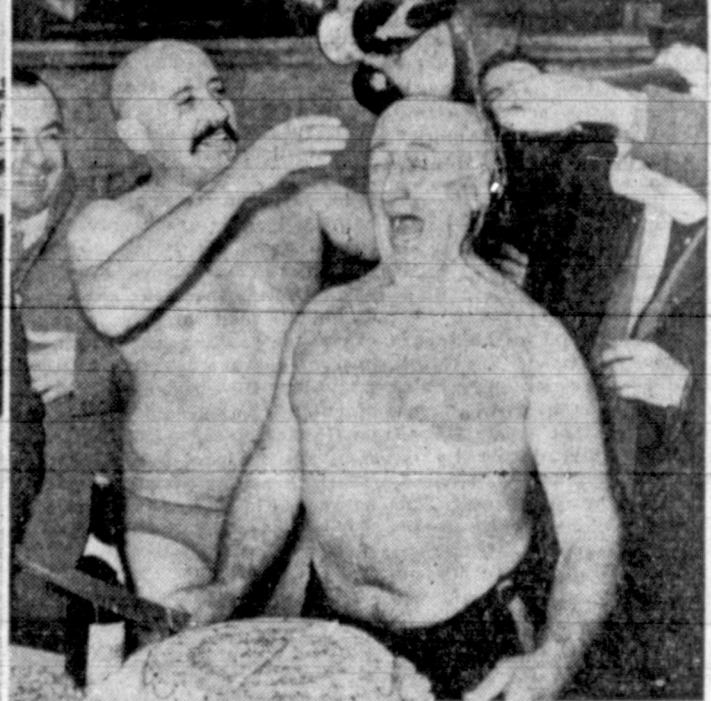

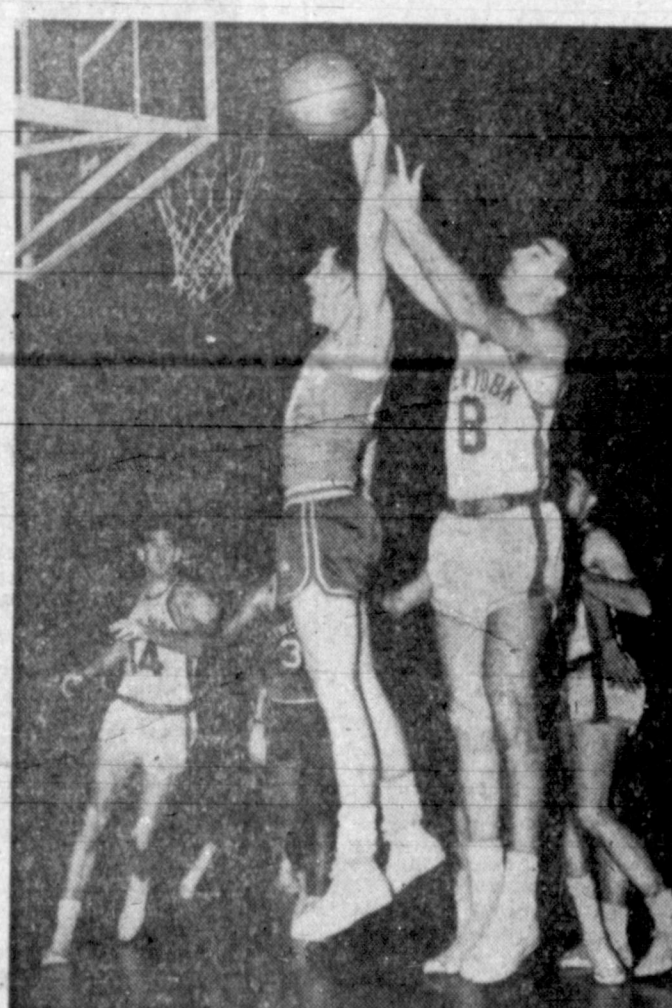

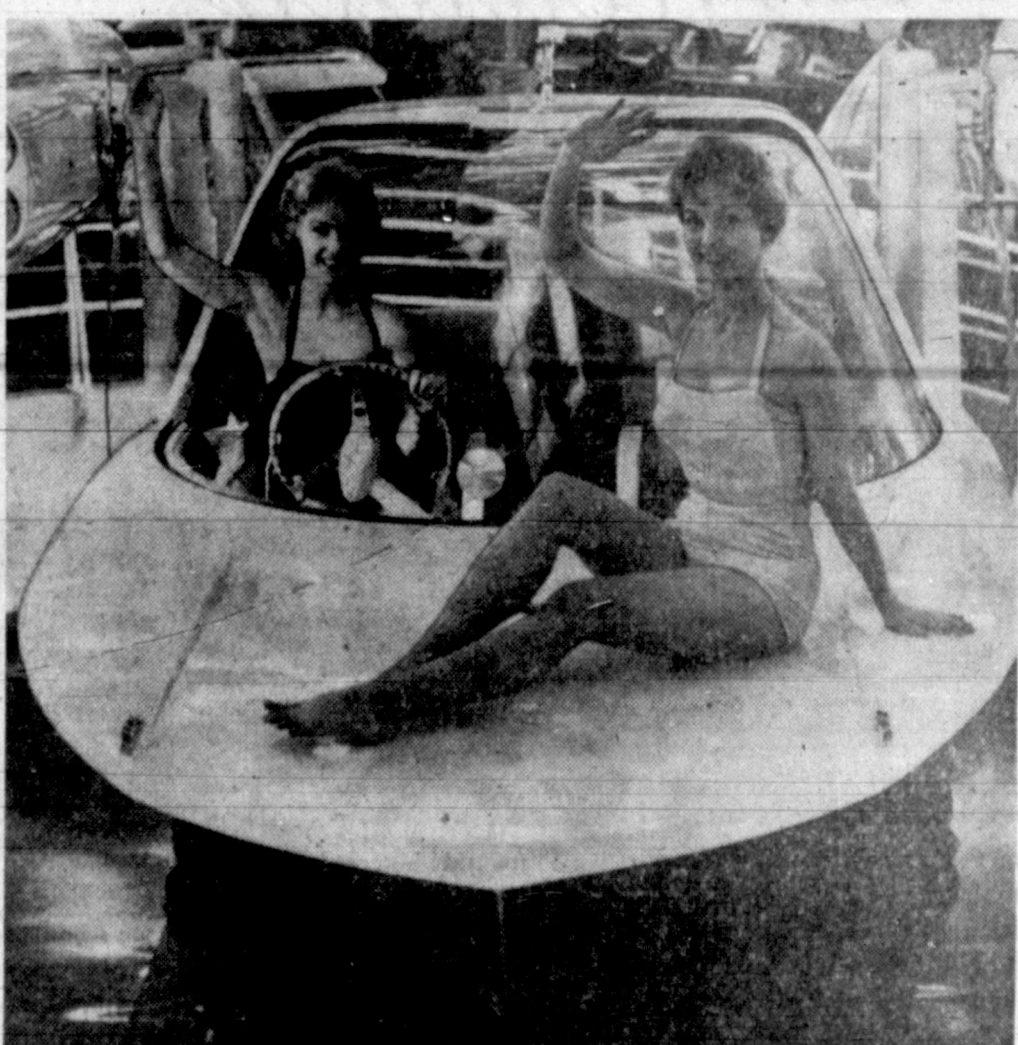
