





Is A Summit Meeting

Casting Pearls To Swine? When we think of the proposed Summit Meeting between Khrushchev and Eisenhower, we cannot help but recall Jesus' advice, Matthew 7:6: "give not that which is holy unto the dogs, neither cast ye your pearls be-fore swine, lest they trample them under their feet, and turn again and rend you"

Now, in order to understand that, of course, we would have to understand what is "holy" and what "pearls" are. To me they are about the same thing. "Pearls" is your life that the Creator has given you, and your life is also "holy", because you're responsible for your acts, since God gave man the right to choose, realizing that was the only way that man could develop.

Now, we'd have to define what a "dog" is and what a "swine" is in order to understand this admonition of Jesus'. A "dog", of course, is an animal that has no principles. It does not understand the difference between right and wrong. Neither does a swine understand the difference between right and wrong. It does not recognize that there are eternal, immutable laws that govern the universe, including human relations.

And, of course, it is a waste of time or "pearls" or that which is "holy" to be discussing things with dogs or swine or men who deny the existence of principles; who deny the existence of what is right; who deny the Commandments; who are horrified with the idea set forth in the Declaration of Independence that governments derive their just power from the consent of the governed: that all men are endowed by the Creator with certain inalienable rights.

Swine and Khrushchev and dogs do not believe that. They believe that they are super-powers that have the right if they have enough power to rule over their fellowman. They believe that all mankind is subject to their whim or their "general will," as determined by the man who has the most power. And, of course, Khrushchev and the man who denies general principles believe it is right to promise anything in order to get more power.

Repudiate Treaties They do not believe that men should be responsible for their acts. They believe they have a perfect right to repudiate their contracts and treaties, as they are doing with Berlin. When Berlin was made an island in E. Germany, it was agreed that the city should have access to West Germany. Of course, it was a very unwise agreement to ever enter into a contract with Stalin, because they should have known that they were casting pearls to swine and that they would trample the pearls under and attempt to rend you. And that, of course, is exactly what "super men" expect to do. They want to take possession of all of Europe step by step and turn it into Godless tyranny where the man with the most power and the most guns has control of everyone else. They want to plan the education, the water, the use of land, how a man can use his energy, how he can trade what he produces, leaving him nothing but a robot subject to the will of the dogs or the

Certainly no good can come from casting pearls to swine. The trouble is that most of our government bureaucrats have little conception of the order of the universe. They have little conception of the Ten Commandments, and they devote more time to escaping life by playing golf than they do to gaining understanding as to how little they really know and how incapable they are of planning the lives of other people. If they really belicved in and understood the Decalogue, they wouldn't be wasting the people's energy and money. And money secured on a free market is a "pearl" because it represents life and energy by attempting to pacify men that have no more principles than do dogs

Castro Just As Dangerous would seem to us that the best dealing with a nation that completely repudiates private property, as Russia has done and as Castro is doing, should be to sever diplomatic relations. The only objection to this is that we in the United States are also failing to recognize men's rights in private property. Possibly that's the reason we hate to sever diplomatic connections with Castro

## The Doctor Says:

by EDWIN P. JORDAN, M.D.

Many of us have disorders of speech. And since we communicate with one another mostly by the spoken word, a speech disorder may be a crippling handicap in our social lives and ca-

Some speech disorders may be corrected. A hairlip, cleft palate, tongue tie causing a lisp or a nose obstruction causing a twang may be remedied by skilled sur-

Some disorders are due to paralysis of the nerve that regulates the tension of the vocal cord. These are very difficult to correct. And some are due to overuse or misuse of the delicate cords as in the case of singers, clergymen and political orators. These respond to rest and instruction in voice production often best given by a singing teach-

But the two disturbances that worry most parents are delayed speech in the growing youngster and stammering or stuttering.

Wendell Johnson of the Uni versity of Iowa, perhaps the leading student of speech disorders, recently has completed a study of 500 child stammerers and their parents." While professor Johnson insists that he is engaged primarily in the gathering of facts, there are valuable hints in his work that may be of service to stutterers and their fami-

Each of us has noted that there is no set pattern for the stutterer. The block does not always occur at the same time, in the same place or with the same word or

This suggests that the block is mental rather than physical. And the Johnson work suggests that the cause of the block may rest not with the stutterer but with the listener, particularly a nervous and high-strung parent. This is how the trouble takes

The child with perfectly normal speech equipment manifests the same amount of hesitation and repetitions that all children exhibit as they learn the very difficult art of talking. The doting parent, frightened by what he or she regards as the beginning of a speech disorder, redoubles efforts to get the child to speak. Parent and child become tense

In the last recession, these three groups lost three - fourths of a million members. Much of that was probably recession caused, and will be recovered in the boom, Labor Department men predict. But they expect the net in the long run to be a decline.

Unions started growing vigorous ly in the 30s. Back in 1933, only five per cent of the labor force belonged to unions. By 1946, that membership was up to 23.5 per

But in the last 14 years, unions have done little more than hold their own overall. Even before the last recession unions had begun to go backward a little. Though membership was growing, their strength was moving down slightly as a share of the total la-
