

According to this definition, a man does not 'love' his employer unless he is prepared to 'love' a bad employer as well as; and as much as, a good employer.

Every so often there are press accounts of debates between phy sicians over the advisability and wisdom of telling the black truth to patients afflicted with fatal

In what may be my ignorance

wonder that any experienced

doctor should permit himself to engage in a debate of this kind. For the obvious answer to this disturbing question cannot be anything other than "It depends." Let me illustrate what I mean by examples: You couldn't reasonably be ex-

pected-to tell the black truth to child with leukemia who faced almost certain death within the course of the next year. But neither could you tell a

white lie to a doomed man or woman whose faith required administration of last rites before the fatal termination You'd certainly not hesitate to

tell the white lie to a patient whose exploratory operation, a few days previously, had revealed a spreading growth the surgeon couldn't possibly remove. But you couldn't deny the black truth to a man of affairs responsible for the conduct of a great corporation. Nor could you even shade the

truth for one who, like a patient of mine many years ago, planned to seek the nomination for the governorship of his native state. The decision, once again, may

depend not so much on condion the doctor's situation. A staff physician, treating a patient from a distant locality, might not be in a position to imperil the reputation of his clinic by giving false assurances to the homebound man or woman. Yet, faced with the identical

patient, the local physicianfriend might, and usually does, put his reputation on the line and lie like the proverbial trooper. Maybe it's wholly an ethical rather than a medical problem. 
