Girls Flee Pittsburgh Hotel Fire

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Fire broke out in the Penn-Sheraton Hotel early this morning, routing 118 girl students from their rooms on the 21st floor of the 24-story building.

No one was reported injured. Fire officials said the blaze erupted in a grease duct in a grill located in the basement of the 1,600-room hotel, the city's largest.

Flames and heavy smoke, forced up the duct, shot high in the air over the structure.

Battalion Chief John Brickley said the radiation of heat set fire to a storage room on the 19th

floor but the flames were extinguished in about 15 minutes.

The girls, some of them panicky and red-eyed from the smoke, were moved to quarters on the fourth floor by firemen and hotel officials.

As thick clouds of smoke filled the corridors, Mrs. Frances Colfer, the house mother for the students, kept shouting, "Take care of my girls." Mrs. Colfer was in tears.

Eight companies answered the two-alarm fire and continued searching the building for any further breakouts for two hours after the fire erupted at 1 a.m., EST.

Kennedy Says LBJ's Deer Shot 'Perfect'

JOHNSON CITY (UPI)—Lyndon B. Johnson wouldn't think of disputing the word of President-elect John F. Kennedy.

And if Kennedy said his Vice President-to-be brought down an eight-point buck with a perfect heart shot at 600 yards—so be it.

When the two national leaders got back from their seven-hour hunt 30 miles south of the LBJ Ranch Thursday, they had bagged four deer, the legal limit, between them.

It was Kennedy's first deer hunt. He was bubbling with enthusiasm. But he seemed more tickled about Johnson's shot than he was with his own two kills, both at a range of about 300 yards.

"It was the best shot I have ever seen," Kennedy said.

And after the meeting with Texas Democratic leaders and a flight to Bergstrom Air Force Base in Austin, where he hopped aboard his chartered jet airliner for the trip back to Palm Beach, Fla., he was still talking about it.

Finally, with a laugh, Johnson remarked to newsmen on the sly: "It was Kennedy and not me that said it was 600 yards."

Johnson and Kennedy drove to the hunting area in a white convertible. They were armed with Winchester 30-06 rifles. How many shots did the President-elect miss before he bagged his first deer? "That," Kennedy said, "falls behind the cloak of executive privilege."

There was one minor casualty in the hunting party. Rep. Torbert MacDonald, congressman from Massachusetts, returned with a cut nose. He explained that the telescopic lens struck him when his rifle recoiled after he fired a shot.

MacDonald didn't get a deer. But another of the President-elect's associates from Massachusetts, Kenneth C. O'Donnell, got one.

Johnson said the venison was being prepared by his ranch hands and Kennedy's meat would be packaged and shipped to his home in Hyannis Port, Mass., for the family dinner table.

Rotarians Hear Talk On Inflation

Bob Brummal, Berger businessman, Wednesday told the Pampa Rotary club that the greatest threat facing the American people was inflation.

Reciting the historical experiences of France, the speaker said that in 1790, a barrel of flour cost 40 cents. In five years, the same quantity cost forty-five dollars.

Explaining how inflation has eroded the value of the American dollar, Brummal said that a seventy-five dollar Series E Savings Bond purchased in 1945 would today be redeemable at \$112.40. In terms of the 1945 dollar's purchasing power, the pay off would be the equivalent of \$78.60 and if the party cashing the bond was in the 26 per cent income tax bracket, he would lose an additional \$7.64.

C. A. Huff was called upon to make a few remarks concerning the election, next Tuesday, as to whether-or-not Pampa will join in the Canadian River Municipality, Water Authority.

Huff said that he thought it was essential that Pampa participate in this project, explaining that the scarcity of water rights and the lowering water table presented a grave problem to Pampa's future. Huff, who has long been associated with the Canadian River project, urged those present to get the facts concerning the Authority, feeling assured they would vote for Pampa's inclusion in the eleven city venture.

Workers Dig In Debris Of Fallen Building

NEW YORK (UPI) — Workers, aided by a giant crane today dug through the wreckage of a five-story apartment building that collapsed with a roar into a huge excavation on Manhattan's East Side.

Police said that all nine residents of the building at 34th Street and Lexington Avenue in the shadow of the Empire State Building either managed to get out before the collapse or were not at home when the structure toppled shortly before midnight.

A first floor restaurant called the Four Seasons closed at 10 p.m. more than an hour before the building came thundering down. Residents lived in apartments on the upper three floors.

Police said the foundation apparently had been weakened by excavation in the area. The 2-foot hole next door had been scooped out for construction of a new apartment building.

Bartender Joe Granah, 29, who was sitting in a nearby bar, said he felt a tremor like an earthquake when the building began to come apart.

"I ran out and saw the building shaking," he said.

As dust spurted from the sides of the building, Granah ran to the front door, found it jammed, and kicked it open. He dashed up the stairs to the fourth floor where he found an 83-year-old widow covering in terror.

He carried her down the stairs and reached the street just as the building fell in a shower of flying brick, glass and wood.

Masonic graveside rites will be held for Mr. Stone, who was a member of the Masonic Order for 54 years. He is survived by one son, Riley Stone and four grandchildren, all of Anaheim; two brothers, E. A. Stone of Henderson, M. F. Stone of White Deer; four sisters, Mrs. F. B. Halbur of San Antonio, Mrs. Ida Duke of Lubbock, Mrs. F. W. Butler of Vernon and Mrs. F. F. Wheeler of Odessa.

Chrysler Ends Production Of DeSoto For Year

DETROIT (UPI) — Chrysler Corp. will halt all production of its De Soto line next month and there will be no car with the De Soto name plate for at least another year, auto industry sources said today.

The sources said the halt of production on the De Soto next month will signify the end of that name on cars of the size and description of the current models.

The corporation is considering introducing a small sports car in 1962 and using the De Soto nameplate on it, but the history of De Soto as a standard passenger car will come to an end next month, the sources said.

The Dodge and Chrysler divisions of Chrysler already are signing up dealers who now carry the De Soto line.

The nation's third largest auto maker paved the way for ending production of the De Soto when it introduced its 1961 models earlier this year.

It offered the De Soto in only one model and allowed the Chrysler Division to crowd into the already cramped market of the De Soto by introducing a new "economy" model of the Chrysler.

So far this year, Chrysler has produced only about 19,000 De Sotos, including about 2,400 1961 models. That's about 33 per cent of the total American car market. A year ago De Soto accounted for about 77 per cent of the American car market.

During September, when dealers were offering bargains in an attempt to clean up their stocks of 1960 model cars, only 1,243 De Sotos were sold, fewer than any other make of American car except the low-volume luxury car, Imperial.

It will be a year ago Saturday that the last casualty in the auto industry, Ford Motor's Edsel, was officially pronounced dead.

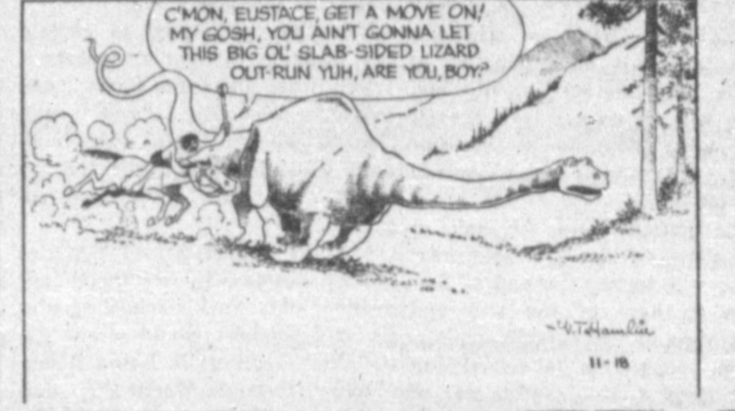

Thanksgiving Day Gains Commercialization Nod

The commercialization of Christmas is often deplored, and rightly so.
But there is another religious holiday that has been degraded even worse than Christmas.
It is the holiday that Americans will celebrate with turkey dinners and football games next Thursday.
By force of habit, we still call it "Thanksgiving Day."
The name stirs dim memories of a bygone era when Americans thought that God had something to do with the incredible material blessings that have been bestowed upon this land and its people.
That belief led our ancestors to set aside a special day, at the end of the harvest season each fall, for everyone to join in litting

thankful hearts to God.
The tradition has been enshrined in law, so the President of the United States continues to issue each year a proclamation declaring a national holiday for "thanks giving" on the fourth Thursday in November.
The churches also try to maintain the national pretense that Thanksgiving is a day of worship. They will conduct special services next Thursday, as they do every year. But they know in advance that these services will be very poorly attended. People just can't bother to go to church when there is so much cooking, eating and football-watching to be done.
A purely rational creature, transported here from another planet, might find it very difficult to understand why Americans of 1960 are less cognizant of the ir

blessings—or at least, less grateful for them—than their Puritan forefathers were.
The visitor would discover from our history books that the Puritans actually had it pretty tough. They had to scratch their livelihood from an untamed wilderness, and sometimes it was nip-and-tuck whether they survived.
Today, the visitor would observe, Americans are enjoying the most luxurious standard of living that any nation has ever known. With 6 per cent of the world's population, they are consuming 50 per cent of its wealth.
What has happened to America's sense of gratitude?
Abraham Lincoln put his finger on the answer 97 Thanksgivings ago. He said:
"We have forgotten the Gracious Hand which has preserved us in peace and multiplied and enriched and strengthened us."
"We have vainly imagined in the deceitfulness of our hearts that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own."
"Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us."
If that diagnosis was true in 1863, it is still more starkly appropriate today.
It is something to think about next Thursday, between the turkey dinner and the football game.

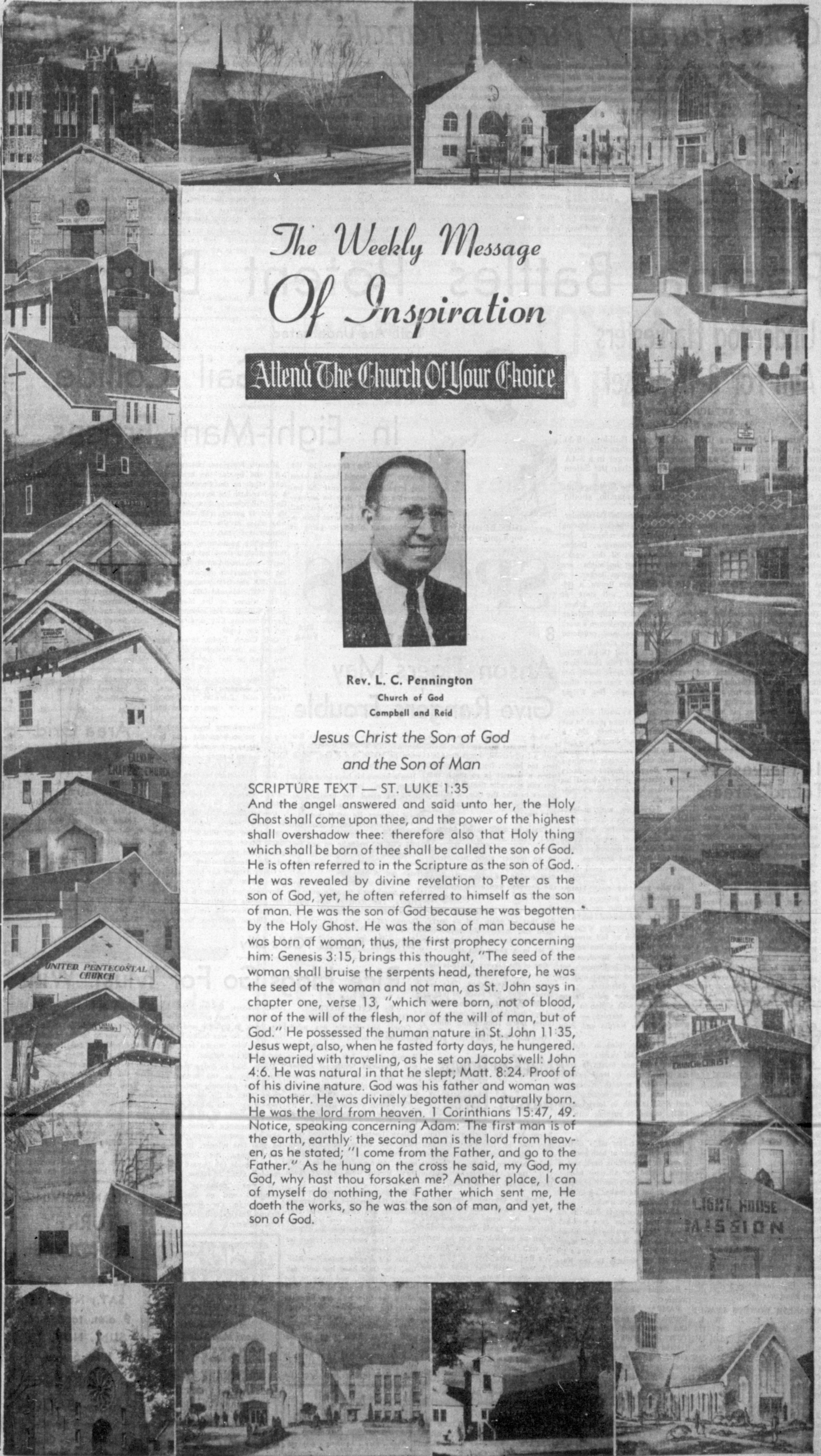

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Football players are the shock troops of athletics.

To even don a shoulder-padded uniform, a lad must have the courage of a paratrooper, the deadly skill of a Marine in combat. To wear football armor with the highest honors, a youngster

must have all the attributes of a hero. He has to be dead game. Football is the only game in which the combatant has to suffer. The football player really learns what sacrifice is. He pays the highest price.

Inside linemen are even denied the right to score. Yet thousands of youngsters are overwhelmed by a burning desire to play a highly intricate team game in which they can be gang tackled, double teamed, trapped and otherwise manhandled — more often than not without recognition.

An All-American basketball player has to beanstalk into the air like a Wilt Chamberlain to be remembered from one year to the next, but football All-Americans live forever. Willie Heston, for example, closed his skyrocket career at Michigan in 1904, yet old-timers speak of him as though he played yesterday.

Walter Eckersall, Tad Jones, Jim Thorpe, George Gipp, Red Grange and the Four Horsemen strikingly illustrate that prominence in football is a tremendous step toward genuine immortality. So do Don Hutson, Otto Graham, Doc Blanchard, Glenn Davis, Johnny Lujack and Doak Walker, names established indelibly.

Enough of the superlatives. Allow me to describe the 1960 Newspaper Enterprise Association All-America team in a sentence. They could all play with the pros and most of them will.

Again it is a rare privilege to name the brilliant stalwarts adjudged the finest in the college game at their respective positions and elected by the nation's coaches and football writers to the 1960 Newspaper Enterprise Association All-America team:

Schayes, who had held the pre-tious record of 26 free throw attempts in a game in 1952, was the high scorer for Syracuse with 22 points. Bianchi had 15.
