

# Cold Whips Into Panhandle; Snow Looms

Two fast-moving cold fronts — one from the Pacific and the other down from Canada — bolted into Texas today, bringing the coldest weather of the winter so far and the threat of snow in the Panhandle.

The Pacific front knifed into the Panhandle - South Plains early today, dropping temperatures to below the freezing point. High winds whipped up dust in some sections of West Texas. The Canadian front barreled in right behind, and the U.S. Weather Bureau said snow may fall in the Panhandle.

The swift-moving masses of air were expected to sweep through the state and into the Gulf by nightfall, the Weather Bureau said.

Cold wave warnings were forecast for South Central, Southeast and Southwest Texas with temperatures in the low 30s and high 20s expected. Extreme Southwest Texas could expect a temperature range of 28-38 degrees, forecasters said. The rest of the state will have readings in the low 20s tonight except for the Panhandle where a reading of 12 degrees was forecast for the north sector. The cold masses of air were expected to collide with warm, moist Gulf air in Southeast and South Central Texas, bringing scattered showers or thunderstorms.

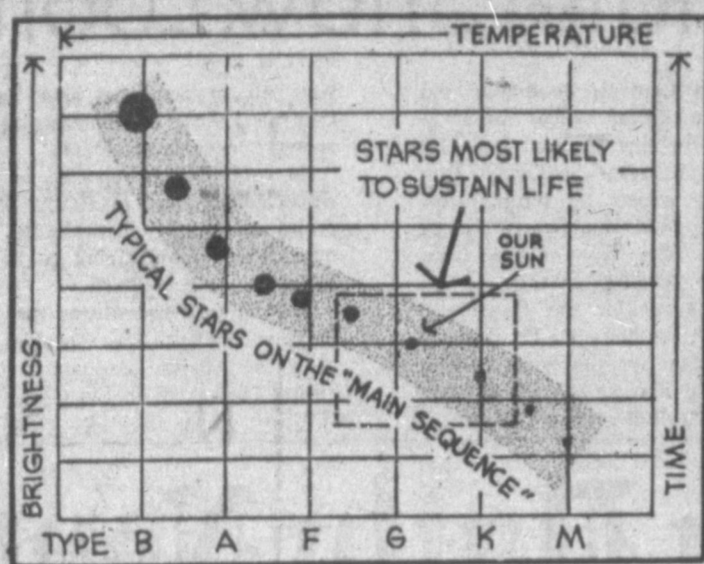

## Earth, Stars and Man (23) Suns and Universes

If planets aren't accidents, caused by colliding stars, but are a routine thing in the universe (as scientists now think), what are the chances that life may have evolved on some as yet unknown planets orbiting distant stars?

For intelligent life, such a star must be stable and about the size of our sun.

When plotted on a graph according to size and brightness, most stars fall in a pattern called the "Main Sequence." The length of time a star stays on the Main Sequence depends on the rate it burns up its fuel. The sun is expected to continue for another 10 billion years. Then it will begin expanding into a red giant, wiping out its planets and all life on them.

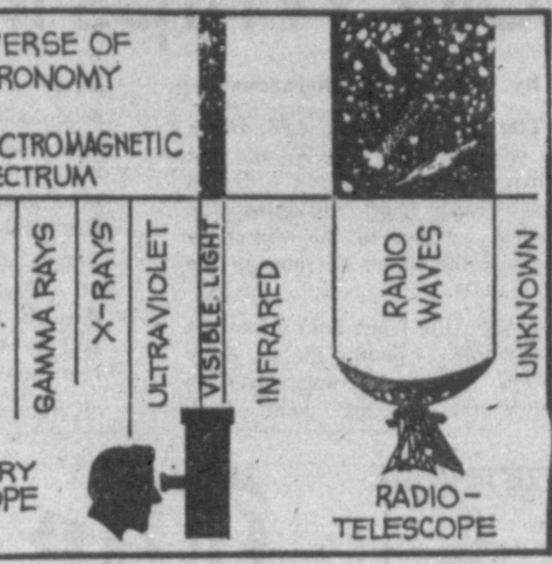
A large B-type star gives off heat over a vast distance but is stable for less than a billion

years—too short a time to allow intelligent life to evolve. A small M-type star, however, may last for 100 billion years. But its heat is less and the "zone of life" around it in space is narrow and less likely to encompass a planet.

Yet there are so many stars that the odds are greatly in favor of life. In the Milky Way alone possibly 20 billion stars qualify.

The greatest enigma confronting astronomers today is the fact that the universe is apparently expanding. That is, all the galaxies are rushing away from one another, somewhat like the spots on an inflating balloon. The farther away from us, the faster they seem to be receding.

This has led some men to believe that the universe may have originated in one terrific explosion of a "cosmic egg" billions of years



ago. Opposed to this "big bang" theory is the "steady state" universe. Its supporters theorize that new matter is constantly coming into being to replace that which has passed out of sight.

An answer may be revealed by the most important recent development in astronomy, the radiotelescope, which has extended man's reach into space by billions of light years.

The fact that bodies in outer space give off radio signals was first discovered in 1931, but not until after World War II did radioastronomy come into its own. Today, giant radio "ears" are being built all over the world, some with antennas hundreds of feet in size.

As of now, radioastronomy has added more questions than answers about the universe.

## 16 Violent Deaths Recorded In Texas

After a heavy surge over the Thanksgiving holiday, violence in Texas died down this weekend, but traffic accidents took up a lot of the slack as the state recorded another gory Saturday and Sunday.

A United Press International poll for the period from 6 p. m. Friday until midnight Sunday showed 16 persons died violently in the state. Ten were killed in traffic, four were shot, one stabbed and one crushed to death by a falling garage door.

Most bizarre of the deaths perhaps was that Saturday night in Fort Worth when Jennie Harriet Rossi, cousin of confessed leopards Curtis Lee Jones, apparently leaped to her death from the car of her fiancé.

The woman, kidnapped and raped by Jones during his week long spree of terror in the state earlier this month, told J. C. Verrier she was going to leap from his car as the couple drove down a Fort Worth expressway.

Verrier said he told her, "If you are going to jump, wait a minute and I'll speed up." He later told police, "I didn't think she would."

Little seven-year-old Pamela Hamlin of Houston was crushed to death Saturday when an overhead garage door at her home fell on her. Cris Sanchez Sotelo, 26, of Rosenberg, was stabbed to death in a Houston tavern fight Saturday.

Dennis Goolsby, 15, of Conroe,

was killed when his shotgun went off and struck him in the chest while hunting near Carlos, Texas. Wilburne Duane Snelson, 25, of Fort Worth, was found dead with a pistol in his hand in a Fort Worth motel early Sunday.

Three-year-old Christopher Hill was crushed to death on an Austin parking lot Saturday night when he fell under the wheels of his parents car. J. B. Turner was killed Sunday when his car was struck by a train in the San Antonio suburb of Olmos Park.

William Ridley Burgess, 19, was killed in Waco Sunday when his car struck a tree. Oil field driller William L. Pollard, 53, of Midland, was killed when his car overturned near Menard Saturday.

James D. Rutledge, 38, of San Antonio, was killed Saturday when his car turned over on SH-16 near Bandera. Marvin Knight, 27, of Strawn, Texas, was killed and two others injured when their car overturned on US-180 near Breckenridge.

## Texas GOP Again Asks For Recheck

AUSTIN (UPI)—The state Republican party turned again today to the state election canvassing board to contest the general election which gave Texas' 24 electoral votes to the Democratic ticket.

Hardy Hollers, Austin attorney who is special counsel for the Republicans, said he would ask Secretary of State Zollie Steakley today to recheck election returns and the methods of throwing out mis-marked votes.

Hollers said there are "several procedures" by which the state GOP could seek to have a recount in the election. The Republicans contend many votes were lost to the Republican ticket when election officials threw out ballots.

The state GOP lost an attempt Friday to get a recount when the canvassing board, headed by Steakley, said it had no authority to order a recount. A GOP attempt through district court in Austin also failed.

The court attempt was in a test case brought by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson, also a member of the canvassing board. Wilson asked Dist. Judge J. Harris Gardner whether he had authority to recheck ballots in Wichita county.

Rankin died Saturday night at 78 following a lengthy illness which confined him to his home for the past three years.

He was a crusader for white supremacy during his congressional career from 1920 to 1952. He was re-elected 15 times with his majority declining toward the end. He was finally defeated by Rep. Thomas Abernethy in 1952 after their districts were joined together.

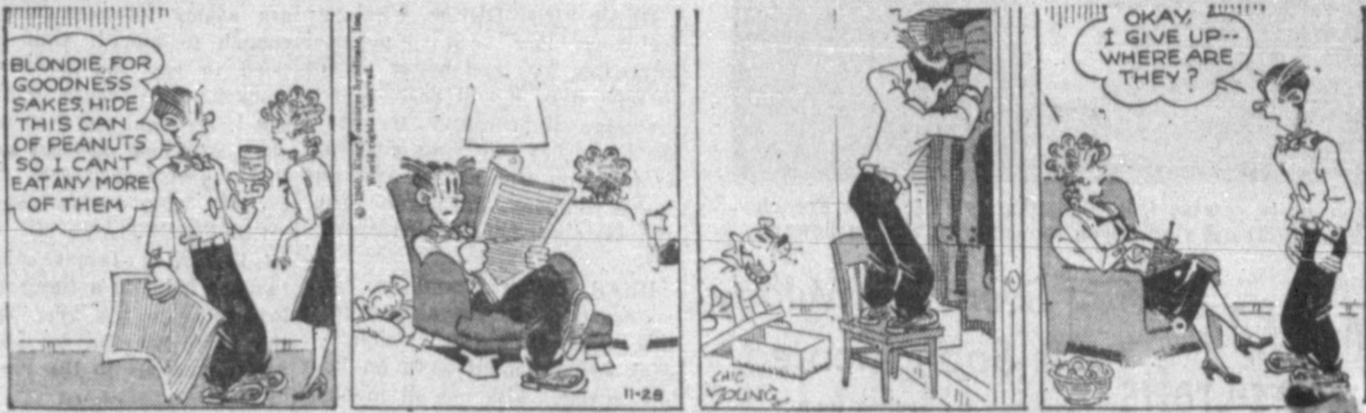

NEW YORK (UPI)—Ohio State, last year's NCAA champion which once again boasts All-America Jerry Lucas, received a record vote from the United Press International Board of Coaches today as the pre-season choice for No. 1 college basketball team in the country.

The 35 famous coaches comprising the UPI board gave Ohio State 347 points out of a possible 350 in their pre-season ratings. That cracked the previous pre-season record of 345 points set by Kentucky in the advance ratings for the 1951-52 season. And it was only one point shy of the all-time record for any weekly ratings since the board began rating the teams in 1950—a 348-point total by San Francisco on Dec. 27, 1955.

St. Bonaventure, built around All-America Tom Stith, was eighth and Auburn and Kentucky, co-favorites for the Southeastern Conference crown, tied for ninth.

Deep-Seated American Trait

# Reluctance To Throw Things Away Brings Out 'Startling' Information

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The General Services Administration recently brought out a report which serves to illuminate a deep-seated American trait. I refer to our national reluctance to throw anything away.

Even as I write this, I can look about my desk and see stacks of literature I have saved on the off chance that I might need it some day. Just now I extracted a couple of papers for a random sample and this is what I found:

(1) A newspaper clipping indicating that the first filibuster was staged in 412 A.D. by the Visigoths and (2) A copy of the "GOP Victory Wheel" published at the onset of the recent campaign.

At the moment, I can foresee no earthly need for this material and I certainly hope I never have an unearthly need for it. But there it is and there it probably will remain.

I can appreciate, therefore, as

I'm sure you can, the problem that the General Services Administration is up against. The GSA has to collect, store and process non-current records for the entire federal government. And it can't throw anything away without the permission of the originating agency.

In a report on its fiscal 1960 operations, the GSA revealed that it had managed to discard, burn or otherwise destroy 416,106 cubic feet of old government letters, receipts and other documents.

Let us pause and ponder this for a moment. I estimate the size of my living room at about 3,000 cubic feet. Therefore, the GSA threw away enough papers during the year to fill my living room some 138 times.

This would seem to indicate that the government is making some headway in its never-ending struggle to avoid being buried by a paperwork avalanche of its own creation. But...

During this same fiscal year, the inventory of the 14 record warehouses operated by the GSA

increased by 823,944 cubic feet. Thus, despite a record number of papers destroyed, the GSA continued to lose ground. New papers destroyed, the GSA continued to lose ground. New papers piled up faster than it could get rid of the old ones. At year's end, it had on hand 5,301,331 cubic feet of records, or enough to fill my living room some 1,767 times.

The cost of maintaining these records is 56 cents per cubic foot, so the bill for fiscal 1960 ran close to \$3 million. And bear in mind that they are non-current records. Current records are kept by the agencies themselves.

Since 1950, the transfer of non-current records to the GSA has enabled the agencies to clear 5,100,000 square feet of storage space by emptying nearly a half million filing cabinets and a million linear feet of shelving.

It is safe to assume, however, that enough new stuff has been written, typed, printed and mimeographed to keep the cabinets and shelves full. It is even safer to assume that some agencies have had to buy additional cabinets and shelves.

Another Texan, Secretary of the Air Force Dudley C. Sharp, wrote to Brig. Gen. Stephen D. McElroy, USAF, national commander of CAP that the service rendered by the Civil Air Patrol, "in providing air search and rescue to America's air travelers, private pilots and military flight crews saves the American taxpayer many thousands of dollars."

Civil Air Patrol, formed six days before Pearl Harbor, now has more than 70,000 senior and cadet members in the United States and Puerto Rico. They are all civilian volunteers giving their time and money to carry out their mission of emergency service and aerospace education.
