Demos Make Picks Saturday

Voters in 12 Gray County precincts will go to the polls at 8 a.m. Saturday for the Democratic primary runoff election.

Only one state office will be at stake Saturday, that of the judge of the court of criminal appeals.

Lloyd W. Davidson of Travis County is seeking reelection against W. T. McDonald of Brazos County.

Israel To Explain Capture

On the local scene, there are runoff for two county commissioner posts and one constable post.

Joe K. Clarke and W. C. Breining are competing for the precinct 1 commissioner post; Ernest Beck and Truitt Johnson are in the runoff for commissioner of Precinct 2; and R. Ben White is running against W. R. Combs for the constable's position in Precinct 1.

As in the first primary election last month, there will be 12 voting precincts in Gray County which will remain open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. Saturday.

They are: 1-Lefors; 2-Baker School; Pampa; 3-Grandview School; 4-Alanreed; 5-M3-Lean; 6-Laketon; 7-Horace Mann School; 8-Hopkins; 9-Woodrow Wilson School; Pampa; 10-Gray County Court-House; Pampa; 11-Phillips; 12-Odd Fellows Hall, Pampa.

Only 75 absentee ballots were cast for the second primary, as compared to 247 last month.

Sister Of Der Fuehrer Dies In Obscurity

BERCHTESGADEN, Germany (UPI)—Frau Paula Wolf lived out her years quietly in a ramshackle house not far from Adolf Hitler's eagle's nest.

The currents of postwar German life passed her by. Germans denounced their Fuehrer and tried his aides for war crimes. Frau Wolf ignored their opinions and clung to the pride she had felt for Hitler since girlhood.

Tourists and American soldiers climbed over the site of Hitler's mountain retreat and talked about the Nazi party meetings, the showdown talks with war-threatened nations, and the lavish banquets that took place there.

Frau Wolf could have given them first-hand impressions of the life in the eagle's nest. She was there. But no one bothered to visit her house near the Berchtesgaden railway station.

Only the townspeople and a few friends knew that the frail, grey-haired spinster was Hitler's sister. These friends today planned a quiet funeral for Paula Wolf, who died Wednesday at the age of 64 after a long fight with stomach cancer.

It was a characteristically unobtrusive end for a woman who lived in a rented room while her brother rose to power.

Bite Victim Back With Snake Farm

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Kenneth Earnest, 22, who almost died of a snake bite, was in fine health and back home today at his parents' reptile farm in suburban Buena Park.

Earnest, given only a 1-in-3 chance of living when bitten by the world's deadliest snake, 37 days ago, walked out of General Hospital Thursday, almost completely recovered.

"I'm really anxious to get back to my snakes," smiled Earnest as he waved goodbye to doctors and nurses.

Earnest was bitten on the finger by an Australian tiger snake. "There is little paralysis left in the eye muscles and a few of the facial muscles, but I feel sure that will clear up," said Dr. Finley Russell, internationally known authority on snake bites. Russell worked 72 consecutive hours to help save Earnest's life.

Three Killed In Lufkin Smashup

LUFKIN (UPI)—A pickup truck collided with a dump truck loaded with sand at a highway intersection Thursday, killing three men and injuring two others.

The dead were identified as Henry McKinnon, 67, Charlie McKinnon, 37, a brother, and Cecil McKinnon, 42, a nephew, all of Wells.

Another nephew, Harold McKinnon, 36, also of Wells, and Wayne Ferguson, 18, Lufkin, driver of the dump truck, were injured. The McKinnons were all in the pickup.

Left Wingers Out To Block Nomination Of Sen. Johnson

BLOXI, Miss. (UPI)—A veteran Washington newspaperman told the Mississippi Press-Asso. today that the left wing of American politics is attempting to prevent the nomination of Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson for president on the Democratic ticket.

Lyle C. Wilson, vice president and Washington manager of United Press International, said another objective of the left wing is to prevent the election of Vice President Richard M. Nixon to the presidency.

Wilson told the opening session of the association's annual convention that Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the NAACP, is interested in stopping Johnson's

nomination. The Negro leader, Wilson said, told a New York audience this week that "Nixon has a good civil rights record as measured by the NAACP as did all the Democratic candidates for the presidential nomination with the exception of Sen. Johnson."

"Organized labor doesn't care for Johnson. The Negro and labor vote might not be able to lick him if he were nominated for president but they surely can sink his vote at the Democratic National Convention," Wilson said.

He said left-wingers are attempting to use New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller as a means of blocking Nixon. He said Jacob S. Potofsky, president of the Anagatized Clothing Workers Union, said he was for Rockefeller for president because the govern-

U.S. Spy Net Is Active As Any

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A real life cloak-and-dagger thriller spun around the intriguing name "U-2" has given most Americans their first view of Uncle Sam as a delicate operator in the shady, deceitful and dangerous world of international espionage.

It also brought, with a shock to many U.S. citizens, the public admission that their government will and does tell baldfaced lies to cover spying activities.

And in the tense days since the high-flying U-2 was downed in Russia May 1, the world has seen for the first time a head of state — President Eisenhower — take personal responsibility for spying activities.

These were some of the developments that bothered the Senate Foreign Relations Committee when it began top-secret hearings a week ago into the ill-fated U-2 flight and other circumstances surrounding the Paris summit conference.

They still bother most of the members, including Chairman J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.). The committee ended the hearings on Thursday and will begin considering a report next week. But it may never agree on one.

After four days of tightly-guarded hearings, with witnesses' testimony carefully censored, a lot more is known about what happened. But there is still doubt in the minds of some senators as to why it happened.

Also still unanswered is: where do we go from here? Out-of-the-welter testimony—661 censor-screened pages—this general picture emerges:

The United States—of course has been spying all along with the activities directed by the hush-hush Central Intelligence Agency headed by Allen W. Dulles. This was no secret to anyone around Washington or overseas.

This country has been using the high-altitude U-2, a single-engine jet reconnaissance plane that can fly above the reach of any Soviet interceptors, since 1956 for valuable photographic work and weather information gathering.

Several successful flights were made across Russia before the May 1 incident when pilot Francis G. Powers was captured by the Soviets.

The summit meeting was scheduled to begin two weeks later in Paris. By that time, the United States had "told all" and admitted the U-2's spy role. President Eisenhower took personal responsibility for the espionage activity in an unprecedented departure from historical practice.

Multi-Party Freedom Turkish Electoral System Changed

ANKARA, Turkey (UPI)—Gen. Cemal Gursel said today he will change Turkey's electoral system to give all political parties an even chance and rule out the dangers of one-party domination.

The head of the ruling Committee of National Unity, in an interview exactly one week after the newly-deposed regime of Ataturk Menderes, indicated the country will adopt a system of proportional representation in the forthcoming elections.

Gursel said that under the old system was the leader of the rebellion actually chose the time to carry it out because he was under close scrutiny by the Menderes government.

Gursel gave the interview in the offices formerly occupied by Menderes. He appeared fatigued after the events of the week.

Gursel said that under the old system—once party received an overwhelming majority of seats in Parliament.

"That endangered the democratic system," he said. "In the system of proportional representation, every party will get seats in Parliament. That will give more balance and prevent domination."

Asked when the promised free elections will be held in view of the fact that Menderes, ex-President Celal Bayar and other government leaders and Parliament members must be screened for possible trial, Gursel said it was difficult to set any exact date.

Gursel said the government hoped to be able to announce in the next five to 10 days how many students actually were killed in the anti-Menderes demonstrations. There were reports that the bodies of a number of students already have been found.

Rockefeller Out To Stir Up Interest

NEW YORK (UPI)—New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller set out today for the Great Plains on a campaign-swing that was intended to aid the election of a North Dakota Republican but could serve to stir interest in a presidential "draft" movement for himself.

The 51-year-old governor planned an all-out effort on behalf of Gov. John E. Davis, who seeks election to the U.S. Senate in a special June 28 election.

Rockefeller has scheduled a full day of "folksy" campaigning at Fargo, N.D., with a street tour, visits to shopping centers and two "live" television appearances designed to expose him to as many voters as possible.

The multi-millionaire told New York Republicans last week that he would accept the GOP presidential nomination if the July 25th convention offered it to him. This announcement was seen as a means of showing off his "availability" for the top place on the ticket this November, while attempting to steer clear of any challenge to Vice President Richard M. Nixon that could draw resentment.

Rockefeller has recently conceded that the vice president is the "likely" GOP nominee, but has refused to endorse him and thus eliminate any chance of competition for the post.

His reason for this, the governor told Republican politicians last week at a special meeting in Albany, was to be in a position to lead the national ticket, should some development eliminate the vice president from the race.

In addition, Rockefeller argued, the interest of the general public would be diverted somewhat away from the Democrats by the "threat" of competition within Republican ranks.

'Show Biz' Tradition Broken For First Time In 41 Years

NEW YORK (UPI)—Curtains failed to rise on Broadway Thursday night, and for the first time in 41 years the show did not go on anywhere along the Great White Way.

The marquee lights were darkened and the footlights remained out as Broadway producers carried out a threat to shut down all 22 current plays and musicals in retaliation for a union-ordered cast walkout at one theater on Wednesday night.

Negotiations continue today in the bitter contract dispute between Actors Equity, which represents all Broadway performers, and the League of New York Theaters, representing Broadway producers and theater owners.

But spokesmen for both sides conceded they still were far apart and that a prolonged "Broadway blackout" was likely.

Only a sudden change in either side's adamant bargaining position, or a compromise—neither of which appeared likely—seemed to offer an early end to the first such blackout since 1919 when the then-fledgling Actors Equity staged a one-month strike to win the right as bargaining agent for Broadway performers.

Several leading producers forecast a long, drawn-out blackout which, they said, would serve as a death blow to several "marginal" productions, which barely are surviving.

Actors Equity represents approximately 11,000 actors and actresses, but only 1,100 are affected by the current shutdown. Seven national road companies employing Actors Equity members are not affected. Nor are off-Broadway theater or summer stock productions, both of which are covered by producer-Equity contracts which are still in force.

Temperatures today are supposed to range in the 90s. At 11 a.m. the official temperature in downtown Pampa had already climbed to 86 degrees, after an overnight low of 67.

Temperatures across most of the state ranged in the 90's Thursday. The hottest spot was a sizzling 108 degrees at Presidio.

Manville's wife No. 9, Anita Rodney-Eden, 38, Thursday was declared never legally divorced from the playboy by Judge Edward R. Brand.

He took the action in granting an annulment to her latest husband, actor John Sutton, 51. The couple was married Feb. 26, 1957, two years after she was granted a Nevada divorce from Manville.

Brand said evidence that Mrs. Rodney-Eden failed to stay in Nevada to fill that state's six-week residency requirements nullified the divorce she received.

Manville, since separating from Miss Rodney-Eden, has married and divorced wife No. 10, Pat Gaston, and currently is married to wife No. 11, the former Christina Erdlen.

"This is very complicated," Manville said.

If he still is married to Miss Rodney-Eden, Manville said, "she owes me four years alimony at \$12,000 a year and a \$120,000 settlement."

It's an American favorite, too.

COLD VANILLA-CHOCOLATE SOUFFLE
(An American interpretation of a French recipe)
Beat 4 egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Gradually beat in 1 cup sugar and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Continue beating until light and lemon colored in top of a double boiler. Melt two ounces (2 squares) semisweet chocolate over hot water and stir into the mixture. Heat 1 cup milk and 1 cup light cream and add. Stir and cook over hot water, not boiling, until the mixture coats a metal spoon. Cool. Fold in 1 1/2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract and 2 cups heavy cream, whipped. Turn into a souffle dish around which a 2-inch band of brown paper is tied. Place in a freezer for 6 to 8 hours or overnight. Remove paper rim and decorate as desired with whipped cream. Serve to the dish.

Your Opinion Is As Good As The Next Man's On Rating The 'Top Ten Schools In The Nation'

NEW YORK (NEA) — A high school student beams proudly as he says, "I just got into one of the top 10 universities in the country."
Another is crestfallen. Although he has been accepted by a small university in the Midwest, he was turned down by colleges in the mythical leagues.
As students wait to hear whether they were accepted by a "good" school, the myth of comparative ratings of universities again prevails.

If the truth be known, there are no official ratings and very few advisory organizations, educators, and the New York public library reader advertiser service.
Some periodicals and newspapers, from time to time, attempt to rate schools through student or faculty polls. One of the latest to do so is "Changing Times" which covered a survey of graduate department heads.
The magazine admits that there are no "official" ratings and that

it is virtually impossible to rate schools, but says of its own survey, "Although the votes reflect subjective impressions and may not reveal the actual merit of the individual department, this does report the judgment of men whose opinions are most likely to have weight... the sum of their opinions is a fairly close approximation of what informed people think."
But subsequently the article hits at the core of one problem: "Often a school's reputation is slow to catch up with a change in quality..."

Philip Coombs, program director of education for the Ford Foundation, also doubts the validity of any and all rating systems.
He says, "The real misfortune (in comparing schools particularly by prospective applicants) is that the typical student and high school guidance counselor do not know of good schools without big reputations."
"The spread between many accredited schools probably is nowhere near as great as one would think from popular impressions,"

any student or parent to view them if they believe such exist.
Lincoln, himself, shrinks at the thought of naming a school in the "top 10." He says the best any educational institution can do is advertise the fields it offers, boasting those in which it does a superior job.
However, today, there is no readily accessible, valid way for the student to determine if a university is really the best, or one of the best, in the field in which he is interested.

Some college guides, such as Lovejoy's, do rate groups of schools and their departments on such broad standards as accreditation. (Most four-year colleges known to the public are accredited and consequently would receive a No. 1 rating in this system.)
Despite educators' continual pounding at the validity of any comparative evaluation, even they often list criteria on which such ratings might be based.
Some consider the schools' accumulated wealth, number of doc-

Demand For Books Good For Publishers

NEW YORK (UPI)—There's a boom on in the book publishing business with new records predicted for 1960.
But for many segments of the industry it's a profitless prosperity. Costs have risen faster than profits, and it's difficult to raise prices.
The industry, trying to do something about the difficulty, is planning a series of mergers and other expedients to steer around the profit carving.
One section of the industry that is apparently immune to the profit squeeze is the publication of encyclopedias where profit margins usually are higher than in other types of books.
This phase of publishing plus reference books looks for a 200 million in 1960. That's a record for the group and it contrasts with a mere \$89 million a decade ago.

The American Textbook Publishing Association estimates that sales of all school texts will be around \$500 million this year, also a new record high.
Sales of all books are expected to reach a new top at \$1.3 billion. Moshe Sachs, editor and publisher of the Worldmark Encyclopedia of the Nations, states the case for encyclopedias.
American parents' insistence on their offspring having the best education possible is helping spark a boom in encyclopedia and reference book sales, he says.

"Pressures on youngsters to enter and graduate from college have never been more intense," he says. "Parents feel that an encyclopedia now is becoming a prime necessity in the home to help children achieve their educational goals."
He believes U. S. leadership in world affairs has contributed to the rise in the demand for encyclopedias.
Sachs' publication tries to meet this demand. In one volume it compresses information about each of the 119 nations now existing on the globe.
"We believe," he says, "this is the first volume encyclopedia that portrays each nation's historical, cultural, economic and social development, as well as an outline of all international organizations and their relationship to such bodies as the United Nations."

But any romance will be a short one said Gray. The zoo has placed an order in Africa for a female gorilla for Timmy.

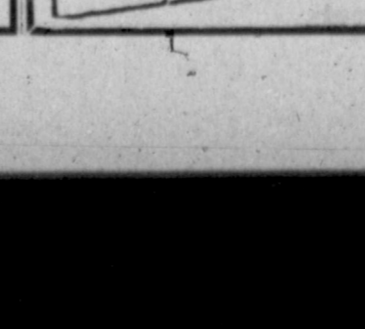

Protestant Churches Rush Goods To Stricken Chile

Money, food, clothing, blankets and medicines are being rushed to Chile by the Protestant churches of America to supply the staggering needs of thousands injured in a disaster area, and a 31 homeless which struck the country earlier this week.

An airlift shipment of 480,000 multi-vitamin tablets to supplement the curtailed diets of earthquake victims has been arranged. The shipment, valued at approximately \$2,000, will be made by Church World Service, cooperative overseas relief agency of major Protestant and Eastern Orthodox churches in the United States.

The vitamins will be followed by additional airlift shipments of medicines valued at \$10,000, including penicillin, strepto-mycin and other antibiotics to combat diseases menacing thousands suddenly exposed to Chile's winter weather.

Fifteen hundred blankets already in Chile for distribution to the needy through Church World Service have been diverted to clothing from the stocks of Lutheran World Relief have been started on their way to Concepcion and other stricken cities. Another 50,000 pounds of clothing collected from American churchgoers and still in the United States is being readied for immediate shipment to Chile.

Announcement of the emergency aid was made by Dr. R. Norris Wilson, executive director of Church World Service. Dr. Wilson also announced that \$5,000 in cash, contributed by American churches through Church World Service, has been cabled to Chile for purchase of

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Church Anniversary Scheduled Sunday

This Sunday Christians will celebrate the 1,500th anniversary of the "birthday of the church." The observance is known as Pentecost, from a Greek word meaning 50 days. It commemorates the occasion, 50 days after Christ's resurrection, when the Apostles received the gift of the Holy Spirit and went forth to begin the bold preaching missions which carried the Gospel into every corner of the Roman Empire within a comparatively few years.

Because it recalls an era when all Christians were "of one mind and one spirit," Pentecost is traditional time for taking stock of the present divided state of the church, and of the efforts that are being made to restore its unity.

Those who engage in such a stock-taking this weekend will find grounds for pessimism or optimism, depending on how long a view they take.

The short-range outlook for Christian unity is pretty bleak. It is now clear, for example, that the Ecumenical Council which will convene in Rome in early 1962 will be an all-Catholic affair, with no Protestant or Eastern Orthodox participation.

If Pope John XXIII hoped that the council would lead to Catholic-Orthodox reunion, as he apparently did when he issued the call, he has learned that the hope was premature. The issue of papal authority, which has divided Catholic and Orthodox churches for nearly a thousand years is still so touchy that neither side can think of a formula which would permit Orthodox bishops to sit in a council summoned by the Pope.

Within the Protestant branch of the Christian family, the drive for reunion is going forward, but in low gear. During the past year, denominational mergers have brought the Unitarians and Unitarians together, and have welded three Lutheran bodies into one. Four other Lutheran groups are tentatively set to unite in 1962. The Methodist Church and the United Evangelical Brethren seem to be headed for early consolidation.

Several other negotiations are in progress, but mostly they are tentative and exploratory, and no one looks for dramatic results any time soon.

This record is not very encouraging to idealists who are impatient for immediate results. But the picture looks brighter when you view it from the long perspective of history.

Then you are struck not by the small pace of the Christian unity movement, but by the fact that there is such a movement. For the first time since the Reformation, four centuries ago, Christians are more concerned with drawing together than with pulling apart. They have recognized that their divisions are a scandal to man and an offense to God, and they are beginning to recognize that neither side is entirely to blame for the situation.

The most fashionable word in church circles these days is "dialogue." It simply means that Catholics and Protestants are talking to one another in civility, trying to understand their differences. So far the dialogue has been confined mostly to scholars and theologians, and it has been concerned with clarifying rather than settling disputes. But both sides are trying earnestly to expand and deepen the process of mutual re-acquaintance.

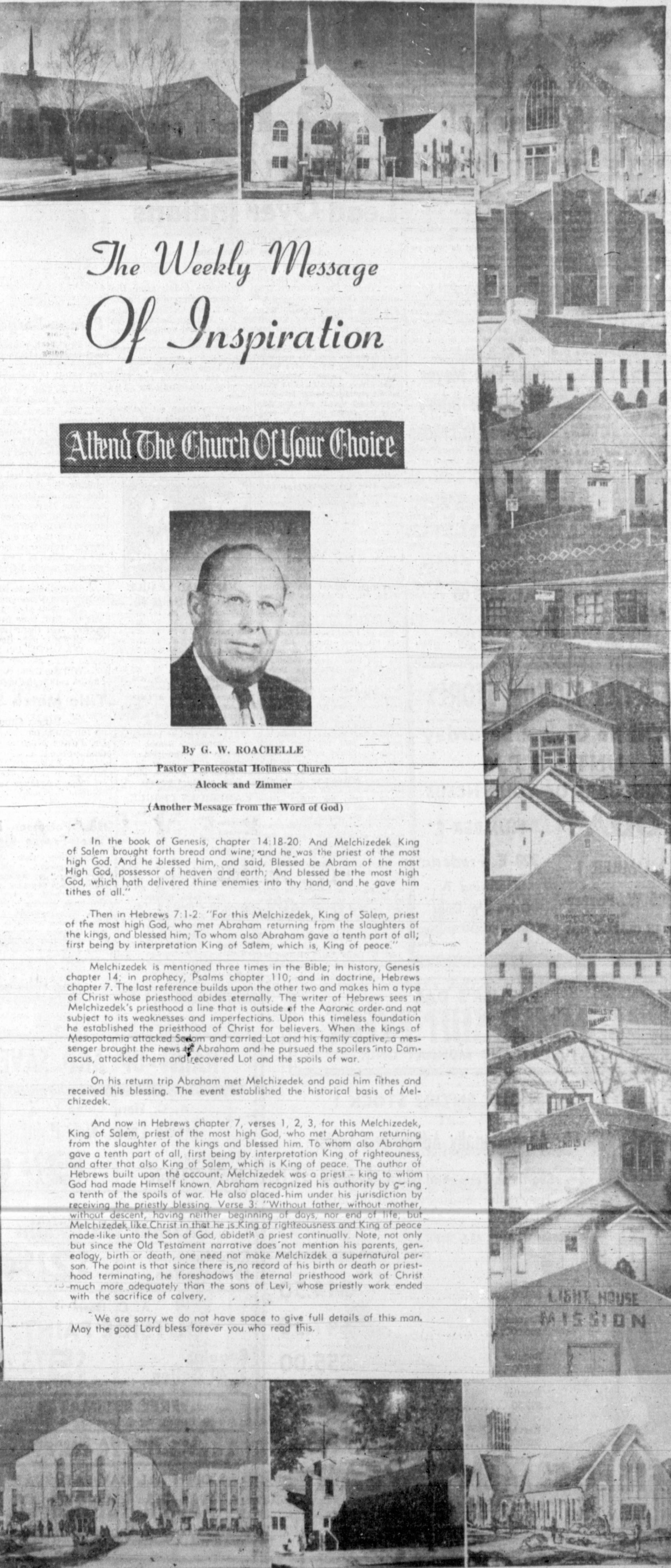
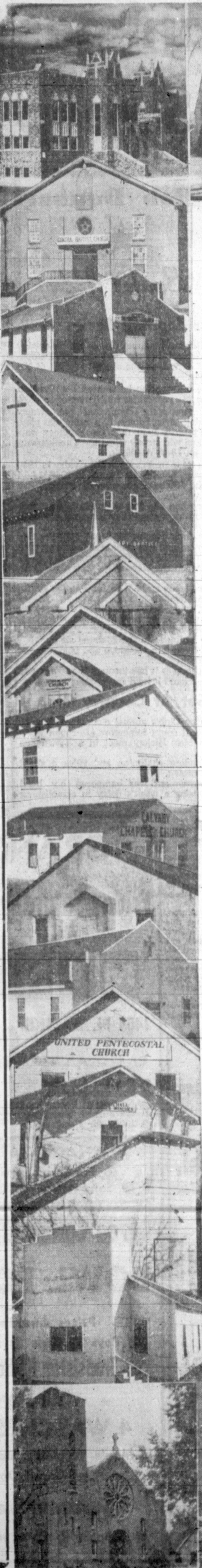
Then in Hebrews 7:1-2: "For this Melchizedek, King of Salem, priest of the most high God, who met Abraham returning from the slaughters of the kings, and blessed him; To whom also Abraham gave a tenth part of all; first being by interpretation King of Salem, which is, King of peace."

Melchizedek is mentioned three times in the Bible; in history, Genesis chapter 14; in prophecy, Psalms chapter 110; and in doctrine, Hebrews chapter 7. The last reference builds upon the other two and makes him a type of Christ whose priesthood abides eternally. The writer of Hebrews sees in Melchizedek's priesthood a line that is outside of the Aaronic order and not subject to its weaknesses and imperfections. Upon this timeless foundation he established the priesthood of Christ for believers. When the kings of Mesopotamia attacked Sodom and carried Lot and his family captive, a messenger brought the news of Abraham and he pursued the spoilers into Damascus, attacked them and recovered Lot and the spoils of war.

On his return trip Abraham met Melchizedek and paid him tithes and received his blessing. The event established the historical basis of Melchizedek.

And now in Hebrews chapter 7, verses 1, 2, 3, for this Melchizedek, King of Salem, priest of the most high God, who met Abraham returning from the slaughter of the kings and blessed him. To whom also Abraham gave a tenth part of all, first being by interpretation King of righteousness, and after that also King of Salem, which is King of peace. The author of Hebrews built upon the account, Melchizedek was a priest — king to whom God had made Himself known. Abraham recognized his authority by giving a tenth of the spoils of war. He also placed him under his jurisdiction by receiving the priestly blessing. Verse 3: "Without mother, without descent, having neither beginning of days, nor end of life, but Melchizedek like Christ in that he is King of righteousness and King of peace made-like unto the Son of God, abideth a priest continually. Note, not only but since the Old Testament narrative does not mention his parents, genealogy, birth or death, one need not make Melchizedek a supernatural person. The point is that since there is no record of his birth or death or priesthood terminating, he foreshadows the eternal priesthood work of Christ much more adequately than the sons of Levi, whose priestly work ended with the sacrifice of calvary.

Orioles Nip Yankees

6-5 For Series Sweep

Retain 2½ Game Lead Over Indians

Make room in that hospital bed, Casey Stengel, your Yankees look sicker than you do.

That's the message from Baltimore today after the amazing Orioles completed a three-game sweep of the Yankees with Thursday night's 6-5 victory. The Orioles are flying higher than ever and those Yankees are beginning to look like the bedraggled bunch that folded completely in 1959.

Gene Woodling, an ex-Yankee who never got along too well with Stengel, swung the decisive bat in the Orioles' seventh victory in eight games and 11th in 13 when he hit an eighth-inning homer to snap a 5-5 tie. It was the fifth time this season that the 37-year-old Woodling has knocked in the tying or winning run for the Orioles in the seventh, eighth or ninth innings.

A crowd of 42,705 — largest of the year in Baltimore — saw the Orioles retain their 2½-game lead over the Cleveland Indians and hand the Yankees their fourth loss in five games. The Yankees are now only 3-4 under acting manager Ralph Houk who took over May 28 when Stengel was bedded with the flu.

Pampa-Borger Football Series

Jim Archer at Grayco Machine Co. called yesterday and wanted to know the scores of the 1947 and 1948 Pampa-Borger football games as well as the overall records of the two teams in the series.

In digging up the information he wanted I noticed an interesting trend in the 28-year series which started in 1932.

The Harvesters completely dominated the rivalry through the 30's winning seven games. (No game was played in 1937) It wasn't until 1940 that the Bulldogs were able to break the Pampa win streak when the Thanksgiving week battle ended in an 18-18 deadlock.

The Bulldogs won their first game in the rivalry in 1946 by a 34-7 count and came back to tie Pampa in 1948, 14-14 making the slate in the 40's read six wins for Pampa, two ties, and one Borger victory.

The Harvesters opened the 50's with the highest scoring rout in the series history when they thrashed the Bulldogs 71-6 in 1950.

After two more Pampa wins in 1951 and 1952 the tide swung in favor of Borger and has remained that way with the exception of 1954 when the two teams fought to a 14-14 standoff and in 1957 when the Harvesters took a 26-12 decision.

Overall the series stands at 17 wins for Pampa, six for Borger and three games ending in ties.

The 28-0 shutout handed the Harvesters last season was the first time in the history of the two schools that a Borger grid team had whitewashed Pampa. Pampa owns five shutouts over the Bulldogs in the 26-game series.

Offensively, the Harvesters rolled up 564 points in the series while Borger collected 339.

Will the trend continue as it has through the 60's or will Pampa retain the upper hand it held for so many years.

Title Match Set At Country Club

The Pampa Country Club's annual championship goes up for grabs on the local cours tomorrow afternoon when Dr. Foster Elder and Max Hickey meet in a show-down duel for the title.

The much-handled question of what gives with the loquacious bankers from Glendale, Calif., seems much more intriguing.

Old Case is in his 12th year at the helm of the Yankees and has done more than a bit of all right with nine pennants and seven world championships over that stretch. He'll be 70 in July and yet, seemingly still as spry as a cricket, you can believe the saying that they'll have to cut the uniform off him.

The theory is that they will at the end of this season.

There was a time when the locker room oracles figured his successor would hail from the home-grown ranks of former Yankee stars. The betting for a time was between Ralph Houk and Eddie Lopat with the wagering fluctuating like race odds between Eally Ache and Tompion before the Kentucky Derby.
