

Looking Sideways

by WHITNEY BOLTON

NEW YORK, N.Y. - It was not really until the end of the first decade of the 20th Century that the American songwriter began to burgeon as a native phenomenon destined violently to change the form and frame of the American musical theater first, and ultimately, musical theater the world over. Until then there had been balladeers (Stephen Foster, et al.) and microscopic copiers of the European operetta form (Victor Herbert at al.). A restless young man of vaudeville named George M. Cohan was fooling around in experiment with plays and accompanying songs drenched in American spirit. A teasing, primitive rhythm born in the stews of New Orleans and Memphis and called rag-time was be ginning to send its throbs North of the Mason-Dixon Line. A one time singing waiter named Izzy Ballin had written one song, circa 1906, called "Marie From Sunny Italy", and even then his name was incorrect. His born name was Israel Baline. But for "Marie" he used a name destined to cannonade through popular American music: Irving Berlin. He did lyrics for three years after that - to songs which were for the time enormous hits, like "My Wife's Gone To The Country", which sold an astounding. 300,000 copies. His ear was sensitive to the savage beat seeping up from Memphis and New Orleans and in 1909 he wrote, in ragtime, his first music: "That Mesmerizing Mendelssohn Tune". In less than 22 months he was to become long-time king of the

ragtime hit: "Alexander's Ragtime Band". While the first decade of the century was beginning to develop isolated cases of men who were rejecting the old ways and pounding out new rhythms that would cause the second decade to become a flood of songwriting, a lank little kid born in 1902 was sitting down at the family piano, utterly without parental compulsion, and not only teaching himself by ear to master the keyboard but already, at 6 or 7 years old, fashioning shaped tunes with a beginning, a middlé and an end and, more impor-

tantly, a realistic theme. The fascinating truth is that Richard Rodgers could play piano by ear when he was 4 years old. He saw theater for the first time when he was 6. He became a passionate idolater of Victor Herbert and swore him-

self, in a tender young oath of fidelity, never to love another composer. But, when he was 14, his oath shattered like thin glass. He saw "Very Good, Eddie," and transferred his hot affections to operetta based on European forms lost its savor and he adored htumping, brisk American musicals.




