Enrollment in the special workshops is up 30 percent over previous years, according to Prof. W. E. Garets, Tech journalism department head. Attendance totaled 85 in 1958 and 75 in 1959.

The yearbook workshop will stress copy writing and layout. Workshops will also include advertising sales and news photography.

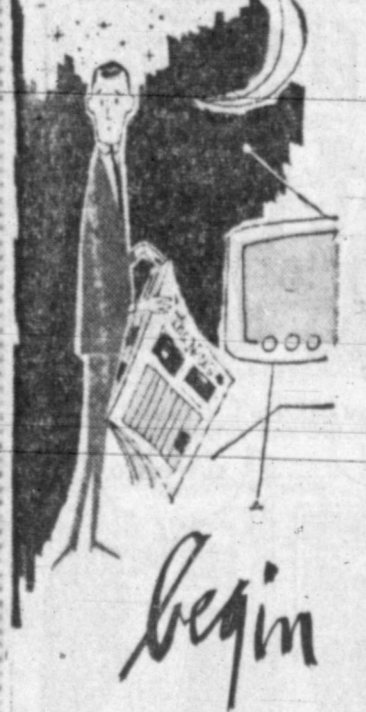
Radio Mirror To Be Visible

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Echo I satellite will be brightly visible over much of the United States during some four passes tonight.

The 100-foot metal-coated sphere was so launched that it will be in continuous sunlight for the next week or two. That means it will be visible at any time from dusk to dawn over communities lying beneath its orbit.

HUNTSVILLE (UPI) — George Moses, convicted of killing a Houston policeman, died in the electric chair at 12:11 a.m. today, protesting his innocence and charging he didn't get a fair trial.

Moses, 30, was sentenced to death for the murder of Houston policeman Noel Miller, who was shot in the stomach as five officers entered Moses' home in a narcotics raid June 5, 1958.

Moses contended he shot in self-defense and that the policemen had no search warrant. He said he thought the police were robbers.

GOP Pleased With Apparent Support Of Nixon In South

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Vice President Richard M. Nixon's campaign strategists were pleased today by what they regarded as surprising displays of voluntary support from the long-Democratic Deep South.

The new support, indicated in field reports and mail reaching Nixon's headquarters, has encouraged the Republican presidential nominee to go ahead with his intention to stump every Southern state, including such Democratic strongholds as Georgia, Mississippi and South Carolina.

There were no plans for extensive campaigning in the Deep South but Nixon will touch every state at least once.

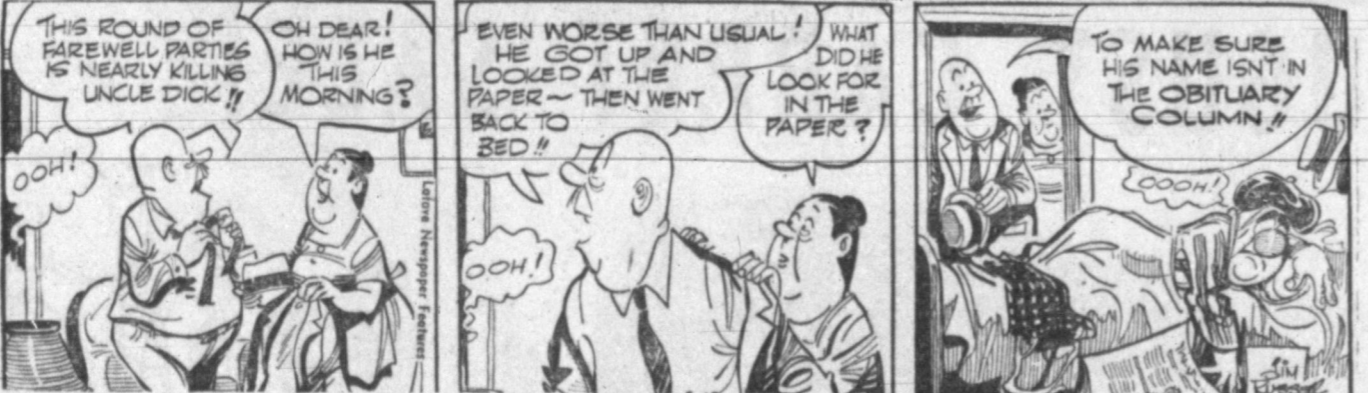

MATURE PARENT Manners Makes Friends

DEAR MRS. LAWRENCE: "Last night, my husband and I were discussing plans for our family vacation when your eldest child—she's 13—told us not to count on her. She wants to stay at a neighbor's while we're away because she's agreed to 'go steady' with a boy who has taken her to a couple of school parties. My husband was furious and has forbidden her to see the boy again. I think she's too young to start 'going steady' but this isn't the way to deal with it, is it?"—Mrs. A.

ANSWER: Maybe your husband felt shock and disappointment rather than anger at your daughter. He wants to share his vacation with her. Why not explain this wish to her?

If, in telling her his wish, he shows some respect for her wish to "go steady" with this boy, he may find her some respectful of his wish for her company on vacation. I, too, think she's pretty young to start "going steady." But many youngsters of her age do so out of what child guidance authorities call their need for "security."

I don't think that's quite it. We must remember that not too long ago it was parents who found husbands for their daughters. Because marriage was women's only future, parents started arranging marital opportunities for girls as soon as they reached mid-teens.

Mothers competed ruthlessly for invitations to balls where eligible males abounded. They paraded their daughters at resorts and hounded wealthy relatives for hospitality that might turn up a likely husband.

Daughters merely co-operated with all this parental finagling, content to let mama and papa manage the matrimonial competition.

Today things are different. Girl children soon learn that getting married is their responsibility. This obligation makes for precocious sexual anxiety—and our custom of precocious dating is a development of it.

Today children of 13 want endorsement of their sexual desirability because, unlike the children of Jane Austen's day, this, instead of parents, is what they have to count on to get themselves husbands.

If this is hard on us, it's harder on them.

If we keep their problem in mind when your youngsters announce that they have entered into inde-

pendent sexual competition, we may behave more reasonably and kindly than we otherwise would.

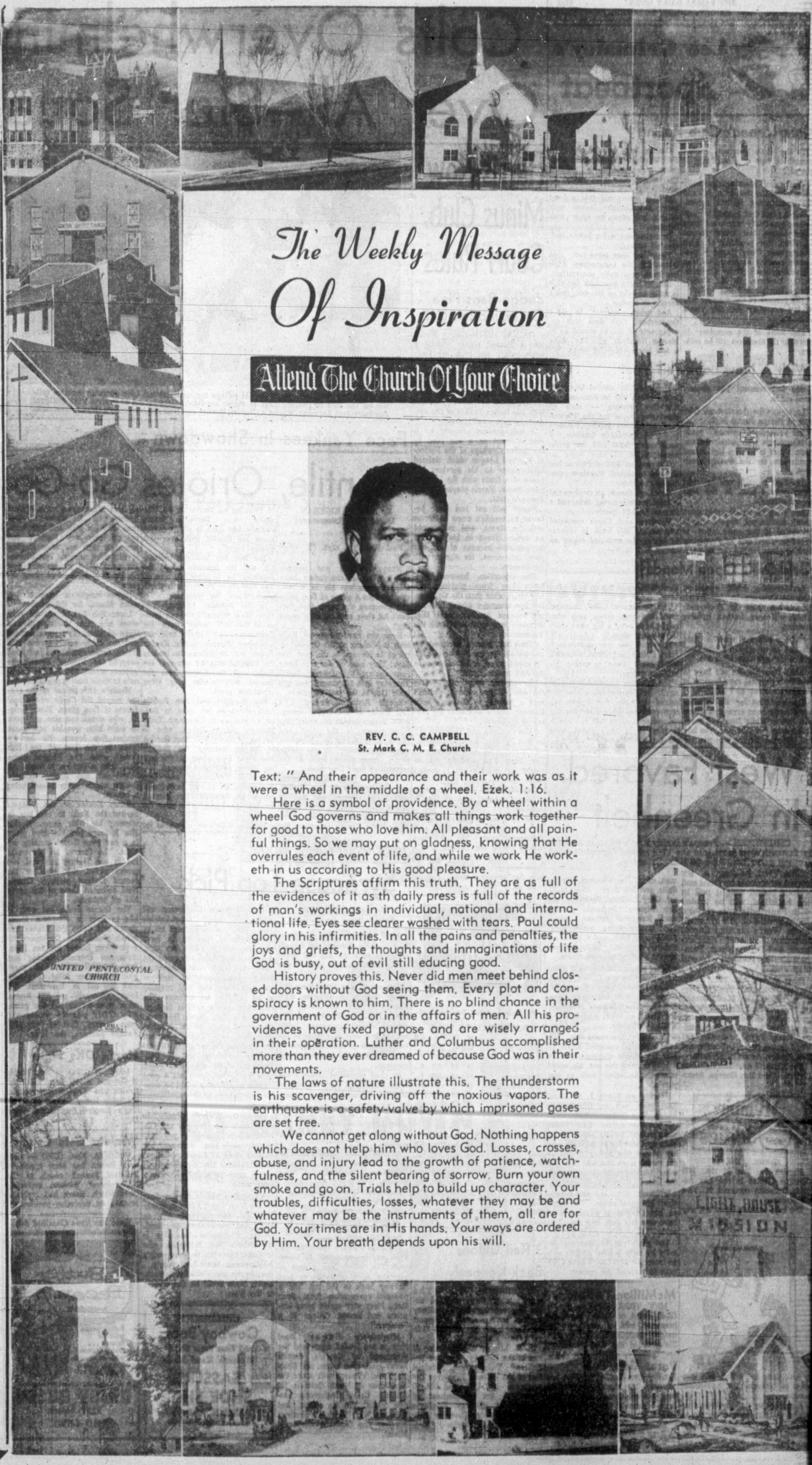

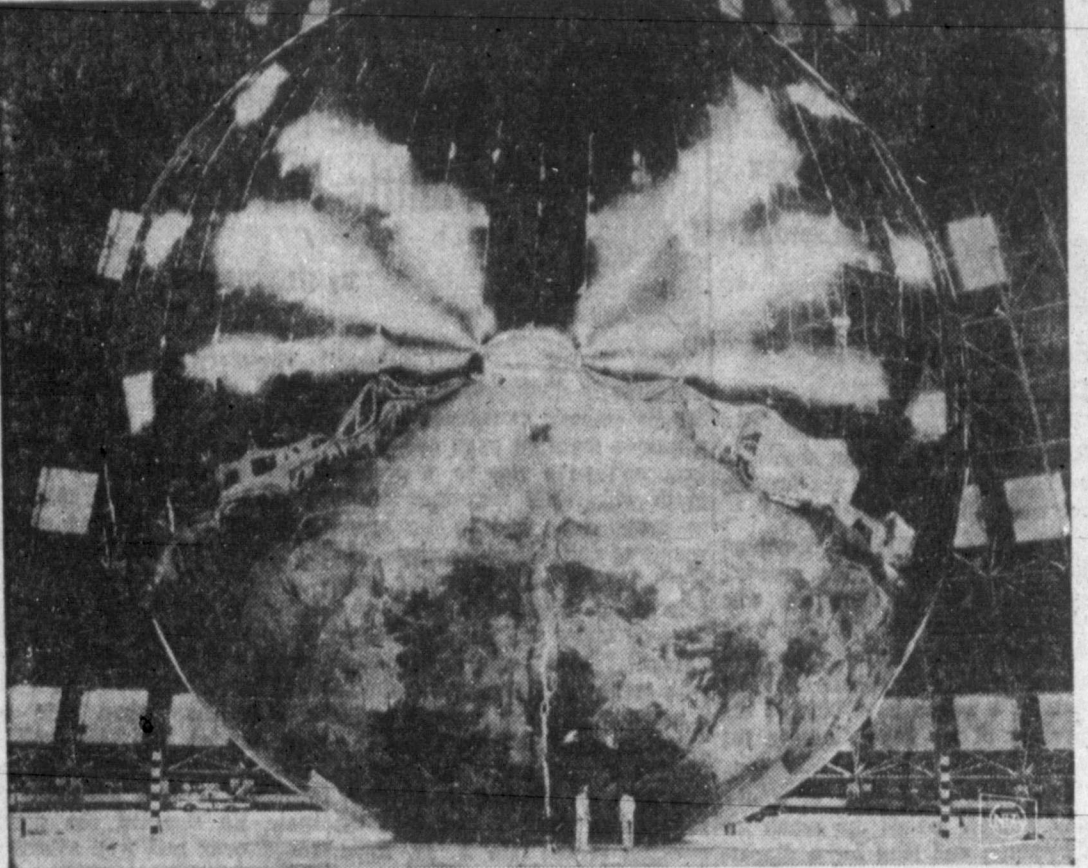

How Far Left Is Left Creates Raging Controversy In Mexico

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — The question of how far left is left, politically speaking, has touched off a storm of controversy with international overtones throughout Mexico.

It all started when President Adolfo Lopez Mateos during a recent tour of the interior described his administration as "extreme left, within the constitution."

The unusual phrase raised the question where the definition placed Mexico with relation to Moscow?

It generated a rash of conflicting statements, most of them from the president's subordinates, and had the immediate effect of bringing official opinion on the Cuban revolution to a boiling head.

The furor started with an almost unnoticed rural chat by socialist-minded ex-President Lazaro Cardenas (1934-40), the man who expropriated U.S. and British oil holdings in Mexico in 1938 and who put teeth into agrarian reforms to break up huge estates (latifundios) and give peasants the farm lands.

During a schoolhouse meeting in Michoacan state, Cardenas advised a group of some 100 farmers not to sell their land to foreigners for more "latifundios" (as many in the region had done to wealthy North American William Jenkins, legendary Mexico resident since 1910 revolutionary days).

Cardenas warned of "social unrest." The phrase got around and started backstage political whispering.

A few days later politicians held a dinner in honor of Alfonso Corona del Rosal, head of the ruling "Party of Revolutionary Institutions," and Manuel Moreno Sanchez, head of a five-member congressional team which had just returned from visits behind the Iron Curtain. Both men said in speeches the present administration is "correctly leftist," which, they explained, did not mean Communist, but simply that it gave attention to the needs of the poor, the oppressed, and the exploited.

Administration officials up and down the line took advantage of the opportunity to get into print with explanatory statements that "this is not Communism, but attention to the general welfare."

At the close of a 20-minute speech in Congress explaining all this, Emilio Sanchez Piedras,

President of an interim committee which sits between regular sessions of Congress, expanded the "extreme left" remarks to the realm of foreign policy, and affirmed Mexico's "solidarity" with Cuba.

The next day Washington asked for an "explanation," obviously wanted assurances the statement by Sanchez Piedras was not official policy. Foreign Minister Manuel Tello gave the assurances, pointing out that the president, not congress, determines Mexico's foreign policy. He also pointed out that newspaper editorials and "other signs" reflected much popular support of the Cuban revolution.

The oral fireworks went into full bloom.

Labor organizations and college students labeled the Washington "explanation" request an "intervention" in Mexico's internal affairs.

Students demonstrated twice in a week, marching past the modern U.S. Embassy building on fashionable Reforma Avenue (an hour after offices closed) to jeer and chant "Cuba yes, Yankees no."

During the demonstration in the starkly bare "Zocalo" Square facing the national palace built in Spanish colonial days, they cheered speakers who decried "Yankee imperialism" in Latin America and burned a paper American flag.

A secret service agent saved a cloth flag from burning, and police broke up the meeting.

A principal reason behind the

government desire to keep things on an even keel is the remarkable stability of the economy and the youthful energy of industry in a country which is now in a phase of production growth much like that of the United States following the Civil War.

Cornerstone of the economy is the now unquestioned stability of the Mexican peso (12.50 to the dollar) as reflected by recent confidence of numerous foreign private financing firms as well as government banks.

The latest move to consolidate the tremendous gains of the present administration which began in late 1958 was the government's decision to retire the foreign debt several years early. The debt amounts to some 450 million pesos (36 million dollars), not a small sum for a country the size of Mexico.

It includes parchment bonds dating as far back as the war of independence from Spain (1810-1820). The advance amortization began July 1, scheduled to be completed within 45 days.

A number of smaller loans have been obtained since. But the most impressive this year, in fact, in recent years, was a 100-million dollar loan from the Prudential Life Insurance Co.

Prudential turned the money over to the government financing agency, "Financiera Nacional," for use at the agency's discretion. It reportedly was Prudential's first such operation outside the United States or Canada.

The Man of the Week: United Nations Secretary - General Dag Hammarskjold.

The Place: United Nations headquarters, New York.

The Quote: "The immediate solution of the Congolese problem is a question of peace or war."

Dag Hjalmar Agne Carl Hammarskjold, second secretary-general of the United Nations, has been called a "global fireman" because of his efforts to preserve peace in a pugnacious world.

His way is the path of "quiet diplomacy," the private conference, the compromise worked out without the glare of publicity.

But this week he felt impelled to speak out in blunt words that warned the world it faced a possible Armageddon in Africa, where the breakaway province of Katanga had threatened to fight the entry of U.N. forces from other parts of the Congo.

His public declaration had the desired effect. The U.N. Security Council wound up a marathon session by voting to send a U.N. military force into Katanga and calling upon Belgium to withdraw its troops "immediately."

Tension immediately eased, and another possible flash point for the start of World War III was damped down.

The task of implementing the thrown back into Hammarskjold's Security Council decision was thrown back into Hammarskjold's lap. It's a task he'll complete, for he has a doggedness of character that belies his quiet, self-effacing exterior.
