Soviets May Cast Veto To Halt Plane Inquiry

DIPLOMATIC SOURCES today forecast a Soviet veto of an impartial investigation into the facts of a U.S. RB-47 shot down by Russian aircraft July 1.

U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge prepared to place more evidence before the Security Council today to show that the reconnaissance jet of the U. S. Air Force was far outside Soviet territorial waters when it was downed.
Lodge was the first speaker listed after him on the schedule were representatives of Argentina, Italy, China and Poland.
Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vasily V. Kuznetsov declared Monday that the U. S. record of the flight, obtained from undisclosed scientific devices and corroborated by equally secret British means, was "a coarse fabrication."
Kuznetsov flatly rejected Lodge's proposal for a joint U. S.-Soviet commission, with a mutually acceptable third party, to examine whatever wreckage there might be of the plane and to question survivors and any eye witnesses.
Kuznetsov said an investigation would only serve to confuse public opinion.
In short, he demanded that the council accept the Russian story at face value — without any outside corroboration — and discount the U. S. story as a big lie.
"The Soviet Union is resolutely against any investigations or the setting up of any commissions," he said. "The Security Council has complete and exhaustive facts which clearly testify to the aggressive nature of this flight."
Diplomats regarded this as an indication the Soviet Union would veto a draft resolution introduced by Lodge calling for either the investigation by a joint commission or referral of the case to the International Court of Justice.

Burglars Run Count Here To 7 Break-Ins In 5 Days

Burglars ran their count to seven break-ins in the past four days by entering two places last night.
But their take was slimmer than it has been — 28 cents, a half pint of milk and a package of potato chips.
Burglars broke into White's Auto, 109 S. Cuyler, and took 26 cents from a cash register.
Patrolman Jesse Goad discovered the burglary when he saw the back door was open during a routine check of the store.
Store manager Lucian Young was called, but the only thing he found missing was 28 cents.
Burglars also struck at the Lota Burger stand, 900 S. Barnes, between 3:40 and 4:30 this morning. Manager J. L. Cooper found an empty milk carton and potato chip sack in the kitchen, and assumed the burglar had stopped for a snack. No money was taken.
Goad had checked the stand at 3:40 a.m. Then at 4:30 a.m. patrolmen Gerald Clark and Charles Matson discovered the back door ajar.
The four-day count on burglaries now stands at seven with an economic loss of \$413.33, plus a \$300 adding machine.
Dirksen Electric Co., Shamrock Service Station and Goldsmith Dairy were hit Friday night. But the culprits failed to gain entry to the service station. \$127 was taken from Dirksen Electric, and an adding machine was stolen from Goldsmith Dairy.
Saturday night \$5 was taken from the Highway Cafe, and \$141.11 was stolen from the Lloyd Kuntz Service Station.
Sometime between Saturday night and Monday morning, the safe at the White House Lumber Co. was cracked and \$139.96 was taken.

African Policy On Agenda Of Kennedy

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI) — Sen. John F. Kennedy turned his attention today from presidential politics to African nationalism, one of the major foreign policy issues he would have to face as an occupant of the White House.
The Democratic standard-bearer, in the second week of a work-and-rest vacation at this Cape Cod resort, scheduled a meeting with Tom Mboya, general secretary of the Kenya Federation of Labor and a prominent young African leader.
Mboya, 29, planned to fly here in a private plane from New York with his brother, Alphonse Okuku, and Frank Monteri, president of the African - American Student Federation in New York.
Kennedy has long been interested in African affairs, and is chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee specializing in problems of that continent.

Texas Delegation Eyes Goldwater As Choice

INTERNATIONAL AMPHITHEATRE, CHICAGO (UPI) — The Texas delegation, instructed to go for Richard Nixon on the first ballot at the Republican National Convention, met today to consider switching its support to Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona.
Thad Hutcheson, GOP state chairman from Houston, said the Texas delegation had cooled toward the Vice President because of his stand on civil rights.
"The Texas delegates are kind of disturbed at the way things have been going here," Hutcheson said.
"Is that why Goldwater has Texas support?" he was asked.
"That's right. We came to this convention with a lot different attitude than we have now. We were instructed to go for Vice President Nixon, you know, or we thought we were. But we have been studying the whole situation."
"You mean your delegation might not vote on the first ballot for Nixon?"
"That's why we're studying the situation. We're going to find out just how deeply we're bound to Nixon. We're going to have a meeting today."
"Why has the Texas delegation cooled toward Nixon?"
"It's the platform that Nixon and Rockefeller worked out."

"You're disturbed with what might come out in the way of civil rights?"
"Civil rights and other things," Hutcheson said. "We just don't think it's right for two men to get together in a hotel room and work out a platform while there's a whole committee back in Chicago doing the same thing. People back home are disturbed."
The first was from Mrs. Bert N. Shipp of Dallas. It said: "Back Goldwater all the way stop Nixon too liberal."

Progress Reported

CHICAGO (UPI) — Richard M. Nixon reported progress toward a strong Republican civil rights program today and Nelson A. Rockefeller rebuffed another move to draft him for the vice presidential nomination.
Nixon's progress report came after a "long night" of telephone talks with platform drafters as the GOP national convention went into its second day. This was "Thank You Ike" day in Chicago, and both city and delegates were geared to give the President a rousing welcome.
The vice president told Rockefeller, his partner in the fight for a strong civil rights plank, that they had made some headway. He and the New York governor talked by telephone for about 10 minutes.
Rockefeller breakfasted with a group of governors who tried to get him to change his won't run- won't serve attitude toward the vice presidency. Aside from breaking bread with them, he gave them no comfort. He said he wouldn't accept the No. 2 bid. Nixon was staking all his presidential nomination.

Mounting Pressure On Rocky

CHICAGO (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller today faced mounting pressure to become Richard M. Nixon's running mate despite repeated "won't run — won't serve" declarations.
Supporters of the plan to get Rockefeller on the 1960 Republican ticket were led by Gov. Mark O. Hatfield of Oregon. Hatfield invited the New Yorker to breakfast with him and several other Republican governors in Rockefeller's headquarters.
"I still hope Gov. Rockefeller will run for vice president," Hatfield told the United Press International. "I have no encouragement from him."
Rockefeller, it was learned, wanted to turn the governors' breakfast from a discussion of possible vice presidential candidates to the 14-point platform he drafted with Nixon.
"With these 14 points the vice president and I agreed to," Rockefeller said, "the convention can adopt a platform that all of us can support. We can go out and work for the candidates to assure victory in November. I think I can do just as much for the ticket without being on it."
Rockefeller spent most of his time working on the platform. He was especially concerned over the civil rights plank which threatened to provoke a floor fight.

Ike Delayed On Flight To Chicago

NEWPORT, R.I. (UPI) — President Eisenhower's flight to Chicago has been delayed approximately two hours "due to bad weather in Chicago." Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said today.
Hagerty said President and Mrs. Eisenhower delayed their departure from Newport because of heavy rains in that city.
The President's big Boeing 707 now is scheduled to arrive at O'Hare Field outside Chicago at 1:05 p.m. e.s.t. instead of the previous 11:05 time.
Chicago planned a ticker-tape parade for the chief executive, who is to address the Republican national convention tonight.

Britain Heads Off Soviet Move To Participate In Congo Crisis

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (UPI) — An emergency British move headed off an expansion of Soviet participation in the United Nations operation in the Congo, an informed source said today.
The source, one of the best informed diplomatic personalities in this part of the world, said Ghana was having trouble getting transportation for the troops it was contributing to the U. N. force in the Congo.
Russia stepped in and offered as many Ilyushin airliners as Ghana needed, the source said.
"The Ilyushins were already heading for Ghana when Britain got wind of what was happening and sent Comet 4 jets to airlift the major portion of the Ghanaian troops," he said. "The Comets landed at Acran Airport only about an hour ahead of the Ilyushins."
The sources said that as a result most of the Ghanaian troops rode in British planes to Leopoldville, although the Russians moved one plane load of them.
The number of U. N. troops in the Congo has climbed above the 7,000 mark and is expected to rise past 10,000 before the end of the week.
The arrival of troops from many lands to serve under the light blue of the United Nations has brought a drastic reduction of the anti-white violence which raged here for two weeks after the Congo received its independence from Belgium June 30.
"Still ahead, however, are the massive problems of the "secession" of Katanga Province, the withdrawal of Belgian troops, future protection of whites, rebuilding the national economy and civil service and preserving the health of the country."

Jacoby On Bridge

Here is a hand from "Spotlight on Card Play" that looks almost too easy, but don't let it fool you. The hand is about as tough as I have ever seen and my guess is that not one bridge player in a hundred would make it against the six of hearts lead, plus good defense from then on.

There seems to be nine easy tricks: four in spades, two in hearts and three in diamonds; plus a possible extra trick in hearts, plus a possible trick in clubs.

The nine tricks are there - all right if you go right up with dummy's ace of hearts: cash three

spades; and lead a low diamond to the dummy. West won't be able to keep you from cashing the ace of spades and three diamonds.

But suppose you play second hand low on the opening lead. East will put up the jack and knock out the king. You will probably go after the spades and then lead a low diamond to dummy's jack. West will duck and you will cash dummy's last spade and play another diamond. West will hold off on that one also and your nine tricks will be down to eight since you will have no entry left to your hand for that last diamond.

Of course, there is a lot more to the hand. If you do play it wrong East will have to make two discards on spades and he must not throw away one of those apparently useless diamonds. Otherwise, after West ducks the second diamond you can abandon that suit and throw East in with a club.

MATURE PARENT

Late last night the mother of a long-widowed friend of ours died in her daughter's home.
When I arrived I found the nurse still in attendance. I made us all coffee. Time passed. After a while my friend was able to speak. Looking across the room to where the nurse was sipping her coffee she said:
"You were so kind to me, Miss Gray. I will never forget your kindness."
"You did so many things I couldn't have done. I couldn't have talked to the medical examiner. I wouldn't have been able to find the telephone number of those of those people who took her away."
"You were so kind. And then making me soup. You are so good, Miss Gray—so good."
Now it is the responsibility of a nurse to deal with illness and death. It is their job to know what to do for those who are not able to do for themselves.
That Miss Gray had done her professional work with kindness is surely to her credit; but as I listened to my friends broken words of gratitude, they struck me as very sad indeed.
She was, quite literally, astounded by her experience of decent human kindness.
Is it such a rare one among us these days that we must so marvel at it? Is it so rarely that we can expose our weakness and need to others and receive strength and compassion instead of criticism and contempt?
Where did this cult of Spartan self-sufficiency come from? It is certainly a basic problem of parents.
Never must we falter before children. Always we must be ready with perfected understanding and endless strength. We must never let our guard down lest Jimmy and Nancy suspect that we are less sure of ourselves than we think we ought to be.
If a disagreement with their father has discouraged us, we must pretend it hasn't. If we're anxious about money, we must say:
"Oh, it's nothing. I was just wondering about something."
Under no circumstances is it safe to let the children know that we are not in complete control of ourselves.
Why?
The answer, I think is a sadening one.
We have learned that exposing our weakness to others means punishment. To reveal it is to invite, not respect but exploitation and hurt.
Which is why increasing numbers of us have to seek psychiatrists for acceptance of our insufficiencies.

Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI) — This week's Republican convention can be expected to paint a rosier picture of the nation's economic health and it would be surprising if the market does not show a favorable response, according to B. K. Thurlow of Winslow, Cohu & Stetson, Inc.

It seems curious, he says, that with the election campaign now beginning in earnest, the administration is showing so little concern over the steady deterioration in business sentiment that has taken place during the past few weeks.

An excellent pretext for stimulating measures now exists and these include lowering interest rates and margin requirements, in the opinion of this financial analyst.

Bache & Co. is surprised to see Great Western Financial back down so sharply in view of its continued earnings gain. With chances for any adverse legislation slim, Bache says, GWF's excellent past record would seem to deserve a higher valuation.

The next twelve months should see a leveling off, or at worst a slight decline in bank earnings, according to the Value Line Investment survey. However, with current dividend payments at historically low levels, a general liberalization of dividend rates appears in prospect.

Hornblower & Weeks notes that oil company executives have stated that improved earnings during the remainder of the year should offset the rather disappointing results earlier so that full 1960 income should be about equal to 1959 or better in some cases. The latter will probably hold true for Standard Oil of Indiana, Hornblower believes.

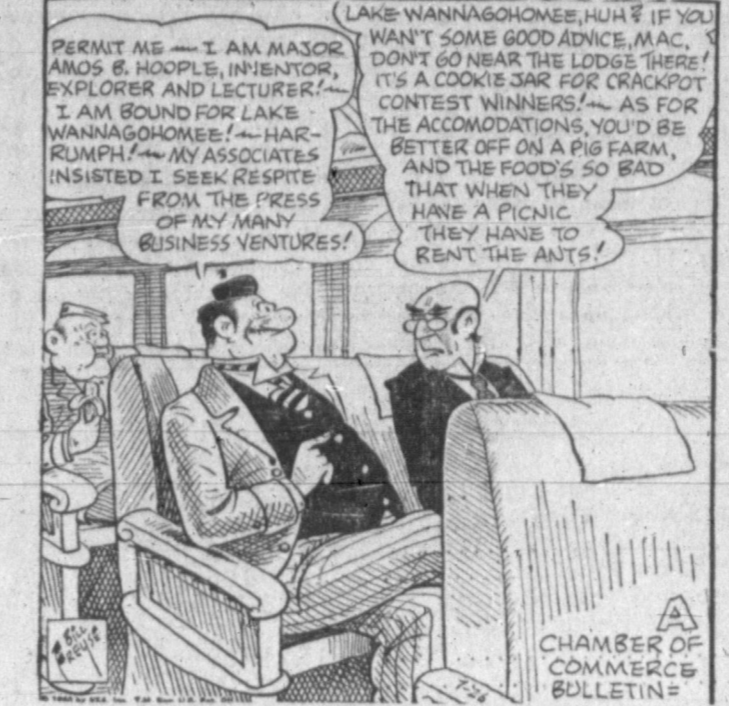

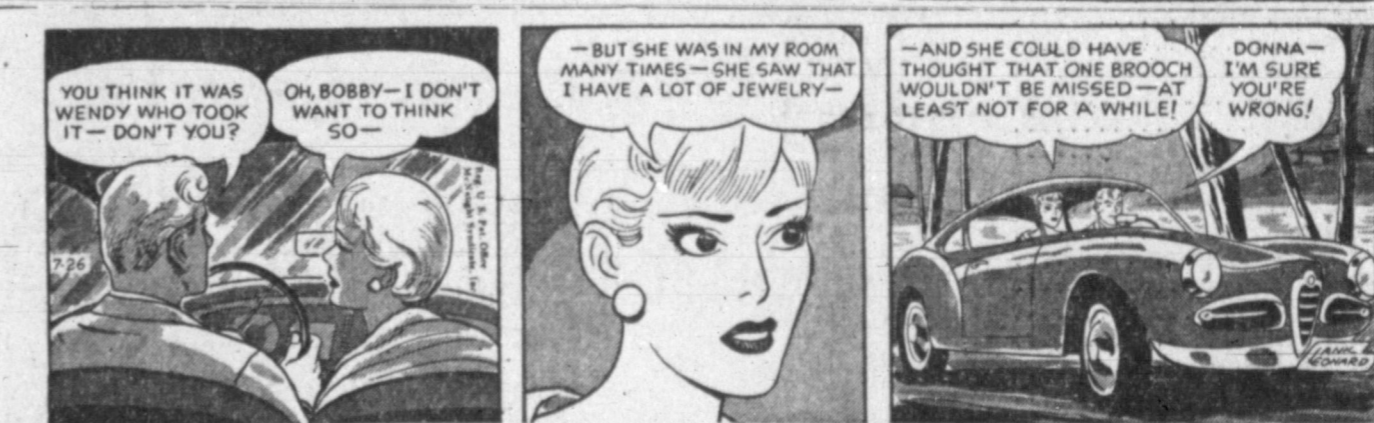

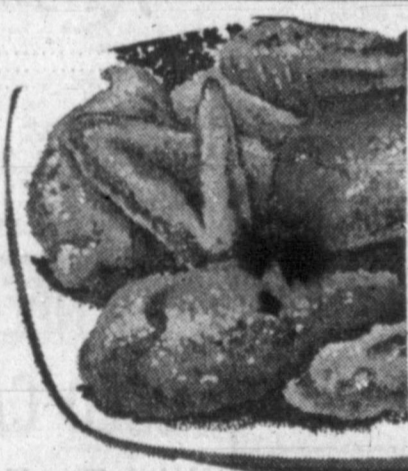
