Doctors Say Castro Must Take Rest

Mentally And Physically Tired

HAVANA (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro's doctors today ordered "absolute rest, mental as well as physical" for the bearded Cuban leader, suffering from an ailment that has kept him out of public view for days.

Castro's illness has touched off speculation of a crisis in leadership in Cuba but most observers believed his anti-American brother, Raul would serve as acting premier until Castro recovers. His doctors gave no time but said he would be back "soon."

A communique issued by Castro's physicians and published today in the government newspaper Revolution again diagnosed Castro's illness as convalescence from a serious pneumonia infection. But most medical courses in Havana said it was an ailment that necessitated surgery.

Maj. Raul Trillo, one of several army physicians attending Castro, said today his "condition is satisfactory without any kind of danger (sin peligro de ninguna clase)." He said he needed "absolute rest."

Trillo said the doctors had suspended treatment with antibiotics a week ago and that Castro now is following a treatment which consists of "complete rest, good food and vitamin injections."

He said Castro had lost weight and that his condition at first was considered "serious." But he said Castro "will recover quickly from here on out."

"There is no motive for alarm of any kind and I can state that Commander Fidel Castro will soon be able to renew his activities," he said.

Nixon-Benson Break Is Jumped On By Kennedy

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI)—Democratic presidential candidate John F. Kennedy's headquarters today lambasted Richard M. Nixon as "a political captain leaving the sinking ship" through repudiation of administration defense and farm programs.

The attack on Nixon came in a statement signed by five Democratic governors and three Democratic senators and issued here after Kennedy saw and approved the wording.

The candidate himself was expected to have a statement later on Nixon's break with Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson on farm policy.

The statement was put out here prior to meetings of Kennedy and Rep. Chester A. Bowles (D-Conn.), one of this top foreign policy advisors, and Bernard Boutin, a candidate for the Demo-

cratic gubernatorial nomination in New Hampshire.

The meetings with Boutin and Bowles started a busy third and final week here for Kennedy, who had combined sun and sea with work and rest in a vacation prior to the August session of Congress and the fall campaign.

Pierre Salinger, Kennedy's press secretary, said the Boutin meeting would involve plans for the Democratic ticket to carry all of New England, including Maine and Vermont, the only two states to vote Republican in the 1954 presidential election.

Kennedy conferred Sunday at his home and on his family's yacht, Marlin, with Adlai E. Stevenson, head of the Democratic ticket in 1952 and 1956.

Their discussion dealt mainly with foreign policy, Kennedy said, but also entailed Stevenson's role in the campaign. Kennedy said they talked about prospects for Stevenson campaigning this year in states where he amassed support in the past two elections.

Kennedy said two of the states they discussed were California and New York—where unity problems (See NIXON, Page 3)

West Berlin Fears Reds Plan Offensive Moves

BERLIN (UPI)—The East German Communists increased their diplomatic pressure on West Berlin today in a new indication of a possible Red move against the free city before the U.S. presidential elections.

The West Berlin newspaper, Tel- egraf reported Sunday the Com- munists planned to move against West Berlin and said it received reliable reports that East German leader Walter Ulbricht has organized "storm troopers" for an assault.

The situation was becoming so tense that a government spokesman in Bonn indicated the West German Parliament would not meet in West Berlin this fall, apparently because of Soviet threats to move against the city if it does.

Post Election Riots In Korea

SEOUL, Korea (UPI)—Savage post-election rioting broke out in three areas of south-central Korea today and the government mobilized army troops to restore order.

The rioters and demonstrators all were protesting the handful of members of Rhee's Liberal-Democratic Party who were elected to the new National Assembly in balloting Friday.

There was no question how- ever of Rhee's old party control- ling the new government. Official returns from 219 dis- tricts gave the Democratic Party, of former Vice President John M. Chang 167 seats, more than the two-thirds required to control the 233-seat lower chamber of the National Assembly which will elect a president and approve a premier.

There were some charges of election rigging, particularly in cases where Liberal - Democratic candidates ran for office success- fully despite the fact they were in jail.

Demonstrations also broke out in Seoul for the first time since the April revolution which toppled the regime of former President Syngman Rhee.

There was no question how- ever of Rhee's old party control- ling the new government. Official returns from 219 dis- tricts gave the Democratic Party, of former Vice President John M. Chang 167 seats, more than the two-thirds required to control the 233-seat lower chamber of the National Assembly which will elect a president and approve a premier.

Dallas Morning News Backs GOP

Political Refugees Now Guard Mexican Embassy

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic (UPI) - An embattled group of political refugees guarded the doors and windows of the Embassy today following an assault on the building by knife-wielding young hoodlums. Up to late Sunday night about 20 grim-faced teen-agers loitered outside the front door of the embassy, which they earlier had smashed, clashing with those inside, in a supposed attempt to gain asylum. Some older men believed to be intelligence agents, could be seen lurking in nearby streets barren of a single uniformed policeman.

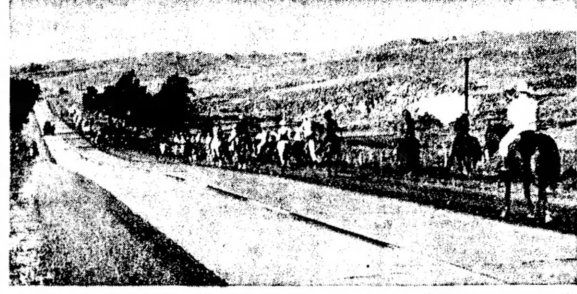

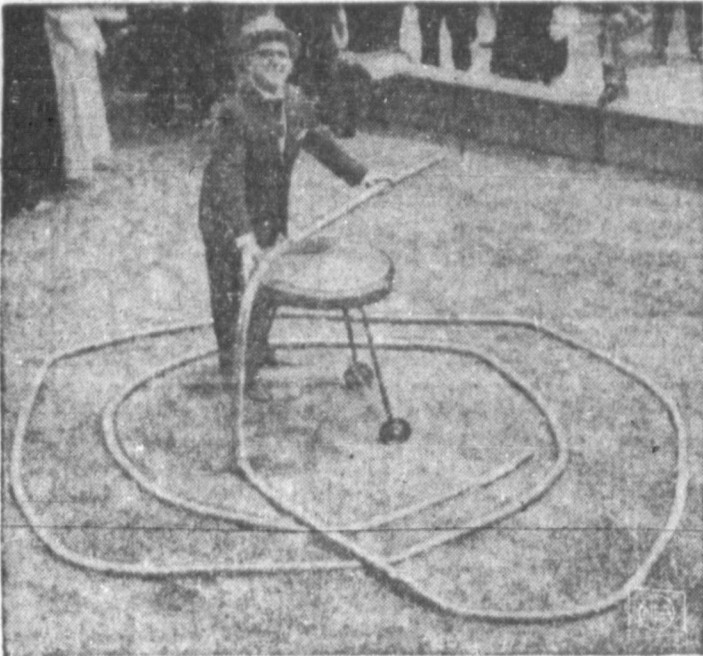

Friendly Negro Youth Beaten By White Men

HARPERSVILLE, Ala. (UPI)—Hard work and courtesy earned for Henry Lewis Jones a degree of respect unique for young Negroes in this middle Alabama farm town. The 19-year-old father of two small children had a ready smile and polite service for all customers, both Negro and white, who entered the combination-grocery-service station where he worked. "I treat people just like I want to be treated myself," he said. His easy way was contagious. "He is liked by the whole town," said Police Chief Raymond H. Rogers. But Jones' eagerness to oblige led to his abduction and flogging Saturday night by a group of white men and left him a young man broken in spirit. "It just doesn't make sense," he said. "I thought all the people around here were my friends." Rogers said he doesn't believe

the abductors are local men. He said he has "pretty positive" identification of them and "it's just a matter of time before arrests are made."

Six white men drove into the station Saturday night and asked for a gasoline credit card. The white man left in charge of the station by the vacationing owners was not versed in the procedure for filling out credit applications. He referred the matter to Jones who had handled many such forms during his two and a half years at the station. The men apparently became angered at having to apply for credit through a Negro. But they left without incident. When Henry and his brother, David, 13, later walked into the yard of their home, they were dragged into a car by the same white men. David was thrown on the rear floorboard of the car and Henry tossed on top of him. The men held them there with their teeth.

The men drove several miles to a wooded area. Henry was stripped of his shorts and tied to a tree. The men flayed him repeatedly with belts and knotted lengths of rope. "Sometimes one would hit me and sometimes two of them at once," he said. David, made to remain in the car, was not harmed. After the beating, Henry was freed by the men who warned him to give them time to make a getaway. The two Negro youths walked about a quarter of a mile to a house where a farmer drove them to a police station.

Jones was not seriously injured. C. B. Miller, owner of the service station, said he hopes Jones will remain at the station. But the disillusioned Negro youth has had enough. "I don't think I will work in the gas station anymore," he said. "I guess I will go live with my brother who is up North."

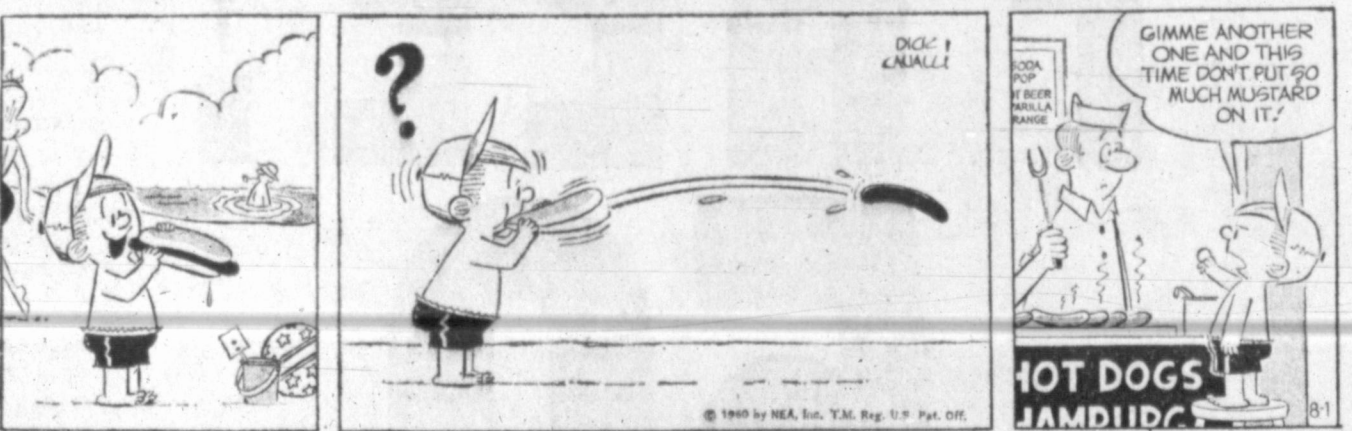

No. 4 of Comanche County.
