### AFL-CIO To Withdraw Support Of 'Wrong Voting' Candidates

 WASHINGTON (UPI) — The AFL-CIO will veto political support for any congressional candidate who does not endorse a labor-backed proposal to provide medical care for the aged.

This position is being spelled out by the No. 2 man in the AFL-CIO — Secretary-Treasurer William F. Schmitzer — in a series of speeches.

The AFL-CIO is pushing for enactment of a bill, originally introduced by Rep. Aime Forand (D-R.I.), which would provide free medical benefits for persons over 65 by raising Social Security payroll taxes on nearly all workers.

President Eisenhower has called the Forand approach a "compulsory" program that would lower standards of medical care. The House is in the process of approving a substitute bill to help the states provide a limited amount of medical care but the AFL-CIO calls this proposal an inadequate handout.

"Any candidate for Congress who refuses to endorse Forand-type health insurance for those over 65 is manifestly unworthy of the support of American workers," Schmitzer declared.

Anyone who balks at supporting this kind of program "identifies himself as a reactionary who would oppose virtually the entire progressive program of the trade union movement," he added.

Schmitzer called it a "clear-cut and conclusive" test for determining labor support.

### Blast Marks Construction Start On Dam

SAN ANGELO (UPI)—Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaton set off a huge dynamite blast that tore away the side of a hill Wednesday inaugurating construction of a 36 million dollar dam and water control project.

More than 7,500 persons attended the three-hour ground breaking ceremonies at the construction site, some nine miles west of San Angelo.

The dam will be made of earth and will stretch for eight miles across the Middle and South Concho Rivers and Spring Creek. Behind it, the reservoir will hold some 336,000 acre-feet of water.

Construction is scheduled to be completed within three years.

"I recall all too vividly my trip to San Angelo with President Eisenhower when this appeared as a drought-stricken area," Seaton said. "It did my heart good today as I flew over San Angelo to see the green fields, the happy look on people's faces and your rivers and streams filled with water."

### SENATOR INJURED

AMARILLO (UPI)—State Sen. Grady Hazlewood, 58, victim of an accident on his farm Tuesday, was listed in poor condition today at Northwest Texas Hospital.

Hazlewood suffered a broken jaw, deep cuts and burns on his face, and an injury to his left eye when a 55-gallon gasoline drum exploded. He was cutting the top off the drum with an acetylene torch when it exploded.

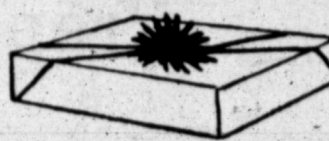

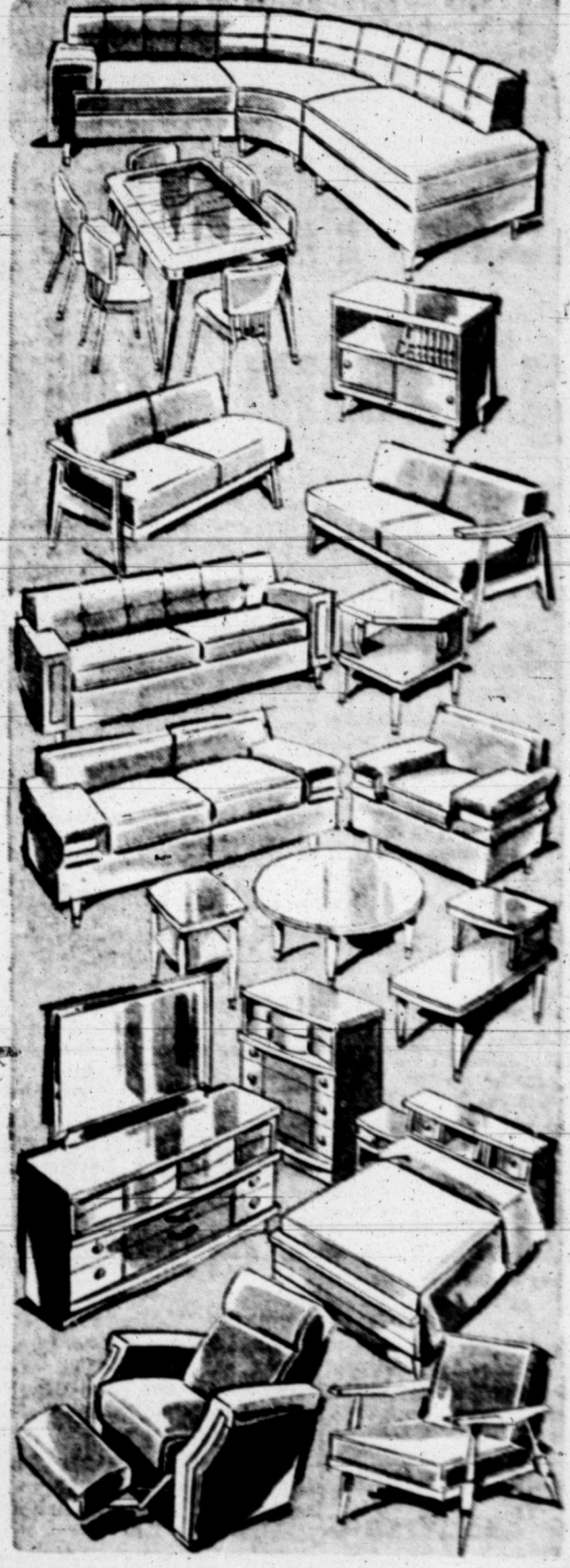

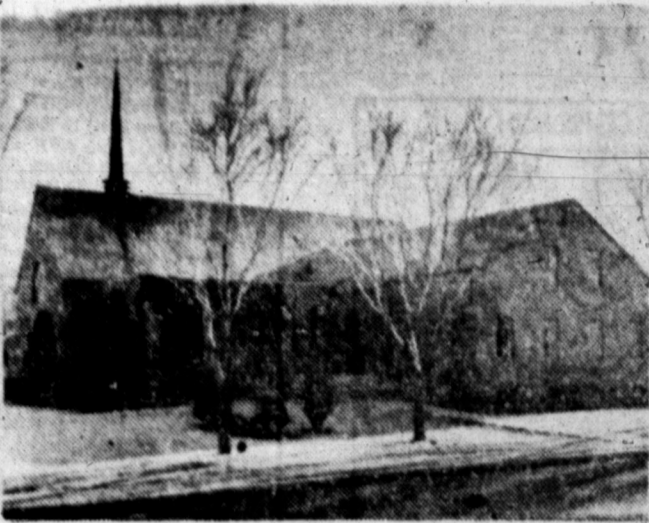

**Communications Advance Accomplished By Satellites**

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The success of the new American piggy-back satellite now in orbit generated high optimism today among Pentagon space experts.

They saw Wednesday's launch-

ing of a twin-bill satellite as evidence that a space vehicle can relay communications. The new communications break-through was expected to be one of the next space ventures of the armed forces.

The highly-successful orbiting new navigation satellite, the Transit II-A, was hailed as showing America's fast-increasing ability to put practical spacecraft aloft.

The II-A vehicle was one of two satellites, boosted from Cape Canaveral, Fla., by a single rocket launcher, the first such achievement on record. The only previous American attempt to orbit two satellites in one shot failed.

Wednesday's success was a measure of U.S. space progress, demonstrating the feasibility of single-shot launches of satellite clusters. The possibility of getting up more payloads with fewer boosters could save millions of dollars.

The communications satellite now under development by the Army Signal Corps for launching by the Air Force is called "Courier." It is one of a number of
