LA Feels Brunt. Of **Big Tides**

LONG BEACH Calif (UPI) Surging tides caused by earthquakes and tidal waves in Chile today ripped loose moorings and scattered some 60 yachts in anchorages of Long Beach - Los Angeles harbor.

The Coast Guard said a strong current was going in with each surge that brought harbor waters several feet before falling back. The surging began at dawn. Small finger piers of main anchorages were pulled loose with some of the craft that drifted back and forth in the channels. Coast Guard crews and boat owners were gathering up lines and securing the drifting boats. There are several thousand small boats and yachts anchored in the

No injuries were reported although some small pleasure craft foundered. Larger boats suffered some splintering and superstructures of some sailing vessels were sheared off by low bridges as they swung in and out of the channel with the tides.
