Castro Renews Attack Accuses U.S. In Death Plot

HAVANA (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro whipped up a new international uproar today with charges of a U.S.-supported plot to shoot down an airliner carrying Cuban Foreign Minister Raul Roa home from San Jose, Costa Rica.

The charge — sprung by the bearded revolutionary leader in a speech from his palace balcony Tuesday night — was spread throughout the island by the government-controlled press and radio to give impetus to a mass rally set for this Friday in Havana.

Castro called the demonstration to show Cuba's contempt for the anti-Communist declaration issued last Monday by 19 hemisphere foreign ministers in San Jose and its determination to stick by its new Soviet and Red Chinese "friends."

The premier claimed that "two airplanes of war based in Guatemala" had been alerted to attack Roa's Cuban airliner over the Caribbean on its return from San Jose.

He said the aerial ambush was to have been carried out "by international gangsters who are supported by the United States" but that the plot was foiled when Roa left five hours earlier than scheduled on a secret flight arranged by the Costa Rican government.

"You all know how many bandits there are, how many killers, gangsters and mercenaries who find work assured in the intelligence service of the U.S. State Department," Castro told a crowd.

Fidel Charge Said 'False'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The White House today denounced as ridiculous and untrue a charge by Fidel Castro that the U.S. government was involved in a plot to shoot down an airliner carrying Cuban Foreign Minister Raul Roa.

Castro had accused the United States of being behind the alleged scheme to shoot down Roa's plane as it was flying from Costa Rica to Cuba.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty emphatically denied the charge.

"It's one of the most ridiculous charges that I have heard emanating from Cuba—and of course completely untrue," Hagerty told newsmen.

Kennedy Suffers Setback

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress, having spurned the legislative program of Democratic presidential nominee John F. Kennedy, moved today to wind up the rest of its business quickly and go home.

The most optimistic members hoped for adjournment late tonight. The more realistic ones talked about quitting Thursday night.

The drive for speedy adjournment began after a collapse in the efforts to work out a compromise bill to increase the minimum wage from \$1 an hour to \$1.15 and expand its coverage.

The failure of Congress to produce any minimum wage legislation plunged the issue into the presidential election campaign.

Kennedy, leader of the Senate negotiators, said he would rather have no bill than accept the one.

Trio Questioned In Negro's Death

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI)—Three white men who fired pistol bullets at Negroes in a speeding car were questioned today by police investigating the first death in four days of racial violence here.

The car slammed into a utility pole, killing the driver and injuring a Negro passenger. An autopsy Tuesday disclosed that the victim, ex-convict Charlie Edward Davis, 27, had been shot in the head.

But police declined to say whether Davis died from the bullet wound or from injuries in the crash.

"He could certainly have been killed in the car accident," said homicide Sgt. W. C. Barber. "He was torn up bad—real bad."

Questioning of the white men, attendants at a service station about one block from the scene of the accident, began as Jacksonville experienced its calmest night in a half-week of racial tempets which have left some 70 persons injured and more than 150 arrested.

The three men, whose identities were withheld, told police earlier they had fired a barrage of bullets from Davis' car as it sped by in a police chase. Their service station had been shot up in an earlier incident Tuesday morning.

Barber said a coroner's inquest probably would be called into the incident which left Davis' companion, 47-year-old Willie Green, severely injured.

There were no immediate plans to place charges, pending further questioning, authorities said.

Statements also were taken from police officers who took part in the chase of the stolen car Davis was driving, or were at the service station.

Daniel Refuses To Act In Houston Integration Fight

Supreme Court Asked To Issue Stop Order

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI)—Gov. Price Daniel refused to intervene in the Houston school integration dispute today on the ground that the state does not have the power to stop a federal integration order.

In Washington, the Houston school district asked the Supreme Court to stop the immediate integration of first grade classes.

Houston's public schools, of which 144 are elementary, open Sept. 7. Registration in the first grade and kindergarten started Tuesday and will continue, 9 a.m. to noon, through the rest of the week.

At last report, no Negroes had registered for the first grade. A spokesman for the Supreme Court in Washington said the Houston application for a stay of the integration order issued by Federal Dist. Judge Ben Connelly might be heard Thursday.

The Houston School Board Tuesday night asked Daniel, who is vacationing at his farm in Liberty, to interpose powers delegated to the state in the 10th Amendment between the schools and the Federal courts to prevent integration.

This is the theory of interposition. Daniel, from the first, made it clear that he was not going to intervene. Finally, he issued a formal statement through his secretary in Austin which said:

"I am sure that the Houston School Board's attorneys and all other capable lawyers would so advise the board. This exact action was tried and failed in the state of Virginia, and Virginia is now following the Texas policy of leaving operation and control of school matters in the hands of local school districts." Daniel's statement said.

"The Texas policy of local operation and control of public schools is far better than an attempted control by the governor or state agencies. If such state control were attempted the entire state and all of its school districts could quickly become involved in federal court injunction suits as we are now witnessing in Louisiana," the statement concluded.

Contacted at his ranch, Daniel said he had not seen a copy of the Houston School Board's resolution asking him to interpose the state's authority to block integration.

The Houston school board has appealed Judge Connelly's integration order to the Fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Destruction Of U.N. Base Threatened By Katanga

ELISABETHVILLE, The Congo (UPI)—The Katanga government today threatened to destroy the huge former Belgian military base of Kamina if the United Nations does not guarantee that Congolese troops will be barred from landing there.

The threat was made in a communique issued by Katanga President Moise Tshombe. The Katanga leader feared the base, which is only lightly held by the U.N.'s 33rd Irish battalion, could be captured by troops of Congolese Premier Patrice Lumumba and used to subdue the secessionist province.

Following the threat, the U.N. command rushed reinforcements of 100 Swedish troops into Kamina to strengthen the garrison.

The U.N. spokesman in Elisabethville, New Zealand's Ian Berendsen, announced the Swedish movement and also confirmed that the United Nations has "neutralized" the base.

He said neither Tshombe's nor Lumumba's troops would be allowed to use Kamina, which is loaded with arms and ammunition left behind by the Belgians.

He also said the Kamina airfield, capable of taking planes of up to 165 tons, will allow only U.N. planes to land.

An estimated 1,000 Belgian technicians still were running the base, but Berendsen refused to say if they now were considered to be U.N. employees.

Roger Crevecoeur, claimed again today that fighting between Congolese troops and Baluba warriors of Albert Kalonji was going on around the town of Bakwanga in the Kasai province. Bakwanga was the capital of the Communist zone. The Reds charged the rally violated four-power agreements and set up special police checks on all road routes to the city.

Earlier, a U.N. spokesman denied knowledge of reports of fighting in the Kasai province between the Kalonji and Lumumba forces, the latter allegedly led by Crevecoeur.

Commercial Ban Ignored

Planes Fly To Berlin; Reds Shift Aircraft

BERLIN, Germany (UPI)—Western commercial airlines today ignored Communist warnings against flying West Germans into Berlin but the Reds made no attempt to interfere with traffic through the air corridors.

Unusually heavy concentrations of Communist aircraft were reported today at Soviet airfields astride the air corridors leading to Berlin.

Two airliners, one from Hannover and the other from Frankfurt, landed safely at Berlin's Tempelhof airport with more than 60 West Germans aboard. They were the first to arrive since the East German Communist regime announced Tuesday night it was closing Berlin to West Germans for five days.

The travel ban was aimed at breaking up a scheduled four-day rally here by refugees from the Communist zone. The Reds charged the rally violated four-power agreements and set up special police checks on all road routes to the city.

Conner Urges Drivers To Exercise Caution Now That School Has Begun

City police today called on motorists for "cooperation in the protection of our school children."

Chief of Police Jim Conner said that every effort would be taken by his department to protect the school children, but "motorists must help us."

"This will mark the first school year for a number of children. They, naturally, will be excited, and we must think safety for them," said Conner.

The chief pointed out restrictions for driving in school zone areas and said, "We have no desire to adopt a 'get tough' policy in this, but, if necessary, we shall."

School zone speed limits are 15 miles per hour, between the hours of 7:30 to 9:30 a.m., noon to 1 p.m., and 2:30 to 4:30 p.m.

These limits must not be violated, said Conner, "and there will be no exceptions."

All school zones include "no passing" regulations, and specific points are banned for parking. These, too, will be rigidly enforced, Conner noted.

"Pedestrian crosswalks should be observed carefully. When a person is in a crosswalk, the motorist must stop," the chief warned.

Throughout the city, the department has assigned seven crossing guards. These guards, who serve in all types of weather, are stationed at crossings to assist children in moving across streets.

The chief urged that all drivers be alert to aid the guards in seeing that youngsters get across streets safely.

Police Kill Gunman In New York Battle

NEW YORK (UPI)—Four young hoodlums fought a running gun battle with police in tourist-packed Rockefeller Center Tuesday after a spectacular \$10,000 stickup in the RCA building.

One gunman was shot dead. Two policemen were injured and in serious condition today. Another gunman was captured and police sought two more, whose identities were unknown.

No bystanders were hurt. The gun battle, witnessed by thousands of shoppers and tourists, began after the robbers fled with \$10,000 from the currency exchange firm of Lionel Perera, Manfra and Brookes, just across from Radio City Music Hall.

"This is a stickup," a gunman told John Brookes, a partner in the firm.

"You're kidding," said Brookes, and one of the men cracked him on the head with his pistol.

Brookes picked himself up off the floor while the men, their pockets and two paper bags stuffed with U.S. and foreign bills, ran outside and separated, mingling with the crowds.

Thomas Byrnes, 19, a West Side hoodlum believed to be the leader of the holdup team, and a companion hailed a cab driven by Al Greenbaum, 60, and ordered him to "keep on going."

By this time, police squad cars were converging on the area. One of the gunmen shot at police through the cab's rear window. The frightened driver slowed down and dashed from the cab to hide in a doorway. All around, pedestrians fled for cover.

One of the gunmen's shots felled Patrolman Donald Baesler, one of two policemen who fired at the fleeing cab. A bullet ripped through his shoulder, chest and back.

The other policeman, Peter Gallagher, 59, who hadn't used his pistol in 31 years, was grazed on the forehead by a gunman's bullet. He later suffered a heart attack.

Industry To Join In Space Job

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The government has asked industry to help design a maneuverable three-man spaceship to fly around the moon and back in the next 10 years.

The National Aeronautics & Space Administration (NASA) said Tuesday it had scheduled a "bidders' conference" for Sept. 12 at Langley Field, Va., to discuss design study contracts.

As many as three such contracts, costing up to \$300,000 each, may be awarded. The studies are to be completed by next May 15. They will include cost estimates.

Actual construction of the spaceship is tentatively planned for 1962-65. The craft will be capable of operating in space for several weeks at a time under complete control of its crew.

It is intended to be the forerunner of manned space stations and of spaceships capable of landing men on the moon and planets.

Authorities said Garland R. Elam, a former Oklahoman, knocked down George A. Howe Jr., broke a wine bottle on his head, and kicked him in the face three times in an unprovoked attack.

Howe was released after treatment Tuesday but police said further hospitalization might be needed.

The only reason Elam could give for the attack was that he "didn't like Sioux Indians," a policeman said.


Elam, himself, is part Indian. "I don't know what tribe he's from, but I'm sure it isn't the Sioux," an officer said.

Indian Children Refused Enrollment In Public School

DUNN, N. C. (UPI) — Seven Indian children, determined to register in an all-white high school, entered classrooms with other students today and refused to leave despite threats of arrest.

Dunn Police Chief A. A. Cobb, five city policemen and two county deputies were summoned to the school by education officials in an effort to break the sit-down protest.

Harnett County School Supt. G. T. Profit met in an emergency conference with Superior Court Judge W. H. S. Burgwyn to discuss possible legal action. They agreed to issue warrants for the Indians' arrest on trespass charges.

Officers patrolled the school corridors and glanced occasionally into the two classrooms where the Indians sat at desks, vowing to stay until they were formally admitted.

White students either stood or sat at desks with other students while the teachers nervously tried to conduct class.

No violence has been reported although some white students gave

cat-calls and Indian war-whoops. The Indian teenagers paid no attention.

U.N. Aid In Assassination May Be Asked

AMMAN, Jordan (UPI)—King Hussein may seek United Nations aid in obtaining the return from the United Arab Republic of two Jordanians suspected of planting the time bombs that killed Premier Hazza Majali and 10 other persons, informed sources said today.

The assassinations Monday of the pro-Western premier and Hussein's accusations of UAR complicity in the plot touched off rumors of troop movements throughout the tense Middle East.

An Israeli radio broadcast said the UAR was massing troops along the Syrian border with Jordan. The report was discounted by informed observers here.

Hussein Tuesday charged that two suspects—described as minor employees of the Ministry of Defense—were "linked up with responsible people in the UAR—mainly Syria."

He said both escaped to Syria before the time bombs exploded, destroying much of the Foreign Ministry building.

The 24-year-old king, who has long been at odds with President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the UAR, said he and his entire cabinet also may have been intended victims of the bombings. Two time bombs were used—the second exploded 90 minutes after the scheduled start of a cabinet meeting Hussein was to attend. Other appointments forced Hussein to postpone his arrival for three hours.

Hussein said Jordan would demand the return of the two suspects, identified as Kamal Ahmad and Shaker Debbas, and file a complaint with the Arab League.

Katanga Premier Moise Tshombe, meanwhile, continued to build up his small, but well-trained army. Tuesday, 300 Baluba recruits were sent to military training camps.

Foreign Commentary

JAKARTA (UPI)—Is Indonesia prepared to start a war with Holland over the 160,000 square miles of jungle known as West New Guinea?

That seems unlikely despite heated declarations from the Indonesians calling for the overthrow of the Dutch colonial regime in the sparsely populated land.

For more than 10 years, Indonesia has fought a hot and cold war of words with Holland over the area which lies just a few miles beyond the eastern boundary of Indonesian-held territory.

Just two weeks ago, President Sukarno unexpectedly slashed all diplomatic ties with the Netherlands and vowed to "liberate" West Irian "in a revolutionary manner."

Earlier this summer, 2,500 new Dutch troops were added to the token force of 1,000 soldiers with which the Hague government manned its last colonial outpost. Twenty-four Dutch fighter planes were carried more than half way around the world to give Dutch

New Guinea an air force.

This, fiercely nationalistic Indonesia claimed, was tantamount to aggression. Sukarno's government was further provoked when the Dutch said the move was prompted by "aggressive elements" in Indonesian foreign policy.

When Indonesia gained her independence in 1949, the Netherlands agreed to turn over West Irian to Indonesia following proper negotiations.

But these talks were broken off in 1950, and have never been resumed. Indonesian appeals to the United Nations have brought no results.

The Hague announced recently that West New Guinea would be given independence "within 10 years."

Australia, only a few hundred miles to the south, holds the eastern portion of New Guinea. Since Holland announced its aircraft carrier, the Karel Doorman, would conduct a "flag showing cruise" to West New Guinea in order to deliver the planes and troops, Indonesia has quietly built up her military strength in the bordering areas.

Needless to say, Indonesia could easily overrun the token Dutch force in an outright invasion. But such an invasion is extremely unlikely.





MARRIAGE: "Miserable Formality"

Frenchmen Wed Solely For Creature Comfort

PARIS (NEA) — If you American women think you have it rough, consider the plight of the French housewife.

French women generally believe that their men become tyrants after marriage. A recent survey indicates:

The men demand too much and regard their wives as slaves. They never think of setting the dinner table, washing dishes or giving the children baths. They sit comfortably in easy chairs and expect to be waited on.

Their wives must be attractive and their food good.

Now all this might be fine if the women had time. But they don't.

Of the 6½ million married French women between 20 and 50 years old, 85 per cent (\$525,000) have jobs to supplement family incomes. So they must dash home from work to cook and wash and iron while their husbands recline... if they are at home at all.

The Frenchman spends almost as much time with his male friends and business associates as he does at home after working hours. At least that is what the French woman says.

The average French girl therefore considers her engagement date. Then that future tyrant dotes on her, whispering compliments.

But after marriage, while the French woman seldom is neglected in the boudoir, she rarely gets the loving kindness and attention she apparently desires. She believes, too, she has to contend with a greater degree of marital unfaithfulness than women of other countries.

A Dutch woman writing to a popular French weekly says:

"Ah, if you knew how I pity a French wife. You have only to pick up a newspaper, see a film, listen to the radio to realize that

in France a woman is considered the happiest of her life. An agreeable sexual object, devoid of soul or dignity. Everywhere she is ridiculed and jeered at."

Although this may be exaggerated, conversations with Frenchmen under 25 reveal they

have a great disdain for the married state which they consider a "miserable formality."

But does all this indicate that the French will stop marrying? Far from it. By 30, more than 80 per cent of the French are married. And it's nearly 90 per cent after 35.

America's First Lady Of Space

Thinks Of Sky As Unspoiled Place

NEW YORK, Aug. 24 — America's first lady of space is a quiet, religious 29-year old who thinks of the sky as "God's unspoiled world which humans should not trespass upon without a feeling of reverence."

Jerrie Cobb of Oklahoma City, who has proved that women are as capable as men of enduring the rigors of space flight, is the first prospective space pilot in a hitherto unannounced 12-women testing program being sponsored and conducted by the Lovelace Foundation in Albuquerque, N.M.

Having undergone a grueling series of tests during which she is reported to have complained less than the famed male Astronauts, Jerrie is eager to be the first female to go into space. Her wish may come true. A veteran pilot with over 7,500 hours of flying a variety of aircraft from crop-dusters to B-17s, she already holds world's records for speed, altitude and distance in the twin-engine class.

According to an exclusive report in the current issue of Life magazine, some space scientists feel that a woman astronaut would possess definite advantages over her male counterparts. They reason that women have lower body mass, use much less oxygen and need less food, hence may be able to go up in lighter capsules, or stay up considerably longer than men

on the same supplies. Their less exposed reproductive system should also give them a higher radiation tolerance.

When not training for the outer world Jerrie is advertising and sales promotion manager of the Aero Design & Engineering Co., which makes twin-engine planes. She plays tennis to strengthen leg muscles, skin dives and swims, and spends quiet moments of prayer before a private altar in the trophy-laden den of her home.

Kennedy To Hit 17 States On 18-Day Tour

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Democratic White House hopeful John F. Kennedy hits the campaign trail Friday in a quest for votes that will take him through 17 states in 18 days.

After tooting his horn in his native Boston, Kennedy will carry his strenuous campaign into two traditionally Republican strongholds, New Hampshire and Maine.

From there, he will go on to Alaska, Michigan, Idaho, Washington State, Oregon, California, Texas, Missouri, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, North Carolina and West Virginia.

Interest in these states covers almost the whole range of election-year issues — civil rights, medical care for the elderly, economic distress, urban problems, farm troubles, labor relations.

Kennedy served notice Tuesday that one of his main themes on this and future campaign tours would be "vigorous" criticism of the Eisenhower administration's defense policy. But he said the criticism would be "responsible and constructive."

The Democratic nominee has


been itching to get away from the shirt-tail session of Congress where a coalition of Republicans and southern Democrats has frustrated his legislative program. The session was expected to end this week.

The broad outline of Kennedy's first campaign tour had been announced earlier. The details were released Tuesday. Texas was added to the earlier schedule.

Kennedy will spend Thursday night in Boston and have a private breakfast there Friday morning. He then will tour Manchester, N.H., and Presque Isle, Bangor and Portland, Maine.

The next day he will fly from Baltimore to San Francisco and then on to Anchorage, Alaska.

NEW YORK (UPI)—The economy may have started on a new standard of living — one where the extremes are avoided, and a relatively high plateau maintained, according to Sidney B. Lurie of Josephthal & Co.

Witness these facts, he says: There is a greater stability to consumer buying power now than ever before; the economy is not as vulnerable as it was at past turning points when many excesses cried for correction, and the tremendous boom outside the United States is spreading over to many American industries.

J. W. Sparks & Co. says Vi-toreen Corp., a stock in the low-priced category, is potentially ripe for a sharp upturn from the technical standpoint. The move could be of such sufficient magnitude as to offer the trader suitable capital appreciation, the firm adds.

Arthur Wiesenberger & Co. notes that for many years, electronic computers were, in most people's minds, synonymous with IBM. This company's number one spot may remain unchallenged, the firm adds; but the tremendous potential of computer sales — projected to rise from \$1.5 billion in 1960 to \$4-\$5 billion in 1965 — obviously leaves room for successful rivals. A relatively recent entry, National Cash Register, appears on the verge of carving out a generous share of this expanding market.



'Gold Stampede' Seen For U. S. Track Stars

ROME (UPI) — The super stars of the United States Olympic track and field team swing into action today in what is expected to produce a cascade of gold medals for Uncle Sam.

Experts are predicting that the United States will win at least a dozen gold medals in track and field and head coach Larry Snyder of Ohio State makes no secret that he thinks that could be a conservative estimate. It is considered certain that the United States will win at least one gold medal today and there are no fewer than eight up for grabs during Thursday's competition.

A 1-2-3 sweep is predicted for America's shotputters. Sprinters Ray Norton of San Jose, Calif., and Dave Sime of Durham, N.C., are beginning their drives toward the gold medal in the 100-meter dash while Glenn Davis of Columbus, Ohio, begins his quest for the gold medal in the 400-meter hurdles.

Despite Tuesday's gold medal victories by Bill Muliken of Champaign, Ill., in the men's 200-meter breaststroke and Carolyn Schuler of Irinda, Calif., in the 100-meter butterfly, the United States is running slightly behind the victories anticipated. And with 72 points, awarded on the basis of 10, five, four, three, two and one respectively for the first six places, the United States is tied with Germany behind Russia's Olympic-leading total of 98.

But all that is due to be forgotten when Uncle Sam's strong men take over the center of the Olympic stage today.

Putting the shot for the United States will be world champion Bill Nieder of San Francisco, Parry O'Brien of Los Angeles and Dallas Lord of Phoenix, Ariz., the trio almost dead certain to share the first three medals.

In addition, Snyder foresees victories in the following events: Dashes: Norton or Sime in the 100 meters and Norton the overwhelming pick in the 200 meters. Hurdles: Lee Calhoun, Gary, Ind., in the 100-meter hurdles and Davis in the 400-meter hurdles.

Broad Jump: Ralph Boston, who eclipsed Jesse Owen's 25-year old record, expected to prove too good for Henk Visser, a Dutch student at the University of California at Santa Barbara.

Pole Vault: Don Bragg, Pennsylvanite, N.J., may set Olympic record.

High Jump: John Thomas, the world record holder, up there all by himself.

They have even offered to rent Yankee Stadium to such a team, but both are opposed to the idea that the City of New York should build a new stadium for an incoming team.

Integration In Some Parts Takes Place Without Hitch

By United Press International Newly integrated public schools began the fall term quietly in parts of Tennessee and North Carolina today.

As Greensboro began its fourth year of integration. The Klansman, Clyde Webster, said later he was "not coming back."

A federal judge at New Orleans granted a delay until Nov. 14 in the start of integration for the first grades of New Orleans schools.

At Knoxville, Tenn., nine previously all-white elementary schools open to Negroes today, and officials estimated that about 100 Negroes probably will register.

Louisiana Gov. Jimmie Davis said he will appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court a ruling forbidding him from interfering with integration of the New Orleans system.

Reliance On Pushing

Assuming the continuation of the human race to a point in the future permitting of objective review of our own century, we have no doubt that some future historian will simply marvel at the astonishing spectacle of human reliance upon force and violence.

We have, since the beginning of the 20th century, had a few notable achievements in favor of a lessening of reliance upon force and violence. But certainly ever since the mid-1930's or thereabouts, there has been a growing trend in the direction of violence reliance. Nowhere is it more apparent than in the union picture.

Here is surely a curiosity. The workers do not like to be "pushed around." Indeed, were we to approach almost any worker from coast to coast or from business to business, we suspect that this worker would unhesitatingly growl that he didn't like the idea of anybody "pushing" him around.

Then why, in the name of common sense, do we find so many union members permitting their names to be used in favor of abolishing a man's right to work unless that man joins in with the mob and pays dues to a gang of racketeers, head-smashers or mayhem experts?

There is no accounting for it.

These same men who permit their names to be used on any union roster will tell you privately they can't stand being pushed around and also, that they don't like to see other men pushed around. Still, they go on record in favor of pushing around, if only the pusher is their labor boss.

It's completely nonsensical.

Compulsory unionism is nothing more nor less than legalized and entrenched pushing. The right of the individual worker to hold down his job, to secure the best wages he can get on the basis of his skills to improve his job by his own efforts, or to find a better job without asking permission... all of these things have been eliminated thru the union boss route.

Yet these same men, robbed of their basic right to work and thus to earn their own way in life, insist they don't like to be pushed around.

An example of just how much

pushing is involved in union membership is now up for review before the Supreme Court. This is the famous *Looper* case. It involves a small group of Georgia railroad employees who have protested their union dues, forced out of them virtually at gun point, are being used to elect persons to political office regardless of the individual rights of the dues payers.

The case was argued last spring but the Court called for a rehearing when it became evident that it was going to be really difficult for the judges to decide in favor of the union without looking awfully silly. So, no decision will be reached until AFTER the November election. Meanwhile, the dues of these men and millions of others who profess they don't want to be "pushed" will be used to elect one or another office seeker, or will be spent to prevent the election of some other office seeker.

Of course the American Civil Liberties Union, out-and-out advocate of civil liberties, and itself supposedly four-square against "pushing," says it cannot see where anyone's rights are violated if he is compelled to join a union in order to have a job; if he is forced to pay dues thru a check-off system; and if his dues are employed to elect a Democrat to the dues payer may positively despise the Democratic Party.

That's all perfectly fair and void of "pushing." Of course, if an employer set up an organization, compelled you to pay dues to it and used your dues to elect someone else from some other party, we suspect that the cry from the Civil Liberties Union could be heard from one end of the nation to the other in outrage against such "pushing."

It's a real curious situation.

Meanwhile, we can cross our fingers and trust that a benign providence will guide us safely toward that future date when objectivity will be vouchsafed to our descendants.

As things are going, there is just about enough "push" in unions to push the whole of civilization into the briny deep and ring down the curtain on human freedom and the evolving human species.

The Doctor Says:

The Allen-Scott Report

In medicine's ivory towers, there is a tendency to accept laboratory reports as final judgments handed down from a sort of physician's Supreme Court.

While I would be among the last to undermine faith in scientific testings, experience has taught me that each human endeavor has some kind of built-in source of error.

I call this observation to your attention as a result of the simultaneous arrival on my desk of three articles describing abnormal electrocardiograms in apparently healthy persons, and of a letter from a reader whose husband obviously has an abnormal heart although his electrocardiogram (ECG) has been reported normal by competent physicians.

The medical papers, based on observations made in places as far separated as Baltimore, Oakland (Calif.) and Winnipeg, emphasize the damage that can be done to the person who is condemned to a life of inactivity and fear by a tracing that mimics the trace that's found in coronary disease. In the words of one author, "if the diagnosis (coronary disease) is made without additional evidence, a healthy person may be converted to a cardiac invalid."

The other face of the coin is seen when a person with a cardiac abnormality is declared to be normal and is suspected of faking on the strength of a normal ECG.

It seems to have been the fate of my correspondent's husband. "On several occasions," she writes, "my husband has suddenly complained of a fluttering sensation in his chest. I have had some experience as a hospital Gray Lady and, when I felt for his pulse, it was going so fast I couldn't count it.

"Each time he's been examined by doctors, after an attack, I've been assured that he's perfectly normal. They've even taken cardiograms. And they show nothing wrong.

"From the way the last doctor questioned us, I got the impression that he thought I was exaggerating how my husband looked during these attacks (the most passes out). . . . He suggested that maybe my husband was putting on an act to collect insurance or some such thing and ought to consult a psychiatrist.

"Is it possible," she asks, "to have something wrong with the heart even when all the tests are negative?"

It is indeed, dear madam. What are called paroxysmal irregularities of the heart are not too uncommon. And they may occur in a heart that's completely normal between paroxysms. I am quite sure you did not exaggerate your husband's distress at the time of his attacks. I am equally sure that he's no malingerer. And I am just as sure that it is possible for all the examinations, conducted between attacks, to be "perfectly normal."

As for you, dear readers, are these lessons to be learned from aforesaid observations and experiences. You are entitled to double check any laboratory report that seems to contradict common sense. Even with evidence as usually convincing as a normal electrocardiogram, you may be less well than you'd like to be. And you may be as well as you think you are despite an abnormal trace.
