





The school system faces loss o accreditation and some \$6 million state aid because of a state prohibiting desegregation without express approval of voter in the district.







The Doctor

By Dr. HAROLD T. HYMAN If you've ever had a true chill you don't have to be told of the difference between feeling chilly and actually suffering a shaking, teeth-chattering chill. It's something of the order of the difference between a rather stiff

breeze and a hurricane. Now the odd part of the chill is the fact that its most prominent characteristic is a perature elevation to somewhere between 104 and 112 degrees F. Why then, you ask, does the body react to high fever with a mechanism that's usually associated with low to freezing tem-

peratures? Like many questions that should be easy to answer, this one is what John Steinbeck's characters would call a tomwallager. Here's the best explanation I can give you: The chill is usually caused by something getting into the blood stream that doesn't belong there. That something may be living (animate), like the malarial organism or a streptococcus. It may be something dead like a typhoid vaccine. Or it may be something inanimate like a drug, a serum, or human blood cells

of the wrong type. One way or another, the immediate reaction of the body is to be as shocked as you'd be if someone you regarded as a friend suddenly came up to you and slapped your face. And, as one evidence of that sense of shock, the body temperature falls from its normal level of perhaps 98

to 99 to maybe 95 degrees. To this abrupt temperature fall, the body reacts as it would to a dive into freezing water. If you happen to be the unhappy victim, you feel your muscles get tense and quivery. You start shaking from head to foot. Your teeth rattle. And the more you try to control yourself, the worse the reaction seems to be. At about this time, your heat-

regulating center gets working. All the stops are pulled out, And before you know it, your temperature's shot up way beyond normal to perhaps 6 to 10 degrees over the arrow. Now the shaking stops and you find yourself sweating like a fat man in the steam room. Finally this, too, comes to an end although, by this time, you're too exhausted

As you must appreciate, the true chill is nothing to trifle with. That's why, as far back as we know, mothers have insisted on calling the doctor the minute the
