NEW YORK (NEA) — The 1920s and the 1930s are blended harmoniously in the new taller, bulkier wider hats for autumn and winter.

Hats rise to new heights this season: towering toques, turbans and profiles. They also show new depths: cloches that nearly touch the eyelashes, deep slouch hats, berets that cover the hair completely. (What a boon this last is for the gal who's missed an appointment with her hairdresser!)

Fur hats have taken on new importance this fall. Admittedly, they are expensive and definitely regarded as luxurious. But for this very reason, many women prefer to put a sound sum into a beautiful mink hat and wear it proudly with a simple cloth coat. There is no doubt that a fur hat can give a plain costume and undeniable air of elegance. And this explains why more designers are emphasizing the fur hat this fall.

Following the fur hats in importance are the frankly fake furs. These are the soft, long-haired pile fabrics which create the fur look at a moderate price.

This same feel of softness and luxury is carried on with durry felts, rich beavers, lavish velvets and satins, leathers used in curls and sprays. Sometimes two, three or more are combined for textures that are both unique and truly handsome.

Veiling, this year, is used as a part of the hat itself. That is, it forms a translucent crown, tip or brim or simply provides a misty covering for the hat itself. This is a definite departure from the old method of using veiling to cover the eyes or entire face.

Colors are magnificent. They range from pale mauve to deep plum and grape. They include rich sapphire and turquoise blues, brilliant reds from ruby to garnet and many dark reddish browns. Highly polished black hats are shown for both daytime and evening.

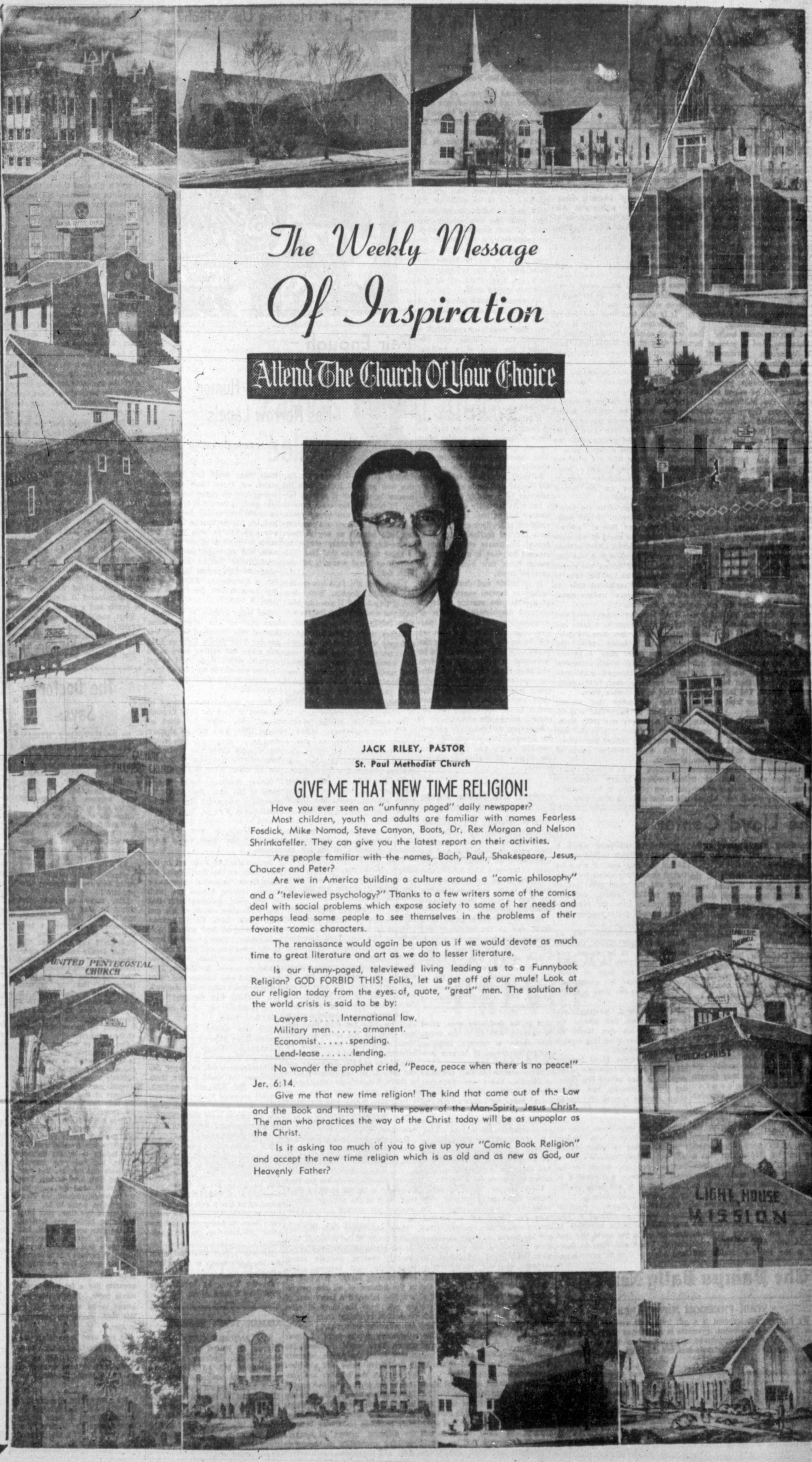
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U.S. Swim Entrants Advance In Olympics

ROME (UPI) — Bruce Hunter of Cambridge, Mass., successfully led Uncle Sam's athletic forces into Olympic action today when he won his opening qualifying heat in the 100 meter free style swim in 56.8 seconds.

Russ Cagers Romp

ROME (UPI) — Russia opened its bid today to unseat the United States as Olympic basketball champion as it knocked over Mexico, 66-49.

United States' star-laden squad, featuring brilliant Oscar Robertson and Jerry West is slated to play Italy later today.

Hungary toppled Japan, 93-66, in the opening contest.

Hunter, brown-haired 21-year-old swimmer from Harvard, was returned the first Yank "winner" of the day as the Olympic Games swung into fevered action on the heels of Thursday's gala opening ceremony.

A blazing sun beat down on the Olympic pool, sunk in a heat-filled hollow, as the swimming event got under way before a scanty crowd of less than 1,000.

With the fastest 24 times qualifying for the semi-finals at 3:30 p.m. e.d.t., Hunter on the basis of the 56.8 clocking, easily advanced to the second round.

Joanne Gunderson Favored In National Golf Tournament

Miss Gunderson, 1957 USGA champion, moved into the semifinal session with a hefty 7 and 6 victory over Natasha Matson of Wichita, Kan., but it was another Kansan, Jean Ashley, of Chanute, who boosted her into the forefront.

Miss Ashley, a willy 21-year-old schoolteacher, ousted defending champion Barbara McIntire of Lake Park, Fla., from the tournament.

Orioles Rip Tigers, 9-3; Hobbie, Banks Nip Bucs

Those Orioles must have planted a booby trap in Baltimore because it sure isn't a pitcher's paradise anymore.

Rival pitchers used to love to work in Baltimore. For one thing the ball park was bigger than all outdoors and for another, they never had to worry about being rapped for homers.

Certainly not by the supposedly weak-hitting Orioles, whose customary rallies used to consist of a walk, a Texas League single and a sacrifice fly. But things have changed — and how! The Orioles suddenly are gunning for the seats.

Big Gus Triandos reached them Thursday night with the bases full during a six-run rally in the

eight inning that snapped a tie and powered Baltimore to a 9-3 victory over Detroit.

Triandos' grand-slam homer, his second in five days and fifth of his career, moved the Orioles into sole possession of second

place in the American League — only one game behind the idle first-place Yankees.

Rookie Chuck Estrada gained his 14th victory against eight losses by allowing only five hits and striking out 12.

Washington moved back into fourth place with a 9-0 victory over Kansas City and Boston beat Cleveland, 10-7, in the only other AL game scheduled.

In the National League, the Cubs downed the Pirates, 2-1, and the Braves shaved Pittsburgh's lead to 6 1/2 games with a 4-2 win over the Dodgers. The Giants defeated the Reds, 8-5, while the Phillies and Cardinals were idle.

The Senators won their game from the A's with an eight-run rally in the seventh inning during which 13 batters went to the plate. Winner Chuck Stobbs (9-5) and loser Don Larsen (1-9) were locked in a pitching duel, with

With the start of the new American Football League season only two weeks away, Saban said the Patriots have "a good passing attack," the running "is coming along," and the defense "is our biggest concern."

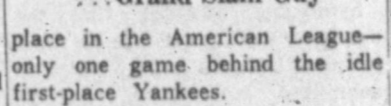
And a quick look at the Patriots' exhibition performances and roster proves that the former all-pro linebacker for the Cleveland Browns known on which side the football is laced.

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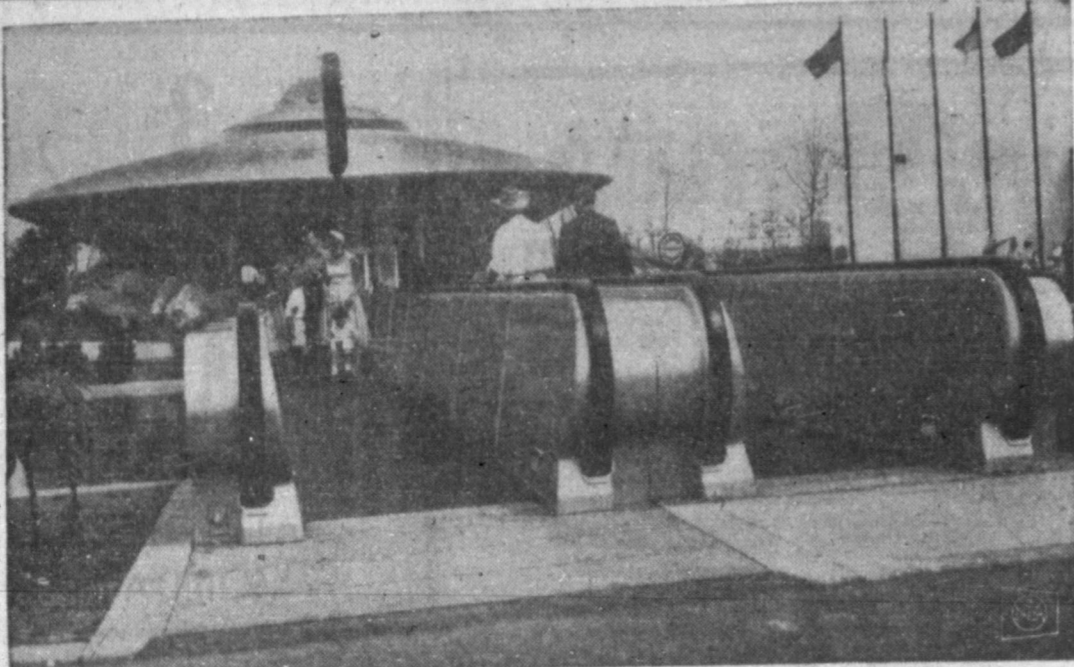

Russ Preparing To Try RB-47 Crew Members

LONDON (UPI)—Western diplomats reported from Moscow Thursday that preparations appear to be well underway for the trial of the two American crewmen of an RB-47 plane shot down by the Russians July 1.

The proceedings are expected to differ considerably from those applied by the Kremlin in last week's trial of U-2 pilot Francis Gary Powers.

Soviet authorities have maintained silence thus far on the date of the trial and its nature and scope. Newsmen in Moscow have been unable even to determine whether the trial will even be held in public.

The problem is different from that posed by the U-2 incident in which Powers pleaded guilty and the U.S. government conceded that the plane was on a reconnaissance mission over Russia.

In the case of the RB-47, the United States maintains the aircraft was downed by the Soviets outside Russian territorial waters. Britain supported the U.S. stand.

The RB-47 was forced down over the Barents Sea last month and the Russians announced later they were holding for trial as spies two crew members, Lt. John McKone, 28, of Tonganoxie, Kans., and Freeman Olmstead of Elmira, N.Y.

Three other crewmen are missing and presumed dead. The body of the sixth airman was recovered and returned to the United States.

The U.S. and Britain maintain that the Soviets deliberately shot down the plane outside Soviet territory. The U.S. insists it has strong proof to back this claim.
