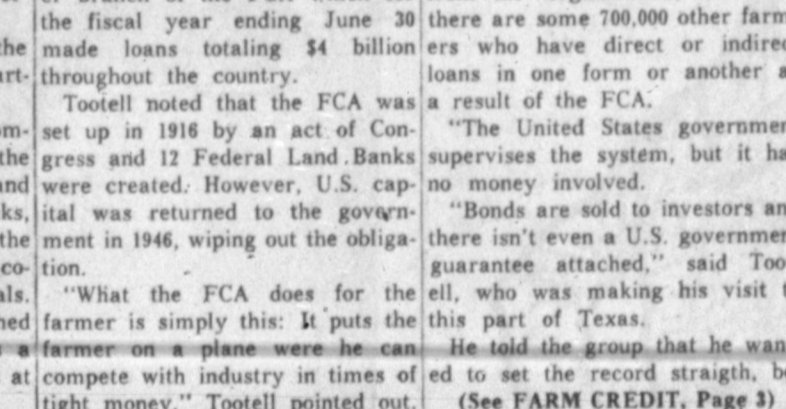

### Ministers Ask Kennedy To Make Speech

HOUSTON (UPI)—Democratic presidential nominee Sen. John F. Kennedy has been invited to address a gathering of 800 Protestant ministers during his visit to Houston Monday night.

Local party officials were so sure that Kennedy, a Catholic, would accept the invitation that they reserved the Crystal Ballroom at the Rice Hotel for the speech.

Kennedy is due in Houston late Monday where he is to make a major speech in his campaign for President Monday night in the 12,000-seat Coliseum.

The invitation to talk to the ministers was extended by the Rev. Herbert Meza, associate pastor of the Bellaire Presbyterian Church in his capacity as vice president of the Greater Houston Ministerial Association.

The association is composed of some 800 Protestant ministers. The Rev. Meza sent the invitation to Kennedy's Harris County co-chairmen, Woodrow Seals and John H. Crooker Jr.

The two said they had forwarded the invitation to Kennedy with a recommendation that he accept. If the invitation is accepted, the ministers' group will call a special meeting and invite all Protestant ministers in the Houston area.

"We are not only urging the senator to accept, but we are suggesting that he answer questions from ministers in the audience," Crooker and Seals said in a joint statement. "We anticipate that many ministers would like to ask questions on the religious issue."

The statement said the local Democratic party leaders had suggested that Kennedy go straight to the hotel following his campaign talk at the Coliseum and speak to the ministers.

The man-of-the-week: Premier Joseph Kasavubu of the Republic of the Congo.

The place: Leopoldville.

The quote: Premier Patrice Lumumba "has let the country down and has fomented tribal strife."

As an uneasy day was giving way to a still more uneasy night in the strife-ridden Congo, soft-spoken, reticent Joseph Kasavubu went on Leopoldville radio and denounced Lumumba as a demagogue who had fostered "fratricidal war." Lumumba, he said, was fired as of that moment.

He called on the 16,000-man United Nations force to take over entire responsibility for law and order.

For a very little while it appeared Kasavubu might be successful.

U.N. commanders assumed they were acting under a new mandate and immediately sealed off Leopoldville radio and assigned extra patrols to duty.

But Lumumba reacted swiftly. Through a confusion of orders

or by means not yet explained, Lumumba gained access to the station, announced he was countermmanding Kasavubu's orders and said that Kasavubu himself was fired.

In the already-confused Congo, a situation feared from the start had been set up.

Many times before, the high-handed and unpredictable Lumumba had threatened to ask direct aid from Russia, side-tracking the U.N. At his disposal for troop-carrying purposes he had more than a dozen Russian planes, Russian trucks and Russian advisers.

It probably made no difference that Kasavubu was the man who triggered the action. A climax was nearing in the troubled Congo anyway.

But Kasavubu was Lumumba's logical opponent. In a test of strength on the eve of the Congo's independence, it had been touch-and-go which man would occupy the presidency and Lu what office. Kasavubu finally took over the presidency and Lumumba became premier.

Our free and vigorous science, adequately supported, has met—and can meet and surpass—any challenge. "Overall, in the field of science, we are well ahead of the Soviet Union today. If we are to stay ahead, we must move ahead. "Nations do not make scientific discoveries nor do governments, industries, universities or institutions... only man alone. The scientist is the pioneer, the discoverer."

DEAR ABBY: That is what you call an "incomplete pass". If she's not listed in the telephone directory, you're out of luck.

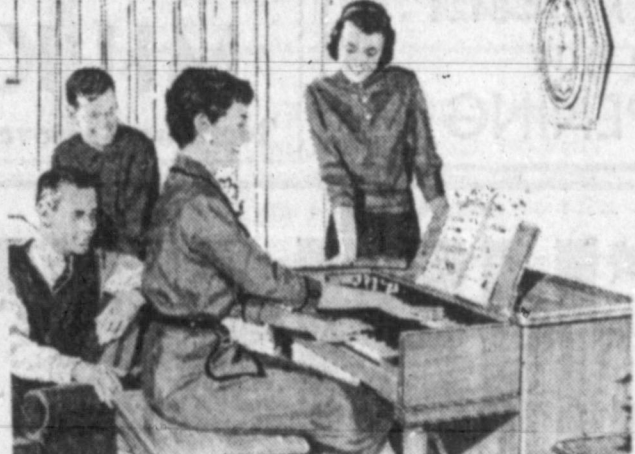

## Sunday School Teachers Needed By Most Churches

This is a "help wanted" ad carried free on behalf of the nation's churches.

It is addressed to men and women who are willing to devote several hours a week to an unpaid job in which they'll experience a lot of frustration and failure—and occasional moments of triumph that make the whole thing seem worthwhile.

The job is teaching in Sunday school.

America's 275,000 Sunday schools are beginning their fall term this month. They can count on a record enrollment—probably about 42 million students. Their big problem is recruiting 3,500,000 teachers.

The annual call for volunteers is now being sounded in church bulletins across the land. Pastors know from experience that it will yield an inadequate number of teachers, and a bumper crop of good excuses.

"The average American feels strongly about teaching in Sunday school," says one weary minister. "He feels strongly that it is a fine thing for somebody else to do."

Why do so many otherwise faithful church members try to duck this particular duty?

Clergymen who've heard all the alibis say that most laymen are convinced that they "don't know enough about the Bible, or the basic doctrines of the Christian faith, to teach in Sunday school."

"And they are absolutely right," says an Episcopal rector.

"But they can learn as they teach. Any teacher who conscientiously prepares for each Sunday's class, with the help of the lesson which are provided for teachers, manuals and other materials which are provided for teachers, will get a first class Christian education as he goes along."

One of the best reasons for teaching in Sunday school is that the experience will necessarily lead you to a deeper knowledge and faith.

Many laymen also protest that teaching is a difficult art which should be entrusted only to trained professionals.

The President, in a message to Edward C. Werle, chairman of the board, New York Stock Exchange, and national chairman of the week, said:

"It is a privilege to join in the 20th annual observance of National Bible Week.

"The theme of the week is close to the spirit of Psalm 33: 'Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord.' As a sacred book, honored by generations, the Bible describes the justice and mercy required of a strong people. — Dwight D. Eisenhower."

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (UPI)—Slender, brown-haired Denny Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif., and broad-shouldered, dark-haired Bob Mark of Australia, the two unseeded youngsters who supplied Thursday's heroics, are slated to meet today in the quarter-final singles of the national tennis championships.

Ralston, only 18 and the top-ranked U.S. junior player of 1959, provided an upset at dusk by eliminating big blond Ron Holmberg of Brooklyn, seeded seventh, in straight sets, 6-4, 9-7, 6-2. He overpowered Holmberg at the net.

Aussie Mark, 23, registered a stunning upset by putting out Barry Mackay of Dayton, Ohio, No. 3 and America's chief hope for recapturing the title 7-5, 6-3, 6-8, 9-6, 6-4. The surprise triumphs of Ralston and Mark left only four seeded men in the round of eight. All were slated for action today.

Neale Fraser of Australia, defending champion and No. 1, was matched against unseeded 19-year-old Chuck McKinley of St. Ann, Mo., who participated in Thursday's youth-fling by defeating ex-champion Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, 6-4, 2-6, 17-15, 6-4. Seixas, at 37, was the oldest man in the singles tourney.

### 'No Liquor' At TU Stirs Campus Folk

AUSTIN (UPI)—A new University of Texas rule against serving liquor at fraternity and sorority parties has left the campus bone-dry and the students don't like it a bit.

"Those \$200,000 houses were built to have parties in," Tom Henson of Dalhart, president of the inter-fraternity council, said.

Henson said the council would call a meeting the first week of school to discuss the new regulation.

Bob Howe, president of Sigma Chi, one of the largest fraternities on campus, was more emphatic.

"Yes, we will appeal this order—if we can get enough support," he said.

Henson admitted that some fraternities have abused tax liquor regulations.

"We have been warned for two or three years a crackdown would come if we didn't straighten up," he said.

Henson added that he thought the university administration was under "outside pressure" to adopt the regulation.

### Wall Street In Review

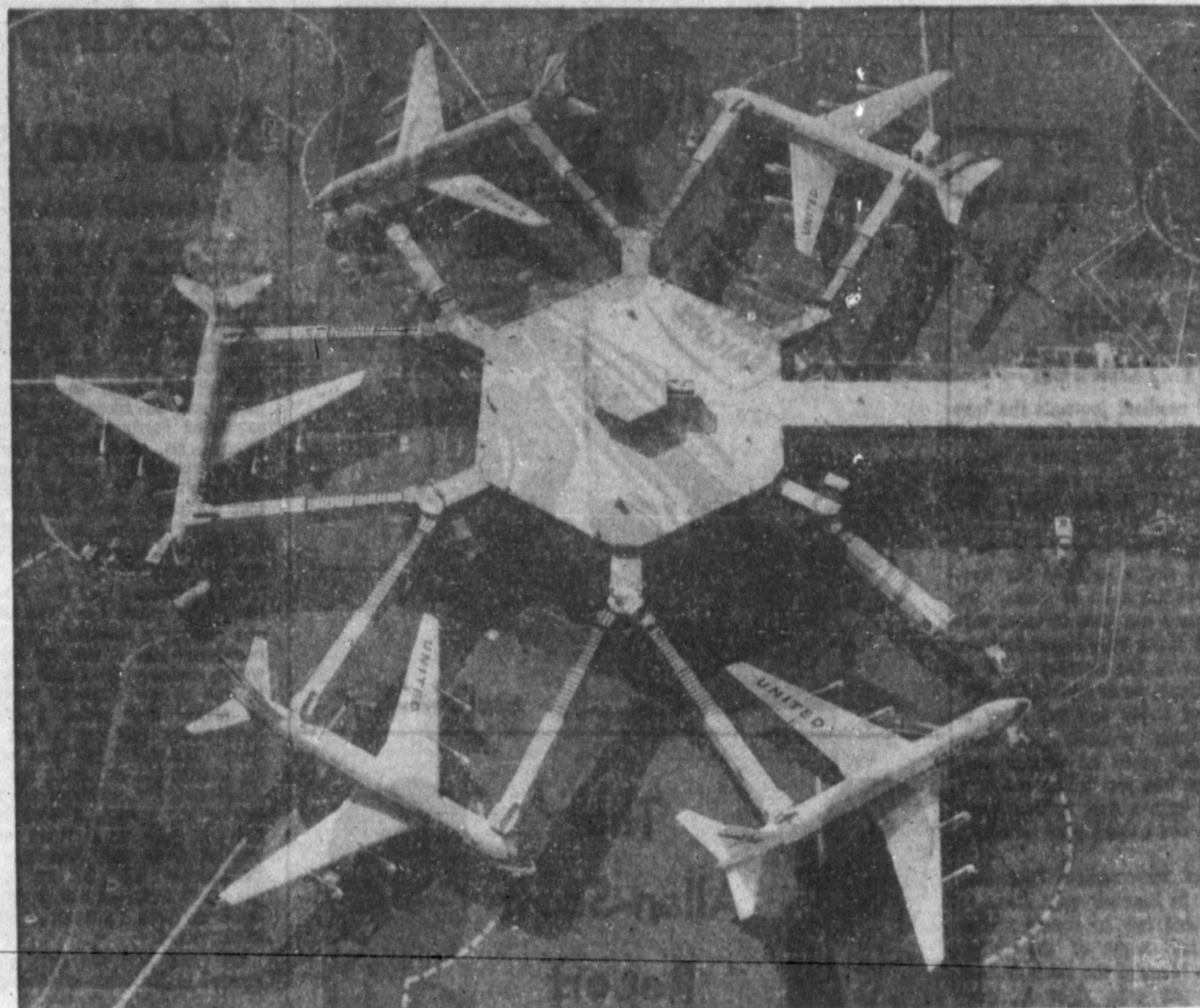
The U.S. economy is uncertain, according to the latest business conditions bulletin of the Alexander Hamilton Institute.

In spite of recent moves by the Federal Reserve to ease credit, it says, consumer demand is falling. Housing starts in the first seven months were 19 per cent below a year ago, and retail sales in July fell 3.8 per cent below last year and slightly below a month earlier.

Other indicators suggesting a discouraging picture, the institute says, are the steel operating rate and a big drop in machine tool orders.

Bache & Co. reports the recent market action in Pan American World Airways is confirming the strength of the base which the stock has established during the past several months. While further building may be necessary, Bache says, the issue appears to have embarked on a definite upward move.

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### Sky 'Off Limits' Saturday To Civilian Planes

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (UPI)—Fourteen million square miles of sky will be "off limits" to all civilians for six hours Saturday morning while the Air Force tests its ability to save the continent from a nuclear bomber attack.

The Strategic Air Command will provide the attacking "Sky Shield"—the biggest air defense exercise ever attempted by the North American Air Defense Command.

Norad, and the Army's missile-armed Air Defense Command, both are headquartered here on the edge of the Rocky Mountains, and will be prime targets for the mock enemy.

Norad will order an estimated 2,000 fighter-interceptor missions against SAC attackers. Ground-to-air missile units will simulate firings of such weapons as the Army's Nike against the hundreds of bombers.

The exercise will be as real as Norad can make it, without actually firing weapons or dropping nuclear warheads.

Beginning at 1 a.m. EST, the nation's commercial airlines will go out of business for six hours. About 1,000 flights will be canceled or delayed.

Private pilots have been warned to stay out of the air, coast to coast, and from the Mexican border to the Canadian arctic and Alaska.

### Khrushchev Leaves Today For U.N. Meet

MOSCOW (UPI)—Premier Nikita Khrushchev left today for Kalingrad on the first leg of his air and sea trip to New York for the United Nations General Assembly session starting Sept. 20.

Khrushchev was seen off at the Vnukovo airport by First Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan and other top members of the presidium and the council of ministers.

Also on hand at the flag-beckoned airport was the foreign diplomatic corps, including the U.S. minister-counselor, Edward L. Freers Jr.

Before boarding the plane, Khrushchev embraced and kissed his wife, three daughters and son Sergei.

About 500 Soviet citizens stood in a cold rain for half an hour to give Khrushchev a send-off. A group of small girls presented a bouquet which Khrushchev handed to his younger daughter Elena.

He was scheduled to arrive at the Baltic seaport of Kalingrad tonight and sail shortly afterward for New York aboard the liner Baltika.

### Farmer Trapped Under Tractor

PALESTINE, Tex. (UPI)— For two days and two nights, Oren Vermillion, 72, a farmer, lay trapped underneath the wreckage of his tractor, calling for help.

He wasn't hurt so bad, but he was pinned by the tractor seat and the harrow attached to the machine. Battery acid and gasoline spilled out and burned holes in his clothing.

Thursday morning, Mike Graham, 18, was chopping wood nearby and heard weak cries for help. He discovered Vermillion and got help. It took six men to lift the tractor enough to free the elderly farmer.

Vermillion lives alone and had not been missed by his neighbors.

### Unemployed List Declines For August

WASHINGTON (UPI)— Unemployment dropped by 229,000 in August to 3,788,000 jobsless, the Labor Department reported today. A decline of 500,000 would have been normal for the month.

The total number of job holders in the nation fell by 407,000 as a pickup in non-farm industries failed to develop.

However, the August employment total of 68,282,000 was a record for the month.

The department blamed early model changeovers in autos and continued sluggishness in steel for the disappointing decline in joblessness and the drop in the number of workers.

If the usual August spurt in non-farm industries had occurred, it would have offset a drop of 431,000 in farm jobs, which was normal.

Unemployment moved down from 4,017,000 in July to 3,788,000 in August. But because the normal, seasonal shrinkage of 500,000 was not realized, the unemployment rate shot up from 5.4 per cent for July to 5.9 per cent for August.

This meant that in August 59 of every 1,000 men and women in the labor force were out of work and looking for jobs.

Most of the 229,000 decline in unemployment was the result of teenagers leaving the labor force. Unemployment among youngsters 14 to 19 years old dipped by 215,000, but this was about 100,000 less than the department's experts expected.

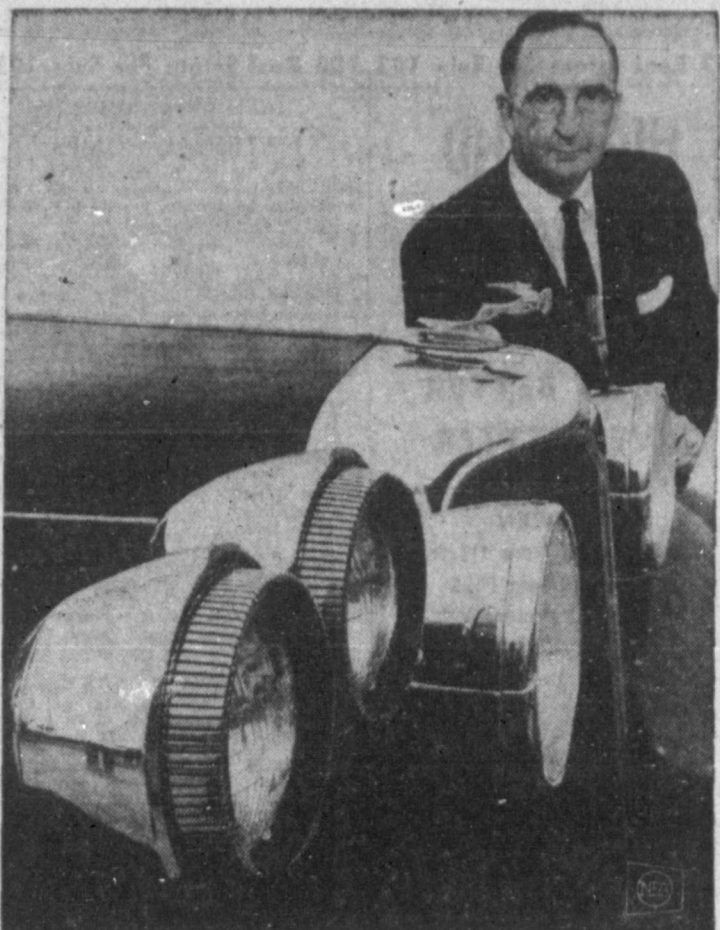

**Washington Window**

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The U.S. taxpayer is fumbling a good chance to ask a good question in this presidential campaign. Two good questions!

The questions are these: How much would it cost to make good on the new spending proposals in the Republican platform? In the Democratic platform?

These questions would lead directly to another: Would the spending proposals in either platform require increased taxes?

Out of that question would come still another to which the answer already is well, if not widely, known. The question: If taxes had to be increased, who would be stuck with the added burden?

Who would be stuck? The little fellows, of course. Stabbed would be a better word than stuck for what happens between the U.S. Common Man and Taxes. The U.S. Little Fellow or Common Man is the patsy because there

are so many of him. The U.S. Treasury expects to collect about \$41 billion in individual income taxes in the current fiscal year. Most of this huge sum will be plucked from the numerous common man. The little fellow has a taxable income up to, say, \$4,500 a year.

About a year ago, the Tax Foundation calculated the total U.S. taxable income at \$153 billion. The amount of income subject to the first bracket rate is about \$108 billion. The first bracket rate is 20 per cent. That is the rate which catches the little fellow. Tax Foundation calculated that this bracket produces about 61 per cent of the tax yield.

For the U.S. taxpayer merely to inquire what the presidential platforms might mean in the way of spending and taxation would not necessarily mean that he was against what the platforms promised. The taxpayer might not be against greater spending with or without higher taxes.

Merely to inquire, however, would be no more than simple prudence, like reading the fine print before signing a contract with a fast talking hustler.

The fact is that the taxpayer does not inquire, which suggests that this mainstay and flower of American civilization may be more fat-headed than prudent, a depressing thought.

Inquiry might — PROBABLY would — uncover some political purpose to whomp it up with more government spending without taxes at all. That should be the cue for the U.S. taxpayer to paint his legs red and to declare open season on all such political purposes.

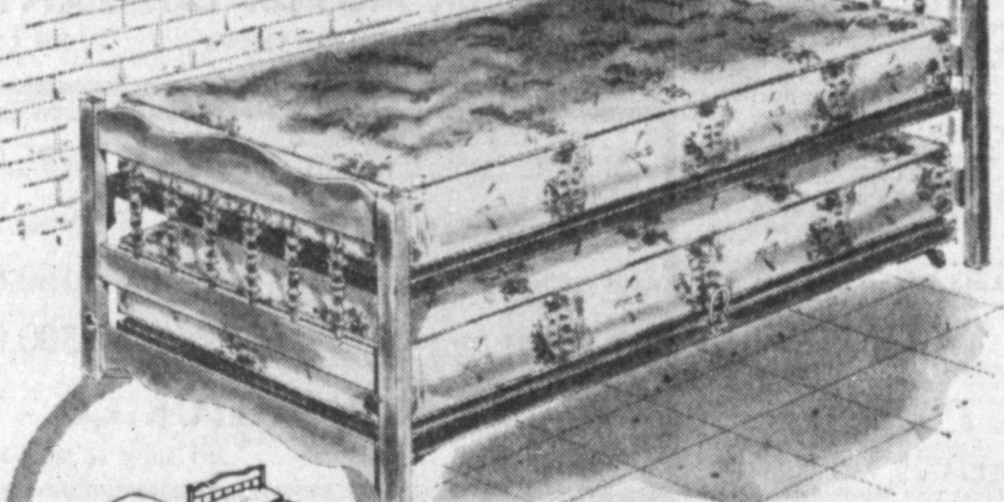

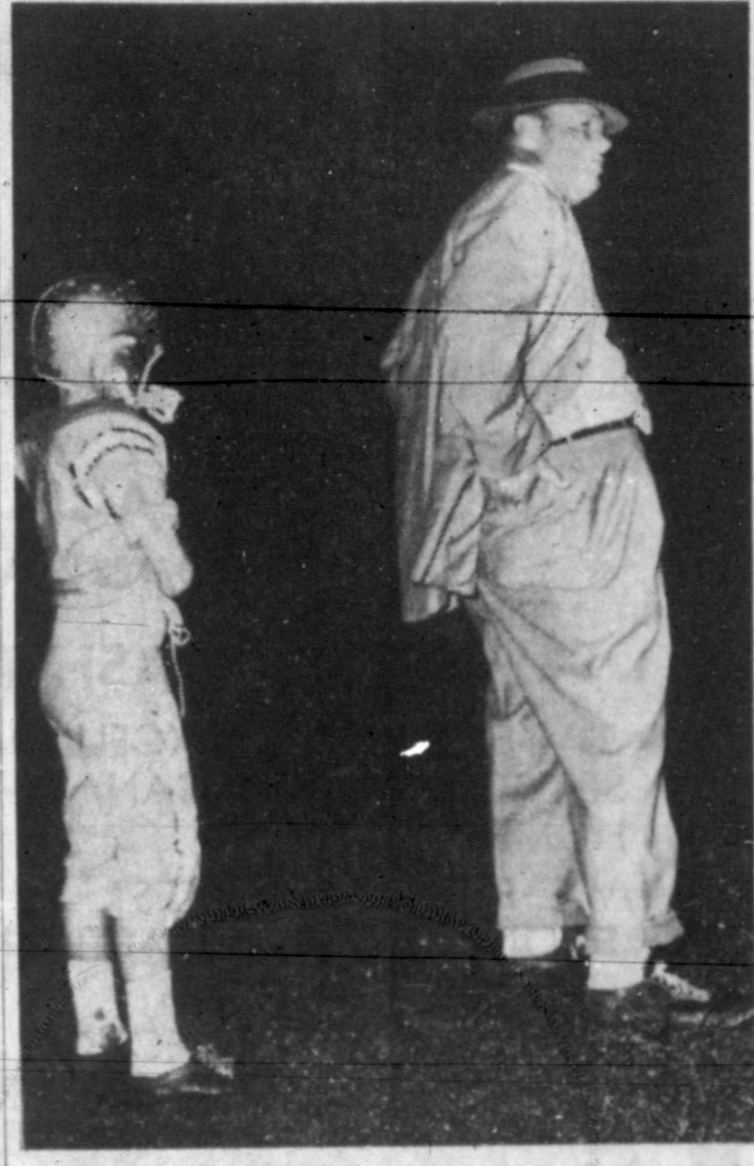
