AMENDMENTS TO SOIL EROSION LAW TO BE PASSED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (P)-Confidence that the new farm and conservation laws would carry out the purposes of the dead AAA and bring about what he considers a well rounded agricultural development of the nation was expressed today by President

The chief executive discussed the agricultural problem at his press conference after stipulating that he was not replying to the farm address last night by former President Herbert Hoover. He explained he had not had an opportunity yet to read the Hoover speech.

There was an intimation that new taxes might be necessary to meet the program as a substitute for the old processing levies killed by the supreme court. The president said, however, he was not ready to discuss that phase. Mr. Roosevelt said slight amend-ments to the existing soil erosion

and conservation acts will be neces-sary. He reserved any estimate on the amount of money which would be required by the government to lease land from farmers under the proposed plan.
Some congressional leaders who attended yesterday's white house farm conference had mentioned

\$300,000,000 to \$400,000,000 as necessary for carrying out the program in 1936. This, the statisticians point out, cannot be called a particularly advanced age, despite the fact that there have been three nonagenarians and nine octogenarians on the Supreme bench since its foundation. The statisticians compute the aggregate years of life expectation of these 66 men at the time of their appointment was 1,205, while the total number of years actually lived was 1,265. (Written Especially for The Associated Press) CHICAGO, Jan. 17. (A)-Inspired by the approach of the games of eleventh Olympiad, American athletes in a score of sports during the past year notably improved their

From the broken records and championship marks set in 1935, we are assured that we will have at Berlin one of the best teams the United States has ever sent to the Olympic games. This applies to all sports from track and swimming to fencing and weight lifting. Basketball and canoeing, on the program for the first time, should provide

new fields to conquer.

Many members of our 1932 team have retired, making way for new-comers. To take advantage of these openings a whole crop of new stars has appeared. The potential possibilities of this new generation of champions who are just hitting their stride, together with the demonstrated ability of the reliable vet-erans of former years, relieve us of any apprehension about the success of the team that will wear the stars

and stripes in 1936. We are cheered, too, by the knowledge that our team will do credit to the United States in exemplifying the high ideals of amateur sport, off as well as on the field of competition. From recent correspondence we are certain that our athletes appreciate the deeper significance of the Olympic games and that they do not share the lack of understanding of fundamenta Olympic principles which has lecome well meaning people to be influenced by the false and mislead-ing propaganda spread by those either wish to destroy the Olympic games or to use them for ulterior purposes. If these games meant nothing more than the de-termination of a few champions, they would not have the significance

they hold in our life today. Those who were responsible for the revival of the Olympic games and who guard their purity look far beyond the athletic possibilities. They visualize the creation and strengthening of the bonds of friendship that should exist among all civilized nations by frequent peaceful intercourse on friendly fields of sport where competition breeds mutual respect and not sus picion or hatred.

SUPPRESSING SPEED

Limitation of automobile speed, beginning at the factory, has often been suggested as a measure of safety. Representative Ranspeck of Georgia has put the idea into form by a bill to limit the speed of motor vehicles of the capacity of eight or less passengers to 60 miles an to play hour. Such a law would help a little; but it would not be determinate.

There are three recognized forms of travel by or over rousing. land-railroads, automobiles and airplanes. It is recognized airplanes are entitled to high speed. Railroads are next, with distinct possibilities of 100 miles or more per, hour at safety. Automobiles are next and third, with the probable limit of 60 miles. The trouble seems to be that the schedules are scrambled. Each agency is calculated to be faster than the other. Possibly a rational division of speed allowances and responsibility will ensue.

Speed is not the main factor in automobile accidents. Airplanes are largely unrestricted in the open spaces; railroads run on beaten tracks and regular schedules; automobiles run rather indiscriminately, at the wills of their more or less reliable drivers. A co-ordination of speed-if there must be overhead regulation at all-is the sensible method of regulating the exhibition of traffic. The multiplicity of automobiles is a big factor and the irresponsibility of drivers is an added factor.

Safety cannot be fully built into automobiles. These machines are fine and admirable, but, abused, they become public menaces. BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON-The Grade A inside dope is that members of the U .S. Supreme Court are more wrought up emotionally than in many decades.

The "calm judicial temperament" has taken wing and report is that feeling between conservative and liberal justices has become relatively as bitter as that between and several wrote letters, one ad New Dealers and anti-New Dealers in the arena of politics.

On the one side are at least five justices who appear to be grimly and in some cases hysterically convinced feet apart each way. that they are the last bulwark against the barbarian hordes and that if they can only preserve the country until a conservative again occupies the White House their lives will not have been spent in vain.

On the other end are the three liberals, Brandeis, Stone, and Cardozo, who are said to be infuriated by the willingness of other justices to rule on a basis of policy or expediency rather than law.

Brandeis and Stone are understood to have been especially angry during the court's secret discussion of the AAA case because they felt Hughes voted with Roberts, McReynolds, Vandevanter, Sutherland and Butler only because he felt that a 5-to4 decision would diminish public confidence in the court.

Hughes appears actually to be standing around somewhere in the middle. Early in this term it was noticed that he had become older and graver and seemed to have lost control of the situation insofar as his ability to avoid 5-to-4 decisions was concerned.

In the railroad retirement case at the end of the last term, he lost his temper and in a slashing dissent against a 5-to-4 opinion read by Justice-Roberts charges "unwarranted limitation" such as would "make impossible the practical exercise of power."

In the last three important liberal-conservative splits, however. Hughes has gone along with the conservative majority, conspicuously refraining from writing the opin-

Using dignified supreme court language, the minority in its dissents has been accusing the majority of usurpation of power and disregard for the Constitution.

That is the only way, according to supreme court experts, that you can interpret Cardozo's sarcastic line-"the process of psychoanalysis has spread to unaccustomed fields"-in reference to the majority's reasoning in the Constaintine federal liquor tax case.

Or Stone's in another three-man dissent on the Vermont income tax case, which attacked the majority's assumptions of the perogative of a super-legislature."

Or, finally. Stone's assertion in the AAA dissent that a majority contention "hardly rises to the dignity of ar-"gument", coupled with the tart accusation of "tortured construction of the Constitution," the warning that the majority was endangering "our institutions," and the charge that the majority refused to admit that the "Constitution may mean what is says,

The conservative side has been equally bitter and emotional. Remember Sutherland's cry last year in the gold cases, "The Constitution is gone!

Strangely enough, as in the political field, each side seems to think that the other is heading the country for chaos and probably wrecking the court. The minority especially seems to believe that the majority, by reactionary policy which can hardly be maintained if Reosevelt is re-elected and has a chance to make appointments, is threatening the court's existence. As in national politics, the liberal-conservative fight spills over party lines. McReynolds is a Democrat. Stone is a Republican. They oppose each other hotly.


