
## Demos Blams JFK For Sugar Price

WASHINGTON (UPI)-A Democratic congressional farm leader said today the American housewife could blame the Kennedy administration for the recent boost in sugar prices.

Chairman Harold D. Cooley, D-N. C., of the House Agriculture Committee said the United States faced a long period of high sugar prices unless Congress revamps the sugar control program pushed through Congress by the administration last summer.


