Action Urged On Water Problems

0 To 10 Below Forecast

Cold Due To **Stay Tonight**

By United Press International

The third sub-zero cold front in less than two weeks, riding winds of up to 50 miles per hour, plunged deep into Texas today with promises of another hard freeze for the semi-tropical Lower Rio Grande Valley.

The rapid movement of the front, coupled with a general dryness of the air, erased most of the threats of snow sleet and freezing rain which would have hampered transportation and added to the cold misery.

found the Communist Party in the United States to be an integral part of the Soviet communist conspiracy and assessed a fine of \$120,000. Individual officers of the party are expected to be tried on similar charges of being agents of a foreign power, namely the Soviet. They will endeavor to prove that the American Communist Party is independent of the fountainhead in Moscow. Abundant proof of the international character and Moscow control of communists in all countries, is seen in four articles which appeared in the London Times. They present at considerable length the identical technique, tactics and efforts to control or contaminate labor unions, also the "peace movements" and snares to beguile youth groups in Britain, as we have observed in this country. The pattern and the purpose is for Moscow's aims. They endeavor to "soften up" the British people, says the Times, so they will come to accept communism as an alternative to the tensions of the cold war. They regard Christian morality as mere weakness or stupidity and they take advantage of it. They accuse the British government of being the main "obstacle to peace" because it will not accept Soviet proposals for total disarmement without any system of guarantees. The government in Britain and other colonial powers are "ruthless oppressors" of backward peoples: it is the British, or French or Portuguese who are "brutal murderers" of Africans, Arabs or others and the British are "Nazi warmongers" because they allow West German soldiers

to train in their country. No mention is ever made of communist methods of liquidation within the Soviet Union or in satellite countries. They enlist support for a whole range of societies and associations, the object of which is simply to promote "democracy, friendship, research, women's rights, art, science, music and, of course, peace". These "innocent" clubs arrange showings of Soviet films at their headquarters - guests come only by invitation, so they know whom they are deluding. They arrange visits to and from the Soviet Union for anyone from an astronaut to a ballet dancer. This is part of the "cultural" programs for snaring the innocent.

These and many more activities of the communists in Britain are precisely what the communists and their collaborators have been doing in this country for years. The pattern is identical on both sides of the Atlantic. Yet the American communists try to convince us that they are an "independent" political organization. Their independence is the same that millions of others have behind the Iron Curtain




