





REFLECTIONS ON A SATELLITE-NASA is experimenting with laser as a possible tool for tracking satellites in space. Laser is a highly concentrated light beam whose chief characteristic is that it does not diffuse and disappear over a distance as, say, a flashlight beam does. A laser beam wouldhit a satellite in approximately the same size and intensity as when it left the transmitter. The "receiver" for the beam is pictured above, being inspected by Dr. H. H. Potkin at the NASA space center, Greenbelt, Md; It is an octagonal, pyramidal case to contain 360 one-inch prism reflectors, to be mounted on a satellite. They can bounce a ground-based beam back to its source from almost any angle. From beam's travel time, distance from earth can be calculated.
