Says \$10 Billion Can **Avoid Recession**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy emphasized today that he would accept a tax cut of \$10 billion or larger from Congress this year without tax reform, in order to avoid

The chief executive delivered a prepared address to a symposium on economic growth sponsored by the American Bankers Association, and then participated in a question and answer session during which he emphasized his desire for tax reduction affecting calendar 1963.

Only a week ago, Democratic congressional leaders said the administration planned to continue its efforts for the overall reduction-and-reform package. This involved a gross tax reduction of Postpones Talks \$13.5 billion with about \$3.5 billion being returned to the government through reform measures to tighten loopholes and correct inequitites.

Mystery Geyser Still Going Strong

ATTICA, Kan. (UPI) -A mysterious salt water geyser that sprung up in the middle of a county road started its third week today of spitting gas and water from the earth.

From 350 to 400 barrels of saline water gush hourly from the 50-foot-deep crater. It tests about 55 per cent salt saturation and has containinated nearby Bluff Creek

The hole started spewing gas Feb. 7, then fresh muddy water became salty and other smaller started following. Soon, the liquid holes within a mile south opened. The hole grew rapidly.

Water squirted up to 100 feet the first days. As the hole grew larger, the spout grew shorter. Now the gas forces the fountain some three to 15 feet high, varywould only cause the some 20 or 30 other smaller holes to spout additional water.

Parr said one of the minor hole's natural gas had caught fire but fire at the main geyser had been averted. The danger that somebody would ignite the gas flow remained a hazard.

Most farmers had fenced their livestock away from Bluff Creek. Parr said an attempt was made to pipe the salt water into a "disposal well," but that was abaning from time to time.

"It just keeps going," said Don Parr, editor of the Attica Independent, a weekly newspaper. "It has become a serious prob-

THE PERILS OF EXPEDIENCY While the Congress has gone on to other matters, it is to be hoped that the initial struggle in the House of Representatives over the Rules Committee will teach a lasting lesson to those Southern Congressmen who surrender convictions in exchange for an administration promise.

It was apparent to political observers even before the voting in the House that a lot of horsetrading was in prospect. But the really crass action, which dismayed and angered conservatives, was the bolt by Georgia's entire 10-man delegation to the administration side. The delegation voted to pack the House Rules Committee, in accord with the wishes of the White House.

In so doing, the Georgia delegation found itself in some very peculiar company. Among the organizations that wanted the Rules Committee packed were Americans for Democratic Action. NAACP, and the Industrial Union Department of the AFL-CIO, Walter Reuther, president.

As political analysts around the nation have reported, the Georgia delegation evidently thought it had ing with the Kennedy administration, one of its members, U.S. Rep. Phil Landrum, would receive a place on the very important House Ways and Means Commit-

But dealing is not always the smart thing to do, let alone the right thing, as the delegation discovered. Many Conservative Southerners, finding that their cause had been sacrificed on the altar of political expediency, voted against Rep. Landrum when the time came to choose the Ways and Means Committee memberand Congressman Landrum lost

No doubt many, if not all, of Georgia's delegation now are sorry that they ever departed from the straight and narrow path. Certainly, the scars of bitterness should be allowed to heal as rapidly as possible. But it is proper to dwell on the lessons of this experience. Part of the defeat suffered by

the Georgia delegation unquestionably was the result of the administration's failure to deliver did not deliver the votes even after the Georgians did their part. This incident-should make South-

erners, who consider cooperation with the New Frontier, realize that they will be played for suckers. The Kennedy administration will use people who will promote its goals, but the rewards may not be received by those who expect them. The administration is hardly the soul of political integrity.

In addition, the conservative coalition is very strong. And those who profess to be conservatives, but back down in a pinch, can't expect the real conservatives to do nothing when the cause of good government suffers from those who follow the path of expedi-

Political honesty is the best policy, as everyone should know. If one is a liberal, then announce oneself as such and declare allegiance to the New Frontier, If one is a conservative, then don't traffic with the other side in politics. One may disagree with a sincere liberal, but one will respect his rights to his oponion and the courage of his convictions. But who respects the nominal conservative who tries to be an undercover liberal? Who respects the officeholder who places a special, short-term advantage ahead of the long-range benefits of a principled public pol-

The conservative who thinks he can let down the cause of good government "just once," does himself and his cause grave harm. Then the opposition comes to believe that those who voice proud sentiments do not, in truth, believe what the ysay. They move swiftly to strike at the weak spots in the conservative line.

With the lesson of the House Rules Committee in mind, Southern conservatives should move ahead - realizing it was but a preliminary skirmish - and gird themselves for the big struggles ahead over the proposal to incro spend and reduce taxes at the same time, over foreign aid, Medicare, the recap version of the Urban Affairs bill and all the other projects that Mr. Kennedy is bringing forth. Perhaps the very unhappy experience concerning the Rules fight will help spread understanding of the essential importance of conservative

Tax Must Be Cut, And More Bureaucrats Added By ED DELANEY

Rep. Leslie Arends of Illionis, has called attention to a speech made before members of the Democratic National Committee, in Washington, by Ted Sorensen told the party stalwarts that if they expect to continue riding the gravy train and re-elect Mr. Kennedy in 1964, they should put pressure on Congress to cut taxes this year. Fool the public - get the votes. It was a brazen but characteristic admission that politics and not the economic welfare of the country, must be considered by Congress.

If taxes are cut, points out Arends, there should be corresponding slashes in federal expenditures. But of course that is not even considered by the intrepid Frontiersmen. As cited in this column some 18 months ago, approximately 360 more employes are added to the federal payroll every working day in the year. That adds up to about 180,000 potential voters for the Kennedy brothers administration in 1964, besides their dependents and relatives who also have votes. When presenting his recent bud-

get message, the President staged a good performance, but not quite good enough. Like a magician who bamboozles you with the manipulations of one hand, the other hand picked your pocket. A study of the 1963-64 budget reyeals that there will be about 37 000 additional recipients of the Kennedy largess, next year, at the expense of the taxpavers. Brother Bobby's office will get 765 more clerks, flunkies, chauffeurs, lawyers and undoubtedly marshals to replace those who are still needed for the illegal occupation of Mississippi. That invasion and occupation has already cost in excess of \$5 million and the end is not in sight.

Then the Peace Corps project under the direction of brotherin-law R. Sargent Shiver Jr., is vitally needed to bolster the national economy, so its budget is raised from a trifling \$58.5 million for last year, to \$108 million for the fiscal year starting July. The volunteer Frontiersmen who make up the personnel of that political agency will be increased from 9,000 at present, to 13,000. And instead of spending that \$108 million, or the major part of it in this country, the Peace Corps will scatter most of their dollars in Africa and Latin America. Statistics show there is an appreciable annual increase of young voters in this country of African or Latin American ancestry. By spending a great part of that \$108 million in Africa and Latin America, with generous press releases to inform those voters, it should reflect favorably for the sponsors of the project in November 1964.

Moreover the Peace Corps helps to reduce the number of unemployed in this country, Sen. Frank Lausche, (D.Ohio) questioned Bill D. Moyers, 28, a former radio and press reporter at relatively small pay, who began working for Lyndon Johnson at the starting salary of \$10,000. But in three months that was raised to \$15,-000, then he was made deputy director to the President's brothof \$20,000. 

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do no share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.
