

IT'S THE LAW * in Texas *

HISTORY OF WILLS

is one of man's oldest transactions. As far back as the Egyptian, Assyrian and Jewish civilizations, we have wills written and witnessed on papyrus, clay tablets, etc. In one will an early testator left some of his property to his wife and named a guardian for his children. The Hammurabi code (2100 B.C.) permitted a father by deed

Under early Roman law the head of a house could tell the patrican assembly his wishes, but later Roman law favored a written will to keep the testator's plans secret until death. It also favored having a firm record of his wishes. not resting on memory.

By 2100 A.D. England, where we got our law of wills, was quite well advanced: The church courts (like our probate courts) supervised disposition of property according to a "testament" of how the testator wanted his property to

Church courts supervised personal property (movables like armor or personal effects); land was passed on by wills which the king's court handled. Hence today we speak of "last will and testament" since English courts came to pass on both real and personal property, so that one court could



The star, known geometrically as a radiant icosahedron, gave Liu the idea for a new kind of farm building. The shape of the building is a modified icosahedron, shown in a model, right. It's constructed by bolting five diamond-shaped panels to a pentagonal base. The frame is filled in with a flexible latticework, then covered with a spray-on plastic material and finished with a weather-resistant coating. The covering adds little weight to the structure, as a regular roof would, and increases its strength as a conventional roof would not. Strohm Explores Farm Mess

CHICAGO (NEA) - "Does it make any earthly sense in a world of want to threaten farmers with heavy fines if they produce too much food?"

With this challenging question, John Strohm, distinguished American reporter, editor and farmer, attacks "Our Crazy Food and Farm Problem" in an important series of articles in The Pampa News starting tomorrow.

Inspection Of Vehicles Only 21 Per Cent

inspection stickers drawing near, only 21 per cent of the vehicles in Gray County have been inspected." Captain Alan Johnson, Motor to a dollar, you can get a really Vehicle Inspection Supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said this week.

Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations when the April 15 deadline approaches. "The authorized inspection stations are ready and capable of handling the inspection of Texas registered vehicles without delay if owners will not wait until just a few days before the deadline," Johnson said.

"Any driver operating a vehicle registered in Texas, that is required to be inspected, on public roads after April 15 will be operating in violation of the law," he

Captain Johnson called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program, vehicles having a defect that was a causitive factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13 per cent to 4 per cent. "The purpose of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident and, by removing the link, prevent the accident," he pointed
