# Investigators Probe Mysterious Crash

MIAMI (UPI) — A Chicago-bound jetliner which crashed and burned in Florida's vast Everglades swampland, killing all 43 persons aboard, was inspected today by experts in an at-

tempt to explain its mysterious plunge. Helicopters flew to the remote site at dawn and a team of a dozen government aviation authorities started the painstaking task of examining the scattered wreckage.

UPI newsmen at the scene saw wreckage scattered over an area about two square miles.

NEW YORK (NEA) - The No. I fear in the world today is man's dread of not getting enough food to fill family stomachs. If you could poll all persons on

earth, you would find the threat of quick extinction in atomic war lagging far behind the fear of slow starvation. "How am I going to feed my

family?" is a plaintive wail I've heard in four continents. Yet the U. S. has spent billions

of dollars to hold down food production - and threatens farmers with heavy fines if they grow too much. Does this make sense? The brutal world facts are these:

Two out of three persons on earth are not getting enough food to work efficiently. I've seen bloated stomachs of malnourished children in the Middle East. . . diseased, disabled, hopeless people in Latin America. . . the dull eyes of apathetic Chinese who have been living on wild roots.

Fanning the hunger fire is a death race between the feeders and the breeders to determine if man can produce as fast as he can reproduce. Every hour 5,000 more new mouths are crying to be

nations hear wails of hunger, while the Iron Curtain countries desperately try to cope with food shortages, we wallow in surpluses and spend \$4 billion a year to bribe farmers not to grow too

Food is a problem in three great areas of the world and each is of profound significance to us all as consumers, citizens, and taxpayers. The areas are the have - not nations, the Iron Curtain countries, and the United States.

1. Have-not countries in Asia, Latin America and Africa are underdeveloped because they are underfed. Hungry people are listless Channel 7 people. Without fuel, the human body hits on only a couple of cylinders. What we criticize as a lazy 'manana' attitude is often no more than malnutrition.

Few of these countries are holding their own in the life and death struggle between production Take Egypt, one of the cradles

of civilzation, where an advanced griculture was carried on 5,000 years ago. In 1875 Egypt had 5.7 million acres of cultivated land, nd 5 million people barely geting by. "Two thirds of all mankind are n a treadmill - the age - old truggle against chronic malnutriion," Dr. B. R. Sen, Director Genreal of the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations, old me recently in his Rome

headquarters. Many of these people are desperately hungry. Many more sufer a debilitation that stunts the desire to help themselves. When a man and his family must devote all their time to growing food for survival, all thoughts and desire or self-help are crowded out of their lives.

"For most of the 70 less developed countries containing 1.9 bilon persons," says our Department of Agriculture, "diets are nutritionally inadequate, malnutrition is widespread and persistent, and there is no likelihood the food problems soon will be solved."

These people live on the ragged edge of starvation: a pound of rice or corn a day is a typical ration. They have only one acre of land per person to produce food, and they use a scant 1.5 pounds of fertilizer per person. In the U. S., we have about 2.





### 5-What Putter?

Third Straight

Almost anything goes in a putt-

The rules allow all sorts of designs and variations in shafts, grips and heads. The main thing is to find one that feels good and gives you complete confidence. The angle of the shaft in relation to the head is important.

A stand-up putter probably will find an almost straight-up shaft best, a stooper may need one at a greater angle. A putter with the shaft at the inside end of the blade is called center-shafted. Heelshafted clubs have the shaft nearer the center of the blade. Straight shafts break straight from the blade while goosenecked shafts curve away from the face of the







## The Doctor Says:

Raynaud's Disease Changes Color of Fingers By DR. WAYNE BRANDSTADT

Q-I have been told that I have Raynaud's disease. What is it? I am taking nicotinic acid for it and no other drug.

A-Raynaud's disease is a relatively uncommon condition in which exposure to cold and sometimes emotional stress brings on a change in the color of the fingers. In the more severe form the toes and other parts may be involved. First there is a blanching of the fingers, then they turn blue or red or they may turn blue and later turn red. The initial stage or pallor is caused by a spasm of the arteries that send blood to the fingers. This is associated with a feeling of coldness or numbness.

The blue tinge results when the spasm relaxes a little and allows only a small trickle of blood to get to the fingers. The fact that the oxygen supply of this trickle of blood is rapidly reduced makes the blood turn blue.

On complete release of the spasm there is a rapid widening of the arteries and a rush of blood to the fingers causing them to become red. This is associated with a burning, tingling, or throbbing sensation. The process starts in the tips of the fingers and may to the joints nearest the hand. The more severe forms of the disease may result in gangrene or loss of the finger tips.

In many persons the cause of this condition cannot be found. In others it may be due to certain types of injury, disorders that cause permanent narrowing of the arteries, severe prolonged exposure to cold, heredity or other factors. It is sometimes seen in persons with lupus erythematosus, rheumatic fever and other general-

ized diseases. Attacks may be brought on in some persons by anger or frustration. Anyone who has this condition must be especially careful to avoid exposure to cold. An attack may be relieved by taking a hot drink or a hot bath.

If the disease has been present for a long time, reserpine or related drugs may be required.

Some doctors in France recently

reported marked improvement of this disease in persons who also had a deficiency of vitamin B-6 when this deficiency was corrected. Nicotinic acid is another of the vitamins in the B group.

Sympathectomy (the severing of some of the sympathetic nerve roots as they come out of the spinal column) has been used with good effect on some sufferers when simpler measures have fail-


